Four Tons a Day from Beatrice.

INDICATIONS ARE IN FAVOR OF THIS MINE BECOMING A FAMOUS SHIPPER.

After a long, hard struggle the Beatrice Mines, Ltd., have reached the stage in the development of their property which assures success. Mrs. H. Y. Anderson and F. F. Fulmer who have practically financed and carried on the work are to be congratulated on the splendid result of their years of hard work.

The property is now producing four tons of high grade copper ore per day, which is being rawhided down the hill to transportation. A new strike was made in the 85 foot drift, from which a 60 foot shaft will be sunk, which will add largely to the stoping ground.

A large body of good concentrating ore has been opened up which will not, however, be handled until either a mill is installed or transportation facilities are improved.

Mohican Going Ahead.

OWNERS WITH SMALL CAPITAL PROVIDE FUNDS FOR PROPERTY IN WHICH THEY HAVE CONFIDENCE.

While a majority of the owners of mineral claims in Kootenay, especially in the Lardeau and Trout Lake districts, are waiting to secure outside capital to assist in the development of their properties, a few are courageously, if slowly, going ahead as fast as their own resources permit, says the Nelson Daily News. A notable instance is that of the owners of the Mohican mine, near the Nettie L., and separated from it by a slope.

D. N. McTavish, representative in Nelson and district of the Scranton correspondence school, is one of the owners. Mr. McTavish speaks of the claim and its history as follows:

"None of the owners are men with large capital. Most of them are Rossland men. We have been at it since last summer. We assess ourselves and have been expending about \$400 a month. After drifting about 400 feet we have a large body of good ore in sight. In the course of development we took out one carload. It paid \$29 a ton above all expenses. At that time we got a fairly good offer for the property and some of us were disposed to accept it. But others objected and argued that by waiting and working on we would probably get a showing that would result in a sale on far better terms. That argument prevailed and we declined the offer.

"We then decided to drive another tunnel between 600 and 700 feet to strike lead again. Several hundred feet have already been driven. We have only three men working on it. We may not strike the lead until August, but I think it will be by the end of June.

"We have incurred very little expense for management. Our aim has been to make every dollar count on the actual hole in the ground. It is not likely that any startling news will come from the property for several months. We are all fairly well pleased with it and content to wait."

Seeding is in progress at Beaton

The Lucky Boy has a car of \$150 ore stacked at the C.P.R. sheds awaiting the opening of transportation.

Alec McLean, the lessee of the Horse Shoe, came down Tuesday. He states that the property is turning out good. There is now about five tons of high-grade ore on the dump, which will be rawhided to the steamboat landing as quickly as possible. The ore as sampled will run easily \$160 per ton.

Ore is being rawhided down from the Lucky Boy every day and stored at the C.P.R. sheds until navigation is resumed.

The local fishermen are all on the hunt for periwinkles to use for bait to lure the wary greying to destruction. Don't forget the printers if you make a good catch.

Abrahamson, Louis Levesque, and J. C. Murray. The first meeting of the new board was held on Monday night, when O. W. Abrahamson was elected president, L. Levesque vice-president, A. M. Craig treasurer, and J. C. Murray secretary.

Promising Properties Awaiting the Coming of Capital to Further Develop Them.

Situate at the head of Canyon creek are some partially developed properties which for good showings cannot be surpassed. The situation is good, being only about 8 miles from transportation, and on an easy wagon road grade.

Among the number is the Linson View property, consisting of six claims owned by P. A. Lindgreen and M. Nelson. On this group are four distinct veins running with the formation. The No. 1 vein is 4 ft. wide, in which is exposed a paystreak of 6 to 21 inches. An open-cut of 10 feet has opened a paystreak of 8 inches. A shaft has been sunk to a depth of 40 feet, showing ore all the way from 6 to 20 inches wide. A drift has been driven from the bottom of this shaft cutting through 21 inches of pay ore. From this drift a winze has been sunk for 15 feet showing a continuous body of ore. Several test shipments were made from the property, giving results as follows:

586 lbs. from shaft, values \$155 per ton.
2000 " " " " " 140
1800 " " drift " " 137.50

A considerable amount of ore is on the dump awaiting shipment.

No. 2 vein is the same width as No. 1 and runs parallel with it, and is opened up by a ten foot open cut exposing a paystreak of 6 inches, which assays 200 ozs. per ton. No. 3 vein is 5 feet wide, and bedded in graphite, similar to the Silver Cup. The ledge has been stripped for 30 feet, showing pay ore from 8 to 24 inches in width.

It Passes Second Reading.

GOVERNMENT SCHOOL BILL PASSES INTO COMMITTEE AT VICTORIA BY 23 TO 17.

[Special to the Review.]

Victoria, March 7.—The second reading of the School Act passed by a vote of 23 to 17.

Hon. F. J. Fulton, Minister of Education, gave the house a clear and concise exposition of the proposed Act. He pointed out that the estimates for roads, trails and bridges amounted to \$248,900.00, or a decrease of nearly 2½ times, while in education it was over \$448,000.00 a large increase.

John Oliver (Delta), who has been holding anti-tax meetings throughout his constituency, bitterly opposed the bill and advocated borrowing or raising money by direct taxation.

Munro (Chilliwack) and Murphy (Cariboo) both spoke along the same lines, advocating the same principle.

W. J. Bowser (Vancouver) ably supported the bill, pointing out that the constituencies of the above advocates of direct taxation had cost the government last year for education alone \$69,000.00, while the total taxes paid in by them was only \$23,000.00, the expenditure not including building or maintenance. He also showed that the per capita wealth of these districts was greater than in any other part of the country. Mr. Bowser also read a speech made by the hon. member for Delta, where he opposed the bill of 1901, which he now upholds just as bitterly as he is opposing the present one.

Mr. Ianis (Alberni) also advocated the principle of direct taxation. The debate on the part of the opposition assumed the nature of

obstruction, and the more they talked their weakness became more apparent. It was laughable to hear the members of a political party who a few weeks ago were rending the air with their denunciations of the government for an increased taxation now urging the system of more borrowing or direct taxation.

An unpleasant incident in connection with the debate on this bill occurred on Thursday. "Sixpence from Saanich" was speaking against the measure, and after roundly abusing the government, suddenly pointed a denunciatory finger at them, and exclaimed in dramatic accents, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

Then he sat down—without applause. Even the Opposition could not stomach so rank a piece of blasphemy. The incident is merely mentioned here as a specimen of Liberal oratory in the mouths of the more "advanced thinkers" of that party.

THE MAN IN THE GALLERY.

It is feared by many, however, that "his nibs" might possibly contract the polygamous habit and ally himself to too many side partners. He says he has every confidence in himself, and promises to let the REVIEW know when Mrs. Duke II. is an established fact.

Placer Operations Begin.

W. N. Dunphy, who has charge of the placer workings is busy getting the flume cleared of ice. If the weather holds mild there will be a clean-up next week. So far the clean-ups that have been made have proved very satisfactory to the company.

It is expected that the officers and principal men of the company will be in next month. We believe that they have a good paying proposition ahead of them. The gold is there, and it is just a matter of handling it right to secure good returns.

A. Fleishman, traveling jeweler and pork-snyist, was in this week selling cheap jewellery at Shyllock prices. He is one of the boys who comes in and has one, and another one, and then another one, and one on us. This one is on him.

The Allis-Chambers Co., one of the most reliable machinery firms of the U.S., are opening a branch at Nelson.

A large number of the boys are down from the Silver Cup and 5-Mile. In consequence the town has been pretty lively during the week.

Trades Council Reorganized.

CITY MEN MEET TO ELECT OFFICERS AND DISCUSS MATTERS OF GREAT IMPORTANCE.

Imbued with a spirit of progressiveness a thoroughly representative gathering of citizens and tradesmen met in the Review building this evening to rejuvenate the almost defunct Trades Committee, and after open discussion it was unanimously decided to reorganize that body and at the same time work along such lines as would be in harmony with recognized boards of trade in the nearest cities.

The officials of the new Council were then nominated, and elections were as follows: President, J. A. Griffiths; Vice-President, T. B. Baker; Sec.-treasurer, Newman Taylor.

Matters of direct importance were then dealt with, among others the transportation problem. Saw-mill difficulty, and incorporation were discussed at length, and resolutions were adopted.

It was agreed that the membership fee be \$5 a year, payable half yearly.

The Council adjourned until Monday, March 20th. Full report of to-night's meeting will appear next week.

A Deal on G. N. Mountain.

ROSSLAND PARTIES AFTER A WELL-KNOWN GROUP OF PARTIALLY DEVELOPED PROPERTIES.

Rossland parties are after a bond on the St. Elmo, Blue Bell, and True Fissure claims on the Great Northern hill. The proposition made to the owners is for a short bond, work to be started at once, and it is altogether probable that their offer will be accepted.

The showings on the property are excellent, and with development ought to prove out winners. On the St. Elmo 14 inches of clean and 3 to 4 ft. of concentrating ore is exposed, giving good values. About 135 feet of tunneling has been done.

On the Blue Bell a tunnel has been driven for 186 feet, for which cross-cuts have been made for 33 and 70 feet, cutting through 4 to 5 feet of concentrating ore giving average values of \$23.50 per ton. On the True Fissure the ore is exposed in two places showing from 4 to 5 feet of concentrates averaging \$30.00 per ton.

The situation of the property is good, and if handled properly should be a big producer.

A UNITED CANADA.

One people, one language, one school, is the only principle in which Canada can expect to take her place among the nations of the world. A house divided against itself cannot stand. We believe in a national system of education—not two, but one—and if by the exigencies of the case during the Federation period the two old provinces of upper and lower Canada agreed on a dual system of education, there is no reason why the principle should be propagated in the new provinces. The immigration department are inviting people of all religions and sects to adopt Canada as their home and settle in the great North-west. Are we to give each sect a school for itself?—one is just as much entitled to it as the other—or are we by a national school system to weld into one harmonious whole all who accept our invitation to become citizens?

MR. SIFTON'S RESIGNATION.

The trouble in the Dominion Cabinet over the school question in the two new provinces has resulted in the resignation of the Hon. Clifford Sifton as Minister of the Interior. British Columbia is entitled to representation in the Cabinet by a minister with portfolio. It is one of the most progressive provinces in the federation, and being a seaboard province, has immense possibilities.

We have capable men representing us in the house, none more so than the member for the Kootenays, Hon. W. A. Gallihier. We do not travel on the same line as the lion, gentleman politically, but this is a matter which should receive the consideration of Grit and Tory alike.

The mineral product of 1904 run close to twenty million dollars, the Kootenay country being the main factor; the products of agriculture for 1904 amounts approximately to ten million; our timber and fisheries industries are also large, and our claim for an active member in the Cabinet should not be disregarded. The Hon. W. A. Gallihier is the man for the job, and he should have it.

A movement is on foot for the organization of a Board of Trade. We believe the move is a good one, and which will help materially any project that may prove beneficial to the district. Unity of purpose among the business men and those interested in the development of the district can accomplish much, and we trust that the organization will be a success.

What will be a big factor in the development of this country is the willingness of the property owner to allow the investor an opportunity of testing their value before paying any great amount. The big tunnel proposition is an instance. In this the claim owners put their property against the investor's money, and if successful they both are large gainers. If they lose they have the satisfaction of knowing that what is lost has been put into good hard work, and that nobody has become rich because of the transaction.

The government is being asked by the associated Boards of Trade to assist in the construction of electric lines throughout the province. The movement is worthy of praise, and should receive due consideration. In mining districts the proposition if carried into effect would do much towards the opening up of districts which are

now partially dormant owing to the lack of transportation. The needs of the Trout Lake and Lardeau divisions require some cheap method of transportation. Electric lines are cheaper and can tap portions of the district where it would be impossible for standard gauge roads to reach. In the Lardeau division a road of this kind could be operated from Goat mountain to deep water on the Arm, which would be of lasting benefit to numerous properties. In the Trout Lake division a road could be opened from 10-Mile to Trout Lake, which would tap several producing properties and allowing numerous others to produce which are at present closed down.

CANCELLATION OF RESERVE.

NOTICE is hereby given that the reservation established in pursuance of the provisions of the "Columbia and Western Railway Subsidy Act 1896," notices of which were published in the British Columbia Gazette and dated 7th May, 1896, and 5th June 1896, respectively, are hereby cancelled.

Business in town is picking up wonderfully, and indications are not lacking of a great spring rush. Preparations are being made for an early opening and a long and active season on the hills.
