## LABOR QUESTION

### PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT TAKE STEPS TO MEET DEMAND.

Circular Letter Being Forwarded to All Employers of Labor.—Those Requiring Help Should Fill Blanks Supplied.

The provincial authorities are endeavoring to find accurately what demand there is throughout the province for domestic and farm labor.

A considerable immigration of farm hands and domestic help is expected in the spring and early summer of 1908 under the arrangement with the Salvation Army, and the government is desirous of ascertaining as exactly as possible to what degree these may be assimilated.

Accordingly a circular letter, with which is enclosed a printed form, has been sent out to clerks of municipalities, secretaries of farmers' institutes and creamery companies, managers of farmers' exchanges and the most prominent fruit growers and ranchers, to postmasters and others, with the request that the forms be distributed as widely as possible.

Any person desirous of obtaining help may get one of the forms, which should be returned to the Provincial Bureau of Information. Of course the above only applies to agriculture and domestic labor and does not affect in any way the trades or artisans.

The printed blank contains spaces for the names and addresses of employers, also the captions "Help Wanted," "No. and Class," "Accommodation for Help," "When Wanted," "Wages Offered," etc. The letter in full is as follows:

"Victoria, October, 1907.

"Dear Sir: Letters are being constantly received by the Bureau of Provincial Information from persons desiring work on farms and orchards. These applications are from the middle and eastern provinces of Canada, the British Isles and Northern Europe, and may be divided into four classes, namely:

"1. Young men inexperienced in farm work, wishing to learn practical farm work and horticulture.

"2. Experienced farm hands, unmarried.

"3. Experienced farm hands, married (with families or otherwise), whose wives are willing to take service with their husbands.

"4. Women domestics.

"A majority of the applicants is of class 1, but there is a considerable number of class 2. Class 3 is much less numerous, and there are very few applicants in class 4. Most of the married men are desirous of having a dwelling separate from that of the employers, an arrangement which should commend itself to those who look to securing permanent help.

"Under an agreement existing between the government and the emigration branch of the Salvation Army, a considerable immigration of farm hands and domestic help is expected from Great Britain during the spring and early summer of 1908.

"The government is very desirous of securing the immigration to British Columbia of a reliable class of white labor, and invites the earnest co-operation of the farmers, fruit growers and dairymen of the province to that end.

"You are therefore requested to call the attention of employers of labor in your district to this letter, and request them to fill in, as comprehensively as possible, the forms enclosed.

## NEW COAL DISCOVERY.

### Nine Foot Seam Uncovered Near Hamilton Hill, Two Miles From Nicola.

Nine feet of good bituminous coal has been uncovered on the Nicola Coal Company's property, on the Hamilton hill, about two miles from Nicola, this week, by R. A. Lambert, one of the shareholders of the company. With one man he has been engaged during the week uncovering the seam at the out-cropping, and also running an open cut a short distance from that point.

The seam is well defined and is no doubt a continuation of the Coal Gulley seam. Next week fuller particulars will be given of the development.

This new seam of coal was discovered several weeks ago by William Munro while riding over the hills. Mr. Munro is also a stockholder of the company.

### The Financial Crisis.

With regard to the effect which the present financial crisis in New York will have on the country generally, and the West in particular, it appears to be the almost universal opinion that there is little to fear in this direction. The various business centres of the West have all sent out reassuring expressions, the general trend of which is that the money supply is ample for all legitimate purposes.

F. H. Mathewson, manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce of Montreal, was one of the speakers at the dinner which marked the close of the annual convention of the Canadian Wholesale Hardware Association. He discussed financial conditions, saying that at the present moment bankers were not very popular, since they were declining to make advances, owing to the stringency of the money market.

"It is true," said Mr. Mathewson, "that we have no money to lend for stock or real estate speculation or that class of business, but I have yet to hear of a single case from Halifax to Vancouver where a merchant or manufacturer entitled to credit could not get all the money he was entitled to carry on his business. I think the bankers of Canada are entitled to credit for taking care of the business of the country as they are doing. The business men of Canada are getting all the money they need to properly carry on their business, but it has been hard work for the bankers to get the money to carry on the growing needs of this country. And if we have patience I feel sure that during the next few months the sky will clear, and that later on there will be plenty of money for everybody to carry on their business."

### Whose Is the Timber?

W. Chester of Eholt was the defendant in action brought before Magistrate McMynn on Wednesday at Greenwood by S. McOrmond, also of Eholt. The plaintiff claimed that Chester entered on his mineral claim and had cut timber. Chester admitted cutting the timber but claimed that he had done so through a mistake concerning the lines which marked off the claim.

Whether the right of a holder of a mineral claim includes ownership of the timber upon it, is a point that has never been tested before here. On account of this fact the magistrate imposed no penalty, but stated emphatically that the defendant had no right whatever to enter on the claim and cut timber. Nor could he remove the timber already cut thereon.

This case is important for the community, because it touches a practice all too general. It clearly establishes the fact that the man who enters upon another man's mineral claim to cut and draw wood therefrom is guilty of theft.

## OF LOCAL IMPORT

### BRANCH OF THE ASIATIC LEAGUE FORMED AT MERRITT.

Arrangements Being Made For Big Conservative Convention at Vancouver.—Large Attendance Expected.

On Wednesday evening a very large and enthusiastic meeting was held at Merritt, the object being to form an Asiatic Exclusion League, and assist in whatever way possible to induce the government to enact such legislation to prevent the further immigration of Asiatics into British Columbia.

The meeting was called to order by Joseph Graham, when George Irvine was elected as chairman. Mr. Graham in a short address explained the objects of the meeting and the league.

It being the unanimous wish of the meeting to form a league, the name to be given it caused some lively debate, and the motion carried that it be called the Merritt Asiatic Exclusion League.

The following officers were elected: Hon. President, Ric. A. Fraser of the Nicola Herald; President, A. Stephen of G. B. Armstrong's general store; Vice-president, D. McInnes of the B. C. Beef Market; John Graham, Secretary-treasurer; Executive Committee, S. Calvert, Geo. Irvine and Frank Steel.

During the evening several addresses were given and it was evident that all were in sympathy with the movement, as they realized the menace of the Asiatics to the workingman and public at large.

Fifty-one signed their names to become members, and it was decided to hold the next meeting on Sunday, Nov. 10th, at 7 p. m. at Merritt.

After the general business was over Frank Steel, Jos. Graham and Geo. Irvine gave very interesting and instructive addresses.

A vote of thanks was tendered the chairman and Geo. Hygh for the use of his rooms, and the meeting adjourned.

### Conservative Convention.

The big convention to be held in Vancouver on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 22 and 23, promises to be an epoch-making event in the history of Conservatism in British Columbia.

The committee having the matter in hand are sparing no effort to make it a success, and the railways have offered every encouragement in the way of reduced rates to delegates coming from the various constituencies throughout the province.

The purpose of the convention is mainly to create a provincial organization and thus place the outlying districts in close touch with the central body.

The need for such an association is being felt more and more, and the policy outlined for the convention will be a broad and comprehensive one in every respect. All Conservative members, either provincial or federal, will be members of the convention ex-officio, while each local constituency will send ten delegates. This makes a possible attendance of 420.

It is almost a certainty that Premier Roblin of Manitoba and Hon. F. W. G. Haultain of Regina, will be present and with local speakers will address the convention. It is proposed to make the event an educator in the way of familiarizing local Conservatives with questions of a federal character.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has agreed to give first-class single fares good for return trip to delegates traveling over the railway or local steamship lines. To those coming by steamship

from Prince Rupert, Skeena and Atlin, or other places where meals and berth will be necessary, a fare of one and a third will be granted. The delegates will purchase tickets one way only and must obtain a receipt for same. Then they will receive a certificate from the secretary of the convention entitling them to return free, excepting where the fare and a third holds good, in the event of which they will pay only one-third in returning.

The committee in charge of the arrangements consists of Premier McBride and the presidents of the Victoria, Vancouver, New Westminster and Nanaimo Conservative associations. This committee is preparing strong resolutions and a constitution to present to the convention.

A. W. Strickland, manager of the Bank of Montreal, who has been absent at his old home in Ontario, returned to Nicola on Tuesday. For some time Mr. Strickland's father has not been in the best of health, and grave doubts are entertained for his recovery.

J. S. Gordon, School Inspector, was in Nicola this week and reports school matters in the valley as very satisfactory. Arrangements are being made for a public school at Middlesboro', and also at Merritt. A portion of the Nicola and Lower Nicola districts will be taken off and a new district made for the Merritt section.

G. L. Hilliard of the Hilliard House has commenced an addition to the house and will, when finished, have increased bedroom, sitting rooms and bar room. The Hilliard House is receiving its share of patronage, and with the improvements in contemplation will be able to accommodate the traveling public in first-class shape.

In another column will be found the advertisement of the Douglas Lake Cattle Company, offering a reward of \$1,500 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of parties who have obliterated brands on their horses in the vicinity of Douglas lake. With the reward offered by the government it makes a sum of \$2,000.

The millenium is apparently within measurable distance. "Wizard" Edison makes the announcement that a laboring man who earns \$1.50 a day can have an indestructible three-story building in twelve hours at a cost of \$1,000. He claims that by a system of patent moulds it is possible for any contractor to build a house of solid cement 25 feet wide by 35 feet deep, three stories high and capable of comfortably housing three families, for \$1,000.

## EXPERT OPINION

### ON NICOLA VALLEY AS A FIRST CLASS FRUIT DISTRICT.

Deputy Commissioner of Agriculture is Favorably Impressed With the District.—Considers it a First Class District.

In an interview with J. R. Anderson, the Deputy Commissioner of Agriculture, when asked as to the prospects of fruit growing in this district, he said there could be no doubt about it being a fruit district, and capable of raising almost all kinds of fruit that are grown in the province, although except in especially favored spots it would be impossible to grow the tenderest varieties of fruit. Winter apples, plums and small fruits would do well here. He had not had time to visit more than a few of the orchards in the valley, but it seemed to him that very little had been done in the way of fruit culture, and that it might be taken up with advantage. From conversations with growers at Lower Nicola he thought that the Spitzenberg would do well here, and if such were the case, as he had no reason to doubt, this variety could be grown in a successful manner commercially, as there would be a large market for them. This variety is one of the best suited for the English market and fetches the highest price. That the district will become a large fruit producer he had no doubt, and if the local conditions were carefully studied and complied with, there is no reason why this district should not produce as fine fruits as any raised in the province. He was very well satisfied with his trip through the valley, and the attendances at the meetings were generally good. He hoped before very long to make another and more extended trip through the district.

**FACTS ABOUT CANADA.**

Since the return of the British journalists from their trip to Canada the press of the old country has contained many interesting and illuminating articles descriptive of the country and the advantages which it offers to the emigrant from Great Britain. The Dominion has been viewed by these writers from almost every possible standpoint, and an incalculable amount of valuable information has been diffused through the medium of the most important papers of England. For a concise and comprehensive account of our magnificent natural resources we have seen nothing better than the following, which appeared in a recent issue of the London Standard:

"Bank deposits in Canada have trebled in the last ten years, and doubled in the last four years. Canada's savings, per head of the population, are larger than those of any other country in the world. Canada has an unbroken wheat field 900 miles long by 300 miles wide, the largest in the world. Canada has the biggest and most prolific sea fisheries in the world, besides some of the greatest salmon rivers. Canada has the largest grain mill in the British Empire, and the biggest grain elevator in world. The Dominion has one of the richest gold fields in the world, the largest nickel mines in the world, the largest zinc smelter in the world, and the thickest known coal seam in the world. During every eight months a considerable larger tonnage of shipping passes through Canada's Saulte canals than passes during a year through the Suez canal. The population of Canada has not quite doubled yet, since confederation; its revenue has been multiplied by six during the same time. More than 85 per cent of Canada still awaits cultivation; more than 85 per cent of Canada lies to the west and north of the older settled provinces of the Atlantic. Yet, during last year, Canada produced over 363 million bushels of grain. Eighty-seven per cent of Canada's farmers own their own farms."

An appeal from the recent meeting of the License Commissioners will come up at Kamloops on Wednesday, before County Court Judge Spinks. The appeal is being made by Joseph R. A. Richards of Coutlee, who applied for a hotel licence for Merritt, and which was not granted. Mr. Richards is at present the holder of a license within the three mile radius of Merritt. Messrs Hygh and McIntyre were the other applicants and had their houses in course of construction, Richards submitting plans of his proposed house, and if he had been successful in securing a licence for his proposed Merritt hotel he would then have been the holder of two licenses in the three mile radius. Mr. Richards, in an article for publication in the Saturday Sunset and the Inland Sentinel, has forgotten to inform these papers of that fact. No one believes that one man should have a monopoly of liquor licenses, and that is what Richards is endeavoring to secure. One would judge that Merritt was doomed because he did not get a licence, and that

Messrs. Hygh and McIntyre, who were granted licences, are not fit or capable of running an hotel. The Saturday Sunset, for Richards, intimates that undue influence was used and that the traveling public was not taken into consideration; also, that the bar of Richards' hotel is a secondary matter. If Richards is so anxious to accommodate the traveling public and the bar is of no consequence, what is he making such a fuss about; why not start a boarding house?
