FAVORABLY PLEASED

WITH SHOWING OF THE MINERAL PROPERTIES.

J. H. Rogers of the Nickle Plate Mines, Looking Over Ten-Mile, Iron Mountain and Highland Valley.

J. H. Rogers of the Nickle Plate mine, Hedley, and who has charge of the work going on on the Bonaparte claims above Ashcroft, was in Coutlee Thursday and Friday. He came in from Ashcroft via the Highland Valley and Ten-Mile creek. On his trip he inspected a number of properties in the Highland Valley section and spent a few days on the I. X. L. group of claims on Ten-Mile, owned by J. W. Collis. He is well pleased with the prospects of the I. X. L. group and has samples of the ore which he will test with the view of taking the property up.

In company with Jos. Graham he visited the McGillivray iron claim, and the coal properties in Coal Gulley, and predicts a great future for the district when the railway is completed.

Mr. Rogers expects to return again shortly and had intended going more thoroughly over this section, but had to return to the Bonaparte properties.

Chinese Demands.

A Washington despatch says Chinese official notification to the powers that she will not recognize any arrangement regarding Manchuria, concerning which she has not been consulted beforehand, has reached Washington, and will be forthwith forwarded to President Roosevelt at Oyster Bay. Before addressing the note to the neutral powers, China sent to St. Petersburg and Tokio an identical note containing this notification. The Chinese communication is briefly worded and is expressed so that it calls for no reply.

Balfour Government Defeated.

A London despatch contains the announcement that the Balfour government was defeated in the House of Commons Thursday night by a majority of three on the motion to reduce the membership of the Irish land commission. The house adjourned until Monday to wait the government's decision regarding the crisis. It is almost certain the government will be rehabilitated by a normal majority. The view that Balfour will resign is not held in circles generally well informed of the government's intentions.

Yesterday afternoon rain fell cooling the atmosphere after the hot days of the past week. During the night heavy rain again fell accompanied by severe thunderstorms and lightning.

CONSTRUCTION WORK.

Advancing Rapidly on the Spences Bridge End.

Work on railway construction is going ahead rapidly and laboring men can get all the work they want.

McLean last week started on the tunnel work at the ten mile hill and other portions of his contract and is getting on well with the work.

An engineers camp has been moved near Canford and another will be in the vicinity of Lower Nicola in a few days.

All along from Spences Bridge up to the 22-Mile House, sub-contractors are shoving work on their contracts. From the 22 up the contractors are getting their plans arranged, teams and outfits on the ground ready to start operations.

Before many weeks this end of the line with the work in progress will put more life into the valley.

What Nicola wants is progress and the building of the railway will open up a wonderfully rich country to the outside world.

To Connect With Nicola-Pentiction.

Arrangements have been made by Manager Stevens, of the local telephone service, to connect subscribers with the Nicola-Pentiction long distance line, says the Inland Sentinel. Those subscribers who desire the long distance service will be provided with a long distance phone at an additional charge of 50 cents a month. The new service will go into effect as soon as the new office is completed.

To Banquet Duncan Ross, M. P.

Arrangements are being made at Greenwood to give a banquet to Duncan Ross, M. P., on his return from Ottawa. This is in recognition of his services in the fight for railway competition. The banquet will be non-political in its character.

Boycott American Goods.

A Shanghai despatch says the boycott on American goods started on Friday morning. All Chinese shops refuse to sell American goods, including Standard oil. All schools and colleges have decided to discard American books.

New C. P. R. Service Next Year.

The C. P. R. intend next year to put on a 73 hour service between the Atlantic and Pacific, and will keep abreast of the times by giving a fast up-to-date service to the traveling public.

Took the Gun Route.

Frank Gaspard, a rancher at Dog Creek, committed suicide during a dance at his home Friday night. A girl refused him the last dance of the evening and gave it to a rival.

Judge Clement.

Barrister Clement, of Grand Forks, has been appointed temporary judge of the county court during the absence of Judge Leamy on account of ill health.

A coast politician has sued a coast daily newspaper for libel. During a campaign very few people take the statements of political writers seriously, and very few politicians have reputations that could be injured by a newspaper article.—Boundary Creek Times.

The C. P. R. have withdrawn their fying of six years ago, on the route between here and Keremeos, and have replaced this with another fying under the Kamloops, Nicola & Similkameen district.—Hekley Gazette.

CRUSHED BY A LOG

AT WOODWARD'S LOGGING CAMP LOWER NICOLA.

J. Caughill Narrowly Escaped Death Last Thursday Morning by a Rolling Log.—Badly Bruised But Will Recover.

On Thursday last at F. D. Woodward's logging and saw-mill camp, near Lower Nicola, J. Caughill narrowly escaped death by a log rolling on him, as it was he was badly injured.

Caughill was alone a short distance from the camp, loading logs on a wagon when his foot got pinioned by a log, another log a distance away started down the hill straight for Caughill, but just before reaching him, one end struck a logging pin and swerved it off some the log going over him slant ways, striking the bowels and crushing his head into a piece of rotten stump which he had got his head by.

The machinery at the mill stopping just about this time, the crews heard his cries and hurried to the scene finding him bruised and fainting. They took him to the camp and Dr. Tutill was at once sent for and attended to his injuries.

Caughill is still at the camp as it was not thought advisable to move him, and is receiving every care from Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Woodward. His injuries are a broken ankle, injury to the spine, pelvis, internally and a number of bruises on the head.

Had the log not struck the logging pin he would have received the full force of its impetus crushing him to death.

CONSERVATIVE ELECTED.

In the By-Election in Alberni Constituency on Saturday.

The result of the by-election in Alberni last Saturday gave Manson the Conservative candidate a majority of sixty over Aitken, Liberal. The campaign was bitter and one of personalities by both sides. The Alberni constituency was opened by the resignation of W. W. B. McInnes, Liberal, who accepted the Yukon governorship.

THE FOURTH ESTATE

REPRESENTATIVES VISIT THE ASPEN GROVE CAMP.

Their Intention to Describe That and Other Sections in Detail With Illustrations for Syndicate of Newspapers.

The Jack-Mac newspaper party, composed of John P. McConnell, John Innes, John McD. Millar, and William MacLeod, have been camped for the last ten days in the vicinity of the Aspen Grove mining camp. They have made a complete tour of that region and visited most of the claims. It is the intention to describe that section in detail for the syndicate of eastern and western papers they represent.

Messrs. McConnell and Millar were in town this week and they are enthusiastic over the showing in the camp. It is Mr. McConnell's intention to describe fully what he has seen in the camp and judging by the opinions he and Mr. Millar have expressed, his description will do Aspen Grove no harm. Mr. McConnell predicts a great future for the camp when transportation has made it possible to ship ores at reasonable cost.

It is probable the party after exploring the Similkameen and Tulameen districts, will return through the Nicola Valley to Spences Bridge in order to see and describe construction operations which they will find under way.

Gun Boat Blows Up.

As a result of a frightful explosion of one of the main boilers of the United States Gun Boat Bennington in San Diego Bay on Friday, twenty-seven bodies of sailors are at the morgues and between 60 and 70 members of the crew are in hospitals. Many of the injured may die. The warship was much shattered, a great hole being torn in the stern. The ship was beached to prevent its sinking.

The cause is said to be a defect in the boiler, which for many months was thought to be unsafe, but which on inspection was reported favorably upon. The ship was getting up steam preparatory to towing the disabled Wyoming to Mare island.

Senator Bostock's Residence Burned.

Senator Bostock's residence at Ducks, was burned to the ground late Friday afternoon, and is a total loss.

It was only last year that Senator Bostock erected a large addition to his residence, and it was deemed one of the finest private houses in the upper country.

NICOLA GOVERNMENT OFFICE.

Efforts should be made to have the government office at Nicola separate from the Kamloops and Princeton offices. At present it is only a sub-office, the majority of returns made from it are credited to the other offices. Besides that this section of the country has so developed in the past few years to be made more than a sub-office and also have a mining division with a mining recorder. At present the man in charge of the Nicola office is government agent, assessor and collector, sub-mining recorder, registrar of the court, justice of the peace, and numerous other things. In other sections of the province places of very little importance have a gold commissioner, stipendary magistrate with the other offices and receives compensation for same. In Nicola the government agent does the same work with less remuneration. It is hoped that efforts will be put forth to have the Nicola office distinctly Nicola, giving it credit for what it produces, and placing the business more satisfactorily to the government, and to the general public.

TIMBER DESTRUCTION.

"While British Columbia has in the aggregate a vast supply of timber, the only timber that has an immediate market value is that which is near transportation. The percentage of this loss by fire must be appallingly large and unless active steps are taken to prevent this destruction, only a relatively small amount of the timber now standing will ever reach the market. So numerous are the fires in a dry season that the whole countryside may be buried under a dense pall of smoke. In a dry season like last year the fire is apt to consume everything. Last summer I climbed up a hillside through fine green timber and about a week later came down the same place wading knee-deep in ashes. Not a vestige of anything com-

bustible in the soil had been left—the hillside was as bare as the bottom of an alkali pond."—Prof. Brock in Canadian Forestry Journal.

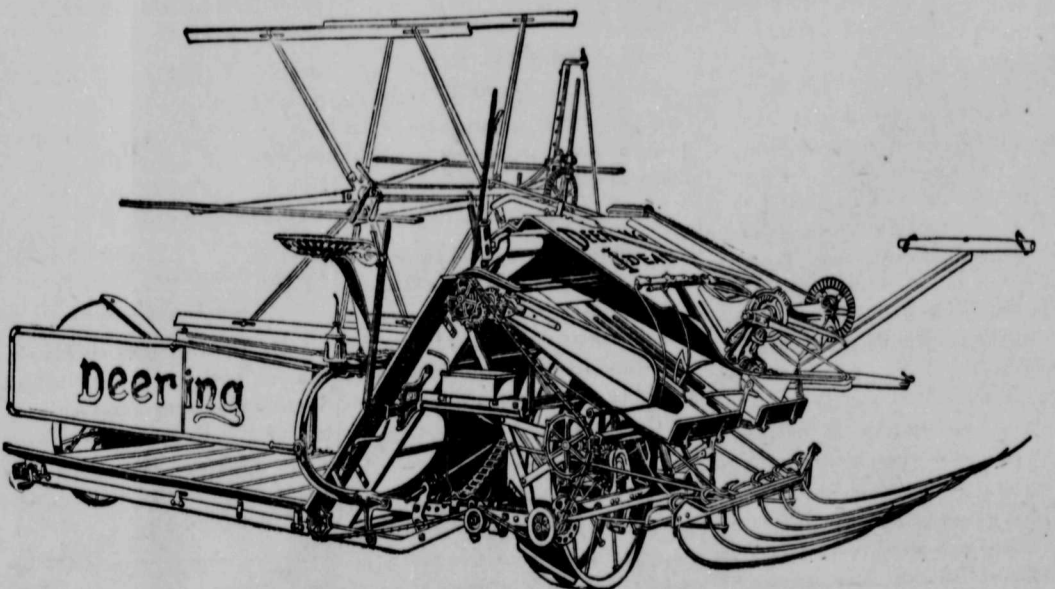

BIG BRITISH BATTLESHIP.
Will be Equal to Any Two Now Afloat.
To be Built at Portsmouth.

The construction of the largest and most powerful battleship in the world is soon to begin at the Portsmouth dockyard. It is planned to build the vessel from the laying of the keel plates to the hoisting of the pennant in a period of 16 months. Thirty to thirty six months is the average time at present devoted to the building of battleships of smaller size. The rapidity is calculated to result in great economy, but nevertheless the cost is estimated at \$10,000,000. So heavily will this vessel be armed that she will be equal to any two battleships now afloat, and her striking power at such a range as that at which the engagement opened in the battle of the Sea of Japan will be as great as any three battleships of the ordinary type. The displacement will be about 18,000 tons. The Dreadnought, as the battleship will be called, will mount twelve 12-inch guns of the latest type, throwing three 850 pound shells every two minutes. The vessel will be driven by turbines, and will be able to steam at upwards of 20 knots an hour. She will carry no secondary armament.

The elimination of the 6-inch guns, borne by practically all the battleships of the world hitherto, is one of the main lessons deduced from the long range actions in the far east. The essential feature of a battleship in modern conditions is now realized, and must be the ability to deliver stunning blows at a range of five or six miles, and this the Dreadnought, with her dozen great guns, will be able to do with terrific effect. No battleship has hitherto mounted more than four of these weapons.
