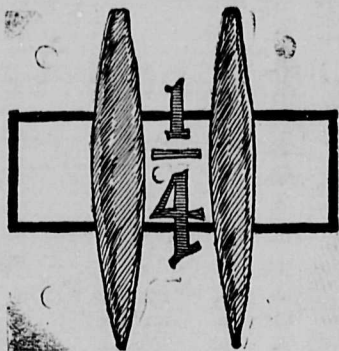

EAGLES' SCREAM

Social Meeting of Rossland Aerie Last Night.

ADDRESS BY DEL CAREY SMITH

Crowded House Attests to Popularity of the New Order—The Mock Trials and Other Features.

The Eagles last night in the International, were birds of proud feather. The social session was an unqualified success and there is no doubt that the result will be found in large accessions to their eeries. The feature of the evening was the address by Del Carey Smith, the Spokane lawyer, who is the president of the order. He spoke along the lines of fraternity, explained the motto of the Eagles, the principles on which it was founded, the reasons which were behind its extraordinary spread during the past five years and the amity it could not fail to engender between the two great branches of the English-speaking race. President Smith's remarks were punctuated with frequent and appreciative applause.

The evening was enlivened by a series of mock trials, in which the only question seemed to be whether the prosecutor or the defendant should be fined. It was certainly either of them, but not infrequently the captivating policeman was made to look blue. The offences were somewhat peculiar, one man being fined for being a false alarm (being not very serious the offender was only charged 75 cents.) And yet another for being homeless (language of eagles for being a rogue and a vagabond among the ladies.) That cost him \$8.00 which was certainly uncommonly inexpensive.

The chairman of the evening was Harry Boulton who was assisted in his labors by A. J. McDonald, M. L. DeForrest, C. E. Gillan and N. A. Burritt.

The judges were no respecters of sex for the ladies came in for a share of their impartial attentions.

The artists of the International made their several turns in good style, there being a good variety of selections rendered. The Chinese impersonator was especially mirth provoking. The most amusing turn of the evening was that in which President Smith caused each artist to do something out of his or her ordinary role. This led to some extremely funny turns which, however were appreciated by the audience but did not seem to be quite so well liked by the performers.

The last turn of the evening was a friendly bout with the gloves between Pringle and Hensley, in which the heavier boxer, Pringle, had decidedly the best of the encounter although Hensley is unusually active.

DIED AT THE HOSPITAL.

Thomas Pearce Passed Away Very Suddenly.

Thomas Pearce, a miner, and a native of Cornwall, England, died very suddenly this morning at the Sisters hospital from an acute attack of pneumonia. The deceased was 48 years old and came to this province about three years ago. He has been in Rossland since the settlement of the strike. He was

one of the pioneers of Ureka, Nevada. Pearce was only taken to the hospital yesterday and his sudden death was quite unexpected.

The funeral will take place from Lockhart & Jordan's undertaking parlors at 1 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

NORTHERN MINES

The Flow of Gold Will Commence in May.

MANY LAPSED CLAIMS OPENED

An Aggregate Cleaning-up of 30 Millions Insured—Government Opens Many Claims.

Tacoma, Wash., April 21.—Dawson telegrams state that blinding snowstorms have formed streams sufficient to permit clean-up operations. The washing out of gold commenced last week and will keep up for two months.

During the winter the greatest dumps in the camp's history have been thrown upon the banks of the creeks, insuring an aggregate clearing up estimated at thirty millions. The flow of gold toward Puget Sound will commence in May.

The Ottawa government last week ordered the Klondike authorities to throw open for entry four thousand lapsed and abandoned claims which are withdrawn from the Treadgold concession. The gold commissioners' office is rushed with men recording abandoned claims which they have staked.

ONE HALF BURNED

Seventy-five Lives Lost in the City of Pittsburgh--Wreck.

Cairo, Ill., April 21.—Although no complete list of either the victims or survivors is yet obtained, investigation today indicates that almost one half of the 150 persons on the city of Pittsburgh were lost when that steamer was burned yesterday at Ogden's Landing between this city and Paducah.

Pyritic Smelting.

In a paper recently read before the Engineers' Society of Western Pennsylvania, Mr. W. F. Koch claims that sulphur, so far from being a deleterious ingredient, may often be a positive advantage if the older methods of treating such ores are abandoned, and the gold is obtained by "pyritic" smelting. In this case the sulphur, instead of being wasted by roasting it off, serves as fuel, replacing an equivalent quantity of coke.

ROSSLAND'S SHARE.

The amounts which appear in the provincial budget for this riding would appear to prove that the Dunsmuir government is prepared to punish Rossland for sending Smith Curtis to Victoria.

The details are not to hand but \$14,500 for the whole riding for public works will certainly not go very far. The grant of \$1500 for the school of mines cannot be used until next winter, though of course, it will be very welcome then. The \$700 granted for the court house linoleum has already been expended, and apparently no further grants may be looked for, either by the city or the riding. The mayor and J. B. Johnson, who especially represented Rossland at the capital last month, can best tell us whether we should be satisfied with the amounts granted and whether their sanguine expectations have been reasonably fulfilled.

PUBLIC UTILITIES.

Chicago, wicked Chicago, has apparently decided to turn over a new leaf at least in municipal matters.

On the first of the month a ballot was taken on these three propositions: (1) For ownership by Chicago of all street railroads within the corporate limits. (2) For ownership by Chicago of gas and electric lighting plants to furnish light, heat and power for public and private use. (3) For the nomination of all candidates for city offices by direct vote of the voters at the primary elections.

Strange thought it may appear all three propositions were carried by a very heavy vote.

The American people have already showed plainly their determination to investigate thoroughly the question of municipal ownership of public utilities. Some smaller cities have already acted as pioneers. Now the larger ones are falling in. The experiment is an interesting one. It remains to be proved whether it will be a successful one in America.

Glasgow has already gone a long way in solving the question and may be looked upon as in the lead of the movement. The experimental stage in Glasgow municipal affairs has long been passed and every year sees a further successful advance.

CIVIC FEDERATION.

Senator Hanna has distinctly denied that he is a candidate for the next presidential election but his boom appears to be flourishing just the same. Speaking of his attitude on the labor problem the San Francisco Argonaut says:

"His presence in the civic federation, which has taken up the questions between labor and capital, has certainly benefited him personally in that respect. His manner in those deliberations has already won more than the respect of the labor representations, whose first expectations were to find him a violent antagonist."

The fact that such a man as Senator Hanna undoubtedly approved of the principle of arbitration in industrial disputes has already induced many Americans, who were formerly opposed to the scheme to give it a very respectful consideration and the plans of the civic federation are being very closely followed all over this continent.

Chairman Hanna has already proclaimed that the scheme is in the nature of an experiment, but so far at least one very important and long standing dispute at Dayton, Ohio, has been disposed of to the satisfaction of those concerned.

If the "experiment" continues to do good work it will be the best answer to all those who now oppose it. There is nothing like good results to convince the public that arbitration is thoroughly practicable.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The politician whose main business in life is to fight for his party is not an ideal figure. After all he is a lesser evil than the truckers and traders and deal-makers who are company directors first and politicians afterwards.

If labor unions do not take in the poorer laborers the unions are called oppressive and selfish. If they do take them in, the unions are accused of demanding more pay for a poor laborer "than he is worth." Funny, isn't it?

Generally it will be found that those who are so anxious to keep the labor unions out of politics are the ones who hope to get some reward from the old political parties who aim to keep labor votes divided.

According to the census there are 1600 shoe factories in the United States, employing 143,000 men, using \$170,000,000 worth of material in a year, and turning out a product worth \$261,000,000. The wholesale price of a pair of shoes represents about 22 per cent in wages, 65 per cent in material and 13 per cent in minor expenses and profits.

Free trade is not an eternal truth. The truth of today becomes the falsehood of tomorrow in the sphere of economics. Free trade may have been good for Britain when Britain adopted free trade. Free trade has possibly outlived its usefulness in Britain, and may be shelved until another turn of the wheel restores its power to advance the interests of the country.—Toronto Telegram.

A new craft has been launched upon the troubled political waters of this province. The organization of the Provincial Progressive Party as representing the political aims of organized labor in British Columbia marks a very important change in provincial politics. Heretofore organized labor has put forward no concerted effort in the direction of influencing legislation at Victoria, or of controlling the administration of the province. As a result of the Labor Convention just closed a new era has been inaugurated, in which organized labor co-operating in support of common principles will exercise a potent effect in provincial elections.—Kamloops Sentinel.

ORDERS DELIVERED BY WAGON

LE ROI NO. 2 RETURNS

Figures for March—Report on the Josie—Profit \$40,000.

The manager of the Le Roi No. 2 cabled his company:—"Completed returns show shipments amounted to 5,170 tons, contents 3,201 ozs. gold, 8,270 ozs. silver, 156 tons copper. Returns from ore after making deduction of all smelting charges amounted to \$62,185. Cost of mining may be taken at \$13,000. Ore taxes, quarter ending 31st of March, \$2,680, leaving profit for last month \$40,000.

Office note—From the above it appears that the whole of the quarter's taxes have been deducted from this month's returns and also the sum of about \$6,500 presumably for development, leaving \$40,000 profit."

The manager's detailed report of the mine for February shows that the pay shoot in the Annie at the 700 foot level had been broken into and that the ore gave values of \$17.05, made up as follows—gold \$11, silver .55, copper \$5.50.

Referring to the shoot in question the manager says:

While the condition delayed the opening of the pay shoot, the value of the ore body is not in any way adversely affected, as your company owns sufficient ground to the west to own this shoot to an almost unlimited depth.

The true position of this ore body having been determined, and shoot proven to this depth, will simplify the future development of the mine at the lower levels when they are opened.

ORE AT THE WINNIPEG

Find Ore at the 300-Foot Level Last Week—Good Returns.

Since shipments first began at the Winnipeg mine, some two years ago, an average of all the cars of ore sent out, including those which proved almost barren, gave \$14 per ton.

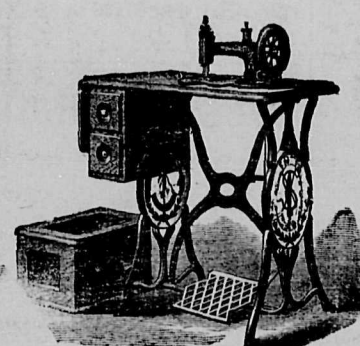
