

Lynn Valley's Post Office Now Deemed Inadequate

NO FIRES TO BE STARTED IN PARKS EXCEPT WHERE SPECIFIED

DISTRICT COUNCIL AWARDS SER- IES OF CONTRACTS

The correspondence waiting the consideration of the district council last night included a letter from the Lynn Valley Ratepayers' Association stating that in the association's opinion the local post office, owing to its present isolated location and limited service was totally inadequate to serve the needs of the Valley. The corner of Lynn Valley and Centre road was recommended as a suitable location. The council decided that it could not at present take any action in the matter.

A letter was read from Mr. F. B. Dickens to the effect that Mr. Alvo von Alvensleben and himself were interested in the proposed highway up the north arm of the Inlet to the northerly boundary of the municipality and thence to the Wigwam Inn and possibly to Indian River Valley. The writer stated that they were willing to co-operate in this matter. "North from your boundary line" the letter said "we shall try to get the government to gazette a right of way for this road with the object in view of a possible grant for a road as a whole."

On the motion of Coun. Westover it was decided that the road running north from Coleman should be called Prime road; and further that the council wishing to further the clearing of the boulevards of the district resolved to reimburse owners of property who undertook work to this end, reimbursement being to the extent of five cents a square yard.

Coun. Westover also mentioned that they had during the past week received

quite a lesson in the consequences of bush fires, and moved that the council should prohibit anyone from starting fires in the parks except where specified and that notices should be posted in the parks to show where these places are. This recommendation was formally approved.

Coun. Ward moved that Special Constable Wilson at the North Arm be granted a retaining fee of \$10 per month intended to cover expenses incurred during the execution of his duties.

Coun. Bridgman thought that steps might be taken to have Mr. Wilson appointed special fire warden for this district.

On a motion introduced by Mr. Ward the council decided to ask the attorney general for a re-survey of D. L. 601 and D. L. 602, said to be two chains short in length and one in width and also of D. L. 785.

N. Lonsdale Ratepayers Forward Suggestions

COUN. BRIDGMAN THINKS INDE- FINITE COMPLAINTS NEITHER FAIR NOR RIGHT

The district council last night gave consideration to a series of resolutions forwarded by the North Lonsdale Ratepayers' Association. The majority evoked replies from Coun. Bridgman, who in each instance apparently voiced the opinion of the council.

The resolutions and the councillor's comments thereon were as follows:

"That the council in conjunction with the school board be asked to buy two acres east of the North Lonsdale school and also 35 feet in front of and south of the school." It was considered that this was a matter for reference to the school board.

"That the council be instructed to remove the logs lying on the corner of King and Mahon and to open Mahon between King and Windsor." Referred to the engineer for the purpose of a report.

"That the council be asked for information regarding the reservoir on Mosquito creek, also for a map or plan showing location of pipes already laid." In this connection it was stated that the council could not give information as to the location of mains to an association, but that the engineer would give all the information required to the secretary if he would call at the engineer's office.

"That the council be requested to appoint a fire chief and to allow him a salary and also to have the hose tested." In this relation Coun. Bridgman remarked that if they were going to start a fire department they were going to tackle a big question, beyond the district's finances at present. If a volunteer brigade was formed the council was willing to pay for their time when called out; also if a man was appointed as their chief the council would install a telephone in his house free of charge.

"That the council be requested to grade the park in North Lonsdale preparatory to seeding down in the fall." It was explained that in view of the grading which had been done in the beginning of the year the council should not undertake to do any more at present.

"That the attention of the council be drawn to the way work is being done in the district, that it is being done in a way unsatisfactory to the ratepayers, the same work being done two or three times over. We also wish to call your attention to the condition of the Local Improvement work, the same having been in hand for about 12 months and at the present rate of progress is likely to be as long again."

Shall No. 1 Ferry Be Used Regularly During Summer

Ten-Minute Service Suggested by Mr. Wright—Board Decides to 'Stick to the Ferry Business.'

The following letter was addressed to the board of ferry commissioners by Mr. H. C. Wright, one of the directors, yesterday afternoon:

"After mature consideration with regard to the increased traffic which is bound to take place to and from our city this summer, as was evidenced on Sunday last, which was practically the start of the fine weather, I am of the opinion that the ratepayers and those who use our ferry would appreciate the act if we were to engage a crew for number one and place her in commission to run during the day, say during the hours of between 8 a. m. and 7 p. m., for the summer months, until further notice. I feel that it is a mistake to keep number one tied up waiting for emergencies, when for little expense we could accommodate the travel quicker and give better service to all. As an advertisement it would be a good move; and further, if we were to establish a ten-minute service I feel sure that the B. C. E. R. will meet our wishes with a quicker tram service."

Mr. Wright supported the purport of his letter verbally, reminding the board that they had to keep number one in repair, and he thought it might be a good proposition to make use of her in the suggested way, if the expense involved did not prove to be too heavy.

"Would you consider it advisable to run her every day?" queried Capt. Cates.

"Why, certainly I would during the summer months," replied Mr. Wright.

Adjourned Session of W. Vancouver Council

By-Laws Will Be Voted on June 1st.

An adjourned meeting of the West Vancouver council was held in the school house at Hollyburn yesterday afternoon principally for the purpose of furthering proceedings in connection with the three by-laws which are soon to be submitted to the ratepayers of West Vancouver. Voting upon these by-laws, which represent a total sum of \$130,000, will take place on June 1st, the school house to be the polling station, and the municipal clerk, Mr. G. H. Peake to act as returning officer. The three by-laws were approved by the municipal solicitor and have passed their second reading almost unamended.

The West Vancouver Road Bylaw for the raising of \$75,000 for the improvement and extensions of roads and streets in the municipality. Owing to the subdividing and settlement being carried out on a larger scale this spring and summer than ever before, the opening up of roads in every part of the district is in the opinion of the council, absolutely essential.

Thirty thousand dollars is to be spent for the purchase of 300 shares of the capital stock of the West Vancouver Ferries Limited, a municipal enterprise which is expected to bring increased immigration to the municipality. Part of this sum will go toward purchasing or building a ferry steamer to accommodate at least 150 passengers, and part will be used to pay the purchase price of \$6,500 on the West Vancouver Transportation Company.

Twenty-five thousand dollars is for school sites in West Vancouver. The expenditure of this amount from the revenue of the council was formally rejected at Tuesday's meeting and a by-law put before the people for the amount.

Reeve Nelson was not at the meeting, having departed for Victoria, where he is spending a few days.

NORTH VANCOUVER DISTRICT AND WEST VANCOUVER

The district of North Vancouver owes the district of West Vancouver approximately \$37,000 according to the report of Mr. J. G. Farmer, municipal clerk, read at the meeting of the district council last evening. The financial statement, which was requested by the West Vancouver council, dates up to about May 1.

"It's a good idea for holidays," commented the captain.

But we couldn't engage a crew just for holidays," objected Mr. Boulton.

Manager Heard's opinion was then sought, and, though Mr. Heard was in agreement with the useful character of the suggestion, he called attention to one or two obstacles, the principal one being the different speeds of the boats, which rendered it a difficult matter to schedule them uniformly. The problem was, as Mr. Wright pointed out, to make four trips with three boats instead of three trips with two boats per hour. Capt. Cates thought it would be a good idea to get the number one into good running order first and then take up the question of utilizing her in the manner suggested.

The manager estimated the additional cost to the company of this scheme at about \$1000, and in Mr. Wright's opinion it meant about \$1000 worth of advertising to the city.

Capt. Cates' suggestion of laying the matter over until the repairs on number one were completed was finally adopted. Discussion of this question led to the consideration of the matter of allowing the hiring of the ferries for excursion purposes. It was unanimously agreed that such a policy should not be adopted, the Mayor exhorting the directors to "stick to the ferry business."

The board based its rejection of the idea primarily upon the fact that the company was liable for any accidents that might occur during excursions, and also on account of the necessity of there being always a third boat at hand in case of mishap to one of the two boats in regular commission.

The statement shows that expenditure on the Keith road up to April 30 was \$40,429.45, and during May, when a contract was completed and paid for, \$6,056.74. This total of \$46,486.19 is deducted from the expropriation of \$100,000 for the work. There was due from the West Vancouver account of separation expenses and other details \$15,742.50, making a total due to be paid to West Vancouver of \$37,100.77.

A letter was read from the West Vancouver council asking for \$10,000, the details of which they thought should be adjusted later. Some money has become due to the new municipality since the beginning of the month.

Telephone Service For Lynn Valley

System To Be Installed Immediately

Lynn Valley residents are to be accommodated with a telephone service at an early date. These tidings were imparted to the district council last night by means of a letter from the superintendent, Mr. F. J. MacGougau. "I am glad to be able to inform you," wrote Mr. MacGougau, "that the estimate providing facilities has been approved and the material will be ordered and work commenced without any unnecessary delay."

Coun. Westover reported in this connection that he had interviewed Mr. Johnston, who had assured him that the telephone company were starting the work of putting in a service at once. At present they were working on the plans and as soon as these were ready the system would be installed.

Coun. Bridgman paid a tribute to the energetic work of Coun. Westover in this relation. Coun. Westover was appointed a committee of one to look into the matter and negotiate with the company and the Valley should certainly be grateful for the satisfactory results of his efforts.

Mayor McNeish has called a public meeting in the city hall on Wednesday the 22nd inst., for the purpose of striking committees and making arrangements for the annual celebration of the 1st of July in this city. It is hoped that there will be a large attendance and an enthusiastic meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the local Board of Trade will take place tonight in the City Hall, when some questions of public moment are expected to rise.

Gas. The Next Step.

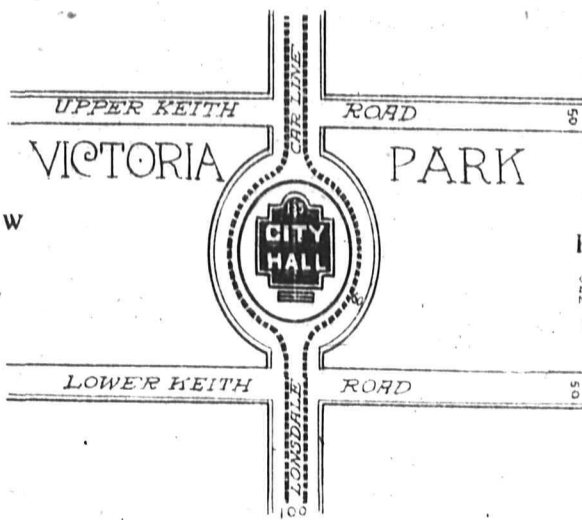
Sir:—
Most citizens who voted for the Gas
Bylaw did so not because they were in
love with the private franchise but
rather from the fact that they felt the
necessity for the immediate installation
of a plant for the supply of this com-
modity, and believed there was no
alternative.

However, there is one, and that is
Municipal Ownership.

There is not time for delay, we must
proceed at once. Money is the first
consideration. This can be got. The

gas undertaking, as they would with
a private concern, absentee owners of
several thousands of vacant lots would
pay their share, so that actual users of
gas would be required to pay merely
a nominal price per 1,000 cu. ft., and
such gas would be within the reach of
all for purposes of cooking and heating
to the exclusion of coal and wood.

With the defeat of the bylaw I feel
it incumbent on me to propound some
alternative. Above I have tried to the
best of my ability to outline a sug-
gestion which if acted upon would place
our city in the very forefront. The
idea is simply an extension of the prin-
ciple of not taxing improvements, or



Dominion Government is to pay \$93,000
for the City Hall. Presumably the site
will not be required for some year or
so; in the meantime the City can lease
the present hall from the government
for City Hall purposes. There is no
need to purchase a new site. There
are rumors that lots are to be bought
facing Victoria Park. If the City Hall
is to be up there, a magnificent sit-
ing would be in what is at present the road
way of Lonsdale Avenue, between Up-
per and Lower Keith roads. Lonsdale
Avenue as it approached the hall would
divide in two, the hall thus standing
in a circular roadway, with a park
on either side. No city in Canada, I
think, could boast of such a
unique civic centre.

This site would cost the city nothing,
and thus the bulk of the \$93,000 would
remain in the city treasury. Note this
money towards a municipal plant and
that will be good for a start. The pre-
liminary work can then be immediately
preceded with. The recent scheme in-
volved, we were told, the expenditure
of \$100,000 on plant and 8 miles of
main. Mains are not expensive. Ap-
proximately 65 miles would pipe the
whole city, suppose all streets were
opened up; 45 or 50 miles would today
reach almost every house. Such an
undertaking is easily within the power
of the city to carry out to completion
within two and a half years. Within
15 or 18 months, that is, before winter
next year, gas could be delivered to at
least all the lower section of the city,
together with all that part lying in a
block or so each side of Lonsdale
Avenue to the city limits, and on some
streets extending eastwards to the
boulevard.

Such gas mains would pass an enor-
mous number of vacant lots. Each of
these would benefit and be held for a
considerably higher price as a result.
By charging all the capital charges,
such as interest, sinking fund, etc., on
to the general tax rate, such owners of
vacant lots would contribute a small
percentage of the increased value of
their lots due to the presence of the
mains. On the present assessment it
might entail an increase in the tax
rate of 3 mills, but considering the
enormous rise in values that has taken
place of late, the assessment could be
raised very considerably, so that the
present rate would bring in a very
much larger revenue. With a higher
assessment our borrowing power would
be increased sufficiently to raise in
balance to complete the gas extension
to build a hall worthy of a city that
calls itself "Ambitious," to bonus the
Second Narrows bridge, and to provide
for all other necessary expenditure on
capital account, such as sewers, etc.

Instead of North Vancouver resi-
dents contributing the whole revenue of
the gas undertaking, as they would with
a private concern, absentee owners of
several thousands of vacant lots would
pay their share, so that actual users of
gas would be required to pay merely
a nominal price per 1,000 cu. ft., and
such gas would be within the reach of
all for purposes of cooking and heating
to the exclusion of coal and wood.

With the defeat of the bylaw I feel
it incumbent on me to propound some
alternative. Above I have tried to the
best of my ability to outline a sug-
gestion which if acted upon would place
our city in the very forefront. The
idea is simply an extension of the prin-
ciple of not taxing improvements, or

having a less sensitive organization the pain is not so acute. Willing enough, after an hour and a half underground, we re-enter the "cage", and speedily measure the 1,200 feet to the surface. sees, perform all the necessary work on these floors. This several months of this treatment the "ground" is transferred to the steam washing gear, where it is pulled with water and the mud is run off to "tailing heaps" which, growing and extending indefinitely, make the landscape hideous. The resulting gravel is "sorted" for diamonds at the "pulstator" and the diamonds conveyed daily under armed escort to the valuator's department at the De Beers head offices situated in the town.

Here they are holed in a mixture of nitric and sulphuric acid to remove all extraneous matter, and valued according to size, color and purity. They are found in a great variety of colors—green, blue, pink, brown, yellow, or orange, pure white and opaque.

The stones vary in size from a pin's head to 1½ inches square—which was the size of the largest stone ever found at Kimberley. This stone weighed 128½ carats, but lost 500 carats in the process of cutting. It was found by a native whose "brother" (they are all brothers) gave information which led to its recovery while being taken from the mine.

A syndicate now buys the whole weekly find and on Tuesday morning (the time conceals the previous burden) has seen on a Monday afternoon \$100,000 worth of diamonds assorted in heaps on a counter in the Beers' office.

The annual output is from \$20,000,000 worth and up to the present some \$100,000,000 worth weighing about 50 tons has been taken from the Kimberley Mines—the Standard.

PUBLIC SERVICE CORPORATIONS
AND THE CITIES

The burden of the message of the touring representatives of the 1,300 electric railway companies of America who addressed a public meeting in Vancouver on Wednesday evening, appears to have been "If the public will amend the franchises of the street railway companies in such manner that the companies will be able to greatly increase their earnings per mile of road, then the companies will be able and may also be inclined to give the public 'the quality and extent of service' which it rightfully expects."

The whole problem of the "relation between public service corporations and the communities they serve" would appear, therefore, to be so extremely simple and easy of solution that it scarcely seems to warrant the lengthy and expensive tour of eleven thousand miles upon the part of this deputation of able and influential representatives of the companies. If the problem were no more intricate than the companies evidently would have the public believe, then it would be necessary only to give the public credit for the most rudimentary order of intelligence to conclude that they would be able to comprehend the situation by the unaided exercise of that intelligence, thus saving to the treasury of the companies the cost of this expensive campaign of education.

The assertion was made that in most cases the interest paid on the investment by the street railway companies is not more than 5% or 6 per cent. In order to understand the real significance of such a statement, it is necessary that the public should know precisely what is meant by the term "investment." If a company starts business with \$100,000 actually paid into the treasury in cash out of the pockets of the shareholders and during the succeeding twenty years invests \$500,000 of the profits of the company in extensions and equipment, then pays six per cent. on the \$600,000 the result is that that company is paying thirty six per cent. on the shareholders' money, but technically it is paying only six per cent. on the "investment." It may be that the record of street railway companies in the United States differs in financial results from their record in Canada, but it would require a lot of persuasion to induce the average Canadian citizen to believe that the street railway systems of Toronto, Winnipeg or Vancouver are not paying considerably more than six per cent. on the amount of money actually paid in by the shareholders irrespective of profits or losses.

The flat rate of a five-cent fare for a long or short ride within certain limits is naturally not popular with the com-

panies, neither, for that matter, is it any too popular with the public but it is just at that point at which the real difficulty arises for the reason that the companies evidently would have it revised upward while the public would have it revised downward.

From the company standpoint the speaker enunciated one of the axioms of the problem in declaring that the future success of the public service corporations depends on the assurance that it is given by the cities that the men who invest their capital will receive a fair return for the money. But this phase of the subject takes a different hue when viewed from the angle at which the public stand in relation thereto. There is a growing conviction in the cities that the assurance sought by the companies comes too high when its cost to the public is taken into account and that instead of contenting themselves with such "quality and extent of service" as the companies are pleased to provide, in their endeavor to procure the assurance of dividends, it would be preferable to invest this order, place the street railway systems in the hands of the municipalities with instructions to provide the service and let the dividends take care of themselves.

The matters now at issue in public service affairs in Vancouver serve to illustrate the difficulties with which relationships between cities and communities are beset. It does not help matters any to tell the public that by attacking the public service corporations of the city the very vital interests of the community are shaken and the citizens injure their own prospects as much as they injure the corporation. The public are not actuated by the desire to inflict injury anywhere but there is a growing determination upon their part to see to it that the affairs of all the public utilities are administered on a sound business basis from the standpoint of the interests of the public. The manifestation of a high order of intelligence and of a spirit of moderate enterprise in public affairs upon the part of the public in any city is a much higher recommendation and a much more valuable asset than would be the toleration of defects in the public methods which were working serious loss and injury to the municipality.

The basis of the relationships between the public service corporations and the public is found in the agreement which is signed by the respective parties when the franchise is granted the company. The solution of the problem lies there. Let the municipalities exercise

extreme care in safeguarding the public interests at that important juncture and all will be well. Let the municipalities state explicitly what they are prepared to agree to and then let them stand firm leaving it to those who seek the franchise to take it or leave it as they may see fit. In their over eagerness for the installation of these public utilities in the early stages of a city's growth the cities are in danger of making concessions which will be regretted in after years. The companies will live up to the agreement which they sign and it is not reasonable to expect anything more from them. The difficulties which arise are not the result of defects in the system but rather of poor bargaining upon the part of the cities.

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS
Coal mining rights of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-west Territories and in a portion of the province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant.
Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.
In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.
Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.
The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.
The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 an acre.

Ottawa, May 15.—Rival claimants to the location of the Grand Trunk Pacific depot at New Hazelton will wage the next battle on June 4, to which date the railway commission has assigned the case, following its remanding for re-hearing by the Governor-General in Council Saturday.

The Hessian General Loved Chess.

Daddy's Bedtime Story—

What a Game Cost the Hessian General

JACK and Evelyn were enjoying a game of checkers. "I just love checkers," Evelyn exclaimed as they put the checkers and board away.

"It's time for our story now, you know," remarked Jack to daddy. "So it is," said he. "Well, into this story I must put George Washington and the time when things were going badly for the patriot army. They had been forced to march away from the enemy whenever these got too close, for Washington knew that if his soldiers fought with the larger and stronger army of the British they would be whipped.

"So he had crossed the Delaware river at Trenton, N. J., taking all the boats with him and there in the ice and snow his half starved, half clothed soldiers pitched their tents while Washington told them to be patient and wait their time.

"Among the British soldiers were a lot which King George III had hired from the ruler of a little German state called Hesse. This prince rented out his soldiers to whoever would pay him.

"General Rahl, the Hessian officer who was in charge of these German soldiers, was at Trenton that Christmas night in 1776 when Washington looked across the ice covered Delaware and felt that the time to fight had come. "That evening in the house where he made his headquarters General Rahl was playing chess with some friends. A boy came in with a note, but so interested in his chess was the Hessian officer that he stuffed it into his pocket and went on with his game.

"He never remembered to open it, for the next day, when he was found dead from the shots of the Americans, the note, still sealed, was in his coat pocket.

"It was a warning that the Americans had crossed the Delaware and were marching on Trenton. Had the Hessian read it the British would have been ready for the Americans and he would not have been killed.

"And so a game of chess cost him his life and gave the victory to Washington."
