## Connect With G.T.P.

MR. LOUIS HILL IS GIVEN AN IMPORTANT MISSION IN B. C.

GREAT NORTHERN MEANS TO DO BUSINESS IN THIS SECTION.

The Great Northern has appointed Mr. Louis Hill to go thoroughly over the Kootenay and Yale section with a view to locating sites for railways. Among others a connecting line from the Nelson & Fort Sheppard road via the Arrow lakes and Columbia valley through Revelstoke to join the Grand Trunk Pacific on the western side of the Pine River pass will be investigated.

The more direct route from the Nelson and Fort Sheppard road would be up Kootenay Lake, Trout Lake, thence to the Arrow Lakes and Revelstoke.

In view of this, nothing should be left undone to prevent the extension of the A. & K. Charter. It controls the situation, and should the Great Northern contemplate the above building there should be nothing in their way to hinder their operations.

The citizens of Trout Lake and Ferguson are supposed to have telephone communication with the world over the wires of the Big Bend Telephone Co., connecting at Arrowhead with the C.P.R. telegraph line. As a matter of fact we have none. The service as it has been for some months past is worse than no line at all. In many cases messages are sent and sometimes delivered after the confirmation has been received by mail, and in some cases not delivered at all. What makes it more annoying is the fact that people on the outside thinking we have through communication will send messages of importance and not receiving an answer come to conclusion that we are dead from the feet up, and any deal that might be pending is cut off in the flower of its youth. ## Death of Old-Timer.

THE GRIM REAPER GATHERS IN WIDELY KNOWN LARDEAU MAN.

HAD BEEN AILING FOR SOME TIME BUT DEATH CAME AS SHOCK.

With grief we record the death of J. W. Westfall, which occurred at the Kootenay General Hospital, Nelson, on Monday last, the 29th ult. For several years he has not been blessed with good health, and it has been his custom to migrate south for the winter. He was in fairly good health, however, when in company with Mrs. Westfall he left for a sunnier climate in November last, but he was taken sick at Nelson and admitted into the hospital.

The last bulletin prior to his death was somewhat reassuring, and his many friends cherished the hope of his ultimate recovery; but the rally was temporary, and from this on he gradually sank. He passed peacefully away in the presence of his wife and several of his relatives on Monday morning from exhaustion following a protracted spell of Hodgkin's disease (a blood malady).

John Wesley Westfall came here in 1897 from Rossland, where he landed in the boom days. He originally came from West Virginia. On coming to this country he was associated with Judge Miller in the Old Gold, Primrose, Guiana Gold and other properties, and had charge of the development on these. In 1902 owing to the growth of his interests he was forced to give up the active management and confine himself entirely to buying and selling. During the past four years Solicitor F. C. Elliott was associated with him in his mining deals.

He was interested in many of the prominent mining deals in this section, among which were Pedro, Lucky Boy, Mohican, Gold Beit group, Broadview, Fidelity and numerous others.

He was 56 years of age and he leaves a widow, two daughters and a son to mourn his loss, viz. J. W. Westfall, jun., Seattle, Wash., Mrs. Jacob Schmitt, Athena, Ore., Mrs. G. A. Milton, Fairhaven, Wash. His death is a great blow to the community, and the Review on behalf of the district extends to the sorrowing relatives deepest sympathy.

The remains have been taken to Bellingham for interment.

## Why Not Inquiry?

KASLO CORONER FAILS TO HOLD INQUEST ON SAD DEATH.

HE SAID INQUIRY WAS NOT NECESSARY.

We have been anxiously awaiting to hear from the Coroner at Kaslo relative to the death of G. W. Carothers, who was killed at Lardo, two weeks ago. Not learning whether an inquest was held or not we made enquiries and find that the Coroner stated that from what he could learn there was no necessity for holding one. If this is a fact, and we have no reason to doubt our informant, there is something radically wrong. We have always understood it was the duty in cases of this kind to examine eye witnesses of the accident not only to determine whether the party was killed or not, but to determine the cause and whether it was by negligence or carelessness and the jury by their findings place the blame, if any, on the deceased himself or to attribute it to other causes, which in this case might be failure of the C.P.R. to observe the necessary safeguards of human life. We do not say this was the case in the recent accident, but we do say emphatically that it was the Coroner's duty to hold an inquest and inquire closely into the facts by taking evidence under oath of all who were in a position to throw any light on the sad affair.

IMPORTANT MINING DECISION.

Word has been received from the Supreme Court in the well known case of Dockstader vs. Clark. The highest Canadian tribunal practically decides that in deciding prime location cases technicalities will not prevail. Specifically the court finds in location cases.

1. That 70 degrees is too great a variation to allow as an approximation. No exact limit was fixed, however, 97 degrees was the point involved.
2. That a location may be wholly on one side of a location line.
3. That a location line may traverse any number of claims.
4. That a discovery post may be located even on a crown granted claim; as much ground as may be lawfully covered by the location is to be allowed.

From a mining standpoint the finding is one of the most important ever given in the Dominion. By consent the decision governs 13 other pending actions.

In the Provincial House on the 17th inst., Premier McBride paid a high compliment to the newspapers of the province. The Premier referred with much satisfaction to the prosperous condition of the mining industry, concerning which he spoke at some length. "This is my own department," he said, in concluding his remarks on the subject, "and I am pleased to bear testimony here, speaking as Minister of Mines, to the uniform support that my efforts have received, through the prominence given to mining matters by the press throughout the province, irrespective of politics. The attitude of the newspapers has done much to forward the interests of our provincial mining industry."

The Lardeau loses a good friend by the death of J. W. Westfall. There has been few men who have so persistently year in and year out advertised its resources. His abounding faith was such that those with whom he had intercourse could not doubt his sincerity. He was ambitious, not for himself, but for the district, and while we feel assured of the realization of his ambition, we regret that the Fates have so willed it that he did not live to see its fulfilment.

The sessions of the House have been so far somewhat tame. John Oliver, of Delta, promised some startling disclosures which so far has failed to materialize. The government are putting through routine work at a rapid rate. Several amendments are being made to the Land and School Acts which simplifies their workings. The opposition, as usual, put in their time in raising objections, which are, however, of no avail.

Smith Curtis is on the political warpath, and his utterances at Ymir recently are considered worthy (by himself) of publishing in pamphlet form. The late member of Rossland and Boundary had his innings, and his work was not of such a nature as entitled him to a continuance of the confidence of the electorate of his home town. His ambition, however, to become leader of the Liberal party is strong, but to step into the shoes of as able a man as J. A. Macdonald, the present leader, he will have to adopt the principle of reincarnation and get some ideas of statesmanship.

Nelson, B.C., takes position as the third city of the province. The gross postal revenue from the Nelson post office for the year ending June 30th was \$16,292. New Westminster comes next with \$12,343. Vancouver leads with \$98,016, and Victoria follows with \$56,771.

G. O. Buchanan is deserving of the thanks of the community for the way in which he is pushing the matter of the A. & K. Extension in the local Boards of Trade as well as at the session of the affiliated boards.
