I have to acknowledge your letter of the 10th, and while I know you are likely to be very busy for the next couple of months, I would appreciate hearing from you, if you have the time, as to what particulars you differ from me on regarding the article I wrote on Sockeye propagation.

I have obtained from Colonel Cunningham the promise of some Sockeye and Humpback eggs for Namu, the latter of which will be secured from the Fraser River fish, and if there is anything in the view I take of the hatching proposition which would effect the planting of these eggs, I would like to get your views before proceeding with the work.

I hope to take a run up to Harrison while you are stripping fish, and, if possible, will try and arrange for Mr. Bauer to accompany me.

I thank you for the sketch you made supplementing the information you gave him in your last letter, and I will communicate this to Mr. Bauer as soon as he returns to town from his ranch up country, where he is at present.
