



## HERRING FISHING STARTS IN NANAIMO

Run Expected to Be Heavy  
This Season—500 Men to  
Be Employed.

Nanaimo, Nov. 9.—Herring are now running in various places along the coast and some fair catches are being made especially at Pender bay. Within two or three weeks, according to usual custom, it is expected the fish will be making their annual visit to Nanaimo.

With each year the value of the fisheries of Nanaimo increases. Enquiry at Inspector Taylor's office elicits the information that the business this year will be conducted on a larger scale than ever with probably 500 men being engaged.

Last year fifteen drag seine licenses were issued and twenty gill net licenses. Practically all of those holding licenses last year will be operating here again this season with several more companies from the mainland. With all these men, most of whom come from outside points here, being employed in this industry, it will be seen that the fisheries of Nanaimo in dollars and cents, means something annually to the city. Each of the drag seines will employ on an average of 8 to 10 men. The Japanese companies holding licenses, employ many more to each seine, as high as 12 to 18. The gill nets will engage about two men to a seine. Besides those actively engaged in fishing other men are employed in the curing establishments and in other ways.

It is estimated that the value of the Nanaimo fisheries in all its different branches last season in Nanaimo proper was close on to half a million dollars.

## Synopsis of Canadian Homestead Regulations.

Any available Dominion lands within the railway belt in British Columbia, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 15 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased), of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2500 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. A royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the merchantable coal mined.

## VOLUNTEER BOUNTY ACT, 1908. WARNING TO PURCHASERS.

Every assignment of the right of a South African Volunteer entitled to a land grant must be by way of appointment of a substitute and must be in the form provided by the Act.

Special attention is called to Sub-section 3 of Section 5 of the Volunteer Bounty Act, 1908, which provides that no assignment of the right of a volunteer by the appointment of a substitute shall be accepted or recognized by the Department of the Interior which is not executed and dated after the date of the warrant for the land grant issued by the Minister of Militia and Defence in favor of the volunteer.

## Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.  
(2) A homesteader may, if he so

desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. The ownership in land will not meet the requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or on a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.

## HILL MAKES PLEA FOR RECIPROCITY

(Continued from Page One)

at the Canadian mercantile marine, while we are of the sacred future of the world, considered the banquet.

"And we must carry our own flag. Our own flag is the Japanese flag or any other flag that will carry our exports to the United States. Once in a while we in the United States build a ship, but the fact is that we have not a ship on the water that is to own a voyage."

But he presented a vastly different picture in railway transportation.

"In this we have been told our own with an open door. The average investment in railways in the United States is \$100,000,000, while the average performance in freight carrying exceeds 100,000,000 miles, while in Great Britain the average investment for mile was near three and a half (three and a half) and the freight carry the same."

"If a railway does not serve the people, the merchant and farmer, to make a fair profit on their shipments," added Hill, "it were better that the railway had never been built. Upon intelligent management depends the prosperity of the country."

On the question of whether the cheaper Minnesota would receive and discharge cargo in Vancouver, to avoid the ruling of the American Interstate Commerce Commission, Hill said:

"It is a real live question, whether it would not be advisable for the Great Northern railway to make the terminal of its Trans-Pacific traffic in Vancouver, rather than at Seattle, in view of the adverse ruling of the interstate commerce commission respecting the advance publication of the rates for railway haulage of export business as well as in view of the unsatisfactory character of the United States navigation laws. If we should take action in the direction indicated, our big ocean liner, the Minnesota, would be given a British register. What I say respecting our own steamship applies to other American vessels engaged in the Oriental trade. The present handicap is too great to compete on even terms with our rivals. The matter has already received much consideration."

On the subject of the probable transfer of Alex. Maclean and J. W. Allen from Seattle to St. Paul, President Elliott of the Northern Pacific, said:

"We have no intention of transferring those officials. Both are good men and we want them to remain in Seattle, where they can do their best work."



# "HOLD THE TIMBER."

This sound advice was handed out by Mr. James J. Hill, the railway magnate, at a banquet given in his honor by the Vancouver board of trade on Saturday last. While late in the day for us to call a halt it is not yet too late, and we opine that some good may result, for, in the same issue of the government organ that reports his speech, we find the News-Advertiser "entirely in accord." This sudden conversion from the declared policy of the McBride government, of alienating the timber areas of the province for the purpose of providing a yearly income by way of taxation, and the strong defense of that policy by three ministers, Premier McBride, Hon. Capt. Taitow and Hon. Mr. Bowser, the gigantic fortunes made by some of the government supporters was not commented on by this same journal, the News-Advertiser, when page after page in its issues contained nothing but notices of application for timber leases. It was then that the most powerful conservative organ in the province should have sounded the warning note, but no halt in the giveaway policy was made until the recipients of the government's bounty were so loaded down, that the bottom dropped out of the market. The timber limit market has not recovered yet, and while the government may refuse leases for a period, we think that the finance minister missed the chance of his life when he let all the "unearned increment" enter the pockets of the speculators instead of going into the provincial treasury to wipe out the provincial public debt, which it assuredly would have done. However, so much has gone that is unrecoverable, and we must make the most of what remains. We are glad to see the conversion of the government organ in these words: "But the government's policy should be to secure the unearned increment for the people, as Mr. Hill indicated."

## RECIPROCITY.

Now that Canada has become a force in the commercial world, we find many of the foremost Americans, Republicans as well as Democrats, suggesting a change by removing the customs barrier now existing between the two countries which are separated by the 49th. It is significant that since we have given what is known as British preference all talk about reciprocity comes from our neighbors. Our policy with respect to the movement became fixed when we received the rebuff at Washington, and no Canadian statesman could with dignity re-open the question. Since that rebuff was administered to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, we have not only grown in trade importance, but we have been reaching out, with a large measure of success, for the markets our American cousins had very largely controlled. We have become competitors in very many lines of manufactured goods. Our trade with the Orient has gone up by leaps and bounds, while that of the United States has not only stood still, but in some lines in which we competed with them has fallen off entirely. We have made such inroads into their grain carrying trade that the New York Chamber of Commerce demanded a state commission to enquire into the grain traffic. We not only carry the percentage of the grain they carried for us, but we are carrying very much of their harvest through our territory, and shipping from our own ports at the seaboard. There can be no question but that the nation with a population ten times greater than ours is feeling keenly the competition Canada is putting up and it is ever cropping up in the speeches of thoughtful men over there, and when they are entertained at public functions here.

There is an added reason for alarm on their part, that is the steady influx into Canada from the United States of that class of well-to-do settler which any nation is glad to welcome. The United States manufacturer would like to follow these people with the implements they have been in the habit of using on their American holdings. This cannot be done so profitably, as long as the tariff wall exists, and while it may be a source of annoyance and of expense to the transportation companies, the customs barrier is pretty sure of a long life, from expediency as well as necessity. After the adoption of British

preference Canada could hardly enter into an arrangement at the suggestion of Washington that does not include the whole British nation in its scope.

company, but the claims which will be sure to come in from passengers will undoubtedly be heavier than this. A conservative estimate of the cost of the switchman's blunder to the B. C. E. R. is placed at \$50,000.

The funeral of the two victims of the accident will take place tomorrow afternoon to the I. O. O. F. cemetery, when representatives of the Knights of Pythias, under whose auspices the funeral will take place, the Orangemen and the Street Railway Men's Union will attend in large numbers.

### The Two Victims.

Murdoch McDonald, the motorman who was instantly killed, was 30 years of age, and had been living at the Cosmopolitan hotel for the past two years. He was a native of Glace Bay, Nova Scotia, and was a bachelor. He is survived by his mother and four sisters, three of whom reside at the old home, the fourth being in the United States at the present time. For some time after coming here, McDonald worked on the dredge King Edward.

Ralph Jamieson, who was 41 years of age, is survived by a widow, three children, a brother and mother, all of whom live at Sapperton. He had been in the employ of the B. C. E. R. a considerable time and was one of the most popular men on the line. He was a member of Granite Lodge, No. 6, K. of P., having joined this lodge after Fraser River Lodge, Sapperton, of which he was a charter member, had ceased to exist.

## BOSNIANS BLOW UP AUSTRIAN BARRACKS

One Hundred and Seventy Soldiers  
Reported Killed Eighty Miles  
From Serbian Frontier.

Paris, Nov. 9.—A special dispatch from Belgrade says that a band of Bosnian refugees from the mountains on Friday blew up with dynamite the barracks at Kozitza, a town in Herzegovina, situated about eighty miles from the Serbian frontier, killing 179 German-speaking Austrian soldiers. The dispatch also says that the Austrian papers have suppressed this news.

## CHINESE WIVES OF WHITES CLAIM EXEMPTION FROM TAX

Victoria, Nov. 9.—A question as to whether Chinese wives of white men are liable to the \$500 head-tax on landing in Canada has been raised by the arrival on board the Empress of India today of two British engineers, who have been working on the Canton-Kowloon railroad, bringing Chinese wives. They hold that their wives should be considered as taking their husbands' nationality, and consequently should not be amenable to the tax. The question has been referred to Ottawa.

**THE ARMENIAN QUESTION.**  
London, Nov. 9.—The "Times" correspondent at Constantinople reports that the Turkish government will make an effort to deal with the Armenian question by conceding grants of government lands to those Armenians possessing title deeds to land from which they were dispossessed by the Kurds at the time of the massacres.

**INVINCIBLE A 30-KNOTTER**  
London, Nov. 9.—The British battleship Invincible, the latest addition to the British navy, in a trial yesterday under seven-tenths of her power attained a speed of 25 knots. It is expected that the vessel, when working under full power, will reach a speed of 30 knots, a world's record.

## HOLY TRINITY CHURCH IS NOW OUT OF DEBT

Congregation Will Now Devote Energies to Assisting Rural Parishes.

The special Thanksgiving service held last evening at Holy Trinity cathedral was of a choral character throughout. Stainer's beautiful sevenfold "Amen" was very creditably rendered by the choir immediately after the benediction and the service concluded by congregation and choir joining in the singing of the national anthem as a mark of respect to King Edward, "the peace-maker," whose birthday was also being commemorated.

The Rev. A. Shildrick preached from the text "Giving Thanks at all Times and at all Seasons," and in the course of his remarks pointed out that Canada had been granted blessings of late, almost beyond expectation, and had not experienced the troubles and difficulties that are even now throwing a dark shadow over other nations. Bringing the "Thanksgiving" blessings nearer home the preacher showed how British Columbia as a province and New Westminster as a city had good cause for thanks for mercies received and blessings derived from the Great Giver of all.

Coming to purely parochial matters it was stated that the officers of the church had this year been able to clear off all debt against the cathedral, thus giving scope for the congregation to extend a helping hand to the rural parishes, which, owing to the extensive growth of settlement during the past year, stood in need of much pecuniary assistance.

### BIG HALIFAX BLOCK

DESTROYED BY FIRE

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 9.—For three hours last evening the entire city fire apparatus was battling with flames in Black Brothers' four-storey brick house on Water street, and it looked for a time as if the entire block, including Pickford & Black's steamship warehouses, would be swept away. The fire started in a room on the top floor of the building, in which a large quantity of pressed hay was stored, and the smoke was so dense that it was some time before the flames could be checked. Four firemen were injured and had to be removed. The building was occupied by the offices of the M. E. Keefe company and G. C. Cook, fruit importers.
