BRONCHO BUSTERS

HAVE CHANCE OF PICK OF BRONCHOS AT VICTORIA.

R. M. Palmer Enthusiastic About Crops In Nicola Valley—Pleased with The Fruit Growing Possibilities Of This Section.

To anyone who fancies that riding a bucking broncho is one of the easiest things in the world, the British Columbia Agricultural association holds out the tempting offer of the ownership of any of the bronchos which will be used in the cowboy roughriding contest at the coming exhibition on from September 24 to 28 says the Victoria Colonist, for simply remaining on the horse's back for a period of ten minutes any afternoon during the fair. J. E. Smart, Secretary of the fair association, on this week announced that the directors had decided to make a present of a broncho to any person who succeeded in riding one. Ten minutes is a short time and the offer seems tempting enough to bring out a host of candidates.

Judging from the remarks of a great many of the spectators at last year's fair the cowboys engaged in the roughriding contest were not the only ones willing to take part in the competition, and this year the association has decided to permit any person so inclined to take a whirl at the gentle art of breaking cow ponies not an easy case. It is open to all and the additional inducement of ownership of a broncho is offered along with the cash prizes. Here is a chance for any young man who thinks he can ride a horse.

After this week there will be plenty of bronchos at the track in a corral there and anyone who has an ambition to enter the roughriding contest can have the use of the horses for practice on applying to the secretary. A carload of bronchos will be shipped this week from Douglas Lake ranch in charge of Oliver Walker. The bronchos have all been running wild on the ranges and after a short rest here will be in great trim for the roughriding test.

Among the bronchos which will come here will be Chilliwack Cherub, the prize broncho of last year. Chilliwack Cherub, is in splendid trim according to reports from the ranch and is more fiery than ever. He has been running loose on the range ever since last year and the man who rides him this year will have to be a past master in the art. Writing from the ranch Oliver Walker tells a story of a young Scotchman who was employed there and who essayed to subdue any horse in the Old Country, and in fact, was a pretty fair sort of a rider. He was given a mount on the horse but his tenure of office in the saddle was very brief. Chilliwack Cherub snorted when he felt the rider and as soon as turned loose reared straight up in the air and then like a flash buried his nose in the gravel. The Scotchman executed a graceful parabola through the atmosphere and hit the turf with a thud. He came to three days later and may get over it some day, but he admits himself that he will never forget it.

Superintendent of Horticulture.

R. M. Palmer, provincial superintendent of horticulture has returned says the Colonist from a tour of the districts of the mainland devoted to fruit growing.

The crops in Nicola Valley and Grand Forks districts are very good Mr. Palmer states.

Haymaking has been delayed by the

unusual amount of rain. The rainfall in the interior has been unusually heavy this summer and consequently the ranges are green and the stock generally is in good condition. At Vernon three and a half inches of rain has fallen during August.

Mr. Palmer states that it is probable that a number of the large holdings throughout these districts will be subdivided into smaller sections and devoted to mixed farming. This has been made possible by the C. P. R. branch line through the Nicola valley.

While in the Nicola Valley Mr. Palmer visited the coal mines operated by the Nicola Coal and Coke company and the Diamond Vale Coal and Coke company. People of the district are very enthusiastic regarding the development of these. The work so far done on them has produced splendid results. In the tunnel of the Nicola Coal and Coke company Mr. Palmer saw a seam of coal eighteen and a half feet wide, in addition to smaller seams.

In the Nicola valley more attention is being paid to fruit growing and it has been demonstrated that the district is well suited to the growing of the harder varieties of apples and pears.

The bog lands along the river are particularly suited to the growing of small fruits which ripen two weeks later than in other sections which is an additional advantage in marketing upon the prairies. This is due to the high elevation of the district.

Lauder—Wardell.

The marriage took place at Trinity Parish Church, Seattle, Wash., on Thursday afternoon, August 29th. Frederick Dixon Lauder, son of J. D. Lauder of Kamloops and Miss Alice Wardell, sister of Mrs. Ric. A. Fraser of Nicola.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. H. H. Gowen and Miss Bessie Douglas was bridesmaid, G. B. Montanye assisting as best man.

The newly married couple arrived in Nicola last Friday evening and are receiving the congratulations of their many friends throughout the valley.

Eighty-Four Victims.

The anchor pier on the Levis side of the Quebec bridge gave way last Thursday and went down into the river at 5.30 p.m., carrying with it over 800 feet of structure. At the time the bridge was covered with workmen, and 84 of these are believed to have perished. So far 16 bodies have been recovered.

At the moment of collapse a locomotive and nine loads of iron had gone on the bridge. They went down with the wreck. It is suspected that some hidden defect had developed. The men killed were mostly Americans in the employ of the Phoenix Bridge Co., of Phoenixville, Pa.

Death of Well Known Actor.

Richard Mansfield perhaps the best known actor on the American stage died at his residence in New London, Conn., U. S. A. on Friday of last week. The deceased had been ill for some time but his condition was not looked upon as being critical, although two doctors were in attendance. His death will leave a gap in the American stage that will hardly be filled for some time, and theatre goers will regret the passing away of a most brilliant actor.

A fine of \$300 was imposed by Magistrate Alexander at Vancouver last week on a Japanese named Okoko, convicted by dynamiting fish in the Capilano river. The money was subscribed in a few minutes by friends of the prisoner.

PRODUCE EXHIBIT

NICOLA SHOULD BE REPRESENTED AT THE FALL FAIRS.

Necessary For Prompt Action—Representative Committee Might be Formed to Carry Matter Through—Would Attract Visitors.

The season of the annual fall fairs is now very close at hand, and it is surely possible for the Nicola Valley to be represented in some way at one or more of the important of these. At one time the district supported an annual fair which was well supported and produce from all parts of the district was on exhibition, and it is surely not too much to expect that now when very nearly every farmer in the district grows produce either for sale or for his own use, that a representative exhibit can be brought together and show to the many attending these fairs what can be done in the way of growing produce in this district. Of the many places that are holding annual exhibitions, perhaps the two most suitable would be Victoria and New Westminster, as these places are visited by the class of people who would be most likely to follow up their enquiries regarding an exhibit, by a visit to the district in which the produce was grown. In the matter of farm and vegetable products the Nicola Valley needs not to yield the palm to any other district in the province, and an exhibit of fruit representative of what is being successfully grown in many of the local orchards would go far to awaken and stimulate interest on behalf of our own district and help to prove that in their claims the residents of this section are not a bit too enthusiastic as regards its fruit growing possibilities. This matter ought to be taken up at once, and a representative committee formed to carry the matter through to a final issue. There is not too much time, still there is time to make all necessary arrangements, and it is to be hoped that those interested will at once take the matter up, and that when the fairs are open not the least interesting of the many exhibits will be that of the Nicola Valley.

Local Train During Winter.

A local train from Vancouver to Kamloops may be placed in operation by the C. P. R. during the coming winter when the double transcontinental express service is discontinued. The service would be daily each way.

Mr. Robert Kerr, passenger traffic manager of the C. P. R., stated that while no decision had been reached in respect to discontinuing the double daily express service between Vancouver and Montreal he rather thought that when business fell off in the fall one train might be taken off. As was the case last winter the double service would only be effective as far west as Calgary.

C. P. R. Enterprise.

The enterprise of the Canadian Pacific Railway has again been demonstrated in the letting of the million dollar contract to the Macdonell, Gzowski Company of Vancouver, engineers and contractors, for the alteration of the grade of the main line of the road at Field.

The 4 1-2 per cent. grade will be reduced to about half that amount and

will mean one of the greatest undertakings in the history of the Canadian road. It involves eight miles of track over the same distance now covered by four miles of track which is now accomplished by a series of loops and rock tunnels. At least a mile and a half of tunnels will be needed—about three quarters of a mile on either side of the Kicking Horse River. Two immense bridges will also be erected in the construction.

It is the intention of the company to go ahead with the new work as soon as they can get men on the spot. The lowest estimate fixes the time which will be required before the work is completed at eighteen months and then with continuous work.

The work is the most ambitious ever attempted by the C. P. R. and to overcome the present heavy grade a cool million dollars will be the outlay. The fact, too, that the contract has been let to the Macdonell, Gzowski Company is a feather in the cap of the well known firm of contractors showing the utmost confidence reposed in them by the transcontinental road.

Dr. Kerr, who had charge of the medical work with the Macdonell, Gzowski Company during the construction of the Nicola branch, will also have charge of this department in the work at Field.

Rare Mineral Found.

A new and rare mineral has been found at several mines in the Cobalt belt, known as stromeyerite, an amalgam of the sulphides of silver and copper. One mine where it has been found is the Cochrane, adjoining the Temiskaming. The vein is said to be fourteen inches wide. The pure metal has previously been found in South America, Siberia and Bohemia. Cobalt's find is the first in North America. The pure mineral contains 53 per cent. of silver and will run over 15,000 ounces to the ton. It is a black heavy metal.

Biological Station.

It is understood that in addition to the land already purchased at Departure Bay for the Biological station Lieutenant-Governor Dunsmuir has granted a further tract of land to facilitate the work of the station. The new station will become a great scientific centre, not only for Canada, but for the whole scientific world.

Cabinet Filled Up.

The Hon. William Pugsley was sworn in last week as minister of the public works in place of the Hon. C. S. Hyman, and Hon. George P. Graham minister of railways and canals in place of Hon. H. R. Emmerson.

POLO CLUBS PLAY

POSTPONEMENT OF HORSE RACES DUE TO WEATHER.

Quilchena Put Up Strong Fight But Visiting Team Too Strong—Kamloops Win Thorpe Oup—Horse Races Will Be Held Tomorrow.

The unsettled weather on Monday was responsible for the rather poor attendance at the sports at Quilchena.

The rain of the previous night had rendered the polo ground very wet and slippery but it was decided to proceed with the game as arranged. The Grand Prairie team were unable to be present and the match was therefore between Kamloops and Quilchena. The following were the respective teams:—Kamloops, W. L. Fernie (capt.), J. Hamilton, F. E. Young and S. W. Batten. Quilchena, G. A. Lafferty (capt.), J. Guichon Jr., W. Hawkins and J. F. P. Nash. G. Lodwick acted as referee and Bradshaw Brown as timekeeper. For the first two quarters of the game the home team held its own fairly well but lost ground in the two last quarters of the game. Of the visiting team Fernie played the fastest game of the whole field, and on the home side Guichon and Nash were conspicuous by their hard hitting. Considering the state of the ground, the wonder was that more shots were not missed and it says much for the players generally that the ball was kept so frequently on the go. The game resulted in a win for Kamloops by 3 to 1, nor need the home team feel disgraced by the result as owing to the slippery nature of the ground there was a big element of luck in the game, and it was to the team with the most experienced ponies that the game would go. The visiting team played for all they were worth and deserve their win, while the home team are to be commended on the plucky fight they put up to defend their cup.

After the game the onlookers returned to the hotel where the R. M. R. band gave some excellent selections which were thoroughly appreciated by an attentive audience. At two o'clock the rain which had been threatening all day started to pour down, and it was decided to postpone the races for a short time. At three o'clock there being no sign of a let up the committee after a visit to the track reluctantly decided that the horse races could not be run off that day, and at a meeting later in the afternoon at which those interested in the horses entered for the various events were present it was unanimously decided to postpone the races till Saturday (tomorrow) at two o'clock. It was unfortunate that this postponement had to be made, but the state of the track rendered this decision a wise and necessary one. There is therefore some good racing to be witnessed at the Quilchena track tomorrow and it is hoped that there will be a good attendance, as the polo club depend to a great extent on the gate receipts to make up the generous purses they have put up for competition, and this young and enterprising club deserve the support of all lovers of sport for the way in which they have tried to foster and sustain an interest in the sport of kings.

A Canadian Pacific Railway special train carrying over 300 passengers bound for the Toronto Exposition, was wrecked Tuesday at Horseshoe Falls, nine miles south of Orangeville. Eleven were killed and twenty-six injured.

BORDEN'S ADDRESS.

The salient features of the address at Halifax the other day by which Hon. R. L. Borden the leader of the opposition inaugurated his Canadian tour are well worthy of consideration. As parts of the policy of the Liberal-Conservative Party he submitted that the following articles were almost essential.

More effective provision to punish bribery and fraud at elections, to insure thorough publicity as to expenditure by political organizations, to prevent the accumulation of campaign funds for campaign purposes and to prohibit contributions thereto by corporations, contractors, and promoters, to expediate the hearing of election petitions and to prevent collusive arrangements for the withdrawal or compromise thereof, to provide for a thorough investigation of corrupt practices, and if necessary to appoint an independent prosecution officer charged with that duty, to simplify the procedure thereof, and to enforce the laws so amended.

A thorough and complete reformation of the laws relating to the civil service so that future appointments shall be made by an independent commission acting upon the report of examiners after competitive examination.

Such reform in the mode of selecting future members of the senate as well as make that chamber a more useful and representative legislative body.

A more careful consideration of the sources from which immigration shall be sought, a more rigid inspection of immigrants, and the abolition of the bonus system except under very special circumstances, and for the purpose of obtaining particularly desirable classes of settlers.

The management and development of the public domain (in which are to be included great national franchises) for the public benefit and under such conditions that a reasonable proportion of the increment of value arising therefrom shall inure to the people.

The operation and management of our government railways by an independent commission free from partizan control or interference.

The development and improvement of our national waterways, the equipment of national ports, the improvement of transportation facilities and consequent reduction of freight rates between the place of production and the market, whether at home or abroad, and the establishment of a thorough system of cold storage.

The reorganization of the present railway commission as a public utilities commission with wider powers and more extended jurisdiction so as to establish thorough and effective control over all corporations owning or operating public utilities, or invested with franchises of a national character.

The establishment after due investigation of a system of national telegraphs and telephones, under conditions which shall be just to

capital already invested in these enterprises.

The improvement of existing postal facilities, especially in newly-developed portions of the country, and the inauguration, after proper inquiry as to cost, of a system of free rural mail delivery.

A fiscal policy which will promote the production within Canada of all useful articles and commodities that can be advantageously produced or manufactured from, or by means of our natural resources, having due regard to the interests of the consumer, as well as to the just claims of our wage-earning population.

The promotion by negotiation, legislation, and other constitutional means of a system of mutual preferential trade within the Empire.

To restore their public lands to the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan upon fair terms.

The unimpaired maintenance of all powers of self-government which have been conferred upon the provinces of Canada under the constitution.

New Canadian Building in London.

It is proposed to erect a magnificent building at a cost of \$2,000,000 in the Strand, London in which will be concentrated all the offices of the Canadian Government, as well as such provinces as may desire to be represented at the heart of the Empire. Plans of the proposed building are already published and give an excellent idea of the location of the building and its character. The proposed Canadian building will have a frontage of 413 feet of the Strand. The building will tower high above Somerset House which is one of the great landmarks of London. In this building it is proposed that all the various offices of the Canadian Government in London, as well as the offices of the several provincial governments, shall be grouped. There will be in addition a great hall in which a permanent exhibition of Canadian products can be maintained, also a noble reception room. The interior design is admirable, special attention having been given to the question of lighting and ventilation. The central location can only be appreciated by one familiar with London, the railway stations of five of the large railway companies being within a mile and a half of the site and very much nearer and more accessible than the present Canadian offices. In short the Canadian building will be in the very centre of London, and hence in the centre of the world.

Now Know Ye, therefore, that in pursuance thereof, we do hereby proclaim a close season for Prairie Chicken throughout the Province until the thirty-first day of August, one thousand nine hundred and eight inclusive.

In Testimony Whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of the said Province to be hereunto affixed:

Witness, the Honourable James Dunsmuir, Lieutenant-Governor of our said Province of British Columbia, in Our City of Victoria, this twenty-day of August, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seven, and in the seventh year of Our Reign.

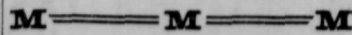
