THEY SHOULD PASS LAST NIGHT'S PUBLIC MEETING FAVORS THE BYLAWS. Aid. Walker Lucidly Explains the Four Bills—The Ferry, Fire Loan No. 1, Water Works Debiture No. 2, and Electric Light Bylaws.

The pith of the public meeting last night was: Resolved, that after hearing the explanations offered this evening, this meeting is of opinion that the by-laws referred to should be passed by the people on Friday. Carried. There was, of course, some opposition, but the carrying majority was a large one.

Regarding the electric light, \$30,000 had been already expended on it and an additional amount up to \$60,000 was still required, but a considerable amount of this sum would come back to the city.

submitting the contracts for public
works of this kind to public competition
was departed from, and the contract
was let before any outside of the
Council of last year knew anything
about it, and while a portion of the
transaction, even was ignorant of the
transaction. Under these circumstances
we think we were justified in asking
that an enquiry should be instituted to
discover whether the city was getting
anything like value for the money
spent; but this request was denied, and
the ratepayers are left in utter ignorance
of that important point. If this
point should turn out as great a success
as the ferry, we suppose the public will
be expected to be thankful for it!

As to whether the ratepayers should
cast their votes for this Electric bill,
we do not propose to offer an opinion.
But it must be recalled that the
Enabling Bill has placed an
obstruction in the way of further
expenditures of the sort intended by the
bill. What will be the result if this bill is
not at defiance? Will it mean simply no
injunction, more heated friction among
the people, more waste of money in law
suits and more legislative opposition?
The responsibility rests with those who
have been instrumental in furthering the
bill.

The additional \$7,000 wanted for the
ferry boat, we presume, will have to be
granted. A sorry mess has been made
of the ferry business. The Mayor last
night expressed the blundering in this
matter on the ground that the boat had
been injured by the injunction that was
put upon it. It's good to have an excuse,
but it is a thousand pities a half dozen
injunctions had not been put on before
the plans were approved. "The boat had
to run itself, so to speak," said the
Mayor; surely it must have lost its
virility very suddenly, because now it takes
no end of coaxing to get it to waddle
along even with a powerful lot of assistance.

The bylaw to raise \$12,000 for further
equipment for the fire department should
be carried, as undoubtedly it will.
The chemical engine will be of great value,
not only in promptly extinguishing
incipient fires, but in saving property from
destruction by water. It is money well
spent to keep down the danger from fire.

There was some discussion last night
about the present rate of taxation for
municipal purposes generally. But the
point of importance was missed in the
failure to enquire what will be the rate
when \$12,000 has been added to the
present indebtedness of the city—the
sum mentioned being made up by the
debentures involved in the new bylaws
and \$72,000 of debentures already
voted for waterworks purposes but not
yet sold. A portion of the new debt
will, of course, be expended on revenue-
producing works (let us hope, at least
a part of the whole), but until those works
are got under way, and that will not be
for a year or more after a great deal of
the money has been expended, there
will be no revenue. This circumstance
is bound to make next year's rate
extraordinarily heavy, unless a further sum
can be borrowed to meet sinking fund
and interest on these loans.

A glance into the future will show
that the need for further expenditures
will shortly again become urgent.
Notably, we need a sewer system. That
will be a big undertaking and it will
return no revenue.

Mr. TRERRELL'S motion, supported by
the Mayor, at last night's meeting, asking
those present to vote one way or the
other on the bylaws should go tomorrow,
was wrong. For one reason, that stated
by Mr. TRERRELL, the twenty-five or so
ratepayers present were no index of
public feeling; and for another, that
some of those present might desire to
vote for one or more of the bylaws and
oppose the others.
