### SETTLEMENT IS REACHED.

The Ottawa and Manitoba Governments Have Come to an Agreement.

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—The cabinet met to-day at 10 o'clock with the Manitoba delegates to take up the Manitoba school question. While the whole matter was as good as settled at yesterday's meeting of the cabinet, there were some details left to be taken up to-day. They were gone into fully and not only has a basis of settlement been reached, but the whole details have been as good as definitely fixed, although the terms of settlement will not be given out until after they are laid before Premier Greenway and a full meeting of his cabinet. There is much rejoicing in political quarters here at the early removal of this vexed question from the political arena.

Some of the details of the settlement have leaked out through various channels despite the efforts of cabinet ministers to observe the strictest secrecy. The proposed settlement is along the lines of the original draft prepared shortly after the formation of the government. The principle of national schools remains intact, the local government retaining absolute control of them. Uniform inspection is also provided for, so that the general efficiency of the schools will be assured. To provide for the education of all children there is a bi-lingual provision so that children who cannot speak English can be taught by the use of the French language to do so.

The clause of the settlement which has given rise to the greatest trouble and discussion and which kept both sides apart the longest is that relating to religious exercises in the schools. The settlement provides half an hour each day shall be taken for religious exercises, the schools closing at 3:30 p.m. instead of four. All children who do not desire to remain for religious exercises may leave after 3:30. Then the teachers shall give certain religious instruction to all those pupils who choose to remain. As the Roman Catholics have always taken the ground that no teacher who is not a Roman Catholic is competent to impart the religious instructions of the church, it is provided, that in all schools where thirty or more Roman Catholic children, a Roman Catholic teacher shall be employed whose duty it shall be to impart religious instruction. It will be recalled that the Manitoba government offered Sir Donald Smith and his co-commissioners, half an hour for religious exercises the same to be given in the schools by priests or brothers of the church who might go to the schools for that purpose. This was objected to by Roman Catholics on the ground that it would be a dead letter, as the church would not provide priests for the work, and that is why provision has been made for Catholic teachers. It should, however, be borne in mind that all such teachers must be properly certificated and possess equal qualification

to all other teachers. In addition to this the efficiency of the schools is assured by the inspection being uniform.

It is understood that the settlement will be made by each government adopting an order-in-council ratifying the agreement and when the Manitoba legislature meets it will pass a brief act covering the necessary ground. It is not expected that any federal legislation will be necessary to give effect to the settlement.

Ottawa, Oct. 14.—Dr. Duncan, quarantine officer at Victoria, B.C., has been dismissed. The order-in-council appointing him by the late Government, which in fact has not properly gone into force, has been cancelled. Duncan allowed a suspect who had been suffering from small-pox and the man who was in charge to come out of quarantine and vote for Earle and Prior in Victoria at the last general elections. The offence was so grave that dismissal was necessary in the interest of public safety.

### Partizan Postmasters.

Toronto, Oct. 16.—A Telegram's special dispatch from Ottawa, says: "The fiat has gone forth. Every citizen has the right of the free use of the post offices, and of all the departments the post office must be kept exceptionally free from all taint of political partizanship. This, it is learned will be lived up to and within a few days the dismissal of twenty Quebec postmasters, for having displayed offensive partizanship, will be announced. In no case, it is stated, has action been taken, except upon clear proof. One postmaster was chairman of a committee; another allowed matter passing through the mails to be opened, and Conservative campaign sheets to be inserted when it was made up again and forwarded. One postmaster refused shelter to a Liberal candidate during an awful storm, and told him, 'You can sleep with the pigs,' whilst another noticing a letter from a Liberal candidate to the Liberal committee men, retained it five days, finally delivering it on the day of the election, forgetting that the dating stamp would give him away. These are some of the cases. The Quebec post-office inspector's case is still sub-judice. Sweetman's official report has not been handed in, and upon it depends whether the reprimand given by him will be deemed sufficient to meet the exigencies of the case or not. There have been frequent complaints about the post office at Rimouski, and several investigations have been held. The last arose out of a theft of some \$200 of government moneys from the office during the absence on leave of the postmaster. What is to be done in this matter is under consideration.

### Pure Beer.

London, Oct. 27.—The royal commission appointed by the government to consider the question of pure beer and to inquire into and report upon the questions whether legislation is required to prevent the use of deleterious substances in the manufacture of beer, and whether the materials of which beer may be composed may be defined by law without due interference with the liberty of brewers to use any wholesome materials, held its first session to-day. The Earl of Pembroke is chairman, and the members include Dr. James Bell, formerly principal of the English Revenue Laboratory, Sir J. H. Gilbert, the famous agricultural chemist at Oxford university, and Mr. H. W. Primrose, chairman of the board of customs.

### Drowning Accident at Revelstoke.

Revelstoke, Oct. 17. Two men named J. McArthur and Dyell, were drowned in the Columbia River, north of Revelstoke, to-day. They were towing a boat loaded with supplies for Big Bend, up the rapids, when the

boat became unmanageable, pulling both into the river with the above result. J. McArthur is from New Westminster, and Dyell is from Fort Saskatchewan, the former being married. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

### Snow in Toronto.

Toronto, Oct. 17.—Toronto is having the first snow of the season to-night. There is quite a heavy shower falling.

### An Insult to the Queen.

London, Oct. 17.—A special dispatch from Bombay announces that a bucket of tar was poured over the statue of Queen Victoria there during the night and that a pair of old sandals was tied around the neck of the statue.

### Bank of British Columbia.

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 17.—J. Simon acting manager of the local branch of the Bank of British Columbia, received cable instructions from London to withdraw branches of the bank in this city and Seattle and immediately wind up business on Puget Sound.

### NOTIFICATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

THE following extract from the "Health Act, 1890," is published for general information by direction of the Provincial Board of Health:

"Sec. 69. Whenever any householder knows that any person within his family or household has the small-pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, cholera, or typhoid fever, he shall (subject in case of refusal or neglect to the penalties provided by sub-section (2) of section 98) within twenty-four hours give notice thereof to the Local Board of Health,\* or to the Medical Health Officer of the District in which he resides, if there be one, and such notice shall be given either at the office of the Medical Health Officer or by a communication addressed to him and duly mailed within the time above specified, and in case there is no Medical Health Officer, then to the Local Board of Health."

Sub-section (2) of section 98 provides a penalty of \$100, or imprisonment for six months, for neglect to report as required.

\*The Government Agent is the Local Board of Health in outlying Districts.

### NEWS NOTES.

The Ottawa cabinet held a council on Monday.

The C.P.R. are sending east over 300 cars of wheat daily.

Over a hundred Armenian refugees have arrived at New York.

George Ross was elected president of the Toronto Young Liberals.

Hon. Clifford Sifton is spoken of as a probable candidate in Saskatchewan.

A large meeting was held in London to protest against Armenian massacres.

Mrs. Joseph Buchanan, aged 85, was killed by a freight train at Bagot Monday.

Counterfeit Canadian half dollars made in China are in circulation in British Columbia.

Henry E. Abbey, theatrical manager, who died suddenly on Saturday, will be buried to-day.

The Spaniards captured a filibustering steamer with large stores of arms and ammunition.

The King of Italy has presented President Cleveland with a valuable set of historical works.

The official announcement of the settlement of the school question has not been made public.

The crew of the Canadian cutter Osprey were fired on by poachers while enforcing the fishery regulations.

Oincinnati, Ohio, October 19.—A sensational murder and suicide occurred last week at the house of Nellie Bentz, on George Street. The circumstances indicate that the two victims agreed to tragically end their troubles and their lives together. The suicides were: D. Harry Sollars, of Cripple Creek, Colorado, and Cleo Russell an inmate of the house, only 19 years old. No one saw the shooting. Inmates of the house were attracted to the room by two reports of a revolver fired in quick succession. Bursting the door of the room they found the girl, Cleo Russell, half dressed on the bed, blood spurting from a wound in the left breast. Sollars lay dead on the floor clenching a 68 calibre revolver, a bullet wound in his left breast. On the table lay a cheque as follows: "Denver, Colo., October 14, 1896. First National Bank. Pay to order \$400. This is for our funeral expenses. D. Harry Sollars."

A nephew of Walters working with him, noticed that he was not used to hard work, and having heard of the Oak Lake robbery, became suspicious of him, questioning him closely, Condie said very little, nothing at all, in fact, as to where he had been lately; but he seemed to know more than the ordinary farmer about the late C.P.R. strike. As his description answered the circular, Adamson, Walter's nephew informed the agent at Gladstone of the fact. Constable Bunn was sent out immediately, who arrested Condie. All the money was found on him and he has confessed that he is Condie.

### People are Awakened.

Vancouver, Oct. 18.—The city council of Vancouver and board of trade are conjointly taking action to protect the interests of the coast and the general public of British Columbia in connection with the proposals now being made in regard to the construction of a direct line of railroad between the coast and Rossland and Nelson, having connections also with East Kootenay's gold and silver country, through the Crow's Nest Pass. The public authorities concerned will urge on the Dominion and the provincial governments the need of withholding grants of railway rights from mere charter mongering syndicates, and the need of at the same time securing equitable freight and passenger rates, as conditions precedent to subsidy grants. The city councils of Victoria and New Westminster are working on similar lines and the province may in fact be said to be a unit on the issue.
