THE DOUGLAS LAKE

CATTLE COMPANY SELLS OUT ITS RANCHING PROPERTY.

British Columbia's Famous Horse and Cattle Ranch is Bought for a Big Sum by English Syndicate of Rich Capitalists.

The Douglas Lake Cattle Company, owner of the best known and perhaps the most valuable cattle and horse ranch in British Columbia, is being taken over by a Big English syndicate which is being incorporated under the name of The Canada Estates Limited, with a capital of £400,000. The retiring company has been one of the most successful in the whole country, and is entirely free from any kind of encumbrance.

It consisted of only three shareholders, the advancing age of whom is the cause of their assets being taken over by the larger firm. These were C. W. R. Thomson of Victoria, who is a millionaire; Wm. C. Ward, formerly of Vancouver but now of London, and J. B. Greaves of Douglas Lake. The ranch consists of 98,443 acres of freehold and 10,000 acres of leasehold land, with the manager's house, stables, coralls and sheds, trading store, blacksmith shop, farm implements and machinery, valued at £157,182. There are 300 miles of fences. The live stock, which includes twelve thousand head of cattle and seven hundred head of horses, eight thoroughbred stallions and 175 thoroughbred bulls, is valued at £87,304. The Spences Bridge-Nicola line passes the outlying portions of the range, and the head station is now only 27 miles from the depot.

There are as well mineral rights of coal and other minerals on the property.

The fortunate holders are obtaining for their holdings a cool million dollars of which over nine hundred thousand is in cash.

The president of the new company is Arnold Foster, and there is a board of directors of whom one, Cecil Ward, is well known to British Columbians.

J. B. Greaves, manager of the Douglas Lake Cattle Co., was at this end of the valley this week looking after his interests. In speaking of the sale of the Douglas Lake Cattle Co. interests, he stated that he had not received any official information yet as to the completion of the deal.

Blair & Company Sell Out.

The Diamond Vale Supply Company took over the business of Blair & Co. of Coutlee this morning, with S. J. Solomon as the manager of the new concern.

The new company is busy stocktaking and will have a gigantic clearing sale next week, full particulars of which will appear in the next issue of the Nicola Herald.

Business will be carried on as usual at Coutlee, and a large consignment of new and up-to-date goods is on the way that will provide a stock second to none in the valley.

Prince Rupert Lots.

That the townsite of Prince Rupert cannot possibly be placed on the market before this time next spring is the opinion of F. T. Jones, a member of the Grand Trunk Pacific surveying staff.

Dancing started about nine o'clock and was kept up until "the wee short hours ayont the twal," and was entered into with keen enjoyment by everyone present. The floor was in excellent condition and the whole "tout ensemble" was such that only the most misanthropic of individuals could have kept from tripping the light fantastic toe on such an occasion. The singing of "She's a Jolly Good Fellow," with three cheers and a tiger for the hostess of the evening, followed by "Auld Lang Syne" and the national anthem brought a most enjoyable evening to a too early close.

St. John's Church.

Ven. Archdeacon Pentreath arrived by the first train accompanied by Rev. James Thompson who will be stationed here in charge of Nicola and other parts as a missionary of the Anglican Church. Mr. Thompson is a native of Lancashire, England, and a graduate of St. Paul's Missionary College, Burgh, Lincolnshire. He is a young man of excellent ability as a preacher. He was ordained deacon in Holy Trinity Cathedral, New Westminster recently, and will be ordained to the priesthood in September. He will receive a hearty welcome from the members of the church here.

Services will be held in St. John's Church on Sunday as follows: 8 a. m., Holy Communion; 11 a. m., morning prayer, sermon and Holy Communion; 7:30 p. m., evening prayer and sermon. The archdeacon will preach in the morning and Mr. Thompson in the evening. At 3 p. m., the annual meeting will be held at the residence of Dr. Tutill to elect church officers and lay delegates to the synod.

Conservatives Elect Officers.

A well attended meeting of the Nicola Valley Conservative Association was held at Coutlee on Saturday last. The following were elected officers for the ensuing year: Honorary president, Hon. Richard McBride; president, Ric. A. Fraser, vice-presidents, D. McInnes, H. S. Cleasby; secretary, G. M. Brash; treasurer, H. H. Matthews. The above with C. L. Flick, R. L. Clark and Jas. Smith, form the executive of the association.

It was decided to ask Hon. R. McBride to address a meeting in Nicola on some date early in June.

One feature of the newly installed train service was evident on yesterday's train, the first passenger train to arrive in Nicola, when a host of drummers got off at Nicola, and were soon busy with the several business houses, showing samples and booking orders.

On the arrival at Spences Bridge yesterday of the new line's first passenger train, full ninety passengers stepped off the cars. These were, of course, gathered up between Nicola and the Bridge, and shows a most encouraging start for the new railroad.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

THE COAL OPERATORS ARE UNABLE TO AGREE.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier to be Raised to the Peerage.—Miners at Texada are Out.—Other Labor Trouble. Man Loses Big Sum.

A Calgary despatch says: After being in session ten minutes Tuesday afternoon the miner delegates and operators broke up, and now the settlement is up to the government, according to the new law. The miners have agreed verbally to everything, including the nondiscrimination clause of the general agreement, but when it became necessary to sign, they balked, and the convention split on the open shop question. Mr. Patterson then moved that the conference adjourn sine die, Sherman seconded the motion, and when it came to a vote everyone voted aye, as everyone was tired of the never ending dilly-dallying.

Laurier Raised to the Peerage.

The Montreal Witness says Lord Strathcona will retire from the position of high commissioner for Canada, and that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is to take his place and be raised to the peerage under the title of Lord Athabasca. It is added that the idea has been favorably received by the friends and colleagues of the prime minister and by representative men of all shades of political opinion, and that an intimation has been received from England to the effect that such an appointment would be most acceptable to the British people.

Laurier to Attend Conference.

It has been arranged that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will attend the colonial conference and will leave for England tomorrow, Friday, April 5. The question was brought up in the House of Commons last week by Hon. Mr. Borden, who said it would be little less than deplorable if Premier Laurier were not present to represent Canada. He offered to adjourn the house until the premier returned or do anything else that was reasonable to facilitate the business to let him leave.

Railroads Must Yield

The representatives of the trainmen and conductors decided at Chicago last week that they will ignore the proposition of the general managers looking to arbitration under the Erdmann Act, and voted to persist in their preparations for a strike. They declared that a walkout is imminent unless the managers make further concessions.

Texada Miners Strike.

The Marble Bay copper mines on Texada Island, one of the best paying properties on the coast, has been closed down as a result of a strike of the miners. Alexander Grant, the manager, says there is no telling when operations will be resumed. The strike occurred as a result of the refusal of the owners to accede to a demand from the miners for increased wages.

Lost \$75,000.

A Winnipeg despatch says: The senior partner of the Fisher Hamilton Realty Company suffered a severe loss last week while returning from British Columbia, losing a valise in which he was carrying \$75,000 in cheques and securities.

V. V. & E. RAILWAY.

No Work Done West of Keremeos But Some Straightening Lines.

No work to the west of Keremeos is being done by the V. V. & E. at the present time save some straightening of survey lines as originally laid down. Such was a statement made by J. H. Kennedy, chief engineer of the V. V. & E. Railway, who is now in Vancouver attending this trial of the action instituted by the Columbia & Western Railway against the V. V. & E. for an injunction restraining the latter from entering upon certain Columbia & Western property in the vicinity of Midway.

Tracklaying is now proceeding according to Mr. Kennedy on the grade which has been completed into Keremeos but not a shovelful of earth has been turned over on grading from Keremeos to Princeton and it is impossible to say when the tracks will reach the latter place.

Among the witnesses attending the Columbia & Western-V. V. & E. trial are a number of upcountry men, among whom the opinion is general that this summer will witness another start on the construction of the Midway & Vernon Railway. The first efforts towards the building of this line came to a disastrous end in the winter of 1905 when work was stopped through an apparent lack of funds to enable it to be further prosecuted. Only about nine miles of grading had been done from Midway west towards Rock creek when orders to stop were given by the New York capitalists then financing the construction.

Montreal capital is now reported to have entered into an arrangement by which the task of building the line can be taken up where it was left off and there seems to be a possibility that Penitction, Vernon and other towns on the projected route of the line will be railway points before they are many years older.

Alterations in Stage Service.

Following the withdrawal of the stage on the Nicola-Spences Bridge route a rearrangement of the other stage routes has been found necessary, and a new schedule has been arranged that is hoped will be found satisfactory, both for the traveling public and the convenience of those who use the mails. Starting on Saturday, the 13th inst., the stage for Kamloops will leave Nicola on that day, arriving in Kamloops the same evening, and this service will continue, cancelling the arrangement now in force. The return journey will be made as at present, that is leaving Kamloops at 6 a. m. on Monday, arriving in Nicola the same evening.

For Princeton the stage leaves on Tuesdays, arriving in Princeton on Wednesday. The return stage will leave Princeton on Thursdays, arriving in Nicola on Friday evening. The arrangement for Princeton comes into force on Tuesday, the 9th inst.

A Business Change.

Hyland & Gray of Lower Nicola, well known as building contractors, have taken over the sawmill business until lately carried on by R. M. Woodward. The new firm ask for a continuation of the patronage accorded to their predecessor in the business, and besides carrying a large stock of rough and dressed lumber, will handle shingles, doors, sashes and a fine line of mouldings.

A number of the officials of the Diamond Vale Coal & Iron Mines, Ltd., arrived at Coutlee on Monday evening and on Tuesday the party drove over the company's property, where they spent the day inspecting the building operations now in progress.

NO RIGHT OF WAY

WORK ON NEW BRIDGE ACROSS RIVER CALLED OFF.

The Right of Way on Both Sides of the River will Have to be Arranged—Government Understood—All had Been Settled

The work on the bridge which was to be built across the Nicola river to make closer connection with the railway station and the Granite creek wagon road did not commence as was intended on Monday, owing to the right of way on both sides of the river being held by private parties.

According to the survey and report made by the engineer who came in to select the most suitable site, the bridge strikes on the Methodist church property, from whom the right of way would have to be purchased. On the opposite side it strikes property owned by Hop Woo and A. E. Howse with whom terms would also have to be made.

On the town side and through the church property the sum of \$1,600 was asked for 66 feet. Some have an idea that this is an exorbitant rate, and although it may be, it is on a par with the prices asked by the townsites owners for their town lots, and the church people are surely entitled to receive the price asked by others for property.

The government granted a request of Nicola citizens for a bridge and were led to believe that the right of way had all been settled, but after ordering work to go on, and the material, the right of way question cropped up, with the result that work was ordered to stop till the people came to some arrangements for the right of way.

There is no question now but that the work of building the bridge will have to be put off until the fall or the next spring as the high water will be on very shortly, and it does not look as if the right of way will be settled for some time. The temporary bridge will be washed out in a few days and then traffic will have to come over the old bridge near the manse.

LOCAL NEWS.

Walter Clark left yesterday for Kamloops taking with him "Scotty" Mayer, who will be placed in the hospital at that place.

James Murchison has received the contracts for the erection of two business blocks at Merritt, and left today to start the construction.

Rev. D. K. Allan will preach in the Presbyterian church, Nicola, on Sunday next at 11 a. m. and in the afternoon at Lower Nicola. There will be no evening service.

Dr. Curry, dentist, will leave for Lower Nicola in a few days where he will remain for about a week. Parties wishing dentistry work should make a date with the doctor.

THE COPPER MARKET.

The Los Angeles Mining Review in an article dealing with present and probable future copper market conditions says: "As the year advances it is becoming apparent that the price of copper must go higher. Unless a miracle happens, this year's output will fall below that of 1906 while demand is increasing steadily. From all quarters, now, come admissions of the fact, long ago evident but accepted with reluctance, that the world has entered upon a new era of industrial development in which electricity and copper must play the leading parts. The aluminum ghost has been laid. The iron wire bluff has been called. Consumers have settled down to copper and common sense. Yet with a market that is ideal from the producers' point of view, copper will almost surely show a marked decline. If this were the result of failing ore supplies, there would be serious cause for alarm. On the contrary, it may be safely stated that there is now vastly more ore in sight than could be claimed a year ago. Transportation difficulties will be responsible to a certain extent for the decrease in copper output but the true difficulty lies in the labor situation. There are not enough miners. It follows that there is uneasiness. Demands for higher pay have occurred and are likely to occur again. Strikes and shut-downs under such circumstances are not improbable. With 200 men laid off at Butte and 1200 at Bisbee, there can be no maintenance of copper output at last year's production. The copper market has been stationary for some weeks but a further advance seems imminent. Quotations are made for dealers for instant acceptance only. Demand is growing for uses where price is comparatively a minor consideration. No one seriously expects copper to go below 25 cents this year or next. It may well go to 30 cents before 1908."

It appears that 114,836 emigrants from the United Kingdom sailed for Canada last year; in the previous year there were 82,437. This year the number promises to be greater than ever. In one week 5,750 sailed from Liverpool and Glasgow alone. Time was when people who came to Canada passed on to the United States, but they are not doing so any more.

By a vote of 109 to 56 the commons on Tuesday night rejected the motion of Mr. Bourassa for the appointment of a special committee to investigate Mr. Fowler's "women, wine and graft" charges. Sir Wilfrid Laurier resented the action of Mr. Bourassa in descending into the gutter to rake up indefinite charges. He said the proposed committee was of an inquisitorial character.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy has denied that new steamships have been ordered for the C. P. R. Atlantic service, and thus the coming of the Empresses of Britain and Ireland to the Pacific will not be as soon as

was expected. But as Sir Thomas says in regard to the Atlantic steamships: "That will come in due course of time."
