SOUTH HAZELTON SITE APPROVED

STATION PLANS ACCEPTED--- ROAD PASSED FOR TRAFFIC

Long-Expected Final Decision of Railway Tribunal is in Favor of People of Hazelton --- Leave to Carry Traffic to South Hazelton Already Granted to Railway

Ottawa, Nov. 4:--- The Railway Board has approved the plans of the G. T. P. for a station at South Hazelton and has granted the railway company leave to carry passengers and freight to that point.

Ottawa, Nov. 7:--- The reasons for the order issued in the Hazelton Townsite case by which the application of Grand Trunk Pacific for a station at South Hazelton is granted are set forth in a judgment written by Commissioner McLean, made public here. Mr. McLean says:

"The reasons for judgment and the draft order in this application have been allowed to stand for a limited time because of the representations of counsel representing certain interests in and around New Hazelton. It was reported that new and material evidence could be submitted and a limited time was allowed so that the Board might be satisfied from the statements indicating the nature of the evidence to be submitted whether a rehearing should be granted. There are now before the Board telegraph statements from the Board of Trade of Old Hazelton favoring the South Hazelton location. There are also counter telegrams alleging that only a bare majority of those present at the Board of Trade meeting passed the resolution in question. It is also stated that a majority of the members of the Board of Trade are opposed to having two stations and favor a single station at New Hazelton. It is alleged in the course of these counter telegrams that the approval of the South Hazelton location in addition to New Hazelton will tend to prolong the townsite controversy, which has been a great detriment to business generally.

The Board is not going to mingle in townsite matters. It will intervene in the matter of station accommodation only where there is public need for a station or where the railway has entered into an agreement binding itself to establish a station. Aside from what is outlined in the preceding section, it is not concerned with whether two townsites grow where one grew before. There may be abuse in the matter of the location of the townsites; there may be too many of them; some of them may be simply the capitalization of an iridescent optimism; but be this as it may, there is not within the four corners of the Railway Act any statement that the Board is the official medium of townsites and the Railway Act nowhere overrules the necessity of the investors exercising common sense. It is also alleged in support of the application for a rehearing that the Grand Trunk Pacific is refusing to haul freight and passengers to New Hazelton. All that need be said on this is that the leave to carry traffic as far as the South Hazelton site was applied for and granted. No application for leave to carry traffic on additional mileage east of this has been received by the Board. The whole question is whether Old Hazelton is to have on the South Hazelton location traffic facilities in addition to those afforded by New Hazelton. The Board has already decided this. Order approving the South Hazelton location plan as filed should now go."

Cabinet Changes

(Special to The Miner)

Ottawa, Nov. 4:---Louis D. Co-derre, M. P. for Hochelaga, was sworn in as secretary of state for the Dominion in succession to Hon. Dr. Roche, who has been transferred to the department of the interior. The reconstruction of the cabinet is now settled.

Hon. Robert Rogers is the new minister of public works. There will be a by-election in Hochelaga.

The new secretary of state is the youngest minister in the cabinet, being only 47 years of age. He had a majority of 1300 in Hochelaga and his re-election is conceded by both parties.

Turks Admit Defeat --- Ask for Peace

London, Nov. 8:---Constantinople is about to surrender to the victorious allies. The Turkish officials have entered into negotiations with the heads of the Bulgarian forces, to arrange terms. It is also reported from Sofia that the Sultan has proposed to Bulgaria to discuss a peace agreement without waiting for the mediation of the powers.

The allies have already decided how the Ottoman empire will be partitioned. Fears are expressed that Austria may clash with Serbia over division of the conquered territory.

London, Nov. 7:---"We will sing a Te Deum of thanksgiving in Constantinople on Sunday," is the boast of the Bulgarian army. According to a cable despatch another great battle was fought last night, in which the Bulgarian forces annihilated the rear-guard of the Turkish army as it fled to safety behind the lines of the Catalja forts. The Turkish losses are said to be double those sustained in the four-days' battle at Lule Burgas.

Of the entire Turkish empire in Europe only five districts are left in the hands of the Ottomans: Constantinople, Adrianople, Salonica, Monastir and Scutari. These are all besieged or threatened by the Balkan allies.

Constantinople, Nov. 5:---Tur-

key has asked the Balkan allies, through the medium of the great powers, for an armistice, but up to a late hour last night the allies had made no reply to the proposal. It is thought that it is the first step in the final settlement of the war.

London, Nov. 5:---That Turkey will gather together and try to reform the soldiery just outside of Constantinople is the report that has reached here. The final stand will be made behind fortifications just outside of the city.

That the Turks will not be able to hold out for long against the allied forces is conceded in all military circles. More than half of the Turkish artillery has been captured, Serbia alone having seized over 300 field pieces.

S. S. ROYAL GEORGE ASHORE IN ST. LAWRENCE RIVER

Montreal, Nov. 7:---The Canadian Northern steamer Royal George went on the rocks off Point Laurentic, in the St. Lawrence, this afternoon. In a few hours all the passengers will be safely taken off. Most reports say the vessel is badly damaged. Information is difficult to obtain. Several tugs which attempted to go to the rescue were driven ashore by the storm.

Quebec, Nov. 7:---(Later) The Royal George is ashore in shallow

water and it is believed may be easily saved. Several passengers say there was a slight haze and that the vessel was going full speed ahead when she struck.

Quebec, Nov. 8:---Five hundred steerage passengers of the Royal George were safely taken off the stranded vessel today. The great storm raging in the Gulf made it difficult to reach the vessel. The ship today is resting fifty yards from the position it occupied yesterday.

A CARNIVAL OF WINTER SPORTS FOR HAZELTON

A project is on foot for the holding of a carnival of winter sports in Hazelton soon after New Years. It is proposed to have a distance race for dog teams, in emulation of the famous Alaska Derby, as well as races at shorter distances, snow-shoe races, Ski jumping, hockey match and other features of interest. The big race for dog teams will naturally attract the most attention, as there are in Hazelton quite a number of men who take pride in the speed and endurance of their toboggan teams. Among those who are expected to enter teams are W.

J. Lynch, W. W. Wrathall, Bill Sweeney and Harris Bros. The promoters of the carnival will have their preliminary plans arranged in the course of a week or so and expect to make the event a big drawing card.

Severe Sentences

(Special to The Miner)

Vancouver, Nov. 7:--- In the assize court here Judge Clement imposed sentences of from one year to ten years imprisonment, adding the lash in three of nine criminal cases disposed of. Highway robbery and attempted murder were the charges in the most serious case.

WILSON PRESIDENT OF U. S. BIG SWEEP FOR DEMOCRATS

President Taft An Ignominious Third in Presidential Race---Professor Carries Forty States and Four Hundred Electoral Votes --- Bryan May Be Member of Cabinet

New York, Nov. 8:---By returns received at Democratic headquarters it is apparent that Woodrow Wilson, the Democratic candidate, carried forty states, Roosevelt six and Taft three. In the electoral college, as indicated by the figures at hand, Wilson will have four hundred electors as against eighty-nine for Roosevelt and twelve for Taft.

Present indications are that after March fourth the Democrats will be in control both in house and in the senate. The victory is unprecedented, and the elation of the Democrats is boundless.

President-Elect Wilson, in his first public announcement after the election, said a great cause had triumphed. Every Democrat must now lend his full force and enthusiasm for the fulfillment of the people's hope and the establishment of the people's right, so that justice and progress may go hand in hand.

Washington, Nov. 9:---It is reported here and generally believed that William Jennings Bryan, to whose efforts Woodrow Wilson was largely indebted for the Democratic nomination, will be a member of the cabinet in the new administration.

PREMIER AND BOWSER CONFER WITH BORDEN

Conference at Ottawa on Questions at Issue Between Province and Dominion

(Special to The Miner)

Ottawa, Nov. 7:---Sir Richard McBride and Hon. W. J. Bowser arrived in the capital this morning, several hours before they were expected by Hon. Mr. Borden. The premier had a number of engagements, but cancelled all to enter into immediate conference with the British Columbia ministers and Hon. Martin Burrel. The meeting lasted for three hours and all matters pending between the federal government and British Columbia were discussed. It was stated that if a conclusion were reached an announcement would be made immediately. Neil McIntyre, of the B. C. fisheries, and J. H. Cunningham, chief Dominion fishery inspector in B. C., conferred with the officials of the Dominion fisheries department.

Ottawa, Nov. 9:--- Everything is progressing satisfactorily in the conference between the British Columbia ministers and the members of the cabinet. Sir Richard McBride and Mr. Bowser today met all the ministers in conference. An effort will be made to conclude on Saturday, when Sir Richard will leave for New York for a brief visit, while Mr. Bowser will go to his old home in New Brunswick, expecting to return west next Wednesday.

To representatives of the press, including correspondents of the London dailies, who sought an interview on the naval question, Premier McBride repeated his

well-known views, emphasizing the defencelessness of the Pacific coast.

On Thursday a busy day was concluded with a large dinner party, attended by Premier Borden and the visitors, at Rideau Hall.

No Sunday For Sailors

Vancouver, Nov. 7:---According to the decision of the court of appeal here in the test case of Murray, a deckhand, against a coast steamship company, all coast shipowners have the right to demand that members of their crews work cargo at ports of call on Sundays. Failing obedience, the owners may engage long-shoremen, deducting the cost from the wages of the objecting sailors.

No Standing in Law

Vancouver, Nov. 8:---Holding that the Komnich Machinery Co., a United States concern, was too late in taking out a provincial license under the B. C. companies act, the court of appeal decided against the company in its suit against the B. C. Pressed Brick Co., on the ground that, in the circumstances, the plaintiffs had no right to maintain an action at law.

RAILWAY BOARD DECIDES FOR HAZELTON

The people of Hazelton and the district immediately tributary to the town have reason to congratulate themselves on the final settlement of the railway station case. After a long delay, for which an interested and factious opposition was responsible, the Board of Railway Commissioners have implemented their decision of last June, when, after a re-hearing of the case, in which the people of the present town were represented, the Commission stated that a case had been made out for a railway station more convenient to Hazelton than that on the Kelly townsite.

The reasons for judgment and the order approving the location of a station at South Hazelton are given in full on another page. It will be noted that the Commissioners take the entirely sensible position that townsite matters are not within their jurisdiction, and that they will intervene in station matters only when there is a public need for a station or where the railway has bound itself to establish a station. It was quite evident that a station was required at South Hazelton. That was all the Railway Board required to know. The allegations of the opposition were fully considered and proved to have no bearing on the question before the Board, which was concerned only with the question of station facilities for the old-established town of Hazelton.

The railway is now accepted for passenger and freight traffic to South Hazelton; station facilities will be provided without delay, and the untoward conditions under which the merchants and people of Hazelton have been doing business will soon become a memory. The townsite question will be satisfactorily settled in a comparatively short time. When the business men of Hazelton—which is and always has been the distributing center for the district—decide that it is necessary to remove to the railway, they will cross the river to South Hazelton, where the railway company and those associated with it will develop a town not surpassed in natural advantages and convenience of location by any on the Grand Trunk Pacific in British Columbia.

Plot To Depose Czar

St. Petersburg, Nov. 4.—News of a daring, but frustrated plot to arrest the Czar and force him to abdicate the Russian throne and fuller details of the alleged attempt to kill the 8-year-old Czarevitch, heir to the crown, have stirred Russia. It is said that Admiral Chagin, the Czar's favorite and commander of the imperial yacht, the Standart, committed suicide when warned by telephone that the police were about to search his quarters. When they arrived, they found a pile of burned papers in the kitchen and the admiral, shot through the heart, in his dressing-room. Further search revealed a blotting pad impressed with a letter written by the admiral to Grand Duke Michael, saying he could "be counted on to drive straight home when morning came."

Though the plot was hatched at St. Petersburg, the execution was planned for Jaita, where the fleet was seriously disaffected.

According to persistent rumors, the plan was to have the officers and crew of the Standart put the royal party under arrest and force the Czar to abdicate and waive his son's rights in favor of Michael. The scheme failed, because the Czar got nervous and fled. The reasons given for the plot are the general disgust with the court influence of the monk Rasputin and the belief that the Czarevitch is not a genuine Romanoff. The third reason given

is that the Czar is no longer fit to reign, being dominated by "ignorant mystics."

Grand Duke Michael has not been on speaking terms with the Czar for two years, since Michael tried to elope with his mother's maid of honor. As for the supposed attack on the Czarevitch, it is now said that a Nihilist, said to work as a gardener at Spala, shot or stabbed Alexis during the temporary absence of the child's governess.

The condition of the Crown Prince continues to improve, according to information from Spala.

SOUTH HAZELTON

The Townsite Fight Now Over

IT is with great pleasure that we announce the final settlement of what has come to be known as "The Hazelton Townsite Case."

On Saturday morning, November second, the Board of Railway Commissioners of Canada, sitting at Ottawa, pursuant to their decision of June last, made and issued an order officially approving the plans of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway for a station at South Hazelton. Thus, after delays occasioned by opposition which it appears unnecessary to characterize, the location of the future Hazelton has been decided upon. **SOUTH HAZELTON**, the only natural and logical point in this vicinity for the establishment of a railway town, is the place.

After almost ten months of battle in the highest tribunals of Canada, right has prevailed, and a final decision has been rendered which will leave no doubt in the mind of any unprejudiced person as to the location of the Hazelton of the future. A long, hard fight has ended in victory for the people of Hazelton and for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, and no time will now be lost in establishing the Hazelton station and developing South Hazelton.

Building Up the New Town

PROMOTED by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, endorsed by the British Columbia Government, and accepted by the merchants and residents of the Old Town of Hazelton, **South Hazelton** should rapidly become a railway town of no mean importance. The Railway Company's station building crew are working but a short distance below the New Town and as soon as lumber and materials can be provided they will be advanced to **South Hazelton**. Warehouses to handle freight for the Old Town, the Kispiox Valley, the Mines and points in the Bulkley Valley will be built and stables will be erected to house the many teams which will be engaged in this freighting business.

A bridge across the Bulkley River to connect the Old Town with the New will be built.

Streets will be stumped and graded immediately. A contract has been let for the clearing of a further portion of the townsite and work will be commenced at once.

With so much work in view South Hazelton will be a scene of great activity during the succeeding months. Some of the merchants of the Old Town have announced their intention of erecting buildings in the near future and applications for lots are being received daily, from others.

The World's Doings in Brief

News Notes from Many Sources

Italy has barred women lawyers from practise in the courts.

Navigation on the Yukon at Dawson is open later than ever before.

The last of the San Francisco graft cases has been dismissed in the courts.

President-elect Woodrow Wilson was slightly injured in a motor accident at Princeton, N. J., last Sunday.

The strike of the copper miners, mill and smelter men in Nevada, had been declared off by an almost unanimous vote.

A terrible storm raged on the Atlantic coast on Sunday last. Several wrecks are reported, with the loss of a number of lives.

At New York, Lieut. Becker, the convicted murderer of Herman Rosenthal, was sentenced to expiate his crime in the electric chair on December 13th.

Governor Norris, of Montana, and several of his friends were attacked and seriously injured by a mob of screeching, howling socialists, who made every effort to kill the governor.

A report has been received at Ottawa providing that the demonstrations made in regard to electrically smelting Canadian ores has been entirely successful. The report will be published shortly.

Within one month there will be at work fifteen hundred men on the construction of the railway line between Vancouver and Fort George. Supplies are now being sent in by Foley, Welch & Stewart.

During a tremendous storm the steamer Cecelia, a little boat which plies between Montreal and Valleyfield, sank at Isle Perrot, Lake St. Louis. At least sixteen persons were drowned. Only four were saved.

A Methodist preacher at Blue Sulphur Springs, W. Va., was stoned to death as a consequence of a series of sermons on "Dis-honesty", which antagonized the mountain people of the district.

With last week's production totalling 52,148 tons the ore output for the Kootenay and Boundary districts reached a figure for the year to date of 2,027,482 tons, setting up a new record for the mines of that section of British Columbia.

On Monday freight clerks and handlers in the employ of the C. P. R. at thirty different points went on strike, the company declining to meet their demands for recognition of the union. It is expected that 5000 men will be involved.

Last Saturday a party of miners from Atlin brought to Prince Rupert, on the Princess Sophia, a ton and a half of gold-bearing quartz, valued at \$30,000. It was from the Engineer mine, in which ore assaying up to \$100,000 a ton is reported to occur.

A ton of Yukon gold, worth over \$400,000, was shipped from Dawson to Seattle on the last trip of the steamer Humboldt. Mining men are agitating for changed conditions, that gold

from the Yukon may be handled without charge at the Vancouver assay office, to meet the competition of Seattle.

The seaport of Acapulco on the Pacific coast of Mexico, was virtually destroyed by a severe hurricane, according to wireless dispatches.

War Losses

Budapest, Nov. 4.—Conservative estimates of the dead and wounded in the Balkan war are placed at 130,000 by military experts. This estimate is confined to combatants, it being practically impossible to estimate the number killed in the annihilation of scores of villages or those massacred by Turkish troops.

The losses as compiled by the military observers here, are divided as follows:

At Kirk Kilissh and Adrianople, 25,000 Turks killed and wounded, and 7,000 Bulgarians dead and injured.

At Lule Burgas, 40,000 Turks, and 25,000 Bulgarians.

At Kumanova, 7,000 Turks and 5,000 Servians.

At Scutari, 3,000 Turks and 6,000 Montenegrins.

The losses of the Greek forces are not believed to have been heavy.

**WILL EXPLORE NEW
AND RICH COUNTRY**

**Prospectors Plan Investigation of
Goldfields Near Source of
Liard River.**

That the gold district tributary to Hazelton extends a considerable distance to the north is the general belief of miners and prospectors who have penetrated toward the headwaters of the Liard. That this opinion is shared by prospectors who are working from the other side of mountains is evident from the following, which is printed by the Greenwood Ledge as a despatch from Edmonton:

When the ice goes out of the Liard river next spring a party of prospectors, whose practical knowledge of mineralogy was gained in the foremost gold camps of the United States, Canada, South Africa, Australia and South America, will start from Edmonton to penetrate the northern wilderness, more than 500 miles west of the confluence of the Liard and Nabanni rivers.

The prospectors will take with them twenty pack animals and ample supplies for a stay of at least six months. Three members of the party will pass the winter in Edmonton to assemble the outfit and to arrange for its transportation to a point, when it will be carried to its destination beyond the outposts of civilization.

William Drew, now a resident of Edmonton, who went to the

1890, discovered gold in paying headwaters of the Liard in a skiff with two prospectors in quantities, but the shortage of provisions forced the men to abandon their exploration project. Drew returned to Edmonton, while his partners headed westward through the mountains intending to travel overland to Vancouver. As they were never heard from it is believed they perished on the lonely trail.

William McLeod and his brother Frank, sons of Murdock McLeod, now of Edmonton, previously a post trader for the Hudson's Bay Company in the Fort Nelson country for thirty years, accompanied by W. J. Wier, a young Scotchman, left Fort Nelson early in the spring of 1904, intending to explore the district at the headwaters of the Nabanni river, a tributary of the Liard.

Nothing was heard of them until 1909 when a younger son, going over the same route with a party of hunters, found the skeletons of the two brothers side by side, both having been shot. Weir's bleached skeleton was found three miles away. There was a ragged hole in the skull. The remains of the three men, which were identified by articles known to have been carried by them, were buried near where they fell.

The theory accepted by the elder McLeod and his son as well as by trappers and traders in the district as a solution of the triple tragedy, is that Weir, highstrung and new to the country with its mystery, became insane and shot his companions, while they were asleep, afterwards taking his own life.

The younger McLeod, and his men who prospected near the headwaters of the Nabanni river for some time, returned with samples of rich gold bearing quartz. The prospectors reported at the trading post that they found gold in abundance, but the inaccessibility of the country, the long distance to pack supplies and the hardships encountered made impossible the development of the ground.

George McLaughlin, for years in the employ of the Hudson's Bay Company in the Fort Nelson district, was a member of a party organized several years ago to investigate the reports brought down by explorers of 1898, 1904 and 1906, but the loss of his sight prevented him from going, and the others postponed the journey until he returned from England, where he went under treatment for his eyes. The project was subsequently abandoned.

The trip to be undertaken next spring will be the first determined effort since 1906 to gain definite information of the gold deposits reported to exist in bonanza quantities in the mountains at the head of the Liard and Nabanni rivers.




