RULES AND REGULATIONS

AUGUST 29 - SEPTEMBER 5, 1938

A synopsis of the most important rules are embodied herein.

1. Exhibits arriving late will not be allowed in competition.
2. **ENTRY CLOSING DATES**—Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Swine and Goats, August 10. All other departments except Agriculture and Horticulture, August 15. Agriculture and Horticulture, August 19.
3. All entries must be made on printed forms.
4. One specimen only allowed in each section, except livestock.
5. To constitute an entry, subject must be on exhibition for competition. The Association reserves to itself the right to refuse, accept conditionally, and to cancel any entries, disqualify exhibitors, prohibit exhibition of entries, cancel award of prizes, and to settle all disputes, without claim for damages.
6. No offensive article will be allowed on the grounds.
7. Exhibitors shall, if required, make statutory declaration that articles are exhibited in accordance with the rules.
8. Protests must be filed within six hours of judging awards, unless otherwise stated in prize list.
9. Exhibits not accompanied must be consigned, freight prepaid, to the General Manager, with instructions for disposition or return, otherwise the Association will use its judgment in arranging disposition.
10. Exhibitors must give the necessary personal attention to their exhibits.
11. Exhibitors of animals, machinery, etc., shall protect the public in the matter of their exhibits.
12. Exhibitors must take any and all risks in exhibiting.
13. The Association will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident whatsoever in connection with the Exhibition.
14. Exhibits must not be removed until after the close of the Exhibition.
15. No smoking allowed in any building.
16. Entries must be made in the name of the owner.
17. Hay, straw and grain will be on sale on the grounds.
18. Production of animals may be ordered at any time.
19. Coal-oil stoves or fires are prohibited except by written consent of the management.

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20. No prize awarded if exhibit is of insufficient merit.
23. Prizes will be withheld for dishonest practice, and exhibitors barred from future showing.
24. Prize-winners must take part in all parades if required.
25. All first-prize animals must compete for championships.
26. All exhibitors of livestock will be required to hold their stock available for such judging competitions as are arranged by the Exhibition Association.
27. Entry fees charged on all sections where money prizes are paid.
28. The Association will not be responsible for the payment of special prizes offered by others.
29. All shipments must be addressed direct to Vancouver Exhibition Association, Vancouver, B.C.
30. Customs Regulations, see pages 29-31.
31. No member of staff is allowed to compete for prizes.
32. The amount of space (height and frontage) allotted exhibitors for storage of feed or straw and for tack room will be in relation to the number and nature of entries, and is subject to the direction of the livestock superintendent.
33. Standard materials for construction of suitable tack room and for placing of signs, decorations, etc. are available on the grounds, and may be obtained from the livestock superintendent's office.
34. Registration and transfer of all animals to be shown in pure-bred classes must be completed in the particular herd books concerned prior to closing date of entries at this Exhibition—August 10th.
35. In the case of animals from the United States, these must be recorded in the recognized American Herd Book for that breed, and need not be recorded in the Canadian National Live Stock Records.
22. All prize cards must be displayed.
21. No prize cards will be allowed on exhibits until they are judged.

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**LIVE STOCK
EXHIBITORS PLEASE NOTE
SPECIAL RULES
and
REGULATIONS**

All entries in Livestock Sections are to be checked by Federal Livestock Department, Ottawa, therefore must be received by Exhibition Association before entry closing date, August 10.

No Livestock Entries will be accepted after August 10.

This year the ages for cattle will be computed from January 1 and July 1.

In all group classes animals must have been previously shown in regular classes.

If complete information as called for by Government Regulations is not given on entry sheets before entry closing date, August 10, such entry will not be accepted.

Section A -- Horses

Entries Close August 10

All Entries in Livestock Sections are to be checked by Federal Livestock Department, Ottawa, therefore must be received by Exhibition Association before entry closing date August 10. No entries accepted after August 10.

Exhibitors should make their entries as early as possible before August 10 and secure stabling which is allotted in the order entries are received. Entries must be in early in order to be included in the catalogue.

All horses must be on the grounds not later than 9 a.m. Monday, August 29.

Entry Fee, \$2.00 in all classes.

Where required by the classification, horses must be entered in their respective stud books in the name of the owner, and the name and registration number of the sire and dam given on the entry form.

Complete particulars of each animal must be placed on entry form. Ages of horses will be computed from January 1.

No person bringing horses under contract as attractions will be allowed to enter in any other classes.

Exhibitors of horses are requested to decorate their quarters as nicely as possible, and to keep the part of the building occupied by them neat and attractive in appearance at all times.

All stalls and exhibition places must be dressed before 9 a.m. each day.

All horses must be paraded in the ring whenever so ordered by the management, and anyone refusing to comply with this rule will be liable to forfeit all prizes to which he may be entitled.

Where there are less than two entries in anyone class, the judge will be the sole arbiter as to whether first, second or any prize will be awarded.

Prizes will be withheld when the judges are of the opinion that there is not sufficient merit in the animal exhibited to justify an award. During the time of judging nobody will be allowed in the ring except the judges of the classes then in the ring, the attendants in charge of the horses being judged, the ringmaster and staff, and the ring committee.

Judging will commence, Tuesday, August 30.

Animals in the pure-bred breeding class may show at any age. A yeld mare is one that has not raised a foal in the current year.

A brood mare is one that has produced and raised a foal during the calendar year.

Any animal that is eligible to show in the individual classes shall be eligible to win a grand championship.

All horses shown in groups and harness classes, must first be shown in their respective classes on the halter.

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Junior champions include foals, yearlings and two-year-olds.

College and Government Farm Exhibits may compete in the regular classes for ribbons and banners only.

The amount of space (height and frontage) allotted exhibitors for storage of feed or straw and for tack room will be in relation to the number and nature of entries, and is subject to the direction of the livestock superintendent.

Standard material for construction of suitable tack room and for placing of signs, decorations, etc., are available on the grounds and may be obtained from the livestock superintendent's office.

PLEASE NOTE: Entries for foals for the current calendar year shall include date of birth and sex of foal and names and registration number of sire and dam. The dams of all such foals must be registered in name of exhibitor at date of birth of foal. If, however, any foal for which entry is made was not born the property of the exhibitor, then such foal must be registered and transferred to the ownership of exhibitor.

Registration and transfer of all animals to be shown in pure-bred classes must be completed in the particular herd books concerned prior to closing date of entries at this Exhibition—August 10.

Entries must be made on regular entry form in all classes (except for Championships and Specials) and the exhibitor must give the following information: Name of animal; registration number; date of birth; sex; names and numbers of sire and dam.

Entries in group classes must be made at the same time as other entries, subject to closing date—August 10. Individual animals may be named just prior to class being shown and special forms will be provided on which this information can be supplied, at the ringside.

Registration certificates and transfer of ownership where necessary must be available for inspection by the livestock superintendent for his representative at the opening date of the show.

In Get of Sire and Progeny of Dam Classes, the certificates of registration may be required to be produced in the ring to establish that the animals exhibited are by the same sire or out of the same dam.

AGRICULTURAL CLASSES

Special rules for exhibiting of pure-bred animals as to ages, championships, etc., do not apply to Agricultural or Heavy Draught classes.

Horses registered or eligible for registration cannot compete in this section. All horses in Classes 55 and 56 must weigh 1,400 and under 1,600 lbs.

Section B -- Cattle

Entries Close August 10

Entry Fees: Bulls, one year and over, \$1.50; all other animals, \$1.00; herds or groups, \$1.00. Entry fee charged wherever prize money is offered. All cattle must be on the grounds, ready for judging by 9 a.m., Monday, August 29. Accomodation available August 25th. All cattle must be registered in their respective Herd Books in the name of the exhibitor and certificates produced on request.

No livestock released before Monday, September 5, 10 p.m.

Judging Dates

Judging will be carried out as follows, commencing at 9:30 a.m. each day, and the schedule will be strictly adhered to:

Monday, August 29—Junior Judging Competition, 1 p.m.

Tuesday, August 30—Horses.

Tuesday, August 30—Holsteins, Guernseys, and Beef.

Wednesday, August 31—Jerseys and Ayrshires.

Thursday, September 1—Halter Making Competition, 10 a.m.

Thursday, September 1—Judging of Junior Exhibits, 1:30 p.m.

Thursday, September 1—Showmanship Contests, 3:30 p.m.

Males to be judged first, beginning with Junior Bulls, ending with Aged Bulls. Females, beginning with Aged Cow Class, ending with Junior Heifer Calves. An effort will be made to start to judge milking females in each of the dairy breeds promptly at 1:15 p.m.

Boys' and Girls' entries will be judged as shown above, in livestock arena.

There will be parades of cattle, and all exhibitors must bring out their animals for this purpose when required by the Committee, with the prize ribbons awarded properly displayed.

NOTE:—THE AGES FOR CATTLE WILL BE COMPUTED FROM JANUARY 1 and JULY 1.

Exhibitors must bring out their animals for stock judging when requested.

No animal under four months of age at closing date of entries, to be shown.

All animals in herds must be owned by one exhibitor, except where otherwise permitted.

All Dairy Bulls over one year old must have rings in their noses and must have adequate staff for proper control of such animal.

All animals shown in dry classes must show evidence of being in calf.

The amount of space (height and frontage) allotted exhibitors for storage of feed or straw and for tack room will be in relation to the number and nature of entries, and is subject to the direction of the livestock superintendent. Standard material for construction of suitable tack room and for placing of signs, decorations, etc., are available on the grounds, and may be obtained from the livestock superintendent's office.

CANADA PACIFIC EXHIBITION

The Vancouver Exhibition Association will take every precaution to segregate Bang's Tested cattle.

Registration and transfer of all animals to be shown must be completed in the particular herd books concerned prior to closing date of entries at this Exhibition—August 10.

Entries must be made on regular entry form in all classes (except for Championships and Specials) and the exhibitor must give the following information: Name of animal; registration number; date of birth; sex; names and numbers of sire and dam, and where called for, tattoo and Production qualification information.

Entries in group classes must be made at the same time as other entries, subject to closing date—August 10. Individual animals may be named just prior to class being shown and special forms will be provided on which this information can be supplied, at the ring-side.

No animal may compete in more than one class except in groups or specials.

Production Qualifications. (Individual Dairy or Dual Purpose Classes)

1. Any female under four years of age having none of the undermentioned qualifications shall be awarded only 80% of the prize money won:

- (a) From an R.O.P. qualified dam or B.C. Cow Testing Association Record.
- (b) By an advanced registry or selective registration bull.
- (c) By an R.O.P. sire.
- (d) Which has herself qualified in the R.O.P. or B.C. Cow Testing Ass'n Record.

2. Any female four years and under six years of age, not having an R.O.P. or B.C. Cow Testing Association Record to her credit, shall be awarded only 80% of the prize money won.

3. No female six years of age and over shall be eligible to show unless she has at least one R.O.P. or B.C. Cow Testing Association Record to her credit. If she has less than two records, she is eligible for only 80% of the prize money won.

4. Any bull having none of the undermentioned qualifications shall be awarded only 80% of the prize money won:—

- (a) From an R.O.P. qualified dam, or B.C. Cow Testing Association Record.
- (b) By an advanced registry or selective registration bull.
- (c) By an R.O.P. sire.
- (d) Which has himself qualified.

In the above sections, Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, Shorthorn and Red Polled cattle shall earn 90 per cent. instead of 80 per cent. of prize money.

Age Limits for Cattle

All records must be complete and R.O.P. certificates issued prior to animals being shown. R.O.P. certificates must be produced when requested.

It is felt that the continuous showing of a high-class individual year after year in the breeding classes is ultimately a detriment to the breed, the individual animal, and the owner. Therefore, the individual in the pure-bred cattle classes, six years of age or over, shall

In all cattle classes any animal which is eligible to show in the individual classes shall be eligible to win a grand championship.

No beef animal is eligible to show six years of age or over with the exception that bulls of beef breeds are eligible to show six years of age or over only when three of their progeny under two years of age are on exhibit.

All entries in Livestock Sections are to be checked by Federal Livestock Department, Ottawa, therefore must be received by Exhibition before entry closing date, August 10.

Health and Evidence of Breeding Capability

Tampering with Cattle. Unnatural practices in fitting will not be tolerated and all cattle entered for competition shall be presented in the judging ring in their natural conformation and natural physical condition. This does not apply to the treatment of hair, horns and hoofs. The Exhibition proposes to ask the Dominion Department of Agriculture to recommend an official veterinarian who will inspect each animal before the time of showing, and in the ring if required at the call of judge or cattle superintendent.

If any animal is found by such official veterinarian to have been tampered with, as previously described, it shall be disqualified from competition. All prize money that has been won at the 1938 Canada Pacific Exhibition by the exhibitor on any animal or animals so disqualified will be forfeited and such exhibitor, manager or herdsman responsible may be debarred from further showing.

The finding of such official veterinarian as to whether or not any animal has been tampered with shall be final and conclusive.

The names and addresses of exhibitors who have had animals so disqualified will be furnished to the secretaries of the respective breed associations.

The Vancouver Exhibition Association will not be responsible for the consequence, direct or indirect, of any animal or exhibitor being so disqualified or debarred from showing.

Breeding Capability. In cases where doubt exists in the mind of the judge or association officials as to the breeding capability of an animal the exhibitor thereof may be required to furnish evidence to the satisfaction of the officials concerned.

TUBERCULIN TEST

There will be admitted to the grounds only cattle from herds fully accredited or from herds dealt with under the supervision of the Health of Animals branch that have passed a satisfactory tuberculin test or animals that have passed a satisfactory tuberculin test within sixty days prior to the Canada Pacific Exhibition, by a veterinary inspector approved by the Health of Animals branch.

Registration certificates and transfer of ownership where necessary together with Production certificates where such are required, must be available for inspection by the Live Stock Superintendent or his representative at the opening day of the show.

Certificates issued by Milk Recording Associations in Great Britain or other countries will be accepted provided the records made equal the requirements of the Canadian Record of Performance.

NOTICE—CATTLE EXHIBITORS

Exhibitors are required to provide their own feed boxes. There will be absolutely none available on the grounds, in view of the stringent health regulations which have been issued.

PLEASE NOTE—Entries in Livestock cannot be accepted after August 10.

IDENTIFICATION OF REGISTRATION

Exhibitors must furnish proof of identity of each animal entered, for checking of same with registration certificate.

Hereford cattle must be properly tattoo marked.

Red Poll born in 1937 or after will be required to be tattoo-marked.

Ayrshire cattle born in or after 1936 must be either tattooed or photographs taken.

Jersey cattle born on or after January 1, 1935, must be tattooed.

Guernsey cattle born on or after January 1, 1935, must be tattooed.

For all breeds, satisfactory identification must be available at or before the time of judging.

Ages of cattle shall date from July 1st.

The Canadian Customs regulations permit animals and articles imported for Exhibition purposes, to be entered free of duty, providing that the importer or owner gives bond for the full value of such animals and articles to ensure their return to United States within ninety days.

SPECIAL NOTICE TO U.S. EXHIBITORS

All cattle must have passed the 96 hours' intradermic test before they can be exhibited at any Exhibition in Canada.

NOTICE

U.S.A. EXHIBITORS

United States exhibitors are especially asked to read the regulations governing the transportation of cattle to British Columbia, in order that there may be no delay at the boundary.

The Vancouver Exhibition Association will be glad to give all necessary information and arrange customs regulations for the convenience of exhibitors.

PRIZE LIST, 1938

The following is a general regulation, which must be carried out by United States exhibitors:

MINISTERIAL ORDER No. 44

Amended October 12, 1921

Under and by virtue of the authority conferred upon me by the provisions of the Order in Council of November 30, 1909, containing regulations relating to Animals Quarantine, I do hereby order that:

On and after July 2, 1919, all cattle over six months old entering Canada from the United States for exhibition purposes shall be accompanied by a satisfactory tuberculin test chart dated not more than sixty days prior to the date of entry, and signed or endorsed by a veterinary inspector of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, and an affidavit or solemn declaration of the owner or importer that the said tuberculin test chart refers to the cattle offered for entry and no other.

Ministerial Order No. 42 of 18th November, 1913, is hereby rescinded.

Dated at Ottawa this twenty-fourth day of June, 1919.

CATTLE

Sec. 39 (a) Cattle for breeding purposes and milk production six months old or over, if unaccompanied by a satisfactory tuberculin test chart, dated not more than sixty days prior to the date of entry and signed or endorsed by a veterinarian of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, must be detained in quarantine for such period as may be deemed necessary, and subjected to the tuberculin test; cattle reacting thereto must be returned to the United States or slaughtered without compensation.

(b) Cattle from fully accredited herds in the United States accompanied by a certificate signed or endorsed by a veterinarian of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry stating that they are from a fully accredited herd, and have been tested within one year from the date of importation, shall be exempted from the provisions of paragraph (a) of this section.

(c) Cattle from herds in a modified accredited area in the United States, accompanied by a certificate signed or endorsed by a veterinarian of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry stating that the cattle originated in such a modified accredited area shall be exempted from the provisions of paragraph (a) of this section.

(d) Cattle six months old or over, excluding steers and those for immediate slaughter, must be accompanied by a certificate signed or endorsed by a veterinarian of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry showing that the animals were subjected to a blood test for Bang's disease (infectious abortion) with negative results within sixty days of the date of exportation. When not so accompanied such cattle may be detained in quarantine for such period as may be deemed necessary for the conduct of a test for Bang's disease. Reactors shall be permanently marked, slaughtered under inspection forthwith without compensation, or returned to country of origin.

Sec. 40 Importers may be required to furnish a statutory declaration that the certificates produced apply to the cattle they purport to describe and no other.

HORSES, SHEEP, GOATS

Horses, sheep and goats will be admitted on inspection at quarantine and inspection ports only subject to the usual customs regulations. It is not therefore necessary that such animals be accompanied by certificates.

SWINE

The importation of swine is prohibited unless the animals are accompanied by satisfactory certificates, in which event they are detained in quarantine at the port of entry for a period of thirty days.

No animal may compete in more than one class, except for championships, herds, groups or flock test prizes in the class to which they belong. In group classes each exhibitor will be allowed two monies and no animal shall be eligible to compete in the Group classes that has not been regularly entered and shown in the individual class to which it belongs, with the exception of fat sheep.

The catalogue numbers must be placed on the pens as soon as the sheep are penned.

Typical breeds of the above grades only are mentioned as a guide to exhibitors in properly entering their wool, be it pure-bred or cross-bred of any breed. Another guide would be the Government Wool Grading statement.

Complete fleeces in the grease alone will be accepted. Manufacturers and dealers are excluded from competition. Fleeces must be grown in British Columbia by a resident exhibitor, one year's growth and shorn in 1938.

All entries in livestock sections are to be checked by Federal Livestock Department, Ottawa, therefore must be received by Exhibition before entry closing date, August 10. No entries accepted after August 10, 1938.

NOTE—Poultry Show starts Monday, August 29, at 9 a.m.

The Poultry Buildings will be open to receive exhibits Saturday, August 27.

All exhibits must be in the building before 10 p.m., Saturday, August 27.

Judging will commence 9 a.m., August 28.

Exhibitors will not be allowed to remove their exhibits before 10 p.m., September 5, unless with special permission for the purpose of despatching exhibits by boat or train. All birds must be signed for before being taken from building.

All exhibitors must state on entry form which class they wish their birds judged in, Exhibition or Utility.

Exhibitors failing to give this information will have their birds placed for judging by committee in charge and no change will be allowed after coops are allotted.

Birds entered and not on exhibition will not be counted in allocating prizes.

The show will be judged under the latest rules of the American Poultry Standard of Perfection.

The card of the Association will be placed upon each coop, giving the entry number and address of exhibitor and name of specimen. This will be an open card show.

No other distinguishing mark or card will be allowed until the judging is over, when exhibitors may put up their own private cards, etc.

All exhibits will be fed and cared for by the Association. No persons (exhibitor or otherwise), will be allowed within the barrier when judging is in progress, except the superintendent or his assistants.

During the exhibition the superintendent will have full charge of all exhibits, and they cannot be removed from the show building without his written consent. Any exhibitor removing birds from the building before 10 p.m., Monday, September 5, without written permission from the superintendent, will forfeit all prize money which may have been won at this show by exhibitor.

No exhibitor will be allowed to handle any but his own exhibits.

Care will be exercised, but the Association does not hold itself responsible for loss or accident to exhibits.

All eggs laid during the show will have fertility destroyed and become the property of the Association.

Protests must be handed to the superintendent, in writing, accompanied by \$5.00, and not more than twelve hours after awards have been decided. If, after investigation, they prove to be without foundation, the deposit shall be forfeited.

PRIZE LIST, 1938

No prize will be awarded if exhibit is of insufficient merit.

All birds must be provided with numbered leg-bands, said numbers to be on entry form in space provided.

All express shipments must be addressed direct to Exhibition Grounds, Vancouver, B.C.

Positively no entries accepted after August 15.

No exhibitor will be allowed to coop or pack for shipment any exhibits unless accompanied by the superintendent or one of his assistants at time of cooping or packing.

Pen to consist of three females and one male. Birds entered in pen classes must be entered in single classes, and birds entered in single classes may be entered in pen classes.

All awards on pens will be made on points, as follows: For females, first prize, 5 points; second, 4 points; third, 3 points; fourth, 2 points; and 1 point each for 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th. The male bird in the pen receives for first prize, 10 points; second, 8 points; third, 6 points; fourth, 4 points; and 2 points each for 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th. Where there is only one competitor only half points will be allowed.

All entries must be made as Cock, Hen, Cockerel, Pullet, Duck, Drake, Old Pen or Young Pen.

All exhibitors whose entries amount to \$3.00 and over will receive an exhibitor's pass, good for one admission each day of show.

In making out entries exhibitor will abide by the following rules:

1. Use the Association blanks.
2. State the correct sex, color and breed. Exhibition or utility.
3. Put leg-band number on space provided.

EGG LAYING CONTEST IN BATTERIES

Entries Close August 15.

An Egg Laying Contest will be held under the direction and management of the Vancouver Exhibition Association, in the poultry show.

Pens of six pullets, each, hatched in 1938 will compete for prizes.

The Birds will be accommodated in batteries of laying cages.

The birds will be fed and watered and cared for by the Exhibition Association from the time they are delivered to the Exhibition Grounds to the end of the Contest.

All eggs laid will become the property of the Exhibition Association.

Entries will be accepted and caged in the order in which they are received; the management reserves the right to refuse entries when available accommodation has been filled.

Individual cages with facilities for feed and water will be provided for each bird.

One breeder may enter one pen only in the competition.

Birds must be pure-bred and true to type or breed characteristics.

The duration of the contest will be eight days as from Monday, August 29th, to Monday, September 5th, inclusive.

Breeders will deliver pens of birds on Saturday, August 27th, before noon of that day.

The management reserves the right to refuse the placing and cooping of an entry of birds in the contest that is diseased or otherwise unfit for competition.

Any pen that develops disease during the Contest may be removed at the discretion of the management.

All eggs of sound shell and of commercial value will be counted and awards will be made on the basis of the total number of eggs laid by the respective pens. Eggs must be 18 ozs. or over to the dozen.

Soft shelled eggs obviously not saleable or eggs too small to be classed in the standard grades will not be counted.

In cases of "ties" prize money will be divided.

Daily reports of production and standing of the pens will be posted in a prominent place and published for the information of the breeders and the general public.

Prizes will be awarded for egg production as follows:

1st, \$20.00; 2nd, \$15.00; 3rd, \$10.00; 4th, \$5.00.

Section L -- Rabbits

A judge, licensed by the A.R. & C. B. A., will be judge of show. Official Show of the Vancouver Rabbit Breeders' Association, Chartered Branch of the Vancouver Rabbit and Cavy Breeders' Association, Inc., and in accordance with their rules and regulations where such do not conflict with the Canada Pacific Exhibition Rules.

Rules and Regulations.

All entries must be made strictly as per classification of the Vancouver Exhibition Association.

Entries will not be accepted unless the full amount of entry fee is enclosed.

Entries positively close August 15.

Ship to Vancouver Exhibition Grounds, Vancouver, B.C.

The entry fee for single rabbits shall be 25 cents; for does with litter, which shall be provided with double coops, 50 cents; does with litter may be shown singly if extra 25 cents for entry fee is paid.

The present A.R. & C.B.A. of America, Inc., Standard of Perfection, will govern this show.

Judging will commence at 12 Noon, August 29, and all animals not in place by that time will be debarred from competition.

Every rabbit must be clearly marked in the ear, either by registered number, private tattoo mark, or by indelible pencil, and all ear-marks must correspond with entry list.

Full transportation charges must be prepaid by owner. Address your animals to the Superintendent, Rabbit Department, Vancouver Exhibition Association.

Exhibitor whose entries amount to \$3.00 and over will receive an exhibitor's pass, good for one admission to grounds each day.

For Customs Regulations see pages 28-30.

Exhibits must be bona fide property of the exhibitor. Any deception in this regard will mean the disqualification of the guilty party's entries.

During the Show the Superintendent will have full charge of all specimens, and they must not be removed without his written consent.

No exhibitor will be allowed to handle any exhibits except his or her own. Any infringement of this rule will debar the guilty party's exhibits from competition, or said exhibitors shall forfeit all prizes awarded them.

PRIZE LIST, 1938

In all classes the following credits will hold: First prize will count 6 points; second, 4 points; third, 3 points; fourth, 2 points; and fifth, 1 point. The total number of points won by an exhibitor to be multiplied by the number of specimens exhibited in his class. This grand total will be the number of points counted in the competition. No award cards or ribbons shall be attached to any coop except those awarded at the present Show.

Animals suffering from infectious disease will not be allowed in the showroom, and all stock discovered to be in such condition shall be removed at the owner's expense.

No animals shall be removed from the showroom before September 5, at 10 p.m., unless with special written permission.

To assist in returning the carriers of outside exhibitors, each exhibitor must have written on each and every carrier his name and address and the ear-mark or ear-marks of the rabbit or rabbits to be returned therein, besides the paper label, which is liable to be lost or torn.

After judging has been finally closed, rabbits may be offered for sale by exhibitors, but 10 per cent. of the purchase price of stock must be paid to the Association through the Superintendent.

1. Entry fee 10 cents in each class. Entry in Section Q, 10 cents per plate. All District Exhibits \$1.00 each Entry.

2. The judges have power to withhold prizes from exhibits considered of insufficient merit.

3. No person is allowed to make more than one entry in the same section. Two or more persons may not exhibit for prizes separately from the same garden, plant-house, nursery, or orchard.

4. All exhibits must be delivered and arranged as stated at top of each section. Exhibits arriving late will be placed on tables, but will be debarred from competition.

5. District and agricultural society exhibits must be arranged by 11 a.m., August 29.

6. No exhibitor will be allowed to remove any exhibits from building before 10 p.m., Monday, September 5, and then only upon presentation of claim check to official in charge.

7. All articles to be correctly named and properly labelled, as far as possible, and all plants must be exhibited in clean pots.

8. No cards allowed upon any exhibit, except those supplied by the Association, until after judging, when one white card, 3 by 5 inches, printed in black, bearing name and address of exhibitor, may be placed upon exhibit, and one 7 by 9 inches, of the same style, on exhibits of collections and banks. No business cards or other advertising matter allowed on other exhibits than by exhibitors on their own.

9. All express shipments must be addressed direct to Vancouver Exhibition Association, Vancouver, B.C.

10. Challenge cups shall be handed to the winners after each Exhibition, but a written guarantee will be required that same shall be returned to the secretary, in good order, at least a month before the following show. Challenge cups must be won three times—not necessarily in succession—before becoming the property of exhibitor.

PRIZE LIST, 1938

11. In the district exhibits it is necessary that each competitor shall submit to the management, immediately after display has been set up, a detailed list of all articles exhibited and by whom grown with a guarantee that the produce was grown in the district entering for competition. **This Rule will be strictly adhered to.**

12. No person may exhibit as an "Amateur" who employs a gardener, or who is either engaged in the floral or horticultural trade, or is a paid gardener, or is a market gardener or is a resident member of family of one engaged in such trade or employment.

13. Open classes are open to all, except seedsmen, nurserymen, florists, and other commercial producers.

14. All exhibits must be the bona fide property of exhibitor at least six weeks previous to the show unless otherwise specified.

15. Vegetables and flowers which have become decayed during exhibition may be removed and replaced by others, subject to the approval of the management.

16. All protests must be made in writing and handed to the Director in charge before 5 p.m. on the judging day of the show, accompanied by \$1.00 deposit, said deposit to be refunded if the protest is sustained. The judges decision in all cases will be final.

17. All collections, except where specified, will be judged according to the following points: Quality, 60; Variety, 20; Arrangement, 20.

18. Exhibitors, please note: When making entries in Agricultural, Horticultural, Floricultural, Vegetable, Roots or District Exhibit Classes, please do not make entries for other sections on same entry sheet. Extra entry sheets will be supplied free of charge on request.

19. Vegetable and Field Root exhibits must be in place and properly arranged, in the order called by the Superintendent, by 11 a.m., Monday, August 29, except where specified.

20. All individual exhibits must be grown by exhibitor.

21. If required by judges, exhibitors shall make a statutory declaration that their exhibits are the growth of the previous or present year.

22. No roots are eligible for competition except those for stock feeding purposes (potatoes excepted). Potatoes must be carefully named.

23. Competitors can only make one entry and receive only one premium in each class.

24. All plate fruit exhibits will become the property of the Association.

25. Defective or diseased fruit will not be given a place on the exhibition tables.

26. No first-prize money will be paid if there is no competition, the first-prize winner taking second-prize money, unless in the opinion of the judges, the exhibit is of sufficient merit.

The Second Prize Group shall comprise all exhibitors who are given a flavour score of 41.8 to 41.9 points, and a total score of 96.5 points or better. Each exhibitor in this group shall receive the value of 1½ units.

The Third Prize Group shall comprise all exhibitors who are given a flavour score of 41.5 to 41.7 points, and a total score of 96 points or better. Each exhibitor in this group shall receive the value of one unit.

The value of a unit will be determined by the number of exhibitors qualifying in each group. Thus, if four exhibitors are placed in the First Prize Group, eight in Second Prize Group, and twelve in the Third Prize Group, the total would represent thirty-two units, and this, divided into the prize money, would establish the value of a single unit. 1. Fifty per cent. of railway transportation expenses will be allowed to British Columbia 1st prize-winning bands.
2. Band Contests will be conducted on September 5th.
3. Bond for return of trophies will require to be provided by winners.
4. Winning bands will be required to play at close of contests if requested.
5. Bands eligible to compete in Class "B" may enter Class "A" if they wish.
6. No member will be allowed to play with more than one band, in any one class, and, if found playing with two bands, both bands will be disqualified.
7. Bands will be allowed five minutes after taking the stand to tune and warm up their instruments. Full instructions regarding this rule will be given each band on day of contest.
8. Each band must send the name by which it is known, together with the signature of each performer, the instrument he plays, and the conductor's name, accompanied by the entry fee, to the General Manager, Vancouver Exhibition Association, not later than August 1st, 1938.

9. All bands will be balloted for thirty minutes before the advertised time of commencement of contest by number only. Bandmasters or their representatives will supervise the ballot, and any band failing to take its place as drawn will be disqualified.
10. The Contest Committee shall have power to decide any dispute that may rise in connection with the contest, and their decision will be absolutely final, and all bands entering in competition understand that no legal proceeding can be taken with respect to such decisions whatsoever.
11. The decisions of the adjudicators will be final as regards the performance of a band. Where a band is disqualified, it will be dealt with by Contest Committee. When a prize is withheld for a breach of rules, such prize will go to next in order of merit, subject to Rule No. 19.
12. Any conductor of a competing band will, on application, be provided with a list of all bands and players registered in these competitions and if they have any objection to register against any band or player it must be lodged in the hands of the committee not less than three days prior to the date of competitions. The decision of the Music Committee in connection with protests is absolutely final. A deposit of \$5.00 must accompany a protest; this sum will be returned if the protest is sustained and forfeited if the protest is not successful. Further, if any protest be necessary in regard to clause No. 8 in the rules of the competition such protest must be in the hands of the committee within one hour after finish of the performance of the band objected to; the same deposit conditions before mentioned in this paragraph will apply to this type of protest.
13. Professional players are allowed to train and conduct any band.
14. To ensure fairness to all, no band will be allowed to rehearse on the grounds.
15. Playing in uniform is compulsory unless band can establish that it is not in possession of a uniform.
16. Any band infringing any of the rules or regulations is liable to disqualification.
17. Music must be played as per edition selected by the Vancouver Exhibition Association.
18. Adjudicators will be sealed from all interference and will judge the contest without seeing the contestants. Results will be announced at the close of each contest.
19. A total of 80 per cent. of the total points must be won to obtain first prize.
20. The term "amateur" is understood to mean anyone who does not make a business or profession of music as a means to livelihood.
21. Open events include both senior amateur and professional players.

NOTE:—With the exception of Rules 1 and 15, these rules apply to Orchestra Competitions.

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
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
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
