Developing Broadview.

Work Going on Steadily on the Famous Northern Hill

Large Quantity of Ore Got Out by Local Syndicate. Will be Big Mine.

The work on the Broadview is proving out satisfactory to the controlling syndicate. Seven men are employed, which number will be added to as the work progresses. Last week one car of ore was shipped to the Trail smelter; another car is being shipped to-day, and two more cars are on the way down the hill via Vipond's palace car route. There are in the group 10 claims and two sections (320 acres) of well-timbered land. The work done consists of a shaft sunk on the Broadview claim 120 feet, from which a drift is run 118 feet, all of which is in vein matter and ore. Sixty feet below a crosscut is made in which some ore is exposed similar in nature to that found in the shaft.

At 120 feet depth a drift is made on ore for 172 feet. At this depth also a crosscut is driven in about 150 feet. At the 200 ft. level a small amount of drifting is done on the ore so as to demonstrate its continuity. A drop is then made to the 200 ft. level, where the drift is in on the ore for over 200 feet. From this level a car of copper and carbonates was shipped, giving good values in copper, silver and gold.

From the shaft nearly three cars of galena ore has been taken out during the last half of November. On the old Sonoma claim a shaft has been sunk for 100 feet, from which the old company extracted some high grade galena. This shaft is all in ore and vein matter. A 200 ft. crosscut has been driven on this claim to connect with the shaft. There are also some high grade showings on the Alpha claim, on which no work has been done. The Phillipsburg claim has also some good showings; the work, however, is being confined to the Broadview claim at present.

The present price of metals is a factor which the owners are not overlooking, and while a large quantity of ore is being taken out, care is taken to prevent gutting by the drifting on the 300 foot level and opening up of new stoping ground.

We believe that the Broadview contains all that is essential for the making of a mine and a big dividend payer.

The erection of a tramway to the Lake while not absolutely essential at the present time, would save a large expense in the handling of the ore, and would add materially to the profits. We believe, however, that steps are being taken to put one in early next summer.

Above the Timber Line.

EDWARD BAILLIE TALKS OF THE MAMMOTH AND THE DEVELOPMENT OF SIRDAR AND CRESCENT CLAIMS. WORK GOING AHEAD.

Ed. Baillie, general manager of the Edward Baillie syndicate, owning the Mammoth group on Goat mountain and other mining properties, returned last Friday from Rossland where he had been attending the annual meeting of the syndicate, which was largely attended, the president T. R. Morrow, occupying the chair. Out of a total of 258 shares issued 223 were represented.

Mr. Baillie says the meeting passed off very satisfactorily, the main question at issue being the want of a tramway to lessen the present heavy transportation charges which now amount to \$40 per ton for up freighting and \$35 for down. The installation of a tramway would reduce this to \$6 per ton. The matter was laid over awaiting the results of the winter's development. Winter quarters have been erected and supplies for four men for eight months have been stored at the mine. The following were elected directors for the ensuing year: T. R. Morrow and Geo. Urquhart of Rossland; C. Fernau, Alex. Leith and Ed. Baillie of Nelson. At the meeting of the directors held afterwards T. R. Morrow was elected president, A. Leith, vice-president and E. Baillie, secretary-treasurer and general manager.

The Edward Baillie syndicate began as a private enterprise on the part of some Nelson and Rossland men, working in the Lardeau. After some success had rewarded their work the syndicate was incorporated last spring and work was actively pushed on the Mammoth group while the syndicate contented itself with doing the required assessment on their other holdings. The Mammoth is probably the highest mine in the province, the Sirdar claim of the group being situated in Goat mountain at an altitude of over 9000 feet; above the glaciers and, apparently, as the miners say, above everything else in sight. Work has to be taken up a long distance, the workings being above timber line. No water is procurable on the ridges, and melted snow has to serve the year round.

Most of the work has been done on the Crescent claim, where a tunnel has been run 180 feet with crosscuts making a total work done of 227 feet. Altogether on the group some 400 feet of development work has been accomplished besides almost as much stripping. The ore shipped is a high grade galena and grey copper, which has shown by the smelter returns that it carries from 186 to 371 ounces of silver and an average of 40 per cent lead, the total thus running about \$150, gross smelter values. This is, of course, the average of the shipments already made which amount to about 40 tons for this season's work. A further shipment of 20 tons is in transit. It is claimed that there is no better showing of high grade zinc and grey copper ore in the province than what is seen on the Sirdar claim. A sample zinc shipment of 107 sacks will shortly be made to the Frank Smelter.

Access to the mine can only be had in winter upon snowshoes and

the miners confine their visits to Camborne, 11 miles away, to two or three trips during the winter. There is a wagon road to the foot of the mountain, leading from Camborne and it is to this road that this enterprising syndicate plan to build their tramway.—Nelson News.

All present signified their intention of subscribing, so that the company may be entirely free from debt. The new directors elected were F. C. Elliott, O. B. N. Wilkie, O. W. Abrahamson, F. C. Campbell and T. B. Baker. At a subsequent meeting of the directors F. C. Elliott was elected president, O. W. Abrahamson vice, and T. B. Baker sec-treas. Arrangements are being made to have skating at the earliest possible moment.

Metals Are Still Advancing.

SILVER THE HIGHEST POINT FOR TEN YEARS. LEAD AND COPPER CONTINUE TO ADVANCE IN PRICE. ELECTROLYTIC COPPER FIRM.

San Francisco, Dec. 1.—Silver is now 65½ cents per ounce, the highest point since 1896. Two months ago the market quotation was 50 cents. Brokers in accounting for the higher price, say that in addition to a legitimate business demand there is also a speculative demand which must be taken into consideration.

The price of silver in New York declined Saturday to 65 cents an ounce. Neither the variation from the San Francisco price nor the fractional decline from the price during the first half of the week has any special significance.

The speculative demand referred to in the San Francisco dispatch is undoubtedly due to the expectation of a large and rapidly expanding market for silver in China and Japan. The awakening of the orient is certain to produce among its earliest results a rapid development in domestic and foreign commerce, for which a plentiful supply of current coin is almost indispensable. The currency to which oriental merchants are most accustomed is the Mexican silver dollar, whose exchange value in Europe and America is only half a dollar.

It is expected that both China and Japan will soon develop a large foreign trade, and for that reason will require at an early date to assimilate their currency to that of the leading financial and trading nations of the world, hence the expectation of a big demand for Canadian and American silver, and the consequent steady advance in the price of the metal.

Lead is also steadily advancing. The London quotation last Saturday was £16 2s. 6d. a ton, as the English ton is 2240 pounds, in the ratio of 28 to 25 to the short Canadian ton of 2000 pounds, the price is a little less than four cents a lb. But as the price less than a year ago was only about 2½ cents a pound, the increase in that time is more than 50 per cent.

With the Canadian bounty arranged on a sliding scale, it really made no difference to lead mine owners what the price was while it varied between £12 10s. and £16. Below £12 10s. they lost and above £16 they gain. Consequently each future advance means increased returns to the shippers and probably an increase in the production of lead ores.

Copper is attracting a great deal of attention from financiers. Its rapid and steady advance is generally attributed to a growing demand for the metal for power transmission lines all over the country.

Saturday's quotations on the New York market showed a fractional decline for casting copper. Electrolytic copper showed firmer, the variation being reduced from a half to a quarter of a cent.

A New Industry for Kootenay.

STEEL RAILS TO BE MANUFACTURED ON THE SHORES OF KOOTENAY LAKE. MC-MILLAN AND ROBINSON IRON MINES PURCHASED.

Next summer, says the Nelson News, will see the manufacture of steel rails added to the industries of Kootenay. A plant will be installed at the mouth of Crawford creek, or near it on the shore of Crawford Bay.

The iron mines owned by G. B. McMillan and R. Robinson, of Nelson, have been sold to a syndicate of Cleveland and St. Paul capitalists, headed by Mathias Horsling, of Cleveland. The purchase price is in the neighborhood of \$75,000.

The new owners will begin active operations on June 1st next. Their plans include the construction of a mono-rail line from the mines to Crawford Bay.

The new properties will be operated in connection with steel works already in existence, either at the coast or in the east.

The company proposes to expend \$150,000 next summer in putting in rolls, and providing transportation facilities between the mines and the lake shore.

There will be no delay or interruption in the work of the new company. The deposits of iron will be thoroughly developed, and shipments will be made as soon as they are justified by circumstances. There is no uncertainty as to the company's plans to develop their newly-acquired property and to manufacture steel on the shores of Kootenay lake.

Seen at his residence, G. B. McMillan said: "Yes, the mines are sold. The purchasers are Cleveland and St. Paul people. Mathias Horsling, of Cleveland, will be the head."

"The purchase price is round \$75,000. That's near enough. Besides that, the company has declared its intention of spending \$150,000 for development and transportation next summer. They will begin on the 1st of June."

"They will build a mono-rail line from the mines to Crawford Bay. They will put in rolls, and will begin as early as possible the manufacture of steel at some point on the shore of Crawford Bay."

"No, the transfer does not include the mines on Gray's creek, which are still held by Mr. Robinson and myself."

C.P.R. Want Extension.

Application is to be made at the next Session of the House at Ottawa for an extension of time on the A.&K. branch of the C.P.R. This is a valuable franchise, and carries, we believe, \$3000 per mile grant. Its value lies in the fact that it is the only through route in which a grade of not over one per cent exists. It is a well-known fact that the Great Northern is anxious to get through this part of the country, connecting their Nelson and Fort Shephard line with some point on the Grand Trunk Pacific. It is a battle royal between the G.N. and C.P.R., and we can rest assured the G.T.P. will not prove a friend to the C.P.R. It is up to the C.P.R. to move and move quick, or this neck of the woods will see a connection made between the two big railway lines. In the meantime the Board of Trade ought to take the matter up at once and use all the pressure possible to prevent the extension of the charter.

Ferguson Locals.

The lessee, A. J. Gordon, of the Free Coinage, is crosscutting from the long tunnel to get under the magnificent showing exposed in the shaft. About 30 feet will have to be driven to get to the desired point, when an upraise will be made to connect. In the shaft there is some fine galena and grey copper.

Sam Shannon came down from the Black Warrior. The contract will be finished about the end of January. He fully expects to open up a good body of ore, however, before quitting.

Continuance of work is all there is to report in the Big Tunnel and Silver Cup this week. Andy Daney is getting ore from the Cup terminal at 9-Mile and freighting to the Lake. Four more men were put to work at the Cup this week.

Ferguson rink is in fine shape and lighted up in magnificent shape. The formal opening will take place Saturday night, and a good crowd is expected. The management deserve credit and the citizens generally are to be congratulated on the public spirited way in which they have gone down in their dip and provided funds for one of the best rinks in the interior.
