GETS ALL IT WANTS

Nelson in Happy Frame
of Mind.

MADE A DISTRIBUTING CENTRE

Rossland and Nelson Rates Untouched—Common Points Cut Out.

Nelson, April 28.—Harry E. Macdonell, General Freight agent of the Kootenay lines of the Canadian Pacific has informed Fred Starkey, the president of the Wholesalers' Association, that he had just received a despatch from F. W. Peters, Assistant Freight Traffic manager of the Western lines of the Canadian Pacific railway, who for the past few days has been in St. Paul in consultation with the traffic men of the Great Northern railway, in relation to the concessions which were to be made to Nelson. Mr. Peters as promised on Saturday, had sent the result of these negotiations in his telegram. This stated that an agreement had been reached with the Great Northern railway which cuts out the Kootenay common points rates.

The rates to Nelson and Rossland remain the same as they had been, except in the case of mining machinery, wire rope, powder and several other articles which are used in the operation of mines, when shipped in carload lots. The extras to the Boundary will also be put in as promised.

Then the message goes on to say that there several special commodities on which the rates will be determined as well as certain commodities from eastern Canada.

RIOTING IN AUSTRIA

The Socialists Are Making
Trouble in Dual
Monarchy

Vienna, April 28.—The Hungarian situation is regarded here as alarming. The Socialists threatened to proclaim a general strike, and in such an event, it is said in political circles, Count Tisza, the Hungarian premier, will put the whole kingdom under martial law.

Following the tragic event at the market town of Eled, near Gross Wardein, yesterday, in which a Socialist killed the commander of the gendarmerie, followed by the killing of twenty-three rioters and the wounding of forty by the gendarmes, a general strike has broken out at Gross Wardein. Today the shops, cafes and restaurants there, and even the schools, are closed, and the business life of the town is entirely suspended.

THE FIRST SERIOUS REVERSE

Japs Lose a Transport With
Troops.

JAPANESE REFUSED TO SURRENDER

New Kind of Combustible Invented by the Japs Is
Causing Some Damage in Russia.

Vladivostok April 28.—Confirmation has been received of the sinking of the Kinshu Maru by the Vladivostok squadron, early yesterday morning. The total crew on board the Kinshu was nearly 1000 lives, of which less than 150 were saved. The vessel, refusing to surrender although surrounded by the Vladivostok squadron and practically defenceless, was sunk with all on board.

St. Petersburg, April 28.—It is claimed that the Japanese have invented a new combustible which has most appalling effects. Their shells are being loaded with it. The peculiarity is that the detonation sets light to what is thought to be the old Greek fire reinvented. On the occasion of the sinking of the Retzivan, it was observed that the new combustible burned under water.

St. Petersburg, April 28.—The Novoe Vremya today contains a remarkably free criticism of the Russian navy, as follows:

"It would be well to put an obelisk in front of the admiralty inscribed 'Remember Makaroff.' His death should be the signal to

destroy the old order of things to which he fell a victim after heroically doing his best with the defective weapons which were at his disposal. Makaroff's death marks a new era for the Russian navy. The old days marked by a muddle of carelessness and inefficiency, are over and we have learned our lessons. The nation understands them just as well and learns from the first lesson the necessity of a reform of the personnel of the navy.

The present system of promoting officers according to the number of nautical miles they sail may work well in a highly efficient navy, but it is absurdly dangerous for ours. The present war is unlike any previous war in that the whole nation is following its phases with breathless anxiety. Our nerves are strained much as are those of the defenders of Port Arthur. We weep over our reverses and rejoice at the slightest success. Like the English in the Boer war, we are one of the greatest of world powers fighting a smaller one, and the sentiment of patriotism overwhelms all other considerations."

LATEST TELEGRAPH BULLETINS

The Doings of Conspicuous Persons
Affecting Canadian Interests.

The Russians are said to be fortifying the Liao river.

A fire in the east end of London has caused a loss of \$500,000.

A Japanese cruiser, the *Haiten*, has been wrecked below Shanghai and is a total wreck.

The Russians are complaining of stringency in the neutrality arrangements at Port Said.

A British ship has arrived at the Island of Sakhalien to remove the Japanese who are still there.

Striking Italians in Salt Lake have been arrested to the number of 120 for resisting an officer.

The Russians admit that the Japanese have crossed the Yalu in one place along a front of 80 miles.

A detachment of Cossacks is said to have crossed the Yalu and penetrated to the rear of the Japanese army.

Indianapolis, Pence (Porto Rico) and New Orleans Republicans have all endorsed Roosevelt for the presidency.

The Russian government had decided to double track the Trans-siberian, a work that will take 18 months to accomplish.

A German military expert asserts that the Russian strength in Manchuria on April 4 was only 113,000 men, including 23,000 railway guard.

Squatters on Stanley Park, Vancouver are demanding a crown grant or a lease 999 years for their holdings which they have occupied for 30 and 36 years.

The Indians refuse to give up their reservation at the entrance to False Creek, Vancouver, making it impossible to utilize the mud flats now being reclaimed.

The Roman Catholic church in the United States has not as yet fully agreed to the Pope's edict as to the use of the Gregorian chants and the singing of women in choirs.

Russia declares it will abide with its agreement with Great Britain and France, the savers of the survivors of the crews of the *Varag* and *Korietz*, and not send the men out to the Far East for duty.

Victoria Liberals

Victoria, April 28.—At their regular meeting the local Liberal association last night, Senator Templeman was re-elected honorary president; Joshua Kingham, president; Captain Cox, first vice-president; William Humphreys, second vice-president; A. B. Fraser, jr., secretary; John Percy, treasurer.

A strong resolution in favor of holding the Dominion exhibition of 1905 in Victoria was adopted.

INQUESTS.

It seems to be the practice in Rossland as elsewhere in the province, to hold an inquest or not just as the coroner feels like. Whether the law here, as in Great Britain and other portions of the Empire, insists on the holding of an inquest on the occasion of any sudden or suspicious death or not, it is certainly not the custom in this province, and most certainly not in this city. There have been more than one instance where no inquest has been held. The coroner exercises his judgment, and only holds an inquest when he sees fit. As long as the coroner is worthy of his position this will work well enough, but he is often enough placed in a situation which demands much moral courage, especially when, as is often the case, he is a practicing physician. On this account as well as on others it would be, perhaps, better, were an inquest necessary in every case of sudden or suspicious death, and let the jury decide the point whether the evidence presented was sufficient or whether it was necessary to hold a more searching enquiry.

But when the enquiry is held under the present system it presupposes that the case is sufficiently grave for the taking of evidence which will afterwards be produced in some criminal case, where a man's life is at stake or in some important damage suit, whereon the issue depends the livelihood of a family which has lost its breadwinner. Such evidence is given under oath. False swearing is punishable as perjury. But if the only report of that evidence is a synopsis taken by the coroner himself, who cannot be expected to be an expert in this line, perjurers need fear prosecution but little, and the object of the enquiry is balked. It is true that a man is supposed to sign his own evidence after it has been read over to him by the coroner, but in the case of an English speaking person a doubt would lie whether that evidence had been so read over to him, that he heard and understood exactly as the writing gave the meaning of every word. In the case of a foreigner perjury would be made still more easy. A murder trial which turned on this very point is on record. It has been claimed in the past that enquiries into accidents have been balked, but on enquiry all that seems to have been elicited is that the coroner was satisfied when some portion of the public was not. Under the act neither the province nor the municipality is liable for the expense of taking a verbatim report which, of course, need only be done in important cases. But who is to be judge as to which are important cases? If an inquest can not be held properly, it were as well if it were not holden at all. All of the coroner's expenses would be saved. But for the repute of fair dealing, in the interest of the men who are

injured and killed, as well as in the interest of those who are supposed to be culpably concerned, and who are often maligned in consequence without adequate reason, it were well to give the coroners of the province every facility in doing their work and make it as easy for them as possible.

A SLOCAN GRIEVANCE**Pays Double Freight Rate
of Any Mining Camp
in America**

Nelson, April 28.—George Huston, of Sandon, is a guest at the Madden, and as he is well informed on the zinc question his views on the matter of the freight rates on the metal and the development of the industry in the Slocan are worthy of consideration.

Mr. Huston said: "In the first place the question of the cost of haulage of zinc ores has been well checked up and it is found that the Slocan country pays the highest freight rate on zinc ore of any country in the world. The rate from Sandon to Antwerp is \$13 per ton.

The next highest rate is paid by Leadville, Col., which is practically \$8 per ton. The Slocan rate does not include the auction charges, insurance, and other small items, which, if added to the \$13 rate, would bring the total up to \$15.55 per ton. The Leadville rate includes the cost of the several items mentioned and, therefore, the rate as it stands at present is \$15.55 against \$8.

THAT STOLEN PAPER**What Minister Blair Really Urged on His Colleagues**

Summarized the main points in Mr. Blair's memorandum are:

1. There is no good reason why Canada should not contemplate government ownership of a transcontinental transportation system.
2. That such would be best attained by extending the Intercolonial railway, beginning with the purchase of the Canada Atlantic.
3. That the Intercolonial railway affords no good argument against government ownership and operation.
4. That the Intercolonial railways does afford good argument for government ownership and operation.
5. That development of a government transcontinental transportation system would be a first class political card for the Liberals.
6. That unless such a policy were adopted, private interests might make a huge graft out of the government.
7. Mr. Blair pointed to the probability that the Grand Trunk Railway company would make a grab.

LIENS OF MEGHANICS

Bank of Montreal vs. Workmen in Winnipeg Mine Case

Argument is proceeding in the Full Court at Vancouver in the appeal of McLelland et al. vs. Winnipeg Mines company and Bank of Montreal. In the original action County Court Judge Leamy allowed judgments to a large number of workmen in the mine in Osoyoos district against the company. The total amount of these judgments is over \$4000.

The Bank of Montreal is appealing, being represented in court by Mr. C. R. Hamilton. The Winnipeg Mines is not represented. Mr. J. W. Bowser is counsel for the respondents (plaintiffs). The law on workmens' liens is largely the subject of the argument.

THE MAYOR REIGNS

Phoenix No Longer Has Nor Does It Want Aldermen

There are no new developments in the municipal squabble this week, says the Phoenix Pioneer, except that Attorney General Wilson has written to City Clerk Matheson asking him to send the necessary declarations re the resignation of the entire membership of the city council. After ten days have passed, or by next Monday, the declarations will be forwarded when the attorney general will probably take steps to order a new election.

It is doubtful, however, if six men can be secured to save the city as aldermen till this trouble is cleared up, or until Chief of Police Flood and Police Justice Williams resign. The mayor states that Chief Flood is still acting, and as Nightwatchman McDougall is also on shift in the city, there are plenty of so-called guardians of the peace.

Judge Williams still holds the fort, contrary to the wishes of a majority of the taxpayers of the city, and the mayor stands with him.

The lieutenant governor and Premier McBride have been bombarded with letters regarding the matter from several citizens, and it is now up to the government to make the next move, as it is unlikely that another election, under the present regime, will serve to secure a city council.
