## NEWS IN A NUTSHELL

Items of Interest Round the World.

LATEST TELEGRAPH BULLETINS

The Doings of Conspicuous Persons Affecting Canadian Interests.

A rising of natives is feared in German South Africa.

An arbitration treaty has been signed between Italy and France.

Late industrial strikes in Paris have had to be quelled by force of arms.

Fire in the new Iroquois theatre in Chicago has caused the death of 500 people.

It has been decided by Liberals to contest the North Renfrew election on the ground of bribery.

Italian papers confirm the report that the Genoese war ships have been sold to Japan.

Japan is guaranteeing the debtures for the completion of the Seoul-Fusan railway in Korea.

Japan will not compromise with Russia on the basis of a Russian supremacy in Manchuria.

The American cotton market is in a flurry, owing to the recent advance.

Senator Burton is of the opinion that the next presidential election is a cinch for Roosevelt.

It is at last officially announced that Great Britain has recognized the new republic of Panama.

The Japanese public are urging the government to be less dilatory in the steps they are taking against Russia.

It is reported that China will make common cause with Japan against Russia unless that country withdraws from Manchuria.

Japanese who have taken the place of strike breaker Greeks on the Great Northern railway have struck themselves for higher wages.

Press reports declare that there is a general feeling of dissatisfaction and revolt arising against Russian rule in Siberia.

Premier Deakin of Australia declares that the Ministerialists, an influential section of the Opposition, and a majority of the Labor party, all support Chamberlain's policy.

Nelson's Shingle Mill

Part of the machinery for the new shingle mill being built at the foot of Park street was received in Nelson yesterday, and will be placed in position as soon as the frame of the building now in course of construction is sufficiently advanced to shelter it. Cutting will be commenced at the mill as soon as the plant is ready.

## GOVERNMENT RAILWAY

Badly Wanted Here—Pooled Roads Put Up Rates.

Vancouver, Dec. 31.—The announcement of the increase of 17 1/2 per cent in commodity rates on all the transcontinental railways on January 18th next struck Vancouver merchants in a heap at first sight and many inquiries were made at the railway offices this morning regarding the matter.

After deliberation the jobbers have concluded that they can do nothing but increase their selling prices to an extent that will cover the increased cost of transportation of freight. In effect the wholesalers will pass the burden of the increased cost on the retailers, who in turn will put it on the customers, and thus will the balance be struck.

In answer to all inquiries about the increase, railroad officials could but announce that rates were agreed upon at a convention of freight traffic officials in Chicago some weeks ago.

Is Archbishop

London, Dec. 31.—The most reverend Francis Bourne, Roman Catholic archbishop of Westminster, was enthroned in the new cathedral of Westminster this morning with impressive ceremony.

## ANOTHER BONANZA

Rich Strike Made Near Dawson.

A STAMPEDE IMPENDING

Ground Runs to Three Dollars a Pan—An Enormously Rich District.

Vancouver, Dec. 31.—Special despatches from Dawson corroborated by private telegrams give the news that an enormously rich strike has been made by Louis Cardinal, of Ottawa, and others, ten miles across the border in Alaska. Cardinal has left Dawson with a \$10,000 outfit. He will be gone a year to work the new strike, which is on the head waters of White river. It is stated that he has found the famous White river channel which extends for a long distance.

Cardinal, who has been in Dawson for some time, states that the ground goes from eighty cents to \$3 a pan, and that he is not near bedrock. It was feared a stampede will occur, although Cardinal made every effort to keep the matter quiet. His party secured a great number of twenty acre claims and have taken out United States papers so as to be certain of holding the ground.

Cardinal worked for the Canadian government in locating the boundary line between Alaska and the Yukon. He states that White river channel extends from Bulion creek and he believes it will prove an enormously rich district.

## DELIVER THE GOODS

Vancouver's New Railway Is Opening Up Tomorrow

Vancouver, Dec. 31.—The first through train on the Vancouver, Westminster & Yukon railway, to this city will be run on New Year's day. The passenger, mail and baggage coaches were brought over to New Westminster from Sydney yesterday. Track laying at this end is proceeding on schedule time. The steel gang is laying rails on the trestle that leads to Westminster avenue. The bridge-men worked an extra shift last night. Everything should be in readiness tomorrow so that the company can meet its charter requirements by running the first train.

The Sullivan

Many hundred feet of development work has been done at the Sullivan mine, and it is estimated that there are now blocked out fully 200,000 tons of good shipping ore.

Want Asiatics

Pretoria, Dec. 31.—The Transvaal legislature, after a three day debate, declared in favor of Asiatic immigration by a vote of 22 to 4.

Looking back over the year which closes today Rosslanders have much to be thankful for. We have touched the nadir of our fortunes and are circling again towards the zenith. The close of the year shows more mines at work than was the case at this time last year, and indeed for several years past. The year has seen the solution of the reduction of the silicious ores of the camp, and the beginning of the end as far as regards the reduction of the ferruginous. It has seen the erection of the forerunner of the numerous concentrating plants which are destined to occupy Trail creek valley. It has seen what may be the end of the long drawn out and vexatious water question, although there is still a loophole for further litigation which, however, is not likely to be attempted, if the city council elected does its duty. It has successfully run a summer carnival, which was the token of peace between the warring elements in the city. Beginning in doubt the year has gradually waxed better and

better, till today some of our leading merchants are reporting as good a business as ever. Rossland has also during the past year awoken to the necessity of a change in our municipal administration, which will conserve the franchises of the people to the benefit of the city, and which will insist on a thoroughly economical carrying out of civic business. Altogether the camp has done well, and can now brace itself up to do better.

## CANADA OUTSIDE

We of the inland country think little upon the merchant marine of this Dominion. Yet to foreign nations the frequent sight of a windjammer, with her topmast and topgallant masts stayed well forward proclaims long before the meteor flag with the maple leaves on the fly, the presence of Canada in those waters. And Nova Scotia owns most of the sailing vessels that go down to the great waters, and proclaim in their build as well as their insignia the power of the Dominion over the world. Scoffingly called "bluenoses" "limejuicers," though this latter title nowadays is a generic name for the whole of the British marine, an honorable title inasmuch as it proclaims the reign of King Temperance, the ships of Canada proudly flaunt their flags alongside of the best of their rivals in foreign ports which may be reckoned from Rio to Foochow, from Mozambique to Archangel. There can be no better advertisement of Canada than its merchant marine, and the fact is warmly welcomed that at no time was ship building more active, and that during the past year upwards of 30,000 tons

were added to Canada's mercantile registry.

## THE PREFERENCE.

New Zealand has now in force a preferential tariff for the Empire. Her chief customers are, in the order named, Great Britain, the United States and Germany, the last named a bad third with Great Britain even now enjoying the bulk of the trade. An important item for both Great Britain and Canada is the admission of iron rails and such like free of duty, when from within the Empire, but chargeable with a 20 per cent duty when from other countries. Otherwise the tariff gives all round the very substantial advantage of ten per cent when dealing with Great Britain. That is to say that if the duty is 30 per cent to foreign countries, it is 20 per cent to Empire, and not 27 per cent. This is practically the same as the Canadian 33 1/3 per cent, but charged along a different line. There is no doubt that this tariff will have the effect in a short time of practically excluding other manufacturing countries than those of the Empire from New Zealand markets, especially if Great Britain prevents dumping by adopting Chamberlain's policy. Canada will benefit considerably in her iron trade which is already assuming large proportions. New Zealand's action is practically a defiance to Germany and of its treatment of Canada.

North Star Will Ship

Having made the necessary arrangements with the Hall Smelting company at Nelson, the North Star will commence shipping in January.

## The Reco

The old vein at the Reco, Sloan, is being developed again. Work on it was suspended in 1897 and not resumed until recently. Some of the richest silver-lead ore ever mined was taken from this lead, which showing up well again.

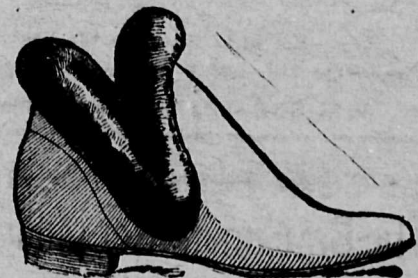
