OTTAWA NOTES.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—I am in a position to definitely announce to the people of Winnipeg, Manitoba and the Northwest that after much discussion the much-vexed question of the interior ship is definitely and finally settled. Hon. Clifford Sifton is the man, but when he is to be sworn in it is difficult to say at the present minute, as the opinion still prevails that no appointment will be made until the school question is settled, but it is believed the basis of settlement is agreed upon. Mr. Martin is reconciled to his fate and has finally come to the conclusion that it is better to his interests to keep out of politics.

It is understood that Mr. Laurier went into the whole situation with Mr. Martin, and spoke so kindly and reassuringly and frankly, that the latter's softer nature was touched, and he said he would no longer resist what seemed to be his leader's decision, and which seemed to be reached with such reluctance and deep regret.

The party leaders who have been made aware of Mr. Martin's final decision are loud in their praises of his conduct, and there are to-day few men who stand better with their party or who will have more real influence with the government than the Hon. Joseph Martin. He asks and wants nothing for himself, and with one of those good-humored, half disgusted laughs of his, he said: "I'm sick of politics, anyway, and perhaps I'll be just as well out of it."

Among those who know Martin there is no difference of opinion that in his retirement from public life the country sustains an infinitely greater loss than he does.

Ottawa, Oct. 5. Before the breaking up of the session I had an interview with Premier Laurier on Northwest affairs generally. He spoke with the greatest earnestness and solicitude in regard to the country, and said it would tax the powers of the government to bring order and progress out of the chaos of a long period of mismanagement which had characterized the administration there ever since the country was opened up. A gigantic series of blunders had been perpetrated in the Northwest. In the first place the railway had not been properly located, then when the bargain was made, no proper safeguards to protect the settlers from excessive rates had been provided, and as a consequence the settlers suffered grievously. The contract with whom the contract had been made had largely retired from active connection with the road, and the government had largely strangers to deal with, who did not recognize the moral obligations involved in the original contract. He greatly feared that in our present financial condition the country would not be able to take possession of the road, and the government would have to make the best of the difficulty and embarrassing situation.

Then again the tariff as framed, had borne heavily on the country. This however, was something the government might cure, of, at least greatly ameliorate.

Then, again, the public lands had been viciously administered, not in the interests of settlers, but largely in the interests of land grabbers. This could be regulated under decent methods, but the harm had been done, and it would be impossible ever to overtake it.

Looking at the whole situation it was deep conviction that the panacea for all the ills was population. The Government would lend its energies to try and fill up the country with population. He recognized that it was a Herculean task and the mismanagement of the past made it difficult to succeed, but the new government would grapple with it and it would not be because of any lack of earnestness and determination on their part. Of one thing the west might rest assured and that was that he was heart and soul with it, and he hoped if God spared him and it was His will to keep him in power for a few years, to show by his policy towards the west that he was deeply in earnest in his determination to assist the country.

I may add that in my intercourse with other members of the cabinet, I found that they were largely pervaded by the same friendly sentiment towards the west, and if the country does not succeed as it should, I believe it will not be because of any lack of effort on the part of the new Liberal Government.

Saved by a Striking Operator.

The coast papers report an interview with W. A. McIntosh, who arrived at Vancouver with a stock train on Wednesday night. He states that the train, on account of the fact that the stock would suffer if detained, had orders to push through to Vancouver the same as the passenger trains are doing. Some distance up the line, east of Ashcroft, the train was flagged. Investigation showed that it was stopped none too soon, for just around a curve and in a position that would have precluded the engineer's seeing it till he was right on top of it was a nasty slide, which would have wrecked the train if it had run into it. The providential escape is due to the fact that Stewart Hummel, one of the striking operators, was walking along the track to Ashcroft and noticing the slide he waited patiently in the vicinity till he heard a train coming and went on. There is no need to send out guards to protect the company's property from damage at the hands of men like him.

NOTIFICATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

THE following extract from the "Health Act, 1895," is published for general information by direction of the Provincial Board of Health:

"Sec. 68. Whenever any household knows that any person within his family or household has the small pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, cholera, or typhoid fever, he shall (subject in case of refusal or neglect to the penalties provided by sub-section (2) of section 98) within twenty-four hours give notice thereof to the Local Board of Health,* or to the Medical Health Officer of the District in which he resides, if there be one, and such notice shall be given either at the office of the Medical Health Officer or by a communication addressed to him and duly mailed within the time above specified, and in case there is no Medical Health Officer, then to the Local Board of Health."

Sub-section (2) of section 98 provides a penalty of \$100, or imprisonment for six months, for neglect to report as required.

*The Government Agent is the Local Board of Health in outlying Districts.

NEWS NOTES.

Gananoque had a \$15,000 fire on Sunday.

General Sanchez, an insurgent leader is reported killed.

The Quebec Mercury office was destroyed by fire on Sunday.

Rumor has it that parliament will re-assemble on February 11th.

It is reported that Francois Lange-lier, M.P., for Quebec Centre, has re-signed.

A storage battery street car was put in service Monday on the New York elevated railway.

Sir William Harcourt thinks the only way to reform the Turkish government is to obliterate it.

At 1 o'clock Tuesday morning Lyman Bros.' warehouse, Toronto, was damaged by fire to the extent of \$6,000.

Parliament was prorogued by Lord Aberdeen on Monday. Only forty members of the commons were present.

It is reported that the government have arrived at an agreement with the Imperial government regarding the fast Atlantic service.

The czar and czarina of Russia arrived at Cherbourg Monday and were received with imposing ceremonies by President Faure.

An ore house at the Mabel mine, Colorado, was robbed of sixty-five sacks of ore, worth about \$60,000.

Mdlle. Mercier, youngest daughter of the late count, was married on Monday to Dr. Cautau, of St. Hyacinthe.

Several missionaries are leaving Toronto for China.

From the Capital.

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—Politically the capital is quiet to-day the majority of the members having departed. The treasury board met this morning when it is understood, the re-organization of the civil service came up.

Sir Richard Cartwright leaves shortly for the Sulphur Springs to get treatment for rheumatism. The exact place is not decided upon but he will be away several weeks.

Tarte goes to Montreal this afternoon to look after his libel suit, which comes on Thursday. The time of his departure for the west will depend on the result. The majority of western members left for home to-day.

Lord and Lady Aberdeen will leave to-morrow or Thursday.

The October session of the supreme court sat this morning. Judge Taschereau being the only absentee the case of provincial jurisdiction over fisheries proceeded. Considerable interest will be taken in the judgment to be given a week from to-day.

Senate Proceedings.

Sir Oliver Mowat had great difficulty on Saturday in securing the promise of a quorum of senators to be on hand on Monday. There were only 18 in attendance Saturday and on asking them to give an assurance that they would remain in the city several said that they could not remain. Sir Oliver Mowat asked those who could remain to stand up and only 13 rose. Finally two more reluctantly rose. This did not seem to satisfy the leader of the house, who remarked that this was sailing too close to the wind as a quorum in the senate meant 15 senators including the speaker. He made a strong appeal to all the senators present not to leave the city. It was most important that there should be no doubt about the senate having a quorum on Monday. If there was not the supply bill could not be passed and most disastrous things would happen to the country.

Station Destroyed.

Stonewall, Oct. 3.—The C. P. R. station at this point was totally destroyed by fire this afternoon at 2:15 o'clock. The station had just been remodelled and fitted up by the company and was one of the most convenient station houses on the branch lines. Mr. C. T. Lewis, the C.P.R. agent, was down town at the time the fire was discovered, but returned by fast horse in time to save the company's books and office furniture, excepting the safe. The whole of the townspeople assisted as soon as they reached the scene, in saving what they could, but very little of the personal effects were saved. The agents loss is fully \$1,000.
