ASPEN GROVE COPPER CAMP

Large Mineralized Zone One Hundred Square Miles in Area.—Drawbacks to Opening Up of Camp.—Good Showing All Over the Camp.

It is now some eight years since the first claim was staked at Aspen Grove. Today this country for an area of a hundred square miles is almost covered by claims. Several geologists and mineralogists of note have made investigations throughout this area, and all are in accord that it is one of the finest copper bearing areas in the west. One thing has kept the district back and that was the want of transportation facilities. If ore was got out the expenses of transportation almost swallowed up the profits of any but the richer ores. When one considers the heavy expense for working material, and also that the necessities of life have practically also to be paid for in the same proportion it becomes evident that only the best of properties would hold men to their claims for such a long period. The advent of the railway is now, however, tending to change conditions somewhat, and the lands and works department have the matter of a wagon road through the camp under consideration and hope to have something done to it in the very near future. It was quite a common thing during the last few years for capitalists to come in and go over the camp and acknowledge that the properties were good but until transportation facilities were better they could not invest. Since railroad construction commenced practically every representative of capital who has gone into the camp, has bonded some claims or made a deal of some sort. There is no doubt as to the richness of the claims, native copper assaying 97 per cent. pure copper and ore assaying 5 to 55 per cent and upwards are frequent occurrences all over the camp. It is a question, whether in any other part of the Dominion such a highly mineralized zone of such an extent can be found, and its extent is believed to be even greater than that mentioned. It is the intention of The Nicola Herald to publish shortly a description of the camp which will no doubt prove interesting matter for our readers.

LOWER NICOLA PICNIC.

Cloudy and threatening weather in the morning did not prevent a big crowd from turning up at Lower Nicola on Saturday to the annual Methodist picnic and an enjoyable day was spent by all present. Foot races and games were indulged in and the ladies of the Methodist Church served an excellent luncheon which was done justice to by the merry gathering. The receipts from the day will total about \$105.

Aspen Grove School.

Under Miss Lawrence the Aspen Grove school is making progress. There are now twenty scholars in attendance. The want of a blackboard and other facilities has been keenly felt and has made the work of teacher much harder. The dance held at the school house last week was for the purpose of raising some money to provide these necessities and was highly satisfactory. Already twenty-eight dollars have been the result and it is expected that other contributions will almost double this amount and enable the school house to be fitted up in a manner that will render the work to both teacher and pupil easier.

RAILWAY WORK.

Construction work is going ahead and a large number of men are working on the bridge over the Nicola river above Coutlee and rapidly getting it finished for the rails. Ballasting and fencing is still going ahead. Freight is now being regularly carried by the trains and it is expected that in the near future all freight will be carried over the line to Coutlee. An authoritative statement with regard to townsites etc., may be expected very soon.

More Quakes at Frisco

Two distinct earthquake shocks in rapid succession were felt in San Francisco and Oakland at 9 40 Friday evening. The movement seemed to be from west to east and was several seconds in duration. No damage was done. Two more slight shocks were also experienced early Saturday morning.

ANTI-TUBERCULOSIS SOCIETY.

Dr. Fagan Speaks Of the Danger From Consumptive Patients.

There was a very fair attendance considering the short notice, at the meeting last Thursday night to listen to an address from Dr. Fagan, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, on the terrible scourge consumption and to organize a local anti Tuberculosis Society.

Dr. Tutill acted as chairman.

Dr. Fagan's address was both interesting and instructive. He opened with a few remarks on the marked progress that had been made in recent years in the direction of fighting disease in general. He told how other diseases had been brought under control, tuberculosis alone perhaps reaping its regular harvest of death practically unopposed. The death toll from consumption is over 2,000,000 a year. In Canada we lose over 12,000 a year and in this province alone 200, and yet little is being done to combat a disease which science has declared to be curable. The tuberculosis bacteria are minute parasites which may enter the body in various ways through a break in the skin, by entering the lungs directly, by lodging in the tonsils and being carried to the various parts of the body. It usually attacks the lungs the patient coughing and expectorating thus casting out large numbers of these germs. It is in the sputum of a consumptive that the most danger lies. As long as the matter expectorated is moist, the germs are imprisoned, but when it dries they are liberated, mingle with the dust and are liable to gain an entrance into a human body and reproduce the terrible disease. Dr. Fagan enlarged on this matter of expectoration and made the statement that were expectoration to cease, the disease of consumption would die also. The danger from consumptive patients is the sputum. He considered the ignorant consumptive was to be pitied while the careless consumptive is a criminal, for he is practically spreading the dread disease among his own family or among his neighbor's. He stated that his appeal would welcome all contributions even to the smallest, and he outlined the manner in which the societies were being formed throughout the province.

At the close of the meeting it was agreed to form a local Anti-Tuberculosis Society. A hearty vote of thanks to Dr. Fagan closed the meeting.

A meeting of the ladies of the district will be called some afternoon to elect officers.

TRAIN ROBBERS

WANT NEW TRIAL

Bill Miner and His Robber Friends Apply For Another Hearing.

A. D. Macintyre, counsel for Miner, Duum and Colquhoun, the train robbers now serving terms in the B. C. penitentiary at New Westminster for holding up a train near Kamloops, applied for a new trial for his clients before Justice Irving at Victoria on Saturday. Mr. Macintyre based his application on two points, one being that the crown prosecutor, in summing up the case, stated that Supt. Hussey did not give all the evidence he could have and one being that the three men, after having been tried once, were not arraigned and asked to plead before being tried a second time.

Mr. Justice Irving refused to grant a new trial, overruling both objections, and the appeal will now be taken before a full court.

DAIRYING.

Great possibilities lie before Nicola Valley as a dairying country. In the valley proper there is now practically no free range for cattle and ranching under these conditions on a small scale becomes unprofitable. We strongly advise our ranching friends, who feel themselves shut in from a free range to go into this matter carefully. Carried out in a systematic way it cannot but prove a commercial success as has already been proved by one of our residents in the lower part of our valley, who is practically the only local producer. The amount of butter consumed is only provided for by drawing on coast and Northwest creameries for the shortage in the local supply. In the very near future this local demand will be greatly increased. The continuation of construction on the railroad will cause a larger demand than ever for this commodity and the opening up of the mines at Aspen Grove and Ten mile will still further increase the demand not to mention the possibilities when the coal is developed. There is not the slightest necessity for any butter to be shipped into this district from the outside if the farmers realize what financial benefits would accrue to themselves by taking this matter up. Much the same applies to poultry. Here again there should be no necessity for outside shipments. The local supply should more than meet the demand and from a district so favorable as this is to the raising of poultry, we ought to be shipping eggs to outside points. If some of our farmers would take this matter up on a commercial basis, instal a separator and feed the skim milk to hogs, they would very soon realize the benefit to their banking account. Parts of the valley are admirably suited for the dairying industry, and if a few of our most progressive farmers would go into this, it might not be long, before a small creamery might be started which could be worked on the co-operative principle. Good butter, fresh eggs and home fed bacon always command high prices and there is practically no competition. If some of our own farmers do not wake up and help to supply this local demand they will wake up some fine morning and find a hard-working eastern Canadian or an enterprising American start-

ing up in this business and making money at it. The day of the small cattle rancher is past and the sooner he realizes this and turns to dairying or mixed farming, which will much more repay him, the better it will be for himself and the district.

CANADA'S CHANCE.

Trade of American Packing Houses is Falling Off.

A despatch to the Montreal Star, states that there has been a falling off of \$20,000,000 in the trade of the packing houses, and that 60 per cent. of the employees have been laid off. That is probably an exaggeration; but in any event the loss must have been very great. Now is the time for the Canadian packing houses to capture the market, and first of all to that end they should do a good deal of judicious advertising. One way of advertising is to be sure that their own premises and their methods are sanitary, and then let the public know it through the newspapers. They must not expect the newspapers to undertake to boost their goods simply because something has happened to their American competitors. If the Canadian manufacturers "get in and drill" they will have the western market for all time to come and it is a most important one, too.

Prince Rupert, the new city of north-western British Columbia, and the Pacific coast terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific, has begun its existence, and the foundations of the coming metropolis of the western province is laid. The camps of the surveyors, both those of the Dominion and the railway company are pitched on and near future city's boundaries. It is the intention to make surveys of the coast line of waters of the inlet and the engineer expect to remain until October. The railway surveyors are busy in the vicinity of Seal Harbor, where the new saw mill will be built. Here a wharf and buildings are being erected.

A New State.

Another star was added to Union on Saturday when President Roosevelt signed the bill admitting Oklahoma and Indian territory as one state. The measure also provides that Arizona and New Mexico may be admitted to statehood as the State of Arizona, provided the people of the territories vote in favor of the admission on the terms submitted by congress.

Marking of Gold.

Legislation has been introduced by the government at the request of gold and silver-smiths, with the object of protecting the public against fraud in the sale and marking of gold and silver. Marks like "gold," "solid gold," "pure gold," "U. S. assay" and other like descriptions are prohibited.
