School was to have opened last Monday, but the newly-engaged teacher—Mr. Stephenson, of Victoria, who forwarded excellent testimonials—has not yet turned up. He may be in quarantine at Vancouver.

Mr. Chas. F. Blackburn is up from the Lardeau mines after supplies and also to have some new claims recorded. He will begin sluicing on the Lardeau placers at an early date. Good prospects have been obtained and ground secured. He returns to the Lardeau on Monday.

Mr. S. Mason, of New Orleans and San Francisco, has been in town for some days past. He is looking for good mining investments, and yesterday drew up an agreement with Pete Walker, Charley Holden and Tom Downs, owners of the "Silver Cup," to bond the mine in \$10,000, ten per cent. down and the balance in six months. Mr. Mason will go down to the Lardeau and look at the mine on Monday.

Pete Walker, Charley Holden and Tom Downs arrived up from the Lardeau on Wednesday, having done all the assessment work on their claims there. They brought six samples of rock from the "Silver Cup" which were assayed by Mr. Reeser on Thursday, the richest of the pieces sampling 1,314 oz. silver to the ton, the average for the whole six being 626 oz. This ore was only assayed for silver, but it also carries gold, iron and copper.

NAKUSP ITEMS.

Trip to the Hot Springs.

Drowning of Mr. J. Barclay.

[FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]

NAKUSP, August 17th.

An adventurous party left here on Saturday last for an excursion to the famous hot springs, which are situate on the lake shore about 22 miles north of Nakusp and 40 from Revelstoke. The tourists were Messrs. McDougall, Holman, Cowan, Case, Thorburn, McRostie, Abriel, Tracey and Anderson, and Masters Thomas and McDougall. They left Nakusp in an open boat about 1 p.m., and with eight men pulling they expected to reach the springs that evening. Rough weather prevented this being accomplished, and the party had to camp that night about six miles from their destination. A jolly night was spent, however, in spite of wind and rain, and with story and song the time quickly sped. They were up at dawn, and reached the springs at an early hour next morning. Here all tested the heat of the water, which was found to vary from 100 to 110 degrees, just hot enough at the first dip to make one imagine himself badly scalded. The water is strongly impregnated with iron, and is stated by many people to have more beneficial medicinal properties than even that of the famous Banff springs in the Canadian National Park. There is certainly some room for such belief when it is noticed how many of those who arrive at the springs weak and debilitated return well and strong after a stay of a week or two. The Nakuspians returned home on Monday morning both mentally and physically recuperated.

Mr. Rooser, assayer, Revelstoke, arrived here last Friday, and left for home next day. He has made the round of all the principal mining camps in the Kaslo and Slooan districts. He says the ore being taken out there is of a very fine quality, but the output will not be very great this season.

Mr. Mahon arrived here from New

Denver last night on his way back to Vancouver. He has secured interests in many of the most valuable claims in the Slooan, and is very much pleased with his investments.

I am grieved to have to chronicle the first death at Nakusp. Last Sunday afternoon Mr. James Barclay went out on the lake in a Peterboro canoe, and nothing has been seen of him since. The canoe was found bottom up about two miles from the shore the same evening, and no doubt is entertained by his friends that the unfortunate man has been drowned, although he was an excellent swimmer. It came on to blow heavily a short time after he left, and it is supposed the light canoe was capsize by the force of the wind. A thorough search has been made, every nook and cranny along both shores of the lake having been visited, but up to the present no trace of the body has been found. Messrs. Bourne, Rathwell, Cowan, and others have been untiring in their efforts.

Mr. Barclay, who was very popular in Nakusp, was a carpenter and builder, and was one of the pioneers of the town. He had the contract for erecting the Nakusp House, and boarded at that hotel. He was well known in the Northwest, where he served in the N.W. Mounted Police, and afterwards became horse-breaker to the Cochrane and Oxley ranches, and had a large number of friends and acquaintances in Fort McLeod and Calgary. He originally came from Richmond, Ontario, where his relatives still reside. "Jim" was a prominent figure in the history of Nakusp, and his cheery laugh and ready wit will be missed for a long time to come.

The first large sale of property in town took place this week, when Mr. W. Cowan, of the Victoria Hotel, Revelstoke, sold out his interest in the Nakusp House to his partner, Mr. Hugh Madden. The price was \$1,500, which is a criterion of how quickly the value of property here is increasing. The Nakusp House, under the able management of Mr. Madden, has done a capital business since opening, which will no doubt continue to increase.

There is one thing which seems to be troubling the captain of the str. Columbia, and that is finding a landing place for freight. He seems to delight in putting it ashore in the most out-of-the-way places imaginable and as far away from the stores and hotels as possible, his latest effort being almost on the outer edge of the townsite. What his reasons are for such cantankerousness no one seems to have any idea, but a rumor is flying around that his lots lie in that direction.

J. P. Sutherland and Robt. Green spent two interesting days this week hunting cattle on the other side of the Illecillewaet. The band of ten belonging to Hull Bros., which escaped into the mountains two weeks ago, were discovered feeding in high grass at the foot of Mount McKenzie, and are exceedingly sleek in appearance. Mr. Sutherland has great hopes of getting them back, but the leader of the herd is a wild steer, and will probably have to be shot in order to get anything like control over the others.

ILLECILLEWAET NEWS.

[FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]

ILLECILLEWAET, August 17th. Things around here continue to jog along pretty much as usual. All are anxiously awaiting the return of Mr. Mackintosh, who is expected to put renewed life into the camp and make things hum generally.

At Fish Creek things are progressing very satisfactorily indeed. The "Elizabeth" is improving in richness as depth is attained. An assay of carbonates made by Mr. W. Pellew Harvey, of Golden, gave over 700 oz. silver per ton. This is the highest assay yet obtained in that locality. There is a considerable amount of the same kind in sight. A great quantity was thrown over the dump, as it was thought to be of no value, but now the modus operandi is changed.

There have been 23 claims and 4 transfers recorded during the past week.

A subscription list has been circulated among business men and others soliciting subscriptions to put the Fish Creek trail in better repair. This shows the proper spirit, but at the same time it is a bad precedent. There is no reason to doubt that the Government Agent would have attended to this had he been asked by the proper parties and the matter thoroughly explained to him. When met by a refusal would have been time enough to take this action.

Mr. Kellie, M.P.P. has been called to Victoria. He expects to return in about a week.

Mr. Kirkup visited us to-day, accompanied by his ever-welcome satchel, and paid off the trail men.

The weather continues cool and showery.

Residents on what should be the main street (and is on the townsite plan) have felt somewhat aggrieved that nothing has been done to render that street passable for vehicles, while Government money has been and is now being spent on levelling Main (or Front) Street and on the making of a new street as an outlet at the eastern end of it. On making inquiries we find the matter is just this: The Provincial Government Agent was allowed \$1,600 for street improvements at the station. He made application for an appropriation for levelling Main Street, which is the only street having vehicular traffic. An extra \$400 was granted for this purpose, but as the station improvements will amount to more than \$1,600 some of this \$400 will have to be applied there. Therefore the residents on the street mentioned have not the least claim to any portion of the money now being spent on Main Street. The Provincial Government do not care to spend any money in Revelstoke, as they have not, and never had, any interests here. We have often wondered why they spent so much money on the streets in Nelson. Now we know. They have "interests" there. If the said residents on the said neglected street want to have it graded they must turn in and do the job themselves or else apply to the owners of the townsite for help. The Dominion Government or Farwell—which?

That Illecillewaet Letter.

SIR,—Will you allow me to correct the statement in my former letter that the men employed on the Fish Creek trail paid for packing in their supplies? They had to pay a "portion," and some of them felt very sore about it, as the Government did ALL the packing last year. I had not the least desire to injure Mr. Kirkup, who, as everybody here knows, looks well after Government interests and lays out Government money to the best advantage, but when I wrote that letter the trail from the bridge to Flat Creek was in a very bad state. In fact, there was no trail but the railway track, which everybody will admit was highly dangerous for a pack train to use. The Monday after my letter appeared in the STAR men were put to work there making a trail!—which was rather singular in the face of "your information from Illecillewaet" that there was "no necessity for a trail to Flat Creek." My letter might have been less severe, but it fulfilled its purpose.

Would you kindly inform me (1) how many miles of the trail from the N. E. Arm to Fish Creek has been constructed this year, (2) the number of men employed, and (3) the amount of money spent so far?—Yours truly, WATCHMAN.

LARDEAU MINERAL.

Another Big Galena-Silver Lode.

[BY AN AMERICAN MINING ENGINEER.]

The latest discovery on the Lardeau is a big "contact" galena-silver lode found by Mr. C. F. Blackburn near the head of the North Fork. This great lode is known as the "Sunshine," and shows a solid outcrop of heavy mineral continuous for a distance of nearly two miles. There is no better defined vein in the world. One wall is a fine-grained green colored chloritic slate and the other a metamorphic limestone or marble. The ore between the walls is from 12 inches to 12 feet in width, and is continuous right along for several thousand feet, consisting largely of galena very rich in gold and silver. The lode stands nearly vertical and strikes north-west and south-east.

The property is finely situated for tunnel development, being near the summit of the range between the Lardeau and Duncan Rivers. Good water power from the glaciers is always available. Wild strawberries cover the mountain through which the lode outcrops, while a short distance below blueberries occur by the million.

It is believed this is the "mother" lode of the country, situated as it is near the summit of the range, in the centre of the upheaval, and along a most regular formation.

The following full claims have been located and recorded:—The "Sunshine Silver Mine," by Chas. F. Blackburn; the "Queen Vie," by H. E. Beach; the "Silver Coin," by Lawson Ingles; the "Silver Mountain," by Philip Drisler; and the "Silver Park," by Frank Mitchell. It is believed by Mr. Blackburn that this lode is one of the most extensive in the Kootenay country, as the formation containing the lode

has been traced by him for a distance of fifty miles! And wherever the "contact" was examined good ore was found.

At some points the lode outcrops on the Duncan River slope, but most of it is on the Fish Creek and Lardeau side. It passes from the Lardeau to Fish Creek, but how far it goes north has not yet been determined. It is known to go south beyond the head of Hailey Creek, and probably as far as the Upper Kootenay Lake.

On the east side of the head of the South Lardeau and at the head of Hailey Creek this limestone belt stands up in mountain masses, and the numerous rugged peaks loom up as sentinels overlooking a mountain region of magnificent grandeur. On all sides are snow-capped, glacier-crowned peaks as far as the eye can reach. Snow fields and solid rock, mirror-like lakes and beautiful torrents, with cascades and thundering falls, all go to make the view one of true sublimity.

Notwithstanding the ruggedness of this country it would be an easy matter to construct a railway through it by way of the Lardeau Pass. The writer can verify the claim made by the Kamloops "Sentinel" last week, viz.: "A route that is entirely feasible, running from Revelstoke to the Northeast Arm of the Upper Arrow Lake, thence through the Lardeau Pass for about 45 miles, passing near Trout Lake and reaching the navigable waters of Kootenay Lake at the mouth of the Lardeau River. The advantages of this route are superior to any other so far proposed or discussed. It reaches Kootenay Lake itself, which is open water the entire year. . . . The Lardeau railway would, therefore, in connection with steamers, control the business of the lake towns and mines absolutely."

The great mineral fields of this section would justify the construction of such a road at once. The mines already found can furnish over 1,000 tons of galena-carbonate ore daily. In fact, three lodes in the Lardeau country can do this very thing at the present time.

There are in this region some of the largest galena ledges ever discovered on the American continent. The amount of gold, silver, copper and lead that might be extracted from this portion of the Kootenay district is beyond computation. Millions in dividends will be the result of the development of these magnificent mines. Any practical miner capable of reading the rocks can tell this on sight, and the writer is surprised to find such an eldorado lying almost at our doors producing nothing, when fortunes could be realised every month. If it is a fact that Canadian citizens do not care to handle this mineral I am sure the American miners will gladly take the job off their hands, and roll the wealth across the boundary line. Such a rich country cannot long remain dormant when known to enterprising men. The demand for gold, silver and other metals will soon change the aspect of things, and before very long this wilderness will be made to give up its wealth.

The "advance guard of civilization" is now on the ground; the prospector gets his revelations direct from Nature, and almost daily important discoveries are being made that, in the near future, means a transfiguration of this country.
