RAILWAY BUILDING

Will Reach Cascade by March 1st--A Race Track.

Grand Forks, Jan. 22.—J. P. Porter, the well-known railway contractor is here. He is engaged on the construction of the Great Northern near Halls Ferry. He stated that the track layers last night had reached a point fourteen miles from Cascade, and seven miles from the ferry. Several small bridges have to be put in between the rail head and the ferry, where the heaviest work is being encountered. Mr. Porter expects that the rails will be laid to the ferry about February 1st, where one trestle will require 555,000 feet of timber. Cascade, he added, will be reached not later than March 1st.

At a meeting of the directors of the Grand Forks Driving Park and Athletic association, held to day, it was decided to hold a race meeting here on July 1st and 2nd next, when \$5000 will be offered in prizes. The construction of a permanent race track to cost \$10,000 will be commenced early this spring. The site was acquired last fall and is located on the Ruckle addition, ten minutes walk from the business section.

COMMENT ON LE ROI NO. 2

The Five Per Cent Dividend That Was Not Earned.

WHAT THE AUDITORS SHOW UP

Modest Claim of the Le Roi for Development Work Done--Only a Third of the Cost Asked--The Charges at the Smelter.

The London B. C. Review commenting on the report and financial statement of the Le Roi No. 2 company says, editorially:

"The balance sheet of the Le Roi No. 2 from June 1st, 1900, to September last has now been issued, and accompanying it is a somewhat intricate report by the auditors. This report bears out the statements we made in our issue of June 15th, when we wrote:

"The announcement of a five per cent. dividend by the Le Roi No. 2 was somewhat of a surprise to the market, and was not unnaturally regarded as a piece of financial diplomacy in view of the approaching proceedings in regard to the liquidation of the B. A. C. It is obvious from the returns issued by the company that unless the ore values in this mine are very substantially higher than from the Le Roi the mine has not earned sufficient profits to pay £30,000," as it now transpires that the total profit earned up to September 30th last only amounted to £27,275! There is one point that needs explanation, viz: the payment of £30,000 as dividend, although 12,000 shares owned by the B. A. C. were only partly paid up. The directors, it appears, received

£1500, being 5 per cent of the profits of the company—which had not been earned!

It is stated that the Le Roi company had claimed \$6000 against the Le Roi No. 2 for development work done, which claim is not admitted by the directors. There appears to be some slight discrepancy here, as Mr. Frecheville states that work costing \$20,000 has been done by the Le Roi in opening up the Josie and No. 1 claims, a piece of generosity on the part of the parent company for which they only desire to charge the Le Roi No. 2 less than one third of the cost.

The uncertainty in regard to the smelter charges on the Le Roi No. 2 ores shows that those in charge of the smelter were either incompetent or unbusinesslike. They commenced by charging \$5 a ton for freight and treatment, afterwards raising it to \$6, and later making a further addition of \$1.98 per ton, which the present directors consider to be \$1.38 too much. The company appears to have managed to liquidate its indebtedness to the Bank of Montreal, but the position of affairs as shown in the balance sheet shows that some time must elapse before another dividend can be distributed.

THE UNION MEETING

A Le Roi Settlement Being Voted on Today--A Definite Proposal.

At the regular meeting of Rossland Miners' Union held last evening, a full attendance of the members was present.

The financial secretary presented his yearly report of the finances of the union. The report, on account of its length, and other important business to be transacted, was laid over for one week.

The executive committee submitted a report of the negotiations which had been carried on with the mine managers, in regard to a settlement of the strike.

A definite proposal being in the hands of the committee, in regard to the conditions the Le Roi company would be willing to extend in case a settlement could be effected, a resolution was moved that the executive committee of the union be empowered to negotiate and complete a settlement with the Le Roi management on the conditions imposed.

A vote by secret ballot is being taken today on this resolution, poll being opened from 10 a.m., to 7 p.m., in order to allow every member an opportunity to express his opinion.

Much pleasure was expressed at the courteous and friendly manner in which the representatives of the union had been received during the negotiations leading up to the proposal.

NED FARRAR.

The arrival in the west of Mr. Edward Farrar, so well known to every eastern Canadian, has very naturally resulted in the appearance, particularly in Liberal papers, of lengthy "special" telegrams and leading articles of great length pointing out specifically the great danger of the Crow's Nest Coal company selling some of our coal to Jim Hill and beseeching the public to rise as one man and demand that the Dominion government hand over what is left of the coal lands to a company which will break the iniquitous combine and work in with the C. P. R.

"Liberal" editors are getting plenty of copy sent them these days and there will be tons of campaign literature ready by the time the house meets next month.

Public "sentiment" is some times very easily obtained.

HALL CAINE.

In his address at a labor bazaar in England last month, extracts from which appeared in the WORLD yesterday, and again today, Hall Caine, the novelist, attacked the attitude of the press and the churches on all social questions.

The novelist declared that while the English press was not as a rule corrupt, it could not truthfully be defined as "independent." The foundation of the press, said Mr. Caine, is a commercial foundation, and its interest always lies on the side of the existing order of affairs, so that it cannot be expected to play the part of pioneer in a social and economic change.

But if Mr. Caine has something to say about the attitude of the press on social questions he has very much more to say about the churches' attitude along the same lines. "Show me," cries the novelist, "a single victory for humanity that has not been won by the people for the people, and often in the face of the churches. I know of none." And he adds: "When the poor have groaned under their hard lot the churches have told them to look up from the miseries of this world to the joys of the world to come."

Mr. Caine concludes his criticism of the churches' attitude in these words:

"We don't say that the churches should devote themselves exclusively to social and economic questions, but we do say that if they ignore these questions they set aside one of the most solemn and urgent parts of the gospel teaching."

It remains to be seen whether the press and the churches will answer Mr. Caine's trenchant attack.

The Toronto Bartenders union is now an accomplished fact, and the union man will be known by the button which he may, by the rules of the union, wear in a prominent place. There are over 400 of the white-aproned men in Toronto. Harry Finch has been chosen president, and Arthur Rooney recording secretary.

It has been a common thought in recent years, especially since the opening up of Siberia, that Russia was destined to be a still greater power than she is now. The report of M. de Witte to the Czar shows, however, that the nation has a path of thorns to tread before it reaches the goal. Eighty millions of people have to be first educated; educated, among other things, to till their land properly, and as absolutism is suspicious of general education, there may be a hesitation about supplying the remedy.

NOVELIST CAINE

More Extracts From a Remarkable Speech.

AN ATTACK ON THE CHURCHES

The Gospel and the Social Question —What Are the Churches Doing?

Here are some more extracts from Hall Caine's address given at the industrial bazaar of the United Trades and Labor Council of the Gorton Division at Manchester, England, on the question of the Gospel and Socialism. Mr. Caine, said:

"What are the churches doing at this moment to promulgate in the midst of the war the doctrines of peace? Have any of these things ever been done by the churches, taking them altogether, and all the ages through? Isn't it the fact in the history of humanity that whatever has been done for the political progress of the people has been done by the people themselves, outside the tutelage of the churches? Show me a single victory for humanity that has not been won by the people for the people, and often in the face of the churches. I know of none. When the poor have groaned under their hard lot the churches have told them to look up from the miseries of this world to the joys of the world to come. In times of peace the churches have taught the people to pray that the servant may be obedient to his master, and the subject may submit to his ruler, whoever the master or ruler at the given moment may be.

It is little wonder if many men who feel acutely the sufferings of the world have come to think that Christianity with its useless lesson

of fatal resignation leaves humanity in the lurch. Can we be surprised that such is one of the accusations against Christianity when the churches are content to talk about the Gospel as if it had nothing to do with the world, as if it were only intended to govern mankind on Sunday, when we put on our Sunday clothes, and our shops are closed and our safes are locked.

Can we wonder that when the churches are so much occupied in the sublime office of teaching the people how to die, some hot-blooded but honest souls should tell them that it is infinitely more necessary to know how to live? We don't say that Christ was merely a great social reformer, but we do say that without being a social reformer He could not have been Christ. We don't say that the churches should devote themselves exclusively to social and economic questions, but we do say that if they ignore these questions they set aside one of the most solemn and urgent parts of the Gospel teaching."

FURTHER TESTIMONY

Whitaker Wright's Co-Directors -- A Court Order.

London, Eng., Jan. 23.—During the inquiry in the bankruptcy court into the affairs of the London & Globe Finance Corporation, limited, today, the register granted an order for the examination of co-directors of Whitaker Wright, leaving to the official receiver's discretion in regard to which directors he would examine. The receiver expressly said that Lord Dufferin had already given him all the information he possessed, and that, therefore, he did not purpose to summon him.
