

Troops Need Your Money to Speed Victory Says Bank Head

WINNIPEG, Oct. 12 (CP) — Canada's Fifth Victory Loan gives Canadians "an opportunity to show that they can speed the victory as well as they backed the attack," Graham Ford Towers, Governor of the Bank of Canada and Chairman of the National War Finance Committee, told an audience here today.

He said the victory is not yet won, not even around the corner, but on the way.

Mr. Towers spoke in the interests of the \$1,300,000,000 Fifth Victory Loan, for which a three-week campaign opens Oct. 18, before a noon meeting of the Canadian Club and Winnipeg Board of Trade.

The plain facts of the situation, he said, are:

1. Canada needs your money—has to have your money—to win a war that isn't news to you because it has been going on for more than four years.
2. Victory Bonds, for you personally, are a good investment.
3. It's your duty to lend your money to back up the men who are giving their lives.

He admitted that some might say this was "the same old stuff." And "that is what it is," he added, but often it was necessary to have reminders of things already known.

"If it sometimes seems that the shouting about it is a little annoying, a little loud, remember that

not the loudest shout can wake the dead who went out with the fighting forces."

In the early stages of the war Canadian effort and willingness to accept restrictions and regulations had been spurred on in part by the stimulus of fear of defeat and disaster.

"We must replace that fear stimulus by something better. We must replace it by the concept of a Canada which has the intestinal fortitude to finish this war on the home front just as unitedly and effectively as our men in the forces will finish it in the front line."

Hitler's remaining hope was that disunity—not only within the United Nations but within each nation—would weaken the Allied strength.

"And what is more likely to foment this disunity and the war weariness and slackening of effort which accompany it, than irritation over personal inconveniences or restraint or growing concentration on the gains to be won by individuals and groups as distinct from the community as a whole."

"... when peace comes we need to have in our minds an image of post-war Canada which will be as daring, as united and as unquarrelsome as the fighting Canada of the war period."

Mr. Towers said the resources are lying ready to oversubscribe the Fifth Victory Loan. The only test was the individual sense of responsibility of the people.

Nazis Threaten To Destroy All Yugoslav Cities

LONDON, Oct. 12 (AP)—Germany has threatened to destroy every city, town and village in Yugoslavia and to shoot an unspecified number of hostages in an effort to force partisans now waging war against the Reich to lay down their arms, a communique of the Yugoslav Liberation Army, broadcast by the Free Yugoslav radio, declared today.

The communique said German planes were dropping leaflets over Yugoslav cities "in which they threaten the towns with complete destruction and the shooting of hostages." It was issued after the Yugoslavs had announced the capture of the important island of Cerkov, commanding the entrance to the Gulf of Flume, and added:

"The German Luftwaffe is continuing its ruthless attacks on unprotected towns and villages."

"The town of Novo-Meste has

been completely destroyed. Not a living soul remains."

Novo-Meste is 40 miles West of Zagreb, and 10 miles East of Zamerik, last Ustashi stronghold between Trieste and Zagreb, the capture of which was announced in the Yugoslav war bulletin.

The German threat of extermination came as the patriots listed a series of victories which included the capture of Siankamen, a town on the Danube near the city of Novisad and approximately 50 miles Northwest of Belgrade.

Two Australians Killed in Crash at Coast

VICTORIA, Oct. 12 (CP) — Two Australians are dead and two Englishmen are missing after the crash of an R.A.F. aircraft in the sea off Sidney Island Saturday.

Dead: Sgt. F. K. Maiden, Cranbrook, N.S.W., and Sgt. N. O. Weekes, N.S.W.

Missing: Po. A. L. Warner, Thornton Heath, Surrey, and Po. K. Shaw, Redcar, Yorkshire.

The crash was witnessed by hundreds of passengers aboard the Princess Alice, Victoria bound from Vancouver.

ASK ALBERTANS TO USE ONLY 4 TONS OF COAL

EDMONTON, Oct. 12 (CP)—Mr. Justice C. C. McLaurin of Calgary, Coal Administrator for Alberta, said here today that Alberta residents will be asked to use four tons of coal instead of the normal five tons burned during winter months. Justice McLaurin will study the coal and wood situation in Edmonton and district.

The overall supply situation still is unchanged and consumers will not be able to pick their coal but must take supplies from the nearest production point, he said.

20 Deaths During Holiday Weekend

TORONTO, Oct. 12 (CP) — There were 20 fatalities in Eastern Canada during the Thanksgiving weekend. Traffic accidents accounted for nine deaths, while drownings, pedestrian and train collisions and hunting accidents each were responsible for two fatalities.

In Toronto a suicide and an asphyxiation were recorded, one man burned to death, and another died in hospital from injuries suffered in a fist fight. A Nova Scotian man died from injuries suffered when pinned under an automobile.

Film Studio Will Choose Prize Book

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 12 (AP) — Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio today reported that beginning next Spring it will annually choose the book it considers the best of the year and offer the author \$100,000 and the publisher \$25,000 for the film rights. Both fiction and non-fiction will be eligible. The studio will also pay 20 cents to the author for each copy sold above 50,000 and up to 250,000.

STAY GRANTED IN MANSLAUGHTER CASE

PRINCE GEORGE, B. C., Oct. 12 (CP)—A stay in proceedings has been granted in the case of David D. Brown, 16, of Fort St. John, charged with manslaughter in connection with the fatal shooting of Jacob Epp, a bullet from Brown's rifle over-shot a target and hit Epp in the head.

Union Thinks C.C.F. Should Change Policy

VANCOUVER, Oct. 12 (CP) — The C.C.F. Provincial Executive should take steps to provide a democratic basis for trade union affiliation, District Council No. 1, International Woodworkers of America, decided Sunday in rejecting terms of affiliation offered by the C.C.F.

The affiliation proposal of the C.C.F. contained in a letter from the Provincial Executive, included:

1. Dues of affiliation unions should be five cents per member per month.
2. Delegates from such affiliation bodies should be limited to 10 in

number, and should be C.C.F. members for at least three months.

3. That the affiliating body should accept the principles and policies of the C.C.F. and agree to abide by its constitution and by-laws.

"If the C.C.F. is conscious of needing a labor base, it should get busy and democratize its terms so that it can become a real labor-farmer federation that would sweep all reaction aside," said Harold Pritchett, Chairman of the District Council.

"We'll get no better terms than these, because the C.C.F. is a political party; the same as the Liberals and Conservatives; and they know any democratic affiliation would swamp their own membership in clubs and riding associations," said a Vancouver Island delegate.

According to the police report, Oram was mistaken by Broder for a deer.

Less Strain... Your Favorite Exercise May Be a Dud

There are a lot of exercises you can skip to advantage. Bending straight over to touch your toes is one of them. Often that is a sheer triumph of will power over avoirdupois, but it doesn't do much for you.

You can sit down on the floor and get much more out of your bending, provided you give it a stretch and the right twist. Try this one on your rampant waistline: Sit on the floor, legs straight out and wide apart, arms straight out at sides in line with the shoulders. First, pull yourself slim through the middle, then twist sharply at the waist, bend forward at the hips, and touch left fingers to right toes. Start over and bend to the other side. Now you've got something!

Stay as you are, but stretch arms overhead—without hunching the shoulders—and pull slim through the middle. Twist to the side and bend to touch both hands to outstretched right foot. Sit up, stretch, and bend to left. In both exercises, keep pulling slim through the middle as you twist and bend. That isn't easy, but it is easier to do these exercises right than to stand up



Not everybody can bend right over and touch her toes. But it's no prize exercise. Side-bending, as illustrated by Helen O'Connell, the

and bend sideways, one exercise will do for each at the beginning.

Another exercise you can lose out of your program is the one in which you lie on your back on the floor and raise your legs, knees straight. That is supposed to be very strengthening for your muscular glands. But for the first eight or 10 inches, the muscles of the lower back are the ones that do most of the work. You will avoid strain and get better results by starting with feet elevated eight to 10 inches, then raising legs, knees straight, to right angles with the trunk. Try this with one leg at a time, then with both. Another good exercise from that position is to fling one arm up on the floor overhead as you bring the leg on the same side to right angle. That increases the stretch through the waist. Alternate sides and repeat 10 counts. In each exercise, try to remember to keep the small of the back pressed down against the floor.

An exercise most women should avoid is backward bending. It's all right for anyone with a very strong back, but, in general, it is apt to increase the tendency to sway back. You can't go wrong on the stretching, twisting and sideward bending already described. But if you want a backward bend in your set, do this: Lie face downward on a good saddle table or flat topped desk with legs straight down and feet on floor so that trunk and hips form a right angle. Stretch arms straight out at sides on table in line with shoulders. Now, slowly raise arms, trunk and head up and back, hold, lower. That does things for your posture and firms your abdominal girdle without letting your back sway in.

Scrambled Eggs

ONIONS CHILINAISE
2 pounds onions, 1/2 cup real mayonnaise, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup water, 1/4 teaspoon chili powder.
Use either white or yellow onions. Peel onions, cover with boiling salted water and boil, uncovered, 20 to 30 minutes. Combine mayonnaise and salt; place over hot water; gradually add water, stirring after each addition until smooth. Cook over boiling water 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Do not overcook. Blend a little sauce with chili powder and add to remaining sauce. Drain onions and serve with the Chilled.

NUTTY TURNIPS
2 pounds white or yellow turnips (rutabagas), 4 tablespoons fat, 1/2 cup nuts, chopped.
Scrub turnips, quarter, pare, cube. Cover with boiling salted water, and boil uncovered about 30 minutes or until tender; drain. Melt fat, add chopped nuts and heat 5 minutes. Combine with diced turnips.

GRAHAM CRACKER CAKES
2 tablespoons butter, 1-3 cup of shortening, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 cup sugar, 3 eggs, 2-3 cup sifted flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-3 cups graham cracker crumbs, 1/2 cup milk.
Blend butter, shortening, salt and vanilla; add sugar gradually, blending well. Add egg yolks, beating well. Sift flour, sift again after measuring, with baking powder and mix with graham cracker crumbs. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk, to egg mixture. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in 8-inch greased layer cake pan 25 minutes in moderate (375 degrees F.) oven.

Sarcasm... Public Ridicule Hurts the Child

"Sometime in your column," writes a mother and President of a P.T.A., "I would appreciate your writing on 'Teachers Using Ridicule' as a means of punishing students. By this I mean public ridicule which embarrasses students before their schoolmates and associates. I have found that in my home children resent being humiliated before any other members of the family, so when I must reprimand them I try to talk it over with them when we are alone. Is this proper? Does public ridicule cause the child or youth to feel inferior?"

No practice at home or school, perhaps, can do the child or youth so much harm as ridicule, especially by older persons or by older children in the presence and with the approval of adults. From the youth's point of view, ridicule is the least forgivable sin of a teacher, and the youth may be as much disturbed by ridicule when a classmate is a victim as when he himself is.

TEACHER'S PROBLEM

Now and then a teacher in a conference or forum will defend ridicule as a means of discipline. She says that they have few means of control at school allowed them and that some smart alecks can be easily tamed by ridicule.

We must have some sympathy with the teacher. She has to put up with all too much disrespect and ill conduct by a few students, who have not learned at home, regard for authority or respect for the rights of others.

Despite this fact, I don't believe that ridicule and sarcasm are desirable means of discipline. Even with the smart-aleck, the teacher usually can get farther by dealing with the disturbing student privately than by trying to humiliate him before his fellows.

FEW DEFEND SARCASTIC

Nevertheless, not many teachers will defend sarcasm. Few use it on purpose. Rather it is employed about as unconsciously as the wagging of a dog's tail and for a similar reason. Human nature prompts it. It gives a feeling of superiority to the teacher and the more the victim suf-

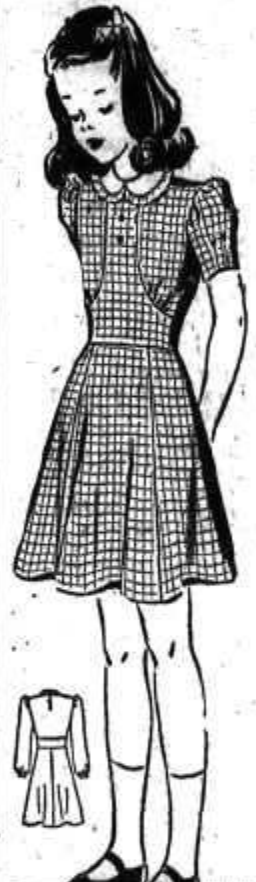

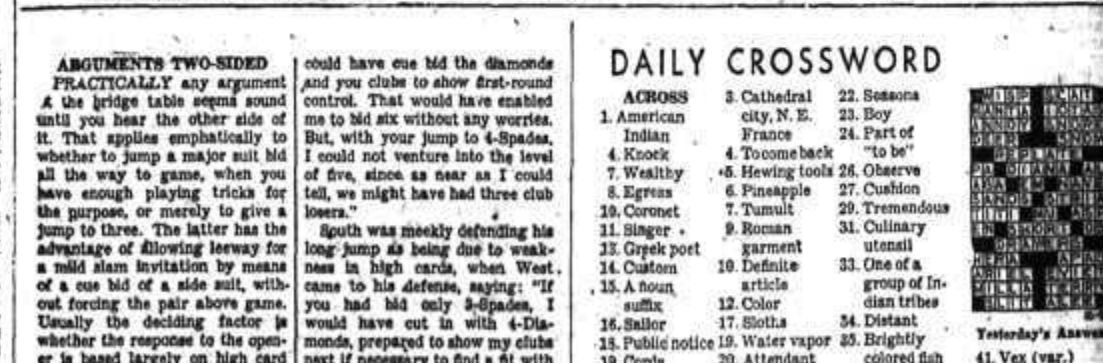
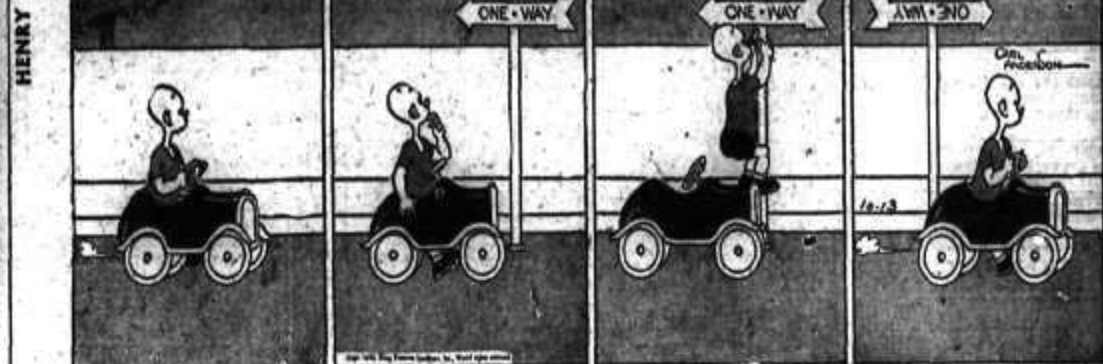
