### Mining in the Rockies

#### EXTENSIVE COPPER DEPOSITS NEAR BANFF

Properties Held by Major Walker and Mr. P. McCarthy, Q. C.

Running across Mr. P. McCarthy, the well known Q. C., of Calgary, the other day, we asked him for some information about the mining prospects in which Major Walker and he are interested near Banff. "Oh yes, busy now, see me at three," said the genial lawyer, and at the hour appointed we hied to his spacious law offices over the Imperial Bank. In Mr. McCarthy's room we found strong circumstantial evidence of his interest in mineralogy in the shape of a large show case on the wall filled with specimens, principally galena and copper ores, and secured from the vandalism of specimen collectors by lock and key. Mr. McCarthy is considerably interested in claims at Illicilliwaet, but those to which we now refer are located about three miles north of Eldon station, the first station east of the summit, on the C. P. Railway, and about 25 miles west of Banff. The claims are located on what is known as Castle Mountain, and which is described on Sir Wm. Dawson's geological map of the country as carrying copper. The group held by Major Walker and Mr. McCarthy embraces seven locations. Six of these claims carry copper, and one is a copper ore carrying galena. The formation is limestone, but the ore runs in true fissure veins, of which four are proved to be such by the development work that has been done, but as to the other veins visible there is not sufficient work done to decide whether they are fissure veins or merely stringers. On the largest vein there is a tunnel driven a distance of sixty feet. The lead is quartz, eight feet in thickness, with copper glance and sulphides disseminated through it.

Mr. McCarthy then produced a number of assay certificates from which we noted the following: Burlington, Denver, Colo., 46.80 per cent of copper; Boston and Montana Company of Great Falls, 6.46, and 15 per cent respectively; and Stowell & Co., of Spokane, 20 2/10 per cent copper. The owners of the property have consulted with W. Pallow Harvey as to amount of copper in this ore to warrant the erection of works and that gentleman has advised that they should not go to any expense unless they have 15 per cent of copper, but as the average of the assays is something like 23 1/2 per cent the owners have every reason to be satisfied with their prospects. The ore also carries gold and silver.

On one of the locations is a galena-copper deposit over 50 feet in width. This has been traced 500 to 600 feet each way from discovery and although a drive has been cut through this ledge for a distance of 50 feet it has not yet reached the hanging wall. The ore is low grade running mainly in lead, of which, however, there is 72 per cent, almost the possible proportion to be found in pure galena. In addition, this ore carries 5 per cent copper. The copper is visible to the eye in the deepest part of the lead, as native copper. Nova Scotia and Montana miners of great experience, who have examined the claim, have expressed the opinion that the probability is that with depth the lead will give place to copper, just as the Butte mines were found to have given low values for the first 500 feet when they suddenly "went from poverty to wealth."

So conveniently is the property situated that a man can now ride on horse back right on to the claims, and a wagon road could be made between the railway station and the mines for \$500.

With the percentage of copper obtained from the assays and the fact that the locations are so well situated for transportation, what now remains to be proved by development work is that there is a sufficiently large body of ore in sight and that it maintains its value. It is of course a well known fact in mineralogy that copper ores invariably improve with depth, the reason being that such ores are especially susceptible to leaching out by atmospheric and hydraulic influences, and as these influences are overcome, there is every reason to believe that the ore will improve with depth. The distance from the railway station is only two miles over the level and then there is a gradual ascent to the ore body covering the remaining mile that separates the deposits from transportation, so that the property is located in an ideal place so far as transportation is concerned.

This is not the only copper in that locality, because near Silver City, on the south side of the river, is what is called Copper Mountain, where there is a large copper property which was formerly owned by the Alberta Smelting Co., but was recently bought by a Mr. Gilles, from Ontario, who intends to work it extensively next season. In addition to this, Mr. McCarthy and Major Walker have another location 15 miles north of the C. P. R. and almost due north of Eldon Station.

This discovery lies north-east of the other. The ore from this location assayed 28 per cent of copper and 87 in gold. There are on the dump 600 lbs of ore. In this case the ore matter is not mixed with the quartz of the vein but is a clean paystreak running from a foot to two feet in width. Twenty miles back of this there is another locality where eleven locations have been made also on copper ore. Mr. McCarthy knew of this locality four to five years ago, but did not record the ground as he thought it too far back from the railway. Yet again there is another group of locations at a point between the group previously referred to and the railway line, from which it is distant some 25 miles. This gives a block of country 25 miles by 40 miles over which copper has been found, and the prospecting work so far done goes to show that there is an immense deposit of copper ore in this section of the Rocky Mountains.

We wish Major Walker and Mr. McCarthy all success in the development of their property and they have done excellent work in opening up a country concerning which little has hitherto been known, and in which comparatively little prospecting has yet been done. These discoveries and facts are worthy of the notice of prospectors and must attract more attention to the country sooner or later.

#### GENERAL MEETING

Of the North East Kootenay Miners' Association.

A general meeting of the above association was held at the Columbia House on Wednesday night. Present: Hon. F. W. Aylmer, president; Messrs. Neilson, vice-president; Warren, M. Dainard, McNaught, McNeish, Lowe, Joliffe, Langlands, Bates, Mercier, H. G. Parson, Hatch and Haggen, sec. The President occupied the chair.

#### THE MONGOLIAN QUESTION.

The committee's report on constitution and bylaws was adopted after some lively discussion on the clause: "It shall be one of the objects of this association to prevent the employment of Mongolian labor in the mines of British Columbia, and no person can be a member of this association who will employ such labor in the mines." Mr. McNaught strongly opposed the clause. The Chinese, said he, were British subjects. He would rather see Americans excluded. They should put Americans and Chinese on the same basis.

Mr. Haggen supported the clause. He pointed to the troubles that had arisen in the Australian Colonies over Chinese labor, and they ought to prohibit it while this country was yet in the early stages of its development. Mr. McNeish considered they should stop Chinese mining. In New Denver they had fired them right out and boycotted a man who employed Chinese. It was ridiculous to compare Chinese with Americans, who had done so much to develop the mineral resources of the country.

Mr. Dainard supported the clause. Chinamen never went out prospecting, whereas Americans had been the pioneers of the country and had brought in capital to develop their mineral resources.

Mr. Lowe condemned Mr. McNaught's action in comparing Chinese with Americans. Such an idea was ridiculous.

The President said a white man could no more compete with Chinese than with a coyote, and he was in favor of keeping out Mongolian labor in every sense of the word. The only thing he was in doubt about was whether it was wise to include this clause in their constitution.

On the question being put the clause was adopted without division on the motion of Mr. Dainard, seconded by Mr. Mercier.

#### VACANCY.

As a vacancy remained on the committee, nominations to fill it were received. T. Mercier was elected.

#### EXTENSION ON ACCOUNT OF SNOW.

On the motion of Mr. Haggen, seconded by Mr. Lowe, it was resolved to ask the Minister of Mines to have the Order-in-Council re-enacted granting three months extension for assessment on claims which were inaccessible on account of snow.

#### CLUB ROOMS.

On the motion of Mr. Joliffe, seconded by Mr. Langlands, it was resolved that the committee take steps to secure a reading room for the association and report.

#### REPORT ON DISTRICT.

On the motion of Mr. Haggen, seconded by Mr. Neilson, it was resolved to send a request to the Minister of Mines that Mr. Carlyle, Provincial Mineralogist, should examine and publish a report on the mines of the district.

#### RE-LOCATION.

An interesting discussion took place regarding this subject. Mr. Lowe said the cry against re-location was all talk—nothing in it. It was a harmless amusement. Mr. Dainard considered something should be done in the matter. He suggested that when the holder of a claim did not do his assessment,

another man who wanted to re-locate it should go to the Mining Recorder and get a permit to re-locate on taking an oath that the original owner should have no interest in the claim. An abandoned claim should be open in that manner for 60 days, an exception only being made in the case of illness of the holder. After the 60 days it should be open to the original owner or any one else to re-locate the claim.

The chairman said such claims were no good anyway, and the Government got considerable revenue from the practice. He opposed the proposed amendment of the law to stop the practice.

Mr. Neilson said they should encourage the prospector instead of crippling him. He moved "That whereas it is understood an official statement has been made that the Mineral Act is likely to be amended by requiring prospectors to do development work before recording their claims, this association begs to point out that legislation in this direction will be injurious and a detriment to the interest of the prospectors and the country, more especially in Northeast Kootenay, and will have a strong tendency to check prospecting and therefore hinder the mining development of the country; and that Col. Baker, as member for the district, be requested to oppose such an amendment."

Mr. McNeish seconded—carried.

#### GENERAL.

During the meeting letters were read from the Minister of Mines, promising to send the Association any publications of interest; and from Mr. Griffith, Government agent, stating he would act on the recommendation of the association in regard to the construction of roads in the district.

Owing to the lateness of the hour some business had to be held over till next meeting to be held on January 4. The meeting adjourned with votes of thanks to Mr. McNeish for the use of rooms and to the chairman.

It is not necessary to go to Klondike to find frozen ground for mining. Major Walker informs us that the tunnel which Mr. McCarthy and he put in on their claims on Castle Mountain had to be driven through frozen ground.

We understand that negotiations between the Golden Lumber Co. and the Columbia River Co. for the purchase of the former company's business by the latter company, have now progressed so far that the completion of the deal only awaits the arrival of papers from England.

## THE PROVINCIAL SURVEY OFFICE.

For some time there has been a lot  
of friction between the Surveyor General  
and the Provincial Surveyors. At the  
meeting of the Surveyors Association  
at Nelson, with a view to overcoming  
this difficulty the association passed  
the following resolution: "That  
a committee of five be ap-  
pointed for the purpose of  
drawing a series of questions for in-  
formation towards compiling a  
manual of instructions for surveying  
mineral claims, and that copies of  
such be issued to each Provincial  
Land Surveyor for their answers and  
suggestions; that said committee draft  
a manual based on such information  
and act in conjunction with the Chief  
Commissioner of Lands and Works,  
and if necessary obtain an order in  
council for the issue of such  
manual. Committee: Messrs. Gam-  
ble, Goring, Burnet, Drewry, and Far-  
well." Another inconvenience which  
surveyors suffer from is the practice  
of keeping all field notes in the head  
office in Victoria. With respect to  
this grievance, the association passed  
the following resolution: "That the  
duplicate copies of all field notes be  
deposited and preserved in the recorder's  
office in the district in which the  
surveys have been made, and that the  
plans filed in the Gold Commissioner's  
office should bear full and complete  
information."

There is a pretty strong feeling  
amongst the employees on this section  
of the C. P. R. at the way in which  
Drivers Murphy and Jamieson, and  
Conductor Johnson, of Field, have been  
treated. The men who ought to know  
say these officers were amongst the  
best and most careful of the staff and  
the accidents that occurred were  
through no fault of theirs. We hope  
the officers of the company who are  
responsible for these employees being  
discharged will see to their re-instate-  
ment as the fact appears to be that  
they are made to suffer for mistakes  
that more properly attach to higher  
officials.

## A MINISTERIAL FAILURE

The Toronto Globe in an editorial  
headed "A Ministerial failure," says:  
"The British Columbia Province  
has suffered from a most  
unfortunate Provincial Re-  
gime. It is to be hoped the electors  
will see the advantage of making a  
change when the opportunity arrives.  
The Ministry seems to have been  
afflicted with a violent desire to give  
away on every pretext mineral and  
forest wealth, which should serve  
the purpose of public revenue for  
generations to come."

The Cassiar Central railway grants  
are but an illustration perhaps of the  
most striking ministerial disregard for  
public interests. By it Herschel  
Cohen, from England, will be in a  
position to levy a royalty on the out-  
put of a large section of mineral land.  
But there are charges more serious in  
one sense than incompetency against  
the ministry. Hon. Mr. Turner,  
premier, and Hon. Mr. Pooley, pres-  
ident of the council, figure as leading  
men in a company that has issued a  
prospectus seeking to sell shares in  
London. In the prospectus it was  
set forth that there will be advantages  
for stock holders in the "unique con-  
nection" between the company and the  
Provincial ministry.

This opinion of the Globe will be re-  
echoed through British Columbia  
except amongst the bootlers.

An evidence of the way in which  
the province has been robbed by the  
Turner Government and the public  
estate thrown away is afforded in the  
fact that in the deal between the  
Gooderhams and Heinze, the railroader  
and smelter man, it was proposed that  
Heinze should receive \$2,000,000  
solely for the franchises which the  
Province, through the Turner Govern-  
ment, had made him a present of.  
No more scandalous instance is  
needed to show how unfitted are the  
present Government to be longer  
entrusted with the reins of power.

In Ottawa a fierce battle has been  
raging for weeks back against the C.  
P. R. Sir Louis Davies has been  
moved to say on the subject: "It is  
unjust and unfair to charge this Gov-  
ernment with being under the  
thumb of the great corporation. If  
it were generally known that on many  
an occasion Sir William Van Horne  
quitted our council with the determi-  
nation to have nothing more to do with  
this administration, perhaps, the  
opinion of the Government in this  
matter would be somewhat different."

2. Is old pack trail used by Cana-

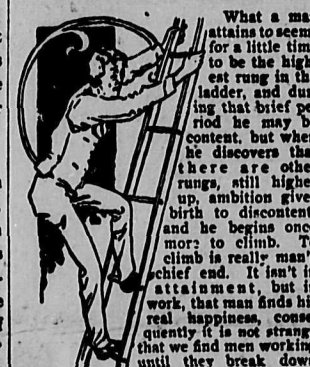

Whether the route to Klondyke be via St. Michael and the Yukon or via Dyea or Skagway and the Chilkoot or White Pass, or via the Stikine River route, which is the most likely, or via Edmonton, Ashcroft and the different routes, the Canadian Pacific Railway will be the best if not the only route to travel by.

From information in its possession a too early start does not necessarily mean first arrival at the Klondyke. Ample time will be allowed for all necessary arrangements.

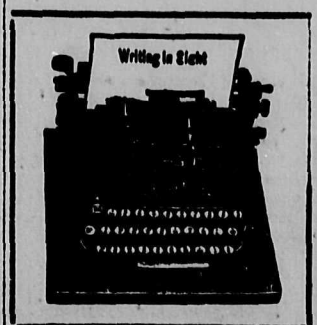
