THE CORONATION

Canada Will Follow the
Example of Australia.

OUR TROOPS WILL GO OVER

Revenue Returns for Fiscal Year
Show Big Increase Over 1900—
Expenditure Also Increased.

Ottawa, July 6.—The Citizen hints that probably the Dominion Government will follow the example of the Australian commonwealth and send a representation of Canadian troops to the King's coronation.

The revenue returns for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1901, show an increase of \$1,701,351 compared with 1900. The expenditures were increased by \$3,748,108.

ENGLISH CRICKET.

The Oxford and Cambridge Match—
Drawn in Latter's Favor.

London, July 6.—Cambridge, after having scored 337 runs with eight wickets down in the second innings (in the annual Oxford-Cambridge cricket match at Lords) declared the innings closed.

The Oxford eleven made 177 runs for seven wickets down, in the second innings when the match was declared drawn.

INTERNATIONAL CRICKET.

Canadians do Well in Final Match at Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, July 6.—The last day of the Canadian cricketers' visit to Philadelphia was devoted to a conclusion on the match with the Philadelphia cricket club begun yesterday. The sensational plays of yesterday greatly increased today's attendance. Rook's fine bowling yesterday gave the Canadians a lead of 36 runs to start with today. The wicket was dry and firm and favored the batsmen.

Barnum's Circus Wrecked.

Gleiwitz, Silesia, July 6.—Barnum & Bailey's circus train has been in a collision at Reauthen, Upper Silesia. One person was killed and several were injured. Great damage was done to the material of the show.

Killed by Live Wire.

Syracuse, July 6.—Clarence Sixbury, a hotel employe 38 years old, came in contact with a live wire in the Mansion house cellar this morning and was killed.

English Trade Returns.

London, July 6.—The statement of the Board of Trade for the month of June shows decreases of £305,300 in imports and £2,450,900 in exports.

DENSE FOG IN NEW YORK

Possible Accidents in New
York Harbor This
Morning.

New York, July 6.—The reports received this morning from the Highlands, Sandy Hook and Quarantine are that the fog is so dense that the vessels cannot be seen from those stations.

Among the steamships due to arrive today and which are no doubt at anchor outside the bar waiting for the fog to lift, are the St. Paul from Southampton and Cherbourg; the Campania from Liverpool; the steamer Victoria from Naples; the Peninsular from Lisbon and several coasters, from southern ports.

London, July 6.—At the Mansion House police court today Julian Field, an author, was committed for trial on the charge of forging an agreement whereby Wm. Waldorf Astor promised to pay £1400 for stories to be published in the latter's magazine. Field denied that he was guilty of the alleged forgery and averred that he had a complete answer to the charge.

THE CHANCELLOR

Prince Von Hohenlohe's
Death Unexpected.

ALWAYS FAIR AND CONCILIATORY

Weakness and Old Age the Cause—
German Emperor Will Attend
Funeral—Press Comment.

Berlin, July 6.—Prince Von Hohenlohe's death was generally unexpected here, as he left Berlin several weeks ago apparently in good health, although his increasing weakness was evident. The Prince arrived at Ragatz extremely exhausted. His death is attributed to the weakness of old age.

The officials of the United States embassy informed the correspondent of the Associated Press that the death of the chancellor was much regretted because of his uniform friendliness towards Americans and American interests. Prince Von Hohenlohe's attitude throughout his chancellorship was always fair and conciliatory in regard to German-American relations.

Many passengers were more or less injured, none of them fatally. The accident was caused by an open switch. The cars did not leave the track and were not badly damaged.

LETTERS OF MARQUE

Urging the Boers to Arm
Privateers Unless the
Powers Intervene.

Brussels, July 6.—The Petit Bleu says that Mr. Kruger has lately refused to entertain proposals to arm privateers, but that the promoters are again urging the former president of the South African republic to notify the powers that unless they intervene he will issue letters of marque.

In the event of Mr. Kruger's continued refusal the promoters propose to act without authorization.

Russian Tariff Question.

New York, July 6.—The Washington correspondent of the "Herald" says that notwithstanding the official secrecy surrounding the recent Russian communication re-

plying to the note addressed by Secretary Hay to Count Cassini, regarding the tariff question, it is learned that Russia has intimated her willingness to remove the retaliatory duties she has applied upon American imports provided the United States repeals the order issued by Secretary Gage imposing the countervailing duty upon Russian sugar.

It is plain that Russia regards the sugar question as the crux of the whole controversy.

RACES TOMORROW.

Many Horses Have Been Entered—Special Train at 1:30.

A good program of sport has been arranged for the Sunnyside race track tomorrow afternoon and a great many entries have been made for the events.

A special C. P. R. train will leave the station at 1:30, returning after the races are over.

All the horses which will participate in the races have arrived here and are quartered at the track.

BREACH OF FAITH.

Railway Men did not go Back—Accuse the Company.

Reading, Pa., July 6.—The Philadelphia and Reading Railway Co. shop employes in this city and other points along the line who went on strike for higher wages and a nine-hour day, did not return to work this morning owing to the action of the general meeting on Wednesday night when the settlement was called off on account of the alleged breach of faith on the part of the company.

Mrs. Ronalds Honored.

London, July 6.—Mrs. Ronalds, one of the American ladies who raised the fund with which the hospital ship Maine was bought and equipped for the use of the British in the Boer war, has been gazetted as an honorary lady of grace of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem.

COURT OF APPEAL

Canadian Ministers Are
Doing Good Work in
the Old Country.

New York, July 6.—The Canadian ministers who are in England will probably leave for home about the first of August says the Tribune's London correspondent.

They do not look for a practical solution of the question of an imperial court of appeals at once, but consider that a conference is helpful in creating an atmosphere for imperial federation. They assert that Canada is satisfied with the existing arrangements, and not in haste to modify them, hence that any proposals for creating an imperial court of appeals will need to be acted upon with deliberation.

The ministers make up a strong delegation and their presence in London has strengthened the good relations between Canada and the mother country.

DELAYED REPORTS.

The report of the minister of mines for last year contains an interesting lot of figures concerning the mineral industry of the province, but the facts and statistics given have long ago been made public by the Kootenay press.

There would appear to be no good reason why Mr. Robertson's conclusions should not be published, say at the latest by the first of February in each year. If it cannot be done the reports should be published quarterly or semi-annually if they are to be of real use to the mining industry. All government literature of the kind is delayed for some reason or other, and when it is given out it is simply ancient history. Take the census returns as another instance. It will be months before the figures are submitted to the people. Yet in the old country a general summary giving an outline at least of the result was published by authority of the registrar general as soon as the returns came in. The details will appear later, of course, in official form. Why could not the Canadian government adopt the same practice?

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Bernard Macdonald evidently thought he would succeed at Northport when he cabled his directors in London on June 20 as follows: "One blast furnace running satisfactorily with non-union labor; balance to start from time to time until smelter works in full operation."

The English papers say the strike at Northport is being worked for all it is worth in the interest of the London bear operators. The London Financial News of 22 June says: "Considering the extravagant bear rumors that are being persistently spread by interested parties with reference to Le Roi, it is surely time that the officials of the company should state the real position. Their studied silence does but play into the hands of the bear operators, who are daily frightening out small holders, while they themselves are acquiring cheap shares. The utmost has been made of the strike; but we would ask the officials if it is not a fact that the strike only affects the work at the smelter, that even now some furnaces are being worked, and that the trouble does not in any way affect the output of the mine itself? Will the officials also reply to the following queries: (a) What amount of ore is, approximately, in sight, and what is its value? (b) What is about the company's indebtedness to the bank of Montreal? (c) What is the amount of matte and what ore is there on the dump as an offset against the overdraft? A frank official reply to these enquiries could not fail to put an end once and for all to the bear rumors, and the directors cannot with propriety withhold it."

ARGENTINA
ALL RIGHT

No Sign of Any Insurrection or Revolt—Order Will be Preserved.

New York, July 6.—Antonio Del Visco, first secretary of legation of the Argentine Republic in Washington, is quoted in a Washington dispatch to the Tribune as saying: "There is absolutely no sign of any insurrection or revolt in Argentina. The conditions are nothing like those in Venezuela, Buenos Ayres is not in a state of siege. Yesterday I received a dispatch from my government saying that crowds had gathered about the capital and were petitioning the congress to abandon a project for the unification of the public debt. I do not fear any serious encounters, and think the government will be able to preserve order without difficulty."
