ANOTHER STAMPEDE

An Important Gold Strike Made on Pelly River, Near Ft. Selkirk.

Tacoma, March 12.—Dawson and the towns adjacent are excited over an important gold strike made in February on a tributary of the Pelly river between that stream and the Yukon, 40 miles from Fort Selkirk. Outcoming miners say dirt running as high as \$500 per pan was taken out. When the news reached Dawson the stampede to Koyukok stopped immediately and scores of miners started for Pelly river.

The discovery was made by Dick Dutton, an old Yukon prospector, who staked a discovery claim and then went to Yukon to spread the news. Up to March 1st about 200 claims have been staked. Prospecting showed that most of them are rich in gold from the surface down.

DIES SUDDENLY

Ex-Governor Altgeld's Dramatic Death.

AN IMPASSIONED BOER APPEAL

Physicians Thought Syncope Not to be Dangerous but Were Wrong.

Chicago, March 12.—At the conclusion of an impassioned appeal in behalf of the Boers, delivered last night in the Joliet opera house in Joliet, Ills., ex-Governor John P. Altgeld fell into a dead faint as he was walking away from the stage. No doctors were in the opera house, but a block away a banquet of Will county medical society was being held. A messenger was despatched and in five minutes Doctors Nash and Cushing had reached the side of the unconscious man, restoratives were called into use and after much effort Mr. Altgeld regained consciousness. He was taken to the Monroe hotel, where he was cared for and it was announced that he was out of danger.

The physicians diagnosed the attack as the result of stomach trouble and did not think heart weakness was primarily to blame.

Later news shows the diagnosis to be incorrect as the patient died in his room at the Hotel Monroe this morning at 7.09 o'clock. He had been unconscious since midnight.

CITY COUNCIL.

No Business Beyond Routine Was Transacted—Early Closing Bylaw.

At the meeting of the city council last night at the city hall the mayor and all his aldermen were present with the exception of Alderman Hamilton still absent on leave. Only the ordinary routine business was transacted there being nothing of any moment brought up by the members of the council.

Mayor Clute expressed himself informally as to the early closing bylaw and said that the alteration of payday had made a difference in its working. The bylaw made an exception in favor of the fifteenth day of each month because that was the the pay day of the miners. The pay day had now been altered and although keeping open on the altered day was not contrary to the spirit of the law it was clearly against its letter. Any alteration to be made in the wording of the enactment could not come, however, from the council but must proceed on petition from the citizens.

Why the Children Do Not Attend.

ROSSLAND'S JOPLIN INCUBUS

An Easy Remedy Easily Applicable by the Authorities Concerned.

It takes time to teach anybody anything. It apparently is the work of eternity to try to teach our civic Solons the veriest rudiments of city government. Lots of people voted for Clute because they thought it was a vote against the strike, and consequently for better business conditions. Some fruits of the policy adopted are already becoming apparent. One of the newest is that of school attendance. The authorities do not understand why the attendance is slack, but they do understand that it will cost the city a large sum of money if it does not grow better.

Were a visit to be paid to some of the mothers concerned it would soon be seen that the fault was that of the city itself. Mothers like to send their children neatly and suitably clothed to school. One of the chief points in this matter is the article of shoes. Now shoes cost money, and if the city and the mine management which it is backing choose to employ aliens who have no interests in the city or bachelors who have no families in preference to old residents, married and settled, it necessarily follows that there is a scarcity of money. The families suffer, and as the city is made up of a number of families it cannot but suffer also.

As long as a discrimination is kept up against union men and union sympathizers, which practically means the best elements in the city, just so long will the merchants sell less goods and pay less taxes, while at the same time the city expenses must inevitably increase. This is what Joplin is doing for Rossland and now Rossland seems to be surprised.

Of course the advocates of this willy nilly, brute force policy are urging coercion in order to remedy the matter. That force is no remedy is well known, but what can you expect from a pig but a grunt.

A GERMAN PORT

Kaiser Wants Tientsin for His Own.

THE MUNICIPAL CONTENTION

How the Sea Gate to Peking and the North is to be Secured to Germany.

Tientsin, March 12.—With regard to the antagonism Germany is developing to the proposed reduction of garrisons in this important center of Chinese commerce it would seem that the movement has behind it the secret intrigues of years. Germany has ever tried to have a foothold in this city and has worked it through commissioner of customs Dietring who for many years has held this post. When some years ago the British government offered the present director general of customs, Sir Robert Hart, the post of British minister to Peking, it is well known that he declined solely on the grounds that Commissioner Dietring was slated by the court party to be his successor. Had he succeeded in his effort to have his brother James Hart appointed to this post he would have accepted the Peking appointment. As it was the position occupied for so many years by Mr. Dietring in opposition to the usual policy pursued by Sir Robert Hart, who always took care that no commissioner should remain over a certain brief period of time in one port, has established the German trade, which he a German subject not unnaturally favored, in a position in this port which it has enjoyed in no other in China.

Hence the unwillingness of the German government to give up the advantages it has already obtained especially in view of the fact that it is already established firmly in the neighboring peninsula of Shantung at Kiaochow.

The argument put forward is that Tientsin should be governed by foreigners in the same manner as Shanghai. If this succeeds it would mean that Germany would have by far the largest say in the affairs of the city, and would no doubt in time succeed in placing this gate to Peking on the footing of a purely German port.

EARLY CLOSING.

A letter was published in these columns yesterday drawing attention to the impunity with which the early closing bylaw is broken to the disadvantage of those merchants who are honestly endeavoring to carry out the spirit of the law. There seems that little redress can be expected from the police from causes which are not altogether within its control. This being the case it is well to remind the citizens concerned that all that has to be done is to buy goods at the offending place of business and then lay an information. Under these circumstances the police would have that active co-operation of the public, which is necessary if the infringements of this bylaw are to be stopped.

NEW THREE PER CENTS.

The World has no reference to to consols. The Manchester Guardian is professedly surprised that the colonial governments are charging a commission on the work they are severally doing for the central government, and thinks that patriotism ought to preclude any charge being made. New South Wales was the first colony to make this charge on its disbursements and now the others are about to charge this commission also. The matter seems simple. The central government is probably allowing a business commission to the people with whom it deals. If these parties are foreign governments or private houses there would be no question as to the justice of the charge. Then why should there be if a colonial government is concerned? To act otherwise than the imperial government is doing would be to make a tax upon patriotism. Canada is displaying neither a mercenary nor an unpatriotic spirit in dealing with business relations in a business way.

WAR NEWS.

British news, especially British war news, which emanates from New York, may be justly regarded with suspicion says the Ottawa Citizen. But it is to be hoped that there is no truth in the report published in the New York Tribune that some Australians have been sentenced to death for retaliating upon the Boer guerrillas for their barbarous conduct in shooting our wounded. It is inconceivable that any British troop should retaliate by shooting the enemy's wounded, but conditions are conceivable under which the troops might be exasperated to the extent of shooting prisoners. The Boers have a nasty way of continuing to fire up to the last moment before surrendering, and then, after failing to kill the man who is coming at him at close quarters, he throws down his rifle at the fifty-ninth second and claims sanctuary as a prisoner. In the heat of a fight it needs all the discipline of Tommy Atkins to control his legitimate desire to make it a fight to a finish. It is all well enough for arm-chair sentimentalists to take a severe view of the conduct of men in the heat of battle, but the natural chivalry of the British soldier has so often been imposed upon by the "slim" and unchivalrous Boer that it is not to be wondered at if colonial troops, at least, should sometimes declare for "no quarter" in hand-to-hand encounters that

follow a charge involving heavy casualties among their comrades. The treacherous guerilla who prides himself on ignoring all the rules of the game cannot expect too close an adherence to these rules from the men he is fighting. The conduct of the British troops has been beyond praise in this respect but there is a limit to all things.

THE JAPS.

It is gratifying to be able to note that the commission on Oriental labor reporting on Japanese immigration has said that these particular Orientals are just as inimical to the true interests of Canada as are the Chinese. There was a fear at one time, as the commission showed itself somewhat chary of taking evidence against the Japs, that the question was one that would be shelved. Now this country gains nothing by excluding the Chinaman and harboring the Jap. In fact it loses, as the former are the best business people of the two and bring a commercial integrity with them which is absent in the latter. From the point of morality it is conceded by Anglo Saxon dwellers in the Far East that the Chinese have the advantage. There is some talk of the Japanese government forbidding emigration, but that story is a twice told tale. It has been proved to be false in the past and is likely to prove as false in the future. Therefore the provincial government should have no hesitation in enforcing a Natal act. The Japs are running the lumber and fishing industries at the coast. They have gained a footing in the railroads and will, if permitted, soon succeed the Joplins men at the mines.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The secretary of the Kaslo convention says Smith Curtis is mistaken as to his facts. In the same breath he shows him to be absolutely correct. The defence of the Kasloites is distinctly weak.

The Liberal Association of this city should turn down the question of the Canadian Northern land grant good and hard. It would not be a bad move for the Conservatives if they were also to put themselves on record against that policy.

The Kamloops Sentinel declares that the Liberal party should adopt the principle of compulsory arbitration as one of the planks of its platform. To say that the party would prevent strikes is very nice, but now that it cannot use the militia to this end, how is that object to be attained?

AN IMPEACHMENT

Charges of Malversation to be Preferred.

CURTIS AGAINST DUNSMUIR

Smith Curtis May Revive an Old Procedure Against the Premier.

Smith Curtis, M. P. P., was indignant this morning when he read the report of Col. Prior's statements last night regarding the contemplated sale of the E. & N. railway, says the Victoria Times. He said:

"The announcement made by Col. Prior and the Colonist that the Canadian Northern railway people are now closing a deal for the purchase of the E. & N. railway stamps the government's railway contract with the Canadian Northern as the most audacious and outrageous attempt ever made in Canada to exploit the public resources for a band of grafters. The question has ceased to be whether Victoria will be benefited or not by the proposed railway deal, and has shifted to much higher ground and is whether the premier of the province is to be allowed to give away subsidies to people who at the same time are buying his own railway to form a part of the subsidized system. To all reasonable minds this will seem a deliberate attempt to bring about, at enormous expense to the province, the sale of his own railway, probably, too, at a greatly enhanced price—a price far beyond its value.

"How can Col. Prior, as a man of honor, be a party to so scandalous a transaction? What is British Columbia coming to when its first minister, sworn to protect it, acts so infamously? What will world—the investing world—think of us, of our government, if the legislature or the lieutenant-governor permits Mr. Dunsmuir to remain in office for a day?

"If procedure by impeachment were not fallen into desuetude, I would, when the legislature meets on Tuesday, move Mr. Dunsmuir's impeachment. I shall then prefer charges against him for malversation in office in connection with these railway deals and ask for a committee or a commission to investigate and report to the house so that it may take the necessary action to purge itself and prove that the great majority of its members stand for probity and political purity."

THE LIE IS NAILED

Dr. Franks on the Real State of the Concentration Camps.

The London correspondent of the Vancouver News-Advertiser, says: "Those misguided individuals in this country who have conducted a campaign against the concentration camps in South Africa should be effectively silenced by the testimony of Dr. Kendal Franks, an eminent Dublin physician, who made an independent inspection of the various camps for the government. His report has been made public in a Blue-Book, which was issued on Monday night, and in it Dr. Franks completely refutes the wild stories of starvation and inhumanity practised on the inmates of these concentration camps.

In his opening remarks, Dr. Franks says: "There are certain people, both in Great Britain and on the Continent of Europe, who

have condemned these camps in unmeasured terms. There are not many who do so in South Africa. It would be well if such people, before indulging in denunciation, could see a camp like this at Bloemfontein. * * * Some of the well-meaning people at home are appalled at the high death rate among the children because they do not understand the conditions as we see them out here. They are willing and anxious to send out supplies or money to buy supplies to feed the children, who, they are told, are dying of starvation. That is not so. Not only are the rations ample to support life * * * but in all the camps there is a liberal supply of medical comforts.

No explanation is given, but the letter states that there can be no doubt that if the cannery managers would come together and consolidate interests the question of employing new methods for the catching of fish in these waters will be greatly simplified.

Silver Shipments.

Silver shipments to the east in January showed a decline as compared with the corresponding month last year says the New York Mining and Engineering Journal. The silver sent to China this year went from San Francisco, no shipments being reported from London.

The decrease in values was 17.5 per cent, but in quantities only 6.7 per cent; showing the effect of the lower price of silver this year. The exports to China there-

fore showed an actual increase in quantity, though the value was lower. A larger demand in silver may be expected from that country, as business becomes more settled. To India the falling off was in quantity as well as value.


