I beg to acknowledge receipt of your telegram of today's date, which I presume concerns instructions about the certification of origin. As far as I am aware, there is no particular working prescribed for making the declaration of origin. I have reason to believe that invoices showing name and address of sender and consignee; number of packages; kind of packages; marks and numbers; weight-gross and net,-; transportation used (rail, mail, ship etc.); contents of packages, and bearing the following declaration:

"I herewith certify that the
above goods are of Canadian
origin"

will be acceptable to the German Customs authorities.
