COMMITTEE REPORTS

Text As Given to Federation.

TO WIN STRIKE IN COLORADO

Conservative Statement Made by Three Independent Working Mines.

To the Officers and Delegates of the Twelfth Annual Convention, W. F. of M:

GENTLEMEN—Your special committee, appointed to go to the Cripple Creek district and investigate the conditions as they exist in that place, beg leave to submit the following:

We find that the delegates in this convention from that district submitted a true state of affairs as they exist. Your committee, however, is of the opinion that a policy should be pursued, if this fight is to be won, on the line of bringing back the old union men who are working on unfair mines. These men are making it possible for the mine owners to operate their properties, inasmuch as the experienced men make practical workers out of the unfair men and scabs at all times.

Your committee was accorded a cordial reception by the secretary of the Mine Owners' Association, and by those present. From the standpoint present by the mine owners they would lead one to believe that the strike, so far as the Western Federation of Miners is concerned is broken, and that they have all the men they can use, and substantiate this statement by saying that they have fully as many men employed as they had previous to the strike, and while they were not producing as much ore as previous to the strike nor was it of as good quality, yet their product was increasing and from his standpoint this time on paying basis, admitting at the same time that at the onset of this strike, the operators had lost money. He further stated to your Committee that were it not for the union men this strike, so far as the operators were concerned, would have been long ago. He frankly stated that they could not have started their mines without the practical assistance of these practical miners. He also stated that numerous union men, so-called at one time in the district, returned to work and put them in shape to cope with the fight that was being made by the Western Federation of Miners. This fact is not contradicted by the Strike committee and the union men of the camp. His main complaint was in the nature of a charge that the union men had violated their agreement with this Drainage Tunnel company, claiming that the agreement was to the effect that if they would close down the El Paso mine they could continue their work on the Tunnel. He does this to sustain his attitude

A NAVAL BATTLE NOW ON

Japs Hurrying to the Scene of Strife.

VLADIVOSTOK SQUADRON IS AT SEA

General Stalkenberg Thought to Be Cut Off from the Main Body of the Russian Army.

London, June 16.—A despatch to the Central News Agency from Tokio filed yesterday afternoon says a naval engagement is now in progress off Tsushima island, in the Korean straits, between three Russian cruisers which escaped from Vladivostok, and a number of Japanese ships. No details have been received.

Nagasaki, June 16.—A Russian naval squadron was lately sighted off Okishima Ken and Yamaguchi and sounds of firing were heard off Oki.

Tokio, June 16.—The Vladivostok squadron is reported in Korean waters. Firing has been heard on Tsushima, a small island lying off the southwest of Honshu island. It is possible that an engagement is in progress.

Reports of cannonading have been received here from various points, such as Chikusen province, Oki island and Tsushima, but the exact nature of the operations of the Russian squadron is not disclosed.

The Japanese warships in the vicinity of are hurrying to the scene. Sasebo is being closed.

There is a strong possibility that a naval engagement will take place soon.

It is reported that the Japanese cruiser Nastaka engaged the Russian Vladivostok squadron off Tsushima island. This report, however, lacks confirmation. The Japanese transports Ugo and Fayo homeward bound met the Russian vessels near Okijoki island. The Russians pursued them and fired 16 shots at the Japanese ships. The transports escaped and reached Katsunoto.

Berlin, June 16.—The newspapers today discuss the situation of General Stalkenberg's corps, which is regarded as being extremely grave.

The Krues Zeitung points out that the attempt of the Japanese in yesterday's fight to turn the Russians' left, creates a situation similar to that at the battle of the Yalu river and says that even if Stalkenberg is not surrounded he will find it extremely difficult to execute his hundred mile retreat to Kouropatkin's main body.

COASTWISE TRAFFIC.

A question has been brought up in the British Parliament as to the coasting trade of the Philippine Islands and almost simultaneously the Princess May, a Canadian vessel, is fined heavily by a United States official for taking passengers between Alaska and the United States. The United States has ruled that Alaska is a part of the United States, and as no foreign vessels are allowed to compete in the coastwise traffic of the United States proper, therefore, as Alaska belongs to the United States, no foreign vessel may ply between points in the two separate countries. The same rule has been made applicable to Hawaii and will be made law for the Philippines also after next year.

Lord Lansdowne, in replying, said the matter had been considered by the Foreign Office to which complaints had been made as to the injury to British trade, but he deprecated retaliation as the colonies were various in their policies as to the admission of foreign vessels plying upon their coasts, and as any question of this description was a portion of the larger Imperial question which was now before the people of that country and of the Empire in general.

Lord Lansdowne, no doubt, answered according to his lights on the subject, which, if they are no better than when he was Secretary of State for War, are not much brilliant than we are supplied locally by the Bonnington people. There is the coastwise traffic of Great Britain which is open to competition, but which is fairly free from it just the same. There is the coastwise traffic of Canada, which is largely entered into by the United States, which does not seem inclined to reciprocate. Australia makes only the condition that vessels plying upon her coast must employ white men. New Zealand gives a preference to all vessels flying the British flag. It seems to the ordinary observer that Great Britain subjects herself or the Empire to no retaliatory treatment if it will merely pass a navigation law restricting trade to British vessels with the addition of the vessels of such countries as will permit British vessels to ply upon their coasts. If Alaska and Hawaii and the Philippines are subject to a coastwise law then it equally applies that London and Montreal and Vancouver and Brisbane and Sydney, Auckland and Port Elizabeth, Calcutta, and Hongkong are likewise subject, if desired, to the operation of a similar law. The effect would be to sweep every other flag from the ocean, except between the dependencies of other countries. Mighty little retaliation would be possible for the more retaliation was attempted the worse would fare the retaliators.

GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS

Cape, Australia and Germany

THESE COUNTRIES CONTENTED

Rival Good Points of the High and Low Freight Rate Systems

The champions of corporation ownership of railways are fond of asserting that in a democratic country like Canada, where political considerations influence administrative policy, state railways cannot be made to pay. Australia, New Zealand and South Africa are democratic countries. Their people take to politics as eagerly as do Canadians. Yet all the divisions of Greater Britain succeeded in making state owned railroads pay expenses.

South Africa does more than that. Owing to the industrial peculiarities of the country, the people prefer to work their railroads as a source of profit, and they realize six or seven per cent yearly on their outlay. Thus they pay off all of their railway charges and put a comfortable sum in the treasury. The Cape Colony way of putting it is that the railways pay the salaries of the civil servants.

Australia and New Zealand having large agricultural interests, prefer low freight rates to dividends, and work the railways to cover expenses, expressly looking for their profits in the stimulus to trade and settlement.

The exact figures for Australia are interesting. The percentage of net revenue to cost of construction in the five states on the continent of Australia is as follows:

- Queensland, 1902-3,1.80
- Victoria, 1901-2,2.96
- New South Wales, 1902-3, 2.52
- South Australia, 1902-3, . . 3.37
- West Australia, 1901-2, . . 3.56

Average percentage for continent2.77

In New Zealand the state railways in the year ending March 31, 1903, paid 3.3 per cent on the cost of construction.

Our corporation railways would be ruined if they had so little to show on the year's work. There would be no money for dividends. In Australia there is no need to make freight rates pay dividends. The lines are solvent and give satisfaction to their owners—in other words, the people whom they serve—if they meet the fixed charges.

A strong argument in favor of the nationalization of railways is supplied by the experience of Germany.

All classes of people of Germany seem to regard the railway question as finally and satisfactorily settled. This is the conclusion of those who have to do with the practical questions of operation, as well as those who, like university professors, study it from an academic point of view.

Before the state acquired the roads the movement was opposed with precisely the same arguments that are heard on this continent today. But the advocates of the reform, by sane, strong and persistent agitation secured its adoption. Experience has confirmed their wisdom.

TWO MONTHS HARD.

Family and Name Does Not Save Mrs. Marie Fotheringham.

Victoria, June 15.—The sensational Klondike case of Mrs. Marie Fotheringham, nee Jousseye—Mrs. Fotheringham being a woman of distinguished family, allegedly a cousin of Lord Strathcona, and herself an authoress and poetess, and socialistic worker of continental celebrity—has ended dramatically in the conviction of Mrs Fotheringham and her sentence to two months' imprisonment.

The charge was misappropriation of money in connection with a mining transaction. The prosecution claimed that money had been given to Mrs. Fotheringham, in trust to pay certain record and other fees in connection with mining properties, in which they and she were interested.

Marie Jousseye went to the Klondike by way of Atlin about three years ago, her mission being to investigate the labor troubles then perplexing the Atlin camp, in consequence of the introduction of Japanese. Going on to Dawson she met and wedded Mr. Fotheringham.

ALLOWS THE APPEAL

Case of Empey Bros—The Railway Assessment.

Victoria, June 15.—The Full Court has reserved judgment in the appeal against the assessment of the Nelson & Fort Sheppard railway land grant, etc.

The Full Court has allowed the appeal with costs in the case of Robinson vs. Empey. Empey was a Rossland grocer, who transferred his business to two former clerks and they subsequently made an assignment for the benefit of creditors. The execution creditors attacked the assignment and other transactions, and made a seizure. Chief Justice Hunter upheld Empey's contention and set the seizure aside. The Full Court have now reversed the former decision.

He further states that had the Western Federation of Miners, constitution been lived up to and the matter been put to a referendum vote in the District, no strike would have taken place, but your committee finds that the Locals in the District took action in the repressive unions and delegated the authority of calling the strike over to the District Union. We find that an anxiety and a desire on the part of the membership of the unions of that District for some arrangement that will lead to a settlement of this dispute, but the majority still show determination to wage the fight to an end, if some honorable arrangements cannot be attained for a settlement.

FALLS TO HIS DEATH

Sandy Pinkerton Is No More.

DROPPED DOWN STAR SHAFT

Alone at Time of the Accident—No Details Likely to Be Known.

There was another regrettable accident on the Gooderham properties this afternoon at 1 o'clock while the body of the man killed at the War Eagle on Tuesday morning still lies unburied.

Alexander Pinkerton, a young man of about 30 years of age, well and favorably known in the camp, being a member of the Odd Fellows, the Rod and Gun Club and affiliated with the Miner's Union, was killed by falling down the Centre Star shaft from the 500 to the 700 foot levels.

How the accident occurred cannot be known as Pinkerton was alone at the time of the accident. He was skip tender and had just finished loading the west skip at the 500 and had given the signal for its hoisting when the men on the 700 foot level heard something falling down the shaft and going to the spot discovered the body of their late comrade. His skull was broken which injury in itself was sufficient to cause death without going any further into details.

It is surmised that the deceased met with the accident in crossing to load the skip on the east side. There is a place for walking around but whether the skip tender took advantage of this or not is not known.

An inquest will probably be held.
