## DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN ESSINGTON

**Fire Breaks Out Sunday Afternoon  
Destroying Greater Part of the  
Town—Buildings Dynamited to  
Stop Progress of Fire.**

### LOSS OVER \$100,000

Port Essington, January 4—Fire originating in the Caledonia Hotel Annex yesterday afternoon destroyed a large portion of the town. Owing to the severe cold weather prevailing and no water pressure it was necessary to use dynamite to blow up buildings on the east and west side of the fire center to save the remainder of the town. The total loss will amount to about \$100,000.

A defective flue was the cause of the fire.

The following buildings were totally destroyed:

Caledonia Hotel and Annex and the Royal Bank, loss about \$15,000.

MacKenzie & Jackson's general store, loss \$10,000.

Ragstad's jewelry store, loss about \$1,000.

Mills & Co.'s drug store, loss \$2,000.

Photograph gallery owned by a

Jap. loss \$1,000.

Anglican church and school building, loss \$5,000.

The Lorenz residence, loss \$2,000.

Warner's restaurant, loss \$2,000.

Chinese restaurant and laundry, loss \$3,000.

Other losses include a Japanese store, about fifteen small cottages with their contents and part of the wharf belonging to the Skeena River Commercial Co., totaling a loss of somewhere near \$30,000.

Concussion produced by the dynamite explosions wrecked practically all the windows in town, adding a further loss of about \$3,000.

The contents of Ragstad's jewelry store were saved and the loss sustained by him was on building only.

Only the absence of wind saved the entire town from destruction, and as it was it was only owing to the prompt and heroic work of the citizens that a business building is standing in Port Essington today. No one was injured.

Most of the property owners who suffered loss are partially protected by insurance.

## Needed Improvements in Naval Warfare

The next great improvement in naval warfare will be on the lines of ways and means of repeating what the Romans did—ways and means of charging upon and grappling with the mighty war vessels of an enemy to sink them with the short sword of high explosives. There is no one thing so much needed in naval warfare at the present time as a more efficient means of reaching battleships and cruisers with a sufficient quantity of high explosives for their destruction. In other words there is a more imperative demand for improvements in torpedoes and torpedo boats than in any other branch of the naval service. The effective range of the modern high power gun is now about five miles, and it is the range of the guns that determines the distance between the lines of battle of the modern fleets, and the fleet with guns of the longest range has the opposing fleet at its mercy.

Not long ago the automobile torpedo was thought to be a valuable adjunct to the armament of the modern battleship, but the range of the guns has now been so increased that such torpedoes become a useless incumbrance because of the shortness of their range, notwithstanding the fact that their manufacturers have done everything possible to perfect them and to increase their speed and range. Their range is necessarily limited to that attainable by the charge of compressed air they are capable of carrying. During the past few years the pressure of the air has been increased from 1,500 pounds to the square inch to 2,250 pounds to the square inch and the weight of air from 60 pounds to 130 in the 18-inch torpedo, and still the maximum range of the 18-inch torpedo is only from 3,000 to 3,500 yards, practically about one-third of the range of the high power guns which determine the distance apart of the lines of battle, and the maximum rate of speed of this torpedo is about 35 knots.—Hudson Maxim in The Metropolitan.

## TELEGRAPH NEWS

Ottawa, January 8—There are now four senatorial vacancies to be filled, namely, two in Nova Scotia, one in Ontario and one in Manitoba. In Nova Scotia the vacancies are over a year's standing. In Ontario the vacancy was caused by the death last summer of Senator Merner, and in Manitoba the death of Senator Banner last week made the fourth vacancy in the Upper Chamber.

It is not likely that any appointment to fill the vacancies will be made until just prior to the opening of parliament.

Agincourt, Ont., January 8—Walter Blyth, a C.P.R. section hand, was arrested here last night for the murder of his wife. Blyth surrendered himself and admitted his guilt. He beat his wife to death, it is alleged, with a poker.

Naples, Italy, January 8—During the night hoodlums ran through the streets in various quarters of the city crying, "Earthquake! Earthquake!" Their cries aroused thousands of people, who rushed out of their houses, thus giving thieves the opportunity they sought to plunder. The frightened population gathered in squares and crowded into churches. Others marched through the streets in procession, and for some time great consternation prevailed.

Indianapolis, January 8—President Lawis has been re-elected head of the United Mine Workers of America.

Bellingham, Wash., January 8—The tug "Edna," in danger of foundering in heavy seas in Rosafio Straits or being dashed on the rocks, a party of prominent Seattle capitalists on board had a narrow escape from death yesterday. The Edna's engines gave out and she was rapidly drifting ashore when the steamer Rosalie, in response to signals of distress, steamed out and took the passengers off the launch.

Messina, Italy, January 8—Several light shocks were felt today which tumbled down tottering walls, and renewed fires.

Media, Penn., January 8—Mrs. Florence Erb and sister, Mrs. Beisel, were acquitted yesterday of the murder of Captain J. Clayton Erb, the Philadelphia politician, and husband of Mrs. Erb. The prosecution sought to show that Mrs. Erb, who is a dashing society leader, shot her husband in cold blood. Mrs. Erb testified that her husband beat her frequently, and that on the night he was killed she called her sister, Mrs. Beisel to her rescue. She said that Mrs. Beisel sought to interfere and that her husband turned upon Mrs. Beisel and a struggle followed in which Mrs. Beisel secured Captain Erb's revolver and shot him five times.

Rome, January 8—In accepting on behalf of the Italian nation the ship "Baryern," which was fitted out by the American people through the Red Cross fund for the sufferers from the recent earthquakes, the King said to Ambassador Griscom: "Our people will be delighted to hear of this work of international humanitarianism, and will follow with the keenest interest the work of mercy that will be performed by the Bayern."

London, England—The death of Harry Barnato robs London of her most eccentric millionaire and enriches the British treasury probably to the extent of \$7,500,000 through death duties.

Born in Whitechapel where he was known as Harry Isaacs, he and his famous brother Barney entered the diamond fields of South Africa as vaudeville performers, Harry juggling and conjuring and Barney reciting for a living. At his death he was reputed to be the richest untitled man in England, his wealth exceeding \$75,000,000.

Vancouver, January 9—The steamship Princess May arrived in port Wednesday night completely covered with snow and ice. After leaving Port Essington she passed through the worst blizzard ever encountered on the north coast.

London, January 8—Colonel Lamb of the Salvation Army says he expects to send 8,000 immigrants to Canada in 1909. They will go as prospective workers on land. Being virtually under contract, they will be exempt from the regulation requiring the possession of \$25 each.

Montreal, Que.—Several representative parties from Europe have arranged to inspect land along the line of the C. P. R. and G. T. P. in British Columbia next spring, and the first of these will arrive in March.

The very best class of farmers from Scotland and the north of England, with the necessary capital, will be settled in these new sections, say the railway people.

Kansas City, Mo.—"I did not shoot any of the police," protested "Adam God" Sharp today under the ordeal of the third degree at police headquarters. "It was God acting through me. He called upon me to do his work and protect His lambs."

James Sharp, self-styled "Adam God," is badly wounded and probably will die as the result of the recent encounter between his band of "Holy Rollers" and the police.

Sydney, N. S. W., January 1—McIntosh, the promoter of the Burns-Johnson fight, will offer \$50,000 for a contest between Jefferies and Johnson. Receipts from the recent fight amounted to \$150,000. Fitzsimmons and Jack (Twin) Sullivan have both challenged Johnson.

## Jack London a Star Gazer

"By the end of the week, teaching myself," writes Jack London in Harper's Weekly of his mastery of the science of navigation, "I was able to do divers things. For instance, I shot the North star, at night, of course—got its altitude, corrected for error, dip, etc., and found our latitude. And this latitude agreed with the latitude of the previous noon corrected by dead reckoning up to that moment. Proud? Well, I was even prouder with my next miracle. I worked out the problem self instructed and learned what star of the first magnitude would be passing the meridian around half past 8. This star proved to be Alpha Crucis. I had never heard of the star before. I looked it up on the star map. It was one of the stars of the Southern Cross. What, thought I! Have we been sailing with the Southern Cross in the sky of nights and never known it? Dolts that we are! Gudgeons and moles! I couldn't believe it. I went over the problem again and verified it. Charming had the wheel from 8 till 10 that evening. I told her to keep her eyes open and look due south for the Southern Cross, and when the stars came out there shone the Southern Cross low on the horizon. Proud? No medicine man nor high priest was ever prouder. Furthermore, with the prayer wheel I shot Alpha crucis and from its altitude worked out our latitude, and still furthermore I shot the North star, too, and it agreed with what had been told me by the Southern Cross. Proud? Why, the language of the stars was mine, and I listened and heard them telling me my way over the deep.

## Climatic Changes Continually Taking Place

There is plenty of evidence of the very best sort which goes to prove that not only in Europe and North America, but the lands situated within the arctic circle, must have enjoyed a tropical climate. The numerous fossil remains found in those regions are those of plants and animals which, according to the present state of our knowledge, must have lived under conditions now found only in the equatorial belt. ### A Neutral Zone.

Probably in order to avoid possible disputes in remote districts, the Government has received a request from the Imperial Government to reserve a strip sixty feet wide on the British Columbia side of the international boundary. The request comes from the British Ambassador through the Ottawa Government, which has agreed to reserve a similar strip along the boundary wherever the public lands belong to the Dominion. The United States is doing the same thing, the president having issued a proclamation declaring that all public lands for sixty feet on the American side of the line will in future be reserved from sale, settlement or lease.

Of course in all cases where land has actually been alienated right up to the boundary, the proprietors will not be disturbed, but no such grants will be made in the future. Mining locations, farms and so forth on the boundary line have in the past proved to be a fruitful source of dispute, and not infrequently, owing to careless surveying, an owner has found out that part of his possessions lie in the United States, or in Canada, as the case may be, with the result that he loses title to part of his land.
