THE following extract from the "Health Act, 1855," is published for general influentation by direction of the Provincial Board of Realth:

"Sec. 65. Whenever say thouseholder knows that any person within his family or householders the small pox diphtheria, scarlet fever, cholers, or typhoid fever, he shall (subject in case) typhoid fever, he shall (subject in case refusal or neglect to the penalties provided by sub-section (2) of section 98) within twenty-four hours give notice thereof to the Local Board of Health,\* or to the Medical Health Officer of the District in which he resides, if there be one, and such notice shall be given either at the office of the Medical Health Officer or by a com-munication addressed to him and duly mailed within the time above specified, and in case there is no Medical Health Officer, then to the Local Board of

required.


