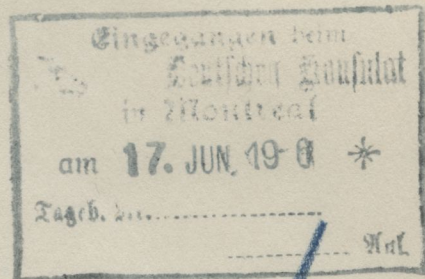

Dear Sir:-

According to our understanding of customs regulations in Germany, there are no prescribed formalities to be observed by a firm abroad, say in Canada, exporting goods to that market. I have reference here to such matters as consular invoices, certificates of origin, etc. We are constantly, however, giving out information of this nature pertaining to foreign countries in general and we have not had any recent direct information on this point concerning Germany. We would appreciate it very much therefore if you would be kind enough to let us have your latest advice concerning German regulations of the kind in question.

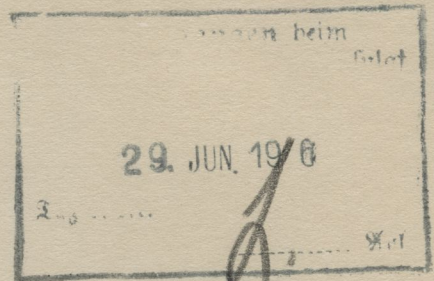
