Dear Sirs,

I have your letter of February 3rd,
~~(neuanfang und begnet)~~ to say that I am not informed as to the
~~Lucoo nraan Germania~~ attitude of the German Government towards the import-
ation of Canadian wool, nor do I know what their re-
action might be to a proposal to include wool in the
list of specified commodities as appended to the German-
Canadian Trade and Payments Agreement.

You will observe that according to the
Schedule to the Agreement, 63.1% of the exchange accru-
ing from German exports to Canada are to be allocated
for the purchase of Canadian products as specifically
enumerated in the schedule. This leaves an unallocated
balance of 36.9% which is available for the purchase of
commodities not included in the schedule.

In my opinion this leaves the door open
for German importers of wool to make application to the
competent German authorities for permits to import Can-
adian wool. I would suggest, therefore, that you cause
your business connections in Germany to make suitable
application.

I would further suggest that when writing to the Department of Trade & Commerce in Ottawa you apply for a copy of the "Explanatory Statement issued by the Department on the Provisional Trade Agreement, etc. between Canada and Germany".

Dear Sirs,

I have your letter of February 3rd.

The import duty on leather is to be imposed as follows: -
S/D Acting German Consul

For the first 500 lbs of leather the rate will be 10% ad valorem.
For the next 500 lbs the rate will be 15% ad valorem.
For leather above 1000 lbs the rate will be 20% ad valorem.

Canadian Trade Agreement.

You will observe that according to the Schedule of the Agreement, 6% of the expenditure on
the Canadian export of leather is to be imposed as follows:
For the first 500 lbs the rate will be 10% ad valorem.
For the next 500 lbs the rate will be 15% ad valorem.
For leather above 1000 lbs the rate will be 20% ad valorem.

It is my opinion that this leaves the door open for Canadian importers to make application to the Canadian authorities to make application for compensation for damage to their trade, therefore, that your case stands well.
