WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Lipton's Challenge Coming—Land Grabbing in California.

New York, Sept. 17.—Signor Marconi states that he has solved the problem of the independence of several simultaneous messages on his wireless telegraphic apparatus.

Kansas City, Sept. 17.—Seventeen head of native steers, averaging 1.66 pounds, sold here today at \$8.75, which is the highest price for beef ever received on this market.

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 17.—Captain Cutler, of the tug Pilot, says the stranded steamer Cottage City is in a favorable position and will be floated.

London, Sept. 17.—The challenge of Sir Thomas Lipton for another series of races for the America's cup will be forwarded within a few days, so as to reach the New York Yacht Club October 1.

New York, Sept. 17.—Among American citizens on the isthmus there is now a feeling of relief, as there is now a United States warship at each end of the Panama railroad, cables the Panama correspondent of the Herald. There are no indications of an immediate attack by the revolutionists.

London, Sept. 17.—A firm of South African merchants in Liverpool is said to have received a cablegram from Cape Town, dated September 13, as follows:

"It is semi-officially stated that the transfer of Delagoa Bay, Portuguese East Africa, to British control, is imminent."

London, Sept. 17.—A return of the national finances today shows that the gross liabilities, March 31, were \$3,282,269,933, an increase of \$3,359,511, due to the South African War.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 17.—According to statistics just published, during last year 8,881 murders were committed in European Russia. This gives an average of more than 2 a day.

San Francisco, Sept. 17.—State Mineralogist Aubrey makes the astonishing statement that during the last few months at least 250,000 acres of public land in the mineralized sections of California, and largely mineral in nature, have been grabbed by Eastern speculators through the employment of dummy

REPUDIATED

Mr. Tully Boyce, the Nanaimo labor
leader, has given very emphatic denial
to the alleged interview published in
the Vancouver Province, purporting to
be a report of remarks made by Mr.
Boyce regarding Ralph Smith, M. P.
Mr. Boyce never made the remarks
attributed to him; the statements pub-
lished by the Province were simply stu-
pid lies concocted to fill space, and not
wholly due to the reporter's want of
knowledge of his trade.

Mr. Boyce has merely been made the
victim of the rascal journalism which
has given this province an unenviable
reputation throughout Canada, and of
which Vancouver is facile princeps. We
were not deceived on reading that alleged
interview the first time; it appeared
in the Vancouver Province and that was
more than enough to begot suspicion.
Mr. Boyce's prompt repudiation of the
scandalous "interview" amply confirmed
that doubt.

Tully Boyce has not yet stooped so
low as to join hands with Ralph Smith,
who seems to be begging friendship
everywhere now that he has been
brought low and his pride humbled.
Smith carried things with a high hand
in the days of his glory; no king
of Dahomey could have been more des-
potic; but he has passed the way of all
labor leaders who have tried to rule in
Nanaimo. Had he played single instead
of double; straight instead of crooked,
he might have lasted longer.

Nobody denies that he has done good
work for labor, or that he is a remark-
ably capable man, but his will is weak;
he cannot stand temptation, and his
ambition is hard to satisfy. Mr. Tully
Boyce, on the other hand is absolutely
square in all his dealings; he would
make a better labor leader than Smith,
even in Nanaimo, where they seem to
have a mania for setting up leaders and
then knocking them down. But Mr.
Boyce, wifancy, is too wary a cam-
paigner to fall a victim to the snares
which tripped up Mr. Smith. But,
nouns verborum.

JUDICIAL ECCENTRICITIES.

Two extraordinary sentences have
been passed within a few days of one

another on the lower Mainland, the dis-
parity between the sentence and the
crime in each case provoking widespread
comment.

In the one instance Captain Pitten-
drigh, justice of the peace of New West-
minster, sentenced a young man to six
years' imprisonment with hard labor
upon being convicted of stealing a "fish-
ing boat. The grotesque contrast pre-
sented by this somewhat common place
crime and the heroic sentence aroused a
storm of protest, and we learn that the
prisoner has been released by order of
Captain Pittendrigh's judicial superiors.

The other case was of the very oppo-
site kind, an exercise of clemency which
seems to border on the fantastic. A
woman named Kelly was tried in Van-
couver and convicted on the charge of
having perpetrated hellish cruelties upon
a little girl, Myrtle de Greek, at Van
Anda, Texas Island. The details are
hardly fit for print so hideous are they.
Suffice it to say that the helpless child,
hardly more than an infant, was seated
by main force upon a red hot stove; her
body and limbs were subsequently sear-
ed with white hot iron; salt was rub-
bed into her raw wounds, and other
saturnic tortures were inflicted upon her
frail body. Of these things the woman
Kelly was convicted on evidence given
in court, and Judge Alexander Hender-
son sentenced her to one year's im-
prisonment!

The thought is forced into one's mind
—what sort of atrocity would be requir-
ed to be proved against a person to in-
duce Judge Henderson to give, say, five
years or seven years imprisonment, the
period most people were of opinion
would have been a just sentence upon
Kelly?

Those judicial peculiarities coming so
soon after the McAdam case certainly
go far to justify the Sandom editor in
some of his remarks. Then there have
been complaints innumerable about
queer vagaries of the provincial judges
on the bench. We have heard of one
lawyer's office in Victoria where, be-
hind the office door, a notification is
posted to the staff to appeal, no matter
what the case, any decision of a certain
judge which goes against the firm's
clients. Strange (or perhaps not
strange) to say, a very large number of
those appeals are sustained.

THE PROGRESSIVE PARTY.

Platform of the New Provincial Po-
litical Party.

THE LEADER has been requested to re-
publish the platform of the Provincial
Progressive Party, as adopted at the
Kamloops convention a short time ago.
It is as follows:—

1. That we gradually abolish all taxes
on the producer and the products of the
producer, shifting the tax on land values.
2. Government ownership of railways
and all means of communication.
3. That the government establish and
operate canals and refuges to treat
all kinds of minerals.
4. That the franchise be extended to
women.
5. The abolition of property qualifica-
tions for all public offices.
6. Farm improvements, implements
and stock not to be taxed, and wild
lands to be assessed at the price asked
for them by speculative holders.
7. No land or cash subsidies. Lands
to be held for the actual settler.
8. Ten per cent. of all public lands to
be immediately set aside for educational
purposes and education of all children
up to the age of 16 years to be free, sec-
ular and compulsory, text books, meals
and clothing to be supplied out of the
public funds where necessary.
9. Compulsory arbitration of labor
disputes.
10. Restriction of Oriental immigration
by a law on the lines of the Natal
act, and if said law be disallowed, it be
repeatedly re-enacted until the end
sought is attained.
11. That to protect us from Asiatics
already in the province the government
insert a clause in all private acts to this
effect: "This act shall be null and void
if the company fails to enter into an
agreement with the government as to
conditions of construction and opera-
tion," and that the house pass a resolu-
tion to prohibit the employment of Asi-
atics on all franchises granted by the
provincial house.
12. Conservation of our forest riches,
pulp land leases to contain a provision
for reforestation so as to produce a per-
ennial revenue and make pulp manu-
facture a growing and permanent in-
dustry.
13. That the act compelling the scal-
ing of logs by government scalers be en-
forced.
14. Absolute reservation from sale or
lease of a certain part of each known
coal area, so that state owned mines, if
necessary, may be easily possible in the

future. All coal leases or grants here-
after made to contain a provision enab-
ling the government to fix the price of
coal loaded on cars or vessels for ship-
ments to B.C. consumers.

15. Municipalization and public con-
trol of the liquor traffic.

16. The right to a referendum where a
value subsidy or franchise is to be con-
ferred.

17. That all transportation companies
be compelled to give free transportation to
members of the legislative assembly and
supreme court and county judges.

18. Election day to be a public holiday,
and provision made that every em-
ployee shall be free from service at least
four consecutive hours during pollin-
g time.

This party lays it down as a first prin-
ciple that they will nominate, endorse
or support only such men as will place
their signed, undated, resignation in the
hands of the convention which nomi-
nates or endorses them; that this resig-
nation be sworn to; that this resig-
nation may be handed in to the lieutenant-
governor in council whenever a majority
of the convention shall consider such
action advisable.

A CRITICAL MOMENT.

Revolver versus Bowie Knife in a
Chesmaines Row.

One detail which, from the standpoint
of the picturesque, was worth all the
others put together did not, strange to
say, see the light of print in the reports
of the fracas at Chesmaines a short time
ago, when Provincial Constable Halhed
had to do with the infuriated Mexican
sailor armed with a murderous-looking
dink, such as the gringos carry about
with them to protect their "honor."

The Leader is informed that the
plucky constable had about the narrow-
est squeak for his life that is ever likely
to fall to his lot. It seems that when

Mr. Halhed waded into his row the
Mexican objected to any professional
refereeing aid, turning on the constable
drew a nasty looking carving knife ar-
rangement from his waistband, and
made a rush at Mr. Halhed with the
knife aloft ready to plunge into the
enemy's body.

Mr. Halhed had time to draw his re-
volver and cover the maddened greater
point blank, but so insane with passion
was the Mexican that the sight of the
revolver did not stop him in the least;
he came charging on evidently deter-
mined to introduce daylight into the in-
terior department of the constable in
sundry places.

The moment was a critical one; it
seemed as if nothing could save the con-
stable but the necessary pressure on the
trigger, which would have sent the
Mexican down in a moment, but the
policeman hesitated to pull, and the
next instant he was whirling, in a cloud
of dust, with the Mexican in the endea-
vor to disarm the fellow. Mr. Halhed's
superior strength quickly decided the
fight; the knife was wrenched out of the
foreigner's hands and flung well out of
his reach, and then he was handcuffed
as surely to prevent any further attempts
to illustrate how they do things in
Mexico.

Constable Halhed has been severely
blamed for failing to shoot the Mex can,
but as the affair ended, miraculously
enough, with no serious hurt to any-
body, probably it was just as well.

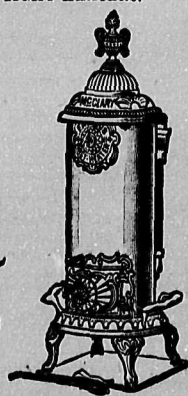
