

The Bankruptcy Act 1862

Thomas Jett Stahlachmidt of the City of Victoria British Columbia Merchant one of the firm of Jove Stahlachmidt and Company maketh oath and saith -

That James Robinson of the City of New Westminster British Columbia Steamboat Owner is justly and truly indebted to this Deponent and his partners James Jove ^{merchants} trading as Jove Stahlachmidt & Co in Victoria aforesaid in the sum of \$2850⁰⁰ for principal and interest due to them ^{as Indorsees} of a certain promissory note made by Nelson & Chalton and James Robinson in favor of Wmiah Nelson dated June 24 1873 payable thirteen months after date with interest at one percent per month -

That the said James Robinson as this deponent verily believes is a trader within the meaning of the Law of Bankruptcy and resides at New Westminster aforesaid and that an account in writing of the particulars of demand of the said James Jove and Thomas Jett Stahlachmidt amounting to the said sum of \$2850⁰⁰ with a notice thereunder written in the form prescribed by the Bankrupt Law Consolidation Act 1849 requiring immediate

payment of the said debt is produced
and shown to this Department at
