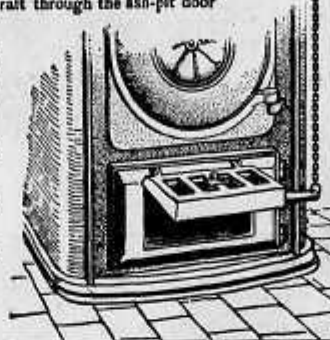

TORONTO, June 16—William White was run over and killed this morning while driving horses through a lane on Gladstone avenue, the animals having taken fright.

MONTREAL, June 16—Hon. senator J. R. Thibault, sheriff of Montreal, died this morning. He was born in 1837 and was called to the senate in 1873. He was a liberal.

OTTAWA, June 16—Fire this morning did damage to the extent of \$20,000 at the corner of Bank and Somerset streets. Six small stores and dwelling houses were destroyed.

BRANTFORD, June 16—F. Douglas Rowley, editor of the Express, will be appointed sheriff of Wright county in succession to the late sheriff Watt, who was also at one time the editor of the Express.

CORAL, June 16—Laughlin Cameron jumped from his window in the second story of a boarding house and plunged into the Wahe river and was drowned. He had been drinking. His home is in Cumberland, near Ottawa.

WINNIPEG, June 16—Contracts were let this morning for the branch lines from Melville to Reglan and from Melville to Yorkton by the G.T.P. Mitchell Bros and Yorkton both the former and Rhye & Hyland the latter. They will both be completed by Aug. 15.

QUEBEC, June 16—The nineteenth annual convention of the Canadian electrical association opened here today. Delegates are present from all parts of the Dominion. They were officially welcomed by mayor Garneau of Quebec. The convention closes Friday evening.

ANNAULIS, June 16—The Halifax board of trade is sending a "good hand" deputation excursion through the province. This year it is from Halifax to Yarmouth and 100 members left on a special train. At each point the excursion is met by the local board of trade.

TORONTO, June 16—Four boys were bitten by vicious dogs in the city yesterday and there is fear of an epidemic of this kind of thing, such as caused considerable excitement in the city last summer. Mayor Oliver says one child is worth all the dogs in the city and that a meeting of the board of control will be called at an early date to pass a bylaw to have all dogs muzzled.

EDMONTON, June 16—Lumbermen are alarmed at the rapid rise of the Saskatchewan. Millions of feet of logs have been lost in the last three years and in spite of frequent petitions the Dominion government refuses to place a breakwater. Five booms now in the river, it is feared, may give way. Last year all broke and a million feet of logs went adrift, three-quarters of which were lost.

Retired Trade Magnate

OMAHA, June 16—Buy C. Barton, former president of the American Smelting and Refining company, and one of the organizers, died at his country home here last night. Barton retired from business several years ago. He was raised in several times a millionaire. For the last two years his mind was affected and his death resulted from this affliction.

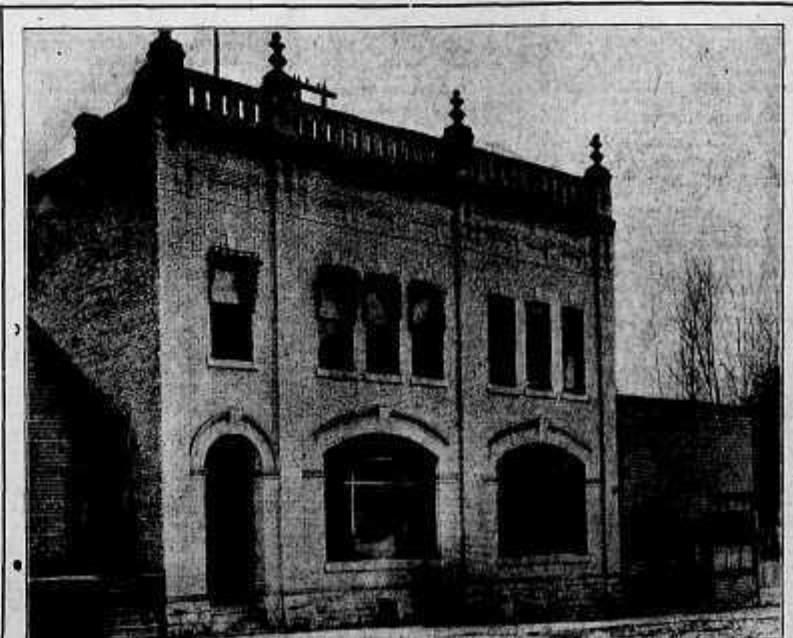

WANT CANADIAN TRADE

GERMAN GOVERNMENT TRIES TO CULTIVATE RELATIONS

FRENCH COMMERCIAL OFFICIAL DISCUSSES SITUATION

PARIS, June 16.—Writing in the Journal des Debats M. Ducasable, government councillor of foreign commerce, says the result of tariff war between Canada and Germany is likely to be aggravated by recent Franco-Canadian conventions in that a German-Canadian association has been formed in Berlin with the object of securing the abolition of the Canadian tariff in return for extension of the continental tariff to Canadian products by counteracting the disastrous effects of the preferential treatment accorded British goods. The German government Ducasable says, is also considering the best plan

of rendering Canadian and German markets more accessible to one another. To this the Canadian government is apparently favorably disposed. The Berlin association has decided to send to Canada a deputation of representative business men. Meanwhile the association is organizing public lectures and publishing pamphlets extolling the excellence of Canadian products and the immense resources of Canada, also pointing out the advantages of the country as a field for German immigration. This propaganda is being carried out in the hope that Canada will display gratitude towards a nation which shows a preference for the produce of their dominion above that of all other nations.

Lynched for Attempt
ARCADIA, Fla., June 16.—An unknown negro was lynched late yesterday for attempted criminal assault on Mrs. P. H. Reed, wife of a prominent citizen of Arcadia. A posse was formed as soon as the news of the attempted

crime spread and within an hour the negro was captured a short distance from the scene of the crime and lynched.

New Doctors' Club
BOSTON, June 16.—The formation of what is believed to be the largest commercial organization in the country was completed yesterday when the old merchants' association, chamber of commerce, board of trade and a number of special business associations united as the new Boston chamber of commerce with a membership to 2400 and an income of \$100,000 a year. Its objects are to promote the commerce, industry and public interests of Boston and New England.

In Small Lake
NEWARK, June 16.—Two men and a dog went out in a small boat on a small lake in the park here last night. The dog returned to shore but the men are dead. Charles Peterson and Wm. Reyer, both laborers about 30 years old, are the victims. The boat was upset and neither could swim.

TOMORROW'S INSPECTION

Tomorrow the 102nd regiment is to
be inspected as a unit by brigadier general
W. D. Otter, the Rossland and
Kaslo companies coming to Nelson to
join the headquarters companies for the
inspection. It is not often that the
regiment has an opportunity of parading
in a body, even for inspection, so
that the event may be termed an un-
usual one. It is also an important one.
General Otter will report on the reg-
iment as he finds it tomorrow and his re-
port will furnish the standard by which
the regiment will be judged by the
authorities at Ottawa. It is therefore
necessary that the very best possible
showing should be made.

Advised by Lt. Rossland and Kaslo
each be depended upon to do his
part and that the companies from these
places will parade practically full
strength. It remains for the Nelson
companies to do their part. The
strength of the local company is about
150 as against about half that num-
ber for the two outside companies com-
bined. If there is anything like a good
turnout of the Nelson members of the
regiment the inspection will be a suc-
cess from the standpoint, at least,
of the number of men on parade.

It can be taken for granted that the
local members of the regiment have
as much interest in their corps and are
as desirous of attending the parade as
are those from Rossland and Kaslo;
otherwise they would not have enlisted.
Whether or not many of the men turn
out, however, depends upon their em-
ployers. If the men are given leave of
absence for part of the afternoon for
this purpose they will be with their
fellow soldiers. If on the other hand
this is refused by their employers they
cannot be.

That any employer of labor in Nelson
would follow to latter course is im-
probable.

CROW'S NEST SERVICE

The suggestion of Mr. Alexander
Macdonald of Winnipeg that the local
board of trade should take some action
in regard to the passenger service on
the Crow's Nest Pass branch is to be
acted upon. This is an important mat-
ter to Nelson from a business stand-
point. Along the Crow's Nest branch
from where it leaves the main line of
the C.P.R. to O'Vurion Junction there
are three trains daily each way. Be-
tween Carson Junction and Kootenay
landing there is only one train daily
each way and, of course, only one boat
daily between Kootenay Landing and
Nelson. This gives Nelson only one
connection each way daily with points
along the Crow.

How this works against Nelson's in-
terests lies in the fact that there are
two trains each way daily between all
Crow's Nest points east of Carson Junc-
tion and Spokane. This makes it easier
for people in the towns along the Crow
in British Columbia to transact busi-
ness in Spokane than in Nelson. The
result of this is obvious to any busi-
ness man in the city.
Anything that may be done by the

board of trade toward securing bet-
ter train service between Crow's Nest
Pass points and Nelson should have
the whole-hearted support of the people
of this city and also of the district gen-
erally for this is a matter that not only
affects local merchants and business-
men generally, but also the fruit grow-
ers for an additional boat and train
would afford them still better facili-
ties for getting their product to the
market in the east. The matter is an
especially important one and one that
deserves the very best efforts of the
board of trade to bring about a change.

QUESTION OF ADVERTISING

The board of trade is moving in the
right direction in taking up the ques-
tion of advertising the resources of
Nelson and the surrounding district
and any action which it may take along
these lines should meet with general
out the absolute necessity for some-
thing of this nature being done, it
this part of the Kootenay is to be
kept to the front and is to get its
share of the immigration which is now
directed toward British Columbia.
Other parts of the province are mak-
ing known their resources and possibi-
ties in places where the dissemination
of such knowledge is likely to do the
most good and Nelson and the district
adjacent must do the same.

The publicity work done in other
years has brought good results and the
benefit of it is still being felt. What
has been accomplished by past adver-
tising shows us nothing else could the
necessity for further work of a similar
character. Advertising to be success-
ful must not only be directed along
the proper lines but must also be per-
sistent.

It will be something accomplished for
Nelson and district if at this evening's
meeting of the board of trade the ini-
tial steps are taken of a movement
which will result in placing of Nelson's
advantages as an industrial and distribu-
tion centre and of the district's pos-
sibilities in fruit growing, mining, etc.,
properly before the outside world. Any
action that the board of trade takes,
however, will come to naught unless it
has the complete support of the people
of the city and district. This
should be forthcoming if the people are
alive to their own interests.

WOMEN'S COUNCIL MEET

INTERNATIONAL GATHERING IN TORONTO TODAY

REPRESENTATIVES FROM MANY NATIONS AND RACES

TORONTO, June 16—Meetings of standing committees and the transaction of preliminary business occupied the quinquennial conference of the international council of women today. This evening there will be a meeting in the Convention hall of Toronto university, where each of the national presidents will give greetings from her country. The international executive will meet tomorrow and the mayor and delegates at the city hall in the evening. The international council will meet on June 18, 19, 21, and 22 and on June 24, 25, 26, 27 and 28 there will be an international congress. This will be held in the university buildings. The congress will meet in nine sessions—

those of education, philanthropy, industries, health and physical training, literature, art, social work and women reform, professions for women and laws that concern women and children. The program for all these meetings are extremely interesting and delegates from many different countries will take part in them. The countess of Aberdeen will be one of the speakers in the public health session.

The Ontario government will take the delegates to Guelph on June 22 to visit the Macdonald institute and there will be an excursion to Niagara on June 23. On June 19 they will go to Hamilton to be the guests of Mrs. Sanford, one of the vice-presidents of the Canadian council, and another afternoon they will be entertained by Lady Edgar, another vice-president, at her home at Lake Simcoe.

Delegates have been accredited from Great Britain, Germany, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, New South Wales, Tasmania, Victoria, South Australia, France, Italy, Queensland, Austria, Norway, Belgium, Greece, Smyrna and the United States. The governments of Denmark and Sweden are paying the expenses of their delegates.

TROUBLE ON THE BANKS

VIOLENT ENCOUNTERS TAKING PLACE DAILY

FRENCH STEAM TRAWLERS ARE CAUSE OF TROUBLE

NORTH SYDNEY, June 16—Trouble which has been brewing between the French steam trawlers operating on Quebec banks and American, French and Newfoundland fishermen, has come to a head and a clash has taken place on Quebec banks.

Vessels which arrived here today from Quebec tell of a sensational encounter between the crews of the American fishing schooner Senator Gardner and one of the French steam trawlers. The fishing vessel had set lines when a large French trawler approached and carried away part of the Gardner's fishing gear. The captain of the Gardner loaded a rifle using lead slugs made out of mackerel flaps out in pieces and fired point blank at the trawler which hurriedly moved on.

The same day a French fishing vessel lost nearly all of her trawls and lines by another steam trawler. The captain of the schooner boarded the trawler which had done the damage and demanded that damages be paid for the loss sustained. No heed was paid and he was forcibly ejected from the steamer's deck.

On the following day a Newfoundland schooner had all of her fishing gear carried away by a steam trawler and was forced to leave the banks and lose several days in order to obtain a new outfit.

It is the opinion of many that violent encounters will take place during summer months, as the steam trawlers threaten to seriously interfere with the handling of fishing on the banks.
