ASPEN GROVE CAMP

WHAT THE JACK-MAC NEWSPAPER MEN THINK OF IT.

Description of This Interesting Mining Camp as Told by Practical Mining and Newspaper Men to The Eastern Press.

In June 1899, H. H. Schmidt located and staked the first claim in the Aspen Grove camp. Tales of rich copper indications in the range of hills extending north and south from the Grove had for years been told in the south country, but it was not till 1899 that prospectors began to give it any personal attention. After Schmidt's discovery, the country fairly swarmed with prospectors, until now every indication has been staked the length and breadth of the range. Mr. Schmidt's original claim has proved to be of first rate indications. It is known as the Big Sioux.

Starting at the southern end of the range is the Little Sioux, owned by W. J. Murray, showing copper glance assaying 23 per cent copper. Then comes the Black Forrest, owned by Angus McKay, with good indications. D. J. Starwald also has claims in the vicinity of the Little Sioux. A. B. Roberts is also interested in properties in this section. On Bear Mountain, in the range, are several claims from which some good ore has been taken out, these are owned by D. J. Stewart and Murray Brothers.

On the summit and each side of Mount Moriah is the Vancouver group, four claims in all, with first rate showings of copper glance, owned by J. P. Allen, Con Murphy and William Augstead. The Red Bird and Lone Star groups consist of six claims, and native copper and glance are found in them. These groups are owned by Roberts, Budd and Alders. T. A. Rodgers and B. Osen own Calamity Jane group, with fine indications of gray and native copper.

On the west side of Mount Moriah is the Queen of Hearts group of five, owned by Frank Bailey and associates. This group shows gray and native copper.

Next to the Queen of Hearts claim is the Swede group, of three, with gray and native copper.

Eli Larson has a group of four claims, the Hub, on which are good showings of gray copper.

Messrs. Lowe and Brown own the Copper Bell group of four claims, the Lothie, a group of three. It is on their property that the biggest showing of amygdaloid in the camp is found. Copper in native and free-milling quartz is also found on these groups.

A. E. Howse and associates have a group of four good claims.

Eastwood, Gladwin and Pries Ellison, M. L. A. own the Copper Standard group of five claims one of the best prospects in the camp.

The Golden Gate and May Bell are also good prospects and are owned by W. A. Dodd and A. R. Carrington.

The Tomcat group, consisting of two claims and three fractions, was recently sold for \$15,000.

J. E. Bate and associates own several groups, in all fifty three claims. Perhaps the best group in these holdings, and for that matter in the camp, is the Golden Sovereign, consisting of seven claims. On this group a well defined ledge or native copper has been discovered and exposed for over 400 feet of the length of the group. The claims have been staked on both sides of the ledge so as to include the irregularities of its course. From the main ledge a feeder has also been traced, and there is also a large body of

NICOLA TELEPHONE CENTRAL.

Office Installed This Week and Ready For Exchange Tomorrow.

Mayor Chas. S. Stevens of Kamloops, superintendent of the government telephone lines, was in Nicola Tuesday, inspecting the work done on the lines in this vicinity.

During the past week under the superintendence of Mr. Woodburn of Vancouver, the telephone gang have been putting up poles and wiring the town to have a central office in Nicola.

The central office will be in charge of Mrs. Munroe, and will be open for connections with the different 'phones tomorrow. Telegrams and conversations will be continued to be received and dispatched at A. R. Carrington's and the A. E. Howse Co.'s stores until the end of this month, after that date all business will be transacted as the central office.

There will be ten 'phones on the Nicola town circuit.

Mr. Stevens found the work very satisfactory and left Wednesday morning for Kamloops. He was accompanied on the trip by Mrs. Stevens.

John Pyke Dead.

The death took place at Quilchena on Monday evening, of John Pyke who has resided in the Nicola Valley for some time. The cause of death was due to heart failure and kidney disease. The deceased was a native of Stratford, Ont., and was about 50 years of age. The only known relative living in this province is a sister, Mrs. Gattrell of Summerland, Okanagan district, who has been notified. The pall bearers were F. W. Jackson, Ed. and Fred Raspberry, F. Gannon, H. Inskip and S. Kirby.

The funeral was held from Quilchena Wednesday afternoon to the Church of England cemetery, Nicola, Rev. Govier officiating, a number of friends and acquaintances attending the last sad rites.

The deceased was for a number of years in the Cariboo country having constructed a number of Russell fences in the vicinity of Clinton and Empire Valley, also being in the same business in Keremeos district. It is claimed he held the patent on the Russell fence for a number of years.

ore-bearing rock extending the full length of the claims. At some distance from the ore-dyke, a lime sea is exposed the full length of the group. Along the surface of native ledge copper nuggets occur in quantities, several tons of these have been picked up and stored in sacks nearby, only awaiting the advent of the railway to be worth 12 to 14 cents a pound. Several shafts and prospect-holes have been sunk or drifted in this group, and in all of them the indications are uniform, showing that the ore body both of the native vein and mineral bearing rock is permanent at least as far as can be demonstrated by the limited nature of the present working.

The Bate outfit also owns the following properties: The Liverpool, group of four claims; Big Horn, two claims; Boomerang six claims; Medal fraction; Great Western the Cincinnati, with a tunnel 400 feet long. They have drifted this tunnel to get into ore indicated on the surface of the hill, but they have not yet got into it, though Mr. Bate estimates that it will be reached in another thirty five or forty feet of drifting.

RAILWAY AT WORK

CONSTRUCTION CAMP STARTED AT COUTLEE.

Will Work Both Ways From That Point Bridge Contractors Looking Over Bridge Work to be Done on the Railway.

Loss, Macdonnell & Co., have started a construction camp at Coutlee and have men at work both ways from that point and will go ahead with the work to the end of the cross-sectioning.

Work is progressing rapidly on all parts of the work and sub-contractors will complete their contracts in good time.

Members of a firm of bridge contractors were at Coutlee this week, having looked over the bridge work to be done on the line with a view of contracting for same.

At Spences Bridge the track has been laid a short distance, to accommodate the cars of rails and other material to be used later with the track-laying.

James Macdonnell was at Coutlee for a few days this week looking over the work at this end of the line.

CLAIMED TO BE TELEPHONE AGENT

Secures Horse and Saddle and Heads for the Boundary Line.

A man by the name of W. L. E. Pason is now in the toils charged with misrepresentation and series of thefts.

Last week he secured a horse and saddle from Johnny Cheletz on the representation that he was an agent of the telephone system, and coming to Nicola made a deal for a new saddle, giving the old one as part payment, later on he exchanged horses and started up the Princeton road to the boundary line. At Aspen Grove he borrowed a rifle and continued on his journey charging his meals and lodgings to the telephone management.

The horse owner on learning that Pason had hooded him laid an information, Constable Clark located Pason as he left Hedley, and had Charles Revely after him in short order, who captured him as he arrived at Keremeos, and returned at once with the prisoner to Thynne's, where Constable Clark had gone to meet them. They will arrive in Nicola this evening when the preliminary trial will take place.

A few weeks ago another man claiming to be a telephone agent, secured a horse and saddle at Quilchena to go to Kamloops. He has not been heard off since.

Mr. Murray, manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Vancouver, and Mrs. Murray arrived by special stage from Spences Bridge last evening and will spend a few weeks visiting with Mrs. Pooley at Tamerton Farm.

Quite a little excitement was caused at Coutlee on Monday when one of the prominent citizens did not turn up from a hunting trip. Search parties were being organized when the belated one turned up, having lost his bearings during an enthusiastic moment while on the trail of game.

C. F. Law returned Monday evening from Bear creek on his way to the coast. He was accompanied by his foreman, W. J. Kilpatrick who has been building a wagon road from Otter Flat to the Bear creek mines. Owing to the winter setting in it was decided to let the balance of the work go until next spring. They continued on to the Coast next morning.

TEN MILE CREEK

WORK DONE ON PROPERTIES IN THIS PROMISING CAMP.

J. W. Collis on His Return to Victoria Tells of Ten-Mile.—Activity on Account of Railway Construction in the Valley.

J. W. Collis who has been doing work on his properties on Ten-Mile creek near Coutlee, returned home to Victoria last week, and speaks quite enthusiastically of the conditions in that part of the province. Miners have been at work on the I. X. L. group all summer and the development work that has been accomplished is of a very satisfactory character. On the I. X. L. Mr. Collis reports that he has a 150 ft. lead of low grade copper ore with rich shoots running throughout. The shaft has been sunk 100 feet and the value of the ore improved at 80ft. and stayed at its best to the lowest depth reached. On the surface the lead has been stripped for 200 feet along the strike, and a considerable quantity of ore taken out. The work so far accomplished has demonstrated the continuity of the ore body on the group for a distance of 2000 feet. The work now in progress will result in a good sized ore dump by the spring. The property is situated 12 miles from the route of the Nicola railroad and is close to the coal fields. As the property will be worked by a "glory hole" and with coal and coke within easy reach the I. X. L. claims should be worked as economically as any mine in the Northwest. Mr. Collis has interested New York capitalists in his property and these will inspect the claims next spring.

Mr. Collis foresees great changes in Nicola and the Similkameen. He feels sure that the C. P. R. will push the Nicola road right through into the Similkameen, thus insuring to this rich mineral and farming country two competitive lines of railway, and consequently fair transportation rates. Both the Nicola and the Similkameen districts have been, as it were, marking time for years, while awaiting the coming of the Iron horse and now they are preparing to come into their own. The coal measures of Nicola held by Vancouver people are being prospected and will be opened up to supply the big market for coke offered in these two districts. Indeed Nicola coke may yet supplant the Crows Nest article in the big boundary smelters for the Nicola coal fields are 100 miles nearer the Boundary than Fernie.

Of recent mining developments, Mr. Collis mentions the report that Mr. Turnbull, of the Trail smelter, has bonded the Transvaal group on the Ten-Mile creek belt and has ten men at work thereon. There is a wonderful showing on this property. At Quilchena, the Diamond Vale Drill Company has been at work all summer on promising coal measures, and at Princeton, The B. C. Copper Company has been prospecting with a drill on the Sunset group with, it is said, excellent results.

Mr. Collis is confident that this part of British Columbia is entering a period of much prosperity and development.

The importance to Canada of the mining industry of British Columbia can be appreciated when one contemplates what its mineral production amounts to in comparison with the mineral production of all other parts of Canada combined. The following is for the year ending December 31st, 1904: Total production of Canada, exclusive of gold of the Yukon, \$31,721,707, British Columbia produced \$18,377,359, leaving \$13,244,348 as the combined production of all other provinces.

Because of reckless shooting in a number of coast districts which has resulted in numerous accidents to hunters, a number favor the imposition of a gun licence. It is claimed such would result in a reduction of impossible "hunters" who go out at the beginning of each season besides preventing mere boys making a nuisance of themselves by carrying firearms, often as large and heavy as themselves. The revenue derived from the issuance of licences it is estimated, would enable the authorities to appoint more wardens and in every way to improve the system for the protection of game during the close season. This matter will come up at the next meeting of the Fish and Game Club at Victoria, and should it meet with favor will be embodied in a memorial to the government at next sitting of the legislature.

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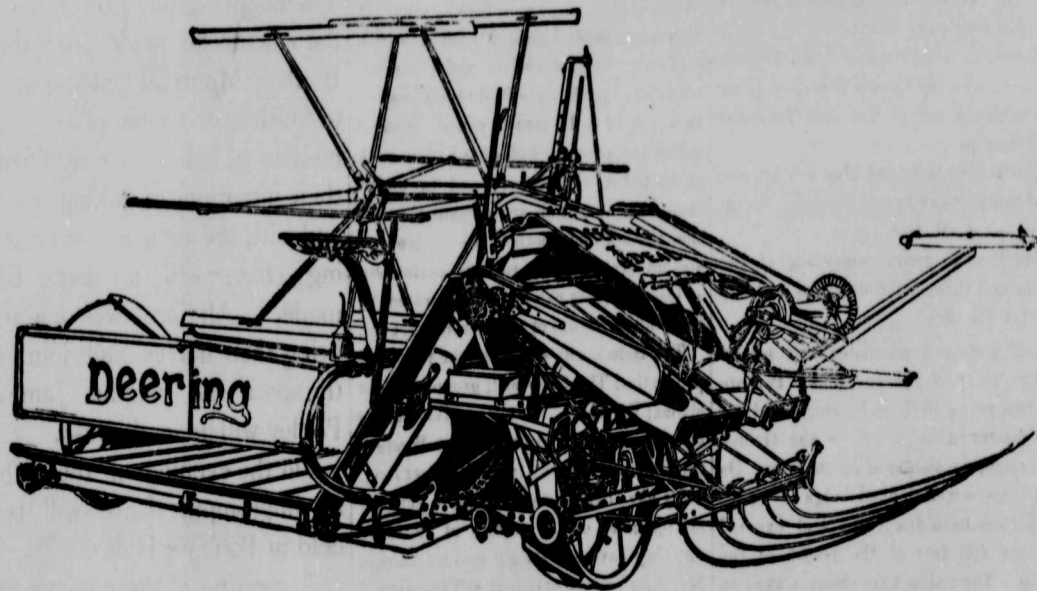
