To Work

All Winter.

A VEIN OF RICH ORE STRUCK ON THE MAMMOTH. ALL OUTBUILDINGS FINISHED AND PREPARATIONS MADE FOR RAWHIDING THE ORE.

The new winter quarters at the Mammoth group erected at the entrance to the Crescent tunnel, consisting of bunk house, cook house, shed and blacksmith shop, are completed and the force of men has moved into them. The buildings are all under one roof and are so arranged that the tunnel can be entered without going out into the weather. Wood, provisions, powder, etc., are all up, the pack train has ceased making its trips and the men have gone into seclusion at the top of Goat mountain from which it is not likely they will emerge until spring, as the journey from the Mammoth over deep snow is a very hard task indeed.

On the Mammoth group there are several veins running into the mountain which lead to the belief that there is a large ore body somewhere in the hill, and to expedite discovery of this deposit a tunnel has been started further around the hillside from the present tunnel on the Crescent. The new tunnel which will be the main working adit when completed, has excellent dumping ground at its portal.

The tunnel on the Crescent is in 55 feet and a crosscut has been started 50 feet from the tunnel's mouth. A vein of rich ore has been encountered ten feet in the crosscut.

Over 200 sacks of ore have been packed down to the timber, about 1½ miles from the mine camp, and as soon as sufficient snow falls to admit of rawhiding, the ore will be hauled to Camberne from whence it will be shipped to the Canadian Smelting works at Trail for treatment.—Camberne Miner.

WORK ON SILVER DOLLAR.

The five storeys of the Silver Dollar mill are now erected and will be roofed in by the end of next week. The prevailing fine weather has been of incalculable assistance in the work, and from present indications it is assured that the exterior of the mill will be completed without hindrance from that quarter.

A force of miners is now at work at the mine, and, since starting a day or so ago, have driven five feet further into the lead in the new crosscut tunnel, making a distance of 35 feet that the lead has been driven into. The lead is an immense one and there are no indications yet of the foot wall. The galena so far found in the quartz has nearly disappeared, giving place to iron pyrites which is usually a sign of gold values. When the foot wall is reached the lead will be drifted on so that ore may be blocked out in readiness for treatment when the reduction mill is ready to operate.—Camberne Miner.

Silver was the feature of Tuesday's metal markets, gaining three points in London and New York. It is now 64 7-8 cents an ounce. Lead and copper showed no change, but both are at high prices for the present movement.

Local Mining

Conditions.

OF INTEREST TO THOSE WATCHING THE PROGRESS AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE RICHEST MINERAL SECTION OF THE PROVINCE

The Broadview syndicate held their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday night. The production of the first twenty days amounted to 28½ tons of ore. Taking into consideration the amount of dead work necessary to open the property up, the showing is a remarkable good one. The proposition made to the syndicate for purchase of the property was considered, but no definite action taken. Two cars of ore will be shipped, one this week and one next week, and in addition to the mineral claims controlled by the syndicate they have also 320 acres of fine timber land, which in itself is a fine asset, lying as it does adjoining the town of Ferguson.

The Shannon contract on the Black Warrior will be completed about the end of December.

The Gordon lease on the Free Coinage is showing up well. The shaft is down 20 or 25 feet, and good galena and zinc is showing on the bottom.

The work on the Silver Cup continues to show up good ore. About 600 sacks of screenings have been trammed to 9-Mile.

Concerning mining activity, it may be said that there is more going on in that line than ever before in the camp's brief history, says the Camberne Miner. The elementary stage is past and the productive stage is at hand. The performances of the Eva mine and Mammoth mine are indicative of this fact, and it will not be long before the Beatrice, Silver Dollar and Goldfinch will add their quota and demonstrate further that the Camberne camp is a permanent producing mining centre.

The lead on the Beatrice has not been tapped yet, but if indications can be relied on, the ore body is not far distant.

THE PRICE OF SILVER.

Considerable interest is being aroused in business circles over the continued advance in silver, despite the growing gold production and the predominant position of the latter metal in the world's currency, says the Montreal Star. Bar silver is now selling at 2s 5½d. in London and at 64½ cents per ounce in New York. This is the highest price silver has touched since January 1901, when it reached the same level of prices in both markets. On November 8 last, 63½ cents was touched in New York for a short time. According to London advices the prevailing price of bar silver, which at 2s 5½d. is higher than it has been in nearly five years, is largely due to the small supplies on hand there and the existence of a large short interest. Two months futures were selling at 28 11-16. With a bear market and the operators to a considerable extent short of November delivery, silver had to be found for the French tender of 10,000 kilos.

BIG LOW GRADE PROPERTY TO BE CONTROLLED BY EASTERN CAPITALISTS. A WAGON ROAD TO BE BUILT UP THE NORTH FORK.

It is reported on good authority that the Surprise group has been taken over by the eastern people who had the property examined last fall by O. V. Grandin. It is stated that the building of the road up the North Fork will be started as soon as the snow goes off in the spring. The property is a big low-grade galena proposition and requires capital to work it successfully. The people who it is reported now have control have unlimited means at their disposal.

Mr. Grandin stated when here that if his people took up the property a reduction plant would be put on the ground, and if necessary put in some method of cheap transportation.

Dave Morgan is to be congratulated on the consummation of this deal. He has worked hard, and the result is not only beneficial to himself, but to the whole district.

LOOK OUT FOR MICA.

Dr. Haanel, superintendent of the mines branch of the department of the interior, has sent to Hon. Frank Oliver the first of a series of publications on the economic minerals of Canada. The report deals with mica. Canadian mica mining has now reached such proportions as to entitle it to a prominent position in the mineral industries of the Dominion. The mica industry employs 550 persons. The wages paid last year amounted to \$120,000. Mica has been found in Similkameen, but whether it exists in commercial quantities is not known. Large deposits of it are found at Tete Jaune Cache, northeast of Cariboo. Prospectors should search for it when in the hills as it is valuable for many purposes.

A STRONG REASON WHY CAPITAL SHOULD TURN ITS ATTENTION TO THE LARDEAU. LOCAL MEN ARE SUCCESSFUL.

From many of our subscribers we have received "Reasons Why" the Lardeau has not gone ahead more rapid than it has. The reasons given were many, and no doubt all contributed more or less to the stagnation prevalent. We, however, think it time to open up a new line giving the reasons why the Lardeau is all right and a sure winner for those who stay with it.

In the first place many of the leads are rich, can be operated by small capital and quick returns obtained. Local men who understand conditions are putting both money and energy into the opening up of properties of merit, and will demonstrate to outside capital that in the Lardeau there is a field for investment unequalled on the continent.

LUMBER TRADE PROSPECTS.

The lumber business is slow in British Columbia. Orders are not coming in from the prairie provinces as good as might be expected. The coast mill could cut twenty-five per cent. more lumber than is being ordered without straining themselves and there are very few orders in for future delivery. It was expected that the good crops in the provinces would make a boom in the lumber business on the coast. There are, however, so many mills in the business between the coast and the mountains that business must be unusually active before prosperity is general with all in the industry. A noted bank manager has said that this is paying-up year in Manitoba and the North-West. There is no doubt about it that the farmers must pay up. They can do so without being seriously crowded, but there will not be money available that is supposed for building purposes. The winter it is expected will be a good one. There will be a fair demand all through the winter, but no great activity.—Lumberman and Contractor.

Now is the time for the Lardeau people to show unanimity of purpose. The indicator is swinging around to points "activity" and "prosperity." It is conceded by all who know that conditions are more favorable than at any other time in the history of the country. The whole province is looked on by foreign capital as a favorable field for investment, and there is no reason why the Lardeau should not get its proportion. We have the goods, but it requires the capital to market them.

Let us be united, therefore, and if the necessary funds cannot be had for the developing of any particular property in which we as individuals are interested, then let us throw our influence in to get it for some other. Don't play "dog in the manger" policy.

Owing to the closing of the mill and the uncertainty of further operations, many are thinking and saying that the bottom has dropped out of Trout Lake. We certainly acknowledge the operation of the mill is a factor in building up the town, but we recognize it only as a subsidiary help. The town had better times before the mill was ever built, and we predict with assurance that even if the present outfit never cut another stick that Trout Lake will be built up and become a populous centre through the working of its mineral resources.

We want the mill (operating), but the foundation of our success is to be found under the ground, not on top.

Don't forget that you will soon be called on to vote for school appropriation for 1906. Our government grant will be \$580. It remains with the ratepayers what our total expenses will be, and it is for them to supply it. Consider the matter over and be prepared at the annual meeting to intelligently discuss it.

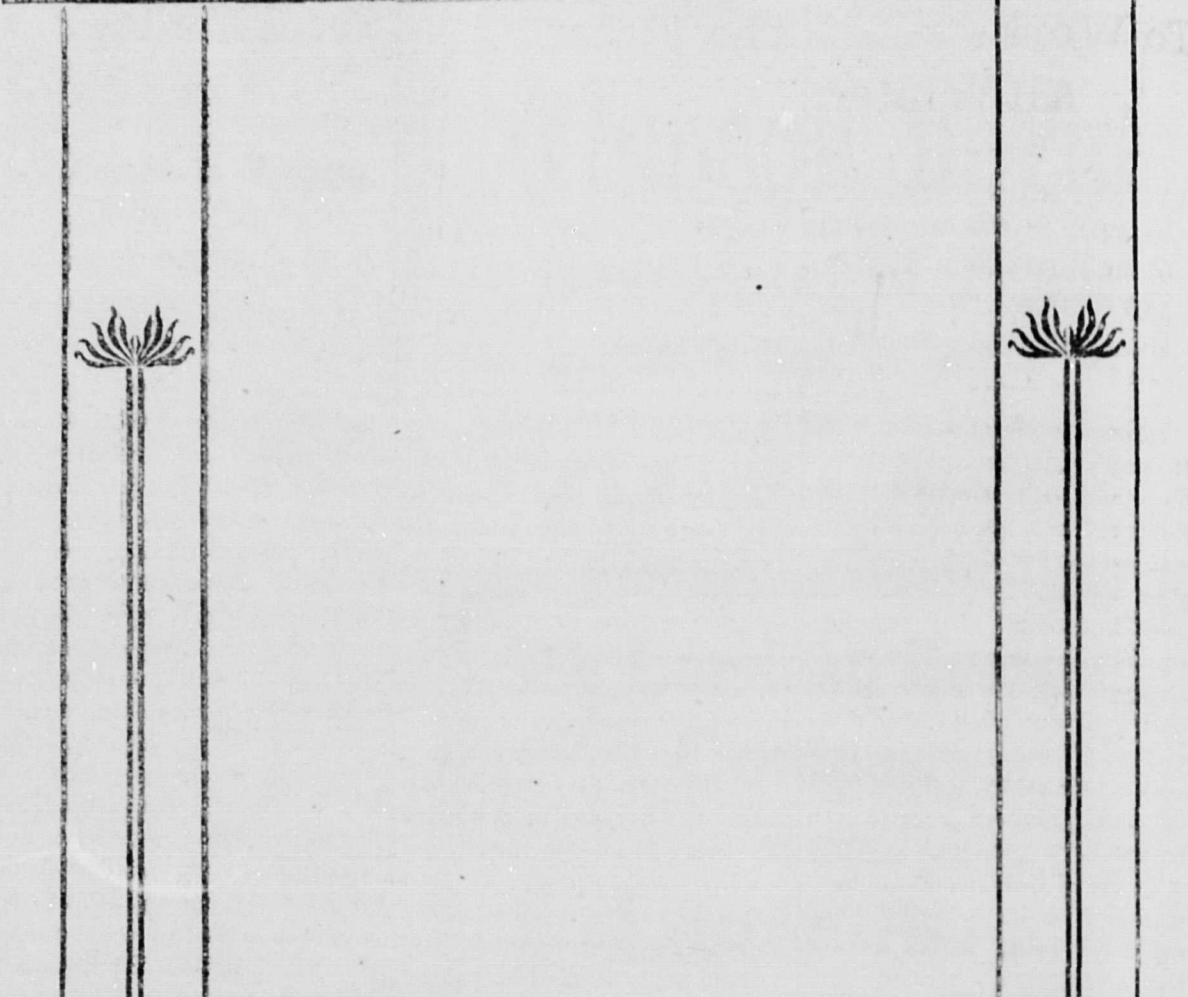
