IN COURT

Case Adjourned Until Sept. 4th--No Official Copy of the Act in Town.

The police court was crowded to the doors this morning to hear the argument in the case of Albert Geiser, the Oregon banker and contractor, charged with a breach of the Alien Labor Act on the information of W. L. McDonald.

A. H. MacNeill, K.C., appeared on behalf of the prosecution, and Hon. T. Mayne Daly for Geiser.

Mr. Daly raised the objection that the act as amended made no provision for a summary conviction and counsel contended that the po lice magistrate had no jurisdiction to try the case.

Mr. MacNeill said that there was no strictly official copy of the act in Rossland. The copy in his possession appeared in the Labor Gazette, a publication issued by the King's printer at Ottawa, bearing the royal arms and issued by the department. THE SITUATION

What Bernard Macdonald Has Done and Is Doing.

FAKE CABLES BEING CIRCULATED

the Attacks on the Union—Too Late to Turn Now--Has Deceived Directors.

We have all heard of the proverb about rats deserting a sinking ship; but rats are not in it when compared with Mr. Bernard Macdonald's ingratitude to Whitaker Wright. No later than last week this master of the policy of facing both ways was assuring the public that there would be no change in the directorate. Mr. Wright was paragon of perfection, a synonym for all the virtues, and Mr. Bernard Macdonald was his trusted co. adjutor. What do we find now? The entire Wright following rejected by indignant shareholders and an investigating committee appointed to look into the methods by which Mr. Bernard Macdonald and a few of his officials in Rossland and Northport have succeeded in paralyzing a great industry.

Has a Tough hide.

None, save an individual with the hide of a rhinoceros, would have the cadacity to com this as an expression of approval of the policy adopted by him. The man with the hide of the rhinoceros has been found, for we read in Mr. Bernard Macdonald's newspaper this morning, the following: "London Directorate Firm," Then follows a cable: "New board of directors fully endorse your policy with regard to strike. (Signed) Le Roi Mining Company, Limited." No more brazened attempt to gull and mislead the business public and those who are anxious for a restoration of harmony could be imagined.

The Fake Cables.

In the first place, the men elected are antagonistic to a prolongation of the existing strike, and it is evident will deal with his actions as a deplorable mockery of business methods. In the second place the "fake" cable is its own condemnation, for there is no official signature to it. The cables published by the WORLD today show that it was utterly impossible that Mr. Bernard Macdonald's policy could be endorsed, as no motion was made at the meeting, nor could one be made in the notice calling the meeting, nor could the direstors act, because there was no properly constituted board of directors and no meeting of the new directors had taken place.

At a Disadvantage.

Mr. Macdonald certainly appears to great disadvantage. He has all along urged a bad cause with boundless impudence. He conspired with Bela Kadish to bring about a lockout at the Northport smelter. Vast sums of money were paid or offered to be paid to union men to betray their trusts. Legal expenses were incurred that would stagger any hard headed business man. Rossland then became the theatre for further dramatic effort on his part. He adopted a plan of campaign more suggestive of the trickery of a circus thimble rigger than a mine manager, and he has virtually gambled with treasures of which he had been made a custodian, apparently for the sole purpose of gratifying a long sought for opportunity to crush

THE FIRST VICTORY.

The clean sweep effected yesterday in London at the meeting of the Le Roi shareholders, by which not only Whitaker Wright personally, but all his immediate friends and followers were brushed off the directorate, was naturally very well received in Rossland, The additional news that Mr. Robert James Frecheville, the mining engineer and nominee of the Robinson syndicate had been elected to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Mr. Wright, and that the new director and one other would leave England for Rossland on Wednesday next to confer with Henry. Bratnober and re-arrange affairs here, confirmed the opinion already expressed in these columns, and there is now every reasonable probability that in a very short time we will see as complete a change here as was witnessed in London yesterday, and that for some years to come we can all look forward to an era of peace and prosperity.

A very different state of things was at one time feared. It was known that two or three London syndicates had for some time been endeavoring to obtain control of the Le Roi company and it was at least possible that by combining with some of these parties the discredited Whitaker Wright faction might manage to partly continue to control the situation in London and out here.

This unpleasant aspect of the case is now no longer possible and while the views on the strike question, of the English representatives who will shortly leave for Rossland are not definitely known, it is at least certain that they are not unfriendly to the union men and a conference is now assured, an impossibility so long as Bernard Macdonald remained sole arbitrator.

Later news received today not only confirms yesterday's dispatches, but positively asserts that no matter what may be the final attitude of the new directorate toward the union, an absolute change n the mine and smelter manage ment has already been decided on and that the advent of the two directors will be quickly folhere.

This is the natural sequence of events which have led up to the present situation and it would be exceedingly difficult to understand any other ending. Some months ago in London a determined systematic attempt was organized to oust Whitaker Wright and his followers in London and out here. The first part of the program has been successfully carried out. Does any one imagine that a set of keen business men would leave the work on hand but half done?

Manager Macdonald is well aware-no one better-of his own painful position, hence his rather foolish and indignified action, as sketched in his newspaper this morning. As a beaten and probably discredited mine manager, he might well have remained silent and awaited his ending in a dignified way, a [stand which would at least have won for him the sympathy usually accorded to the under dog in every fight. Mr. Macdonald evidently prefers to die differently but his shouting now will deceive no one or avail him any more than have his frantic cables to London during the past few

A little more patience and the looked for change will be an accomplished fact here. The World has always expressed the view that if two shrewd business men where dispatched out here having the real interest of the Le Roi share-holders at heart and having full power to adjust the matters, a settlement would promptly arrived at. The men are coming and we have no doubt of the ultimate result of their visit.

NEW ZEALAND.

People who read the editorials in the morning paper, thoughtfully prepared for the nominal editor of that publication, must have been some what bothered by the articles on gold production and on New Zealand, which followed one TORONTO another today. The first gave the figures proving that the gold production of New Zealand, for the OTTAWA first six months of 1901, showed MONTREAL an increase over the same period of last year, of considerably over half a million of dollars, or 16.7 per cent. The second article was devoted to proving the reverse of the first and to demonstrating that the country in question has really gone to pieces and is in a very bad

New Zealand affairs will doubtless be attacked very savagely by all those who fear the coming of compulsory arbitration, but just as long as its government are in a position to conclusively demonstrate, as they certainly can at the J. present time, that New Zealand is prospering beyond all expectations and advancing by leaps and bounds, they can afford to ignore the attitude of unfriendly and untruthful critics.

As to the real situation in New Zealand, the words of the agent general published in all the leading English papers on the 10th of this month, can be left to speak for themselves, he said:

"There is no 'paralysis of business' whatever. Trade is brisk and condition of business perfectly northport. normal. New Zealand still enjoys to the full the high prosperity which has marked the last few

"As for supposing that the arbitration act has 'admittedly broken down and is benumbing the country's industries,' that hardly calls for serious contradiction, at any rate it is quite opposed to fact. The census figures will show the extraordinary progress made by industries all round since the act came in force."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

In a lengthy article on compulsory arbitration the Nanaimo Herald says: "Now, would not the arbitrators' decision be subject to the same public criticism as the merits of a strike? If they were unfair would not public opinion condemn them and if they were fair would they not be approved and would not this force of public approval or disapproval have a strong tendency to regulate the verdict of the court within the limits of reasonableness and fairness? Public opinion, therefore, is the great tribunal to which both strikers and arbitrators must bow and there is one advantage on the side of arbitration that the strike can never posses. It is that work is not suspended, labor and capital are not destroyed, women and children do not starve and the whole industrial world is not paralyzed during the progress of the settlement."
