A MODERN ROMANCE.

London, Sept. 8.—Capt. Hunter, of the British steamship Nonpareil, which arrived at New Port, Monmouthshire, from Cayenne, French Guiana, reports that Capt. Albert Dreyfus, formerly of the French army, and attached to the ministry of war, and who was sentenced to be publicly degraded and confined for life in a fortress after having been convicted by court martial of selling plans of French fortifications, mobilization schemes, etc., to foreign governments, escaped from the Isle du Grand Salut, where he was taken after leaving Isle de Ra, off the French coast.

In an interview, Capt. Hunter is quoted as saying that Dreyfus escaped on board an American schooner, and with the help of his wife, formerly a Mlle. Hadnamard, and the daughter of wealthy parents. Mde. Dreyfus, at the urgent request of the prisoner, received permission from the French government to join her husband at his place of imprisonment, and in due course of time arrived at Cayenne, well supplied with funds. Captain Dreyfus was arrested in October, 1894, was tried by court martial and was sentenced to be publicly degraded and confined in a fortress for life. His formal degradation took place on Jan. 5, 1895, on the parade grounds of the military school and in the presence of 5,000 troops. His sword was broken, his buttons and insignia of rank were cut off and he was compelled to go through what is known as the "execution parade," being marched with drums beating along the four sides of the square composed of the soldiers detailed to witness his punishment. He was accused as a traitor but always maintained his innocence and claimed that it would eventually be proven, a belief that was shared by a number of people at the time, it being claimed that he had been made the victim of a foul conspiracy. Mde. Dreyfus was also a firm believer in the innocence of her husband, and when she reached Cayenne, the French authorities offered her the use of a steam launch to take her to the Grand Salut islands, where her husband's prison was situated; but, she declined, saying that she wished to become accustomed to the climate before going to the island. Thereupon the steam launch left Cayenne. According to Capt. Hunter Mde. Dreyfus must have lost no time in perfecting plans for her husband's escape, or else she must have had assistance from persons who had reached Cayenne before her; for the same night, he says an American schooner, with Mde. Dreyfus on board appeared off Grand Salut island, sent a boat ashore and brought off not only the prisoner, but several of the men who had been detailed to guard him, apparently proving conclusively that everything was arranged for the escape of Capt. Dreyfus before his wife reached Cayenne. Continuing Capt. Hunter said the schooner then left the coast, heading in a northerly direction, and it is believed that Captain Dreyfus and his faithful wife eventually reached the United States.

The Mining Boom.

Toronto, Sept. 8.—A special from Rossland, B.C., to the World this morning says: It is understood that English capitalists have opened negotiations for the purchase of the famous Josie mine for \$50,000. This would bring the stock over one dollar, and it is already higher in anticipation of completion of the deal. These capitalists are after other mines as well. Messrs. Jones, Warren and Burke, who are controlling the West Lario and Josie, will sell. General Warren said the price was higher than reported and that the deal would be completed on Monday. George Gooderham, the Toronto millionaire, who has over half a million invested in the mines round Rossland, declared in an interview, that the country had an immense future. Enough ore was now actually in sight to keep up the boom for years, and all that is wanted is improved transportation facilities.

Prospector or Miner.

A mining engineer, who claims to have studied the difference between a prospector and a miner, defines them as follows, says the Scientific Press: "A prospector watches every piece of float and studies its source, knowing that it never came up hill, and he sees things that no one else would notice to tell which way the straws are pointed. The minuteness of his detection is marvellous. On the other hand, the miner sees nothing on the surface, or the formation of the country, and could not even select a nice rich cropping if he were to stumble upon it, but when he gets inside of a tunnel he can take out the best ore in the shortest time. His instinct serves him well, but he sees nothing until he gets underground. A good prospector is seldom a good miner and vice versa. The two are opposite and distinct in their lines of action."

The Grand Army.

St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 3.—Nearly 40,000 Grand Army veterans, tramped the streets of St. Paul for several hours yesterday, renewing the associations of their youth and feeling in their veins the martial spirit that animated them in the old days. The day was an ideal one for marching, the warm rays of the sun being behind the clouds nearly all day, and a slight breeze making the tramp much easier for those in line. It was 11:30 when the head of the parade reached the grand reviewing stand at Smith Park, and 2.25 in the afternoon when the last post in the big eight division, containing Minnesota's veterans, had passed, and there was scarcely a noticeable break in the line, post following post, and department coming after department in almost endless succession. The enlivening music and the stirring martial sound of the veteran drum corps signalled the approach of each new department, and the crowds shouted prompt appreciation on the appearance of various favorites.

NOTIFICATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

THE following extract from the "Health Act, 1893," is published for general information by direction of the Provincial Board of Health:

"Sec. 69. Whenever any household knows that any person within his family or household has the small pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, cholera, or typhoid fever, he shall (subject in case of refusal or neglect to the penalties provided by sub-section (2) of section 98) within twenty-four hours give notice thereof to the Local Board of Health,* or to the Medical Health Officer of the District in which he resides, if there be one, and such notice shall be given either at the office of the Medical Health Officer or by a communication addressed to him and duly mailed within the time above specified, and in case there is no Medical Health Officer, then to the Local Board of Health."

Sub-section (2) of section 98 provides penalty of \$100, or imprisonment for one month, for neglect to report as required.

The Government Agent is the Local Board of Health in outlying Districts.

Mr. R. L. Richardson has given notice of a question to the government asking whether it is their intention to establish a two-cent postage rate for letters throughout the Dominion.

Putney, Eng., September 8.—Jake Gaudaur of Toronto, the champion champion of America, after a most disappointing race yesterday over a four mile championship course from Putney to Mortlake, defeated Stansbury of Australia, who recently beat "Wag" Harding for the championship of the world. The race was for the world's championship, \$2,500 and the Sportsman cup. The weather was as dismal as could be. There was a foul, a protest of which was disregarded, and Gaudaur won by 20 lengths in 23 minutes and one second.
