HAD A HARD TIME

Bound in North Snow Dakota.

WERE FOUR DAYS IMPRISONED

A Terrible Blizzard-The Passergers Suffer From Cold and Hunger.

St. Paul, Minn., March 21 .-Three hundred Great Northern passengers from points west of the eastern Montana line, 20 tons of mail matter and car after car of baggage all snow bound in North Dakota since last Friday, reached St. Paul last night. The first section of the through train pulled in late last evening, breaking a block-

ade that lasted 150 hours. Passengers told stories of frontier privations. They were of the first east bound overland train snow bound and were caught at Stanley, N. D., a station which consists of a side track and a cattle yard. From Thursday night till Monday morning the passengers were hardly able to leave the train. A blizzard raged and no food was to be had except the limited quantity on the dining car. The coal in the day coaches gave out on Sunday.

GRAND NATIONAL

Shannon Lass Won--King **Edward Scratched** His Horse.

Liverpool, March 21. - The Grand National Steeplechase was won by Shannon Lass. Matthew was second and Manifesto was third. Twenty-one horses ran.

The Grand National Steeplechase of 2525 sovereigns is a handicap for five year-olds and upwards, distance about four miles and 856 yards. Sportsmen turned out in force to see the steeplechase run, though the interest of the general public in the event waned with the scratching of King Edward's entry, Ambush II and the knowledge that his majesty consequently, would not attend the meeting, the preliminary racing was not of much interest.

THE RUSSIAN REPLY.

The Russian reply to the Anglo-Japanese alliance has one significant sentence "Russia desires that preservation of the status quo and general peace in the Far East by the construction of the great Siberian railroad together with its branch line through Manchuria towards a port always ice free." This means that Manchuria is to be Russian, and also that Peking will always remain within easy striking distance of the Russian forces. That Russia intends to support this policy can be seen by the despatch of reinforcements to the front.

A look at the map will show that the first objective of Russia, the port of Nicolajevsk at the mouth of the Amur is away to the north. Vladivostock is to the south of this but is north of Korea. The extremity of the peninsula of Korea, washed by a warm ocean current setting in from the south, is ice free. Any port to the north is blocked with ice for five or six months in the year. Any port within the gulf of Pechili, i. e. Newchwang or Tientsin, escapes the current, although to the south of Korea, and is also ice blocked from November to March. The fisrt ice free port is Chefoo, just north of the German port of Kiaochao and both of which are situated on the peninsula of Shantung, which with that of Korea, encloses the ice blocked gulf of Pechili. Hence Chefoo or another Shantung port is the objective of Russia. But to reach there from Siberia the whole of Manchuria has to be crossed and the Chinese province of Chihli entered upon. The railroad will skirt the Manchu capital, Peking.

THE MINERAL TAX.

The unwisdom of the action taken by the Kaslo convention of the associated boards of trade of the Kootenays is nowhere more aptly exemplified than by the recent visit of Mayor Goodenough of Kaslo, at the request of his townspeople, to Victoria for the purpose of protesting against the representations of the Kaslo convention having any weight with the deliberations of the legislature. The local board of trade has also sent down a delegate to help the mayor. The objection seems to be, from a dispatch from Kaslo published in the Vancouver News-Advertiser, chiefly centering upon the tax on prospectors, and it is to this and to the lack of clearness in the presentation of the issues that the Kaslo convention is to be condemned.

At the present time low grade mines are being taxed from 3 to 30 per cent on their output, whereas high grade mines, having ores whose value exceeds \$50 per ton, are seldom taxed higher than a fraction over two per cent. Now the high grade mine owners think that they are paying all that should be demanded of them, while the opinion that they are paying far too much. In the meantime the government wants the money and certainly cannot afford to have the revenue curtailed in any manner. revenue curtailed in any manner.
But the difficulty is more apparent than real for the low grade mines would be satisfied by seeing that the tax was one levied upon the net profits or upon the assay valnet profits, or upon the assay values, irrespective of charges. What is objected to is a tax that presses the more and more heavily the lower the grade. Let this be done away with and there will be no trouble. Afew mines will pay a lesser taxation than before, which are just the mines that should be helped, but there will be other mines opened, as soon as conditions improve, which will more than make up for any slight temporary deficiency.

These conditions are that the mines should have the cheapest rates possible on the transportation of their ores to the smelters and the bringing of fuel and flux to the smelters, together with the making of roads, so that there shall not be an undue expense in shipping ore. If the government see to it that these things are obtainable by the mines the mines would, in a comparatively short period of time, bear even an increase of the tax. 

Matters.

The Dominion trades and labor men had their annual talk with members of the government on Monday last on subjects in which they are interested. The delegation assembled in the Premier's office. Messrs. Ralph Smith and Puttee along with Messrs. Mulock and Mackenzie King, headed the delegation. They were received by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Ralph Smith was the first speaker. He said that the delegation was one of the largest of the kind that ever interviewed the Dominion government, representing as it did, every province in the Dominion. That ought to be taken by the government as a proof the earnestness of the labor workers in the cause

Having said this, Mr. Smith presented the first resolution, which was asking for \$500 of a head tax on Chinese. He hoped it would be the last time that they would have to ask this. He said this because the report of the royal commission on the Chinese had not only recommended an increase of \$500, but had declared in favor of exclusion.

Mr. Puttee spoke in favor of government ownership of public utilities. He said that the labor party were in favor of public owner-

Other speakers followed.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, his reply, took up the different points presented to him. In regard to an eight hour day on government works the premier said if such was given on other works in the country he did not see any reason why it should not be given on government railways.

In respect of immigration it was the desire of the Dominion govern-ment that none but agricultural laborers should come here from England, and therefore he would committed on Aug. 24, 1900, while lay the manner before the Minister

The proposition as to deportation in regard to the alien labor act was somewhat startling at first look, since it meant to take away the personal liberty of the party without being heard. However, he would have it considered.

As for public ownership in general it was a large question. and all that he could say was that it would be considered.

Then as to Chinese legislation. Before anything was done it would be necessary that the report of the commissioners on this subject should be made known in Eastern Canada, where the subject was not known sufficiently.

Mr. Mulock, who followed, promised a bill dealing with letter carries' salaries this session. The conciliation amendments proposed were apparently an improvement to the bill, and would have the hearty support of the government. He also said that the union labor Bill had been thrown out twice by the senate.


