## TOM CAT GROUP

### MINERAL CLAIMS IN THE ASPEN GROVE CAMP

Which Were Bought By California Men Will Be Taken Up. Principal In Nicola Closing Deal.

The Tom Cat group of mineral claims in the Aspen Grove camp, owned by G. H. Armstrong and Wm. Murray, of Lower Nicola, which were bought by Frank Bailey, representing California capitalists, last May, will be taken up.

R. C. Campbell Johnston, M. E., of California, arrived in Nicola Wednesday, and will go up to the Tom Cat property in a few days to complete the deal and commence work which will continue all winter under his supervision.

The price to be paid for the Tom Cat group is \$15,000 and the first two payments are deposited in the bank.

The Tom Cat group, which adjoins the Portland mines in the north direction, has had quite a lot of work done on it and last summer opened up 16 feet of chalcocite (copper glance), some of which runs from 15 to 25 per cent. in copper. On the Night Hawk claim, which is included in the group, work has shown it up to be a good property, and very rich carbonates are exposed in the line, part of which is dolomite. The ledges all contain good values.

The purchasers of the Tom Cat group are well satisfied with their property and no doubt from the showings so far exposed and the value the ore contains the property will be a bonanza.

### V. V. & E. Plans Approved.

Before leaving for the west on Friday the railway commission approved the plans of the Victoria, Vancouver and Eastern railway. A reservation was made in regard to the Similkameen & Kereenos railway, to the effect that when their proposition and plans came before the board they would be considered and the commission might give them also a line at the points asked for. In other words, their rights, whatever they are, will not be taken away by the building of the V. V. & E., which, however, gets the first opportunity of building, which is all that it asks for.

### Broke His Ankle.

Last Saturday morning while driving a cow across the bridge at Clapperton creek near Walter Clark's residence, Alfred Carrington's horse fell and slid quite a distance, badly dislocating Alfred's ankle. He was taken to his father's residence where medical attendance was at once called and the injured limb set. It will be some time before he will be able to use his foot again.

### Work on the V. V. & E.

The Similkameen cut-off of the Great Northern will be completed through British Columbia up the Similkameen river and on to the coast, a distance of about 380 miles from Grand Forks, within three years, according to a statement made by contractor L. E. Shields in Spokane last Tuesday evening.

In a letter to Mayor Keary of New Westminster, Lord Roberts announces that he kindly accepts the dedication of Professor Trendell's (Vancouver) march "Commandatore," and that the Royal Irish Guards' band will play it at the Dominion exhibition. The management will arrange to have this special musical number rendered on the opening day of the exhibition.

## WHISKEY - MURDER

### VICTIM SHOT IN FACE AND KILLED INSTANTLY

Drunken Row at Spences Bridge Ends In Murder - Gave Himself Up and Will Have Trial

October 6th.

A man named Olsen shot and killed one Hoperoff at Spences Bridge Friday evening about 6 o'clock.

The men had been drinking and the shooting was no doubt the result of a big drunk. Friday being a wet day the men with others did not go to work, but gathered at the tent of Olsen, who was a married man, and with numerous bottles of whiskey there were quarrels more or less all day. During the afternoon the party left and later on Hoperoff returned to Olsen's tent and according to the evidence at the inquest given by an Indian boy, who was an eye-witness to the shooting, went up to Mrs. Olsen and was talking with her and shaking hands - talked away.

Olsen, who had been sleeping in the tent, awoke about this time, and with his grievance against the man and in his drunken stupor, got his shot gun and shot Hoperoff in the face killing him instantly. The murderer went to the store of H. L. Roberts and gave himself up immediately, and was later taken in charge by the constable.

At the coroner's inquest and preliminary hearing Olsen was sent up for trial, which will be held on October 6th.

Sydney Fisher, minister of agriculture. In reply to an invitation sent him by Mayor Keary some time ago the minister says he can now positively state that he will be on hand.

## ARRANGEMENTS FOR MUSIC

### Elaborate Band Stand for Royal Irish Guards at Dominion Fair.

Among the attractive additions to the buildings at Queen's park, where the 1905 Dominion Fair will open on Sept. 27, is an elaborate band stand for the accommodation of the Royal Irish guards band, which has been engaged at enormous cost as the musical feature of the exhibition.

Although the Irish Guards have not been long in existence, and up to their formation there was no particular Irish battalion forming one of the household regiments, it has yet gained a reputation for itself as a magnificent organization, so far as the rank and file are concerned, but more especially through the splendid band that C. H. Hassell succeeded in getting together.

This band comprises forty-two of the finest musicians in any military organization in the British Empire. They have all been selected for their special ability on some particular instrument, and in fact, each and every one is a soloist. In passing, it might be mentioned that it is a gratifying fact and one considered very gratifying to the Royal Military School of Music, that all the bandmasters of His Majesty's Foot Guards received their training at Kneller Hall.

Mr. Hassell, although still a comparatively young man, has been in the service upwards of a quarter of a century, during which time he has been attached to several leading military musical organizations, and was selected for the bandmastership of the Irish Guards out of 100 candidates because he was considered the ablest conductor in the service. His income is larger than that of any bandmaster and his fame extends all over the United Kingdom.

Viscount Vespi, a direct descendant of the original Irish peer, will be the colonel in charge of the Royal Irish guards during their visit to New Westminster.

### Anglo-Japanese Treaty.

A London despatch says: Great Britain and Japan are in league for supremacy of Asia. Two great points stand out conspicuously in the Asiatic policy of Great Britain now that the mists have rolled away from the Portsmouth conference. One is the enlarged alliance with Japan and the other the new programme in India. Perhaps the two should be considered in solidarity, since each is a factor distinctly anti-Russian in origin and tendency.

By the alliance in its new form the contracting powers guarantee the status quo in Asia, each pledging to defend the other if its interests are attacked by any power or combination of powers. Russia is the state whose aggressions they most fear in that part of the world, for she will take the earliest opportunity to recoup herself for the loss of Manchuria.

### Salmon Pack Count.

The salmon pack for the whole of British Columbia during the season just ended was 1,022,231 cases, according to the report sent both from the Fraser river and northern coast canning points. The counts, of course, are liable to change when the fish are cased, but it is probably correct.

The count on the Fraser river showed that 765,813 cases were packed. North of Vancouver as far as the canneries on Nasse Harbor, including every point where fish were put up the report counts showed the pack to have been 256,418 cases.

This count is with respect to sockeye pack only.

## BY ASPEN GROVE

### C. P. R. WILL TAKE EAST PASS UP QUILCHENA CREEK.

Survey Will Now Be Made - Will Pass on Level at Nicola and Along Lake Shore to Quilchena Creek.

As was noted a few weeks ago engineers were in the Aspen Grove country looking over the lay of the country with a view of getting a better pass to the Similkameen, and as a result have found that they can get a route about 280 feet lower than the one previously surveyed.

The party at present in charge of Engineer Hazen will be increased and the survey of the right of way from the Charters ranch will be continued on up to Nicola and the new route to the Similkameen.

Instead of making the raise from the Forks the route will follow on across the Pooley ranch passing Nicola on a level with the town and following the lake shore to Quilchena and up the creek, following the valley up to a point near the Falls, striking the water shed about eight miles further south than it does on the old survey, and making a difference of 280 feet lower.

With the survey now to be made it is quite certain that the railway will go this route and the investigations from several points of view have been satisfactory. By this route construction will be considerably cheaper, the mines will be able to work to better advantage, which will increase the tonnage enormously. Also the company some day may desire to make extensions to Kamloops and the Okanagan section, when the grade will be in such a position that work could be continued on without much trouble.

### "Wild Goose" Wheat.

Government Agent Tunstall, on his return from the Similkameen last week brought with him a sample of wheat which is likely to prove interesting to those who contemplate the cultivation of the dry upland benches in this section. The wheat has been named "wild goose" wheat from the fact that the original seed was obtained from the crop of a wild goose by an uncle of the McCullough Brothers of Otter Valley, who have since then succeed in proving the variety to be practically adapted to the dry belt. The ears owing to the fact that the kernels overlay, seem to be very large, and they will undoubtedly develop into prolific bearers. The wheat apparently does well without irrigation and, for that reason alone, is worthy of notice by the farmers of the interior of British Columbia.

### Standard Burnt Out.

Fire broke out in the Standard Publishing company's building at Kamloops on Friday morning and before the flames was subdued the whole of the upper storey was gutted. The ground floor and machinery were greatly damaged by water. The origin of the fire is unknown. Insurance on the building is said to be \$800; plant insured for \$3,000. The owner of the building is Mrs. Belleau, of Victoria.

### Canada's Revenue.

Canada's revenue for the two months ending August was \$11,635,351, an increase of three-quarters of a million over the same time last year. There was a slight increase of expenditure both ordinary and capital.

No definite action has yet been taken towards the exportation of American silver from Canada, which was decided upon some months ago. It is certain, however, that the decision will be acted upon as soon as arrangements can be made. The situation in British Columbia is thus set forth by a banker. "No I have received no official notification yet, but I think it is certain to come. It is not merely that the silver coins are inconvenient and expensive to handle. The acceptance of American silver at its face value represents a big profit to the United States and a corresponding loss to Canada. The American dollar is worth a little over 60 cents and its present purchasing power is one dollar. I couldn't say what part of silver in circulation in Canada is American, but I think that in British Columbia it must amount to 75 per cent."—Colonist.

An exchange says: There are nine ways in which you can hurt your town. 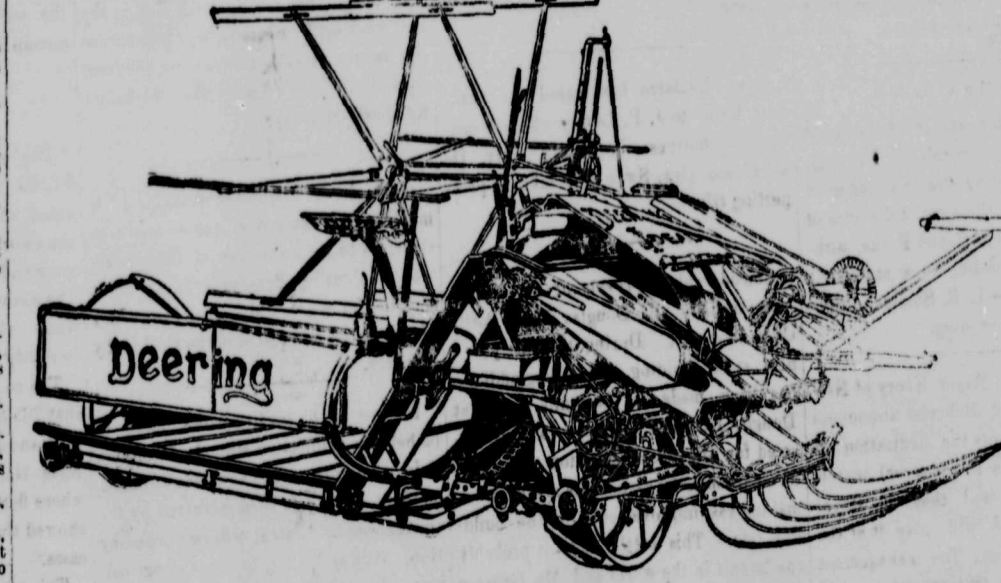

**KAISER ON YELLOW PERIL**

Tells American That "Open Door" Will Be Closed by Japanese.

Congressman McNary of Massachusetts, who was a member of the American party received Saturday by Emperor William, is quoted in the Times despatch from Berlin as follows:

In our interview the Emperor dwelt on the "yellow peril" and expressed the opinion that the Japanese would follow up their military successes by closing the "open door" and by their command of cheap labor force Europe and America out of the Oriental markets. He went on to say that it was now time for the white races to oppose the yellow peril by uniting. The only power that Japan feared was America, and it was a good thing for the world that the United States was on one side of the Japanese empire.

"The Emperor asked us what we thought of German railways. We said frankly that we believed the American lines were better. The Kaiser assented but said he thought German cities were better paved than those in America.

**Dominion Fair Notes.**

All machinery on exhibition at the Dominion Fair will be in motion, electricity and steam both being supplied by the management.

The lighting scheme for Queen's park during the eleven nights of the Dominion Fair will show the outlines of all the big buildings and will illuminate the forest at the rear of the grounds.

From the time of opening in the morning till two o'clock in the afternoon of each day at the 1905 Dominion Fair, Sept. 27 to Oct. 7, in New Westminster will be given up to viewing the exhibits, and the Royal Irish Guards band will discourse music all the while.

Horse racing with klootchmen as riders will be one of the daily attractions in front of the grand stand during the 1905 Dominion fair.

The Sockeye run, which will be the same sort of thing at the 1905 Dominion Fair as the Trail is at the Lewis & Clark fair in Portland, will have every line of attraction known to the show man. There will be more of these entertainments on the ground than has ever been seen outside of a world's fair.

The Dominion Fair opens at 1 o'clock on Wednesday, Sept. 27 and closes on Oct. 7.

**Nelson-Britt Fight.**

In a fight with many novel features, "Batling" Nelson, of Chicago, knocked out James Edward Britt of San Francisco, at Colma, Cal., last Saturday afternoon. The end came in the eighteenth round, and was a fairly won victory.

The surroundings, the crowd, the bitterness of the men towards each other, the uncertainty as to whether there would be a fight at all up to a quarter of an hour before the fight actually began, together with the cleverness and endurance displayed by the two boxers, made the fight of the greatest interest to followers of fighting.

It was the success of a strong enduring fighter against a clever, cool boxer. From the first of the fight until Referee Grady finished the count of ten seconds, Nelson forced the fighting. Although suffering many bruising blows on the face and body and being at times very tired, Nelson never gave ground. He came back after every attack by Britt, always ready to exchange blows. For the rushing, forcing persisting tactics of Nelson, Britt could find no effective blow.

**McKnight Sentenced.**

J. McKnight, who was arrested at Lytton on Saturday, September 2, was given six months or \$100 fine. The charge was being drunk and disorderly, constable McGillivray not having brought any charge against him for resisting arrest with a gun. He paid the fine.
