NEED THREE STEAM SHOVELS ON BURNS LAKE CONTRACTS

Six Dinkey Engines, One Hundred Cars and Several Hundred Men
--Two Years to Complete the Work--First Shovel
Now in Town Ready for Shipment

On Sunday last the first steam shovel of three arrived in town and has since been dismantled and loaded on sleighs ready for shipment to Burns Lake as soon as the snow comes. This shovel came from camp 24 and was brought to town under her own steam. Dick Johnston, superintendent at Stewart Bros. camp, Burns Lake, is in charge of the work. The other two shovels will arrive any time now and will be ready for shipment when the snow comes.

The Burns Lake work is one of the big pieces on the western end of the G. T. P. Stewart Bros. and Rankin are the contractors and to accomplish their task they will use three steam shovels, six dinkey engines, one hundred cars and between three and four hundred men. The engines and cars are now at Sealey and along the

line ready for shipment and Johnston will have at least a hundred head of horses on the road when he once gets started. To complete the work will take at least two years and during that time an immense amount of supplies will be sent out from New Hazelton to keep the camps going. There are between 600,000 and 700,000 yards of material to move and the rock is some of the hardest yet encountered. At the present time they are drifting for a big shot which will be put off about the first of the month. This one shot will use 35 tons of powder. The completion of the Burns Lake work will very nearly mark the completion of the western division of the road and the eastern division will not be many months behind. It is hardly expected, however, that the road will be connected up in less than two and a half years.

Real Estate Men Coming

F. C. McKinnon has wired from Vancouver to his Hazelton office to close that place up on Dec. 1st and move to New Hazelton. Harvey & McKinnon are one of the oldest real estate firms in the north and their action means considerable to the new town. The past week the firm has been looking for a temporary location until their own office building is completed.

Business Booming

All roads point to New Hazelton. Business in all lines is humming and it takes the present staffs half the night to catch up to the days business. Merchants, restaurants, poolrooms, hotels and rooming houses are all kept on the jump and business is getting better all the time. The boom is on and it will continue for years. Every business place in town will make a bunch of money.

Arrangements have been completed by the G.T.P. engineers on the Western Mountain Division for an At Home, to be held in Swanson's Hall Telkwa on Dec. 6th. Invitations will be issued shortly. A citizens' meeting is called for Monday night in the Presbyterian tent for the purpose of organizing a Citizens' Association to carry on the affairs of the town until such time as it is possible to incorporate. Besides the organization there are many matters of importance to be taken up and every man in town is asked to be present and take an interest.

MACHINERY IS NOW INSTALLED

Big Plant Now Ready to Operate at Silver Standard Mine—Shaft Down 240 Feet

Manager Haskins, Silver Standard Mine, was in town on Monday and reported that all the heavy machinery had been installed at the mine and that they were in shape to run. There are still a few small machines to come, such as the lighting plant, etc. These are however on the way. In the meantime sinking has been continued on the big shaft which is now down 240 feet, and they have never lost sight of the ore. Silver Standard is now shaping up like a big mine and soon the production of ore from that property will prove it to be all that has been claimed. The arrival of the snow is all that is holding back the shipping.

STOPPED WORK FOR THE SEASON

R. G. Steele On His Way Back to England for the Winter—Return in the Spring

R. G. Steele, who has been all summer at the Hudson Bay Mountain Mining Co's property on Hudson Bay Mountain, in the interests of his English company, was in town on Friday on his way out for the winter. The big tunnel contract taken by Peter Schoffer has not yet been completed. There are still 150 feet to go, but the work has been discontinued for the winter and Mr. Steele is returning to England where he will report progress to the company. Speaking to the Herald he said he was more than pleased with the progress made during the past season. They have cross-cut one vein 15 feet wide and the ore is more than satisfactory. As soon as the spring opens up he will be back and resume the work. At present everything is covered with snow around his district. The property itself is showing up even better than was at first expected and they are all well satisfied. It has all the earmarks of being one of the big mines of the district, and when Mr. Steele gets back next spring he will no doubt have some important announcements to make as to future developments.

An Open Winter

Local weather profits are now predicting that this will be an open winter. The season is so far backward now and there are signs of the mild weather continuing for some time. Last year at this time there had been considerable zero weather. It is six or seven years ago that the district experienced the last open winter.

Thos. Arneill, Prince Rupert, was in town the past week representing Kelly-Douglas Co. He was making a special trip for the firm and while here he met many of his old friends.

BIG WIND STORM CAUSES DAMAGE

Windows Are Blown In and Buildings Damaged in Prince Rupert—Boats Miss Train

The heavy wind storm that struck New Hazelton on Tuesday was, according to reports, quite general in the interior and along the coast. While it was a little more severe in New Hazelton than for some time, the brunt of it was borne by Prince Rupert and the steamers on the coast service. At Prince Rupert many windows were blown in and buildings wrenched from foundations, while the steamers on the coast run had to take refuge from the gale that raged. This is probably the first time the new G. T. P. boats on that run have had to lay up on account of bad weather, and the boat due to reach Prince Rupert on Wednesday was delayed more than the total number of delayed hours last year. As a result of this, all passengers from the south were unable to make connections at Prince Rupert, and have had to lay over there until the Saturday train.

WILL APPLY FOR THEIR STATION

Telkwa People Refuse to Move—Have a Good Town on the Railway and Want a Station

The Telkwa people are organizing for the purpose of a united action to get a station at that town as soon as the railway reaches that point in the spring. Telkwa is the oldest place in the northern interior to Hazelton and for many years people have made that their headquarters; the Provincial Government has spent many thousands of dollars on roads, trails and bridges leading from all points to Telkwa. At the present time all roads go there and the mining properties in the district make that their headquarters. The town is growing rapidly and is quite a size. It is exceptionally well situated and the people there do not wish to move. They have a strong case and there is no doubt but that they will get a station.

The First Snow

The first snow of the season fell here on Sunday night. It was only a flurry and did not last long. The weather to date has been ideal and the cold and snow may be expected at any time now.

Mrs. W. S. Haskins will arrive next Wednesday night from Oakland, Cal., with her little daughter to join Mr. Haskins, manager of Silver Standard mine. Mr. Haskins has fixed up his cabin at the mine and there is now lots of room for his family. Mrs. Haskins will be welcomed in the district.

EXCURSION BY HOCKEY CLUB

Tournament to be Held Here—Prince Rupert, Hazelton, Chicken Lake and New Hazelton

The hockey club has been making plans for the past few days to bring an excursion from Prince Rupert and all along the line to New Hazelton for the New Year's season. The hockey club will be in fair shape by that time, and the rink will be in better shape. The idea is to bring a team from Prince Rupert, Hazelton, and, if possible, the Telkwa or Chicken Lake team, and have a two- or three-day tournament. The rink will be lighted by acetylene 5000 candle power lamps, which will make it as light as day. The excursion would come up on the Saturday train and return on the following Wednesday. A first-class time would be afforded the visitors, and the town people are unanimously in favor of the move.

Finished His Work

Engineer P. A. Jenns, who has been in charge of the Ross' tunnel contract for the past couple of years has everything now cleaned up and has closed his camp. It was a big contract and he had a lot of heavy work to look after. But he has made a good job and now he goes out to Fraser Lake on another section of the road. Mr. Jenns many friends in town are very sorry to learn of his departure.

Getting Out Timber

Word has been received from Prince Rupert that Peck, Moore & Co. are now getting out the timber for the construction of the new high level bridge at Hagueltgate. This timber will come from Georgetown Saw Mills and will be here next week ready for the contractor.

The Up-to-date Drug Store, at the corner of Pugsley street and Eleventh avenue, is this week being fully stocked and the first of next week will be open for business. Wm. Larmer has been in charge of the moving and he will open the store and remain in charge for some time.

With this issue we make our bow to the public as full fledged citizens of New Hazelton—the rapidly growing town of the interior—and in doing so we desire to express our pleasure in associating ourselves with the people of the new town. We came of our own accord in the hopes of increasing our bank account, and in our efforts to achieve this object we will do our utmost to assist every other man in the town and district to increase his. The policy of the Omineca Herald in the future will be as in the past: "To tell the outside world the facts about the Hazelton district, and of New Hazelton—the hub of this immensely wealthy district." In our efforts to help the town and district we ask the New Hazelton people to assist us, and we feel confident that our request will be granted.

Moving to New Hazelton was an immense undertaking. Beginning on Thursday of last week the first lot of stationery stock came over and every day until the following Tuesday one or more loads of machinery, type, etc., arrived in town. It required two four-horse teams, three two-horse teams, besides small consignments, to move the Omineca Herald. Everything has arrived in good shape and the plant is now all installed and in good working order. The paper comes out this week as usual.

The new building of the Omineca Herald is the finest in the interior of this northern country. It is two storeys, 25x40 feet. It is well built and the best lumber and material from the coast was used. The lower floor will suffice for the office for this year, and the editor will reside upstairs. There is every reason to believe, however, that in another year most of the second floor will be required for office purposes. The Herald has enjoyed splendid success in the past, and the circulation of the paper is increasing so rapidly, and the job department is also increasing so rapidly, that at a very early date larger presses will have to be secured. We are now purchasing heavy machinery for the job department and we have just received another shipment of new type. At the present time it would be hard to find another office in British Columbia, considering the population to draw from, that will equal the outfit of the Omineca Herald.

The Herald office is now in running order, and we shall be pleased to receive any visitors and customers at any time.

Every four years the people of the United States walk to the polls and cast their vote in favor of the candidate of their choice; some reverently, seriously and to the very best conception of their duty as citizens of the republic; others with a greenback and an election smile. The 1912 election is now a part of history, and the business and monetary conditions will soon find their level, and work smoothly and profitably till the pendulum of time hurls them on another four years, when they will experience the same upset conditions that seem attendant upon every election.

As to the wisdom or folly of the decision at the polls, the future alone can decide. Through the campaign of slander, charge and counter charge Wilson alone emerged unscathed. Missouri said, "Show me" and the majority of the voters seem to have been from the same state. It could hardly have been otherwise. As Governor Wil-

son, the president-elect performed the duties of his office fearlessly, faithfully and well. A man of keen discernment, constructive and executive ability, the people look for him to give a good account of himself, and at the end of next term he will no doubt be able to stand by his stewardship.

Teddy was expected to make a much better run, especially in the west, but recent developments in the investigation of campaign contributions made things look gloomy from the standpoint of the common people, to whom he was appealing. His party, the Progressives, was practically new, being formed at the Republican Convention this year when the same machine he depended on for nomination proved to be too strongly in the control of Taft. No doubt the machine was used by Taft to the full limit of his power and that justice, common decency and the wishes of the masses were trampled under foot. That Roosevelt should have been the nominee of the Republican party was conclusively demonstrated at the primaries, when, in almost every state that holds primaries, he was the choice, then that fanatic was very lack in judging his time to slam a 44 in Teddy's slats. Had this affair been delayed one week later the people would have run the Bull Moose to a much better showing and gave the Progressives a more hopeful view of the future. Meanwhile Roosevelt is the head of a new party—the only party that can arrange their platform, without apology, to meet the present cry for remedy in the social and economic fabric of the republic to the south.

President Taft polled eleven electoral votes, and there are many knowing his record in office, will begrudge him that number. As a president he has been one of the most complete failures that ever occupied that position of honor. In the reciprocity campaign of over a year ago he took no small part and was more than all others responsible for the "Annexation of Canada" cry that reverberated throughout the length and breadth of the two Americas. Elected solely by the aid of Roosevelt in 1908 he was discarded by the people in 1912, and will with the completion of his term retire to the oblivion that should have been always his, where he will have abundant time to ponder on weighty themes; where he will have time abundant to formulate a plan of action for the taking of Canada by the ear and hauling her over the International boundary, after which he may enter the commercial field, say manufacturing consolation saugages from the quint essence of the north pole.

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL mining rights of the Dominion, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-west Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.

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
