

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THE NEW CLUB'S FINE PREMISES

LUXURIOUS EQUIPMENT AND FURNISHINGS

Everything Designed for the Comfort and Convenience of the Members. Prince Rupert Club House is Now One of the Best on the Coast.

The new premises of the Prince Rupert Club which were formally opened last night occupying as they do one of the most commanding sites in the heart of the city form a handsome feature in almost any view you can take of Prince Rupert. From the club room windows, too, you can command the most magnificent views of the superb scenery that surrounds the city.

Within, the club rooms are luxuriously furnished, well planned, and extremely comfortable. The interior fittings at the time of writing were just undergoing a few finishing touches and though there everywhere still the atmosphere of newness there is not lacking the feeling either, of solid comfort.

As you enter the doorway which fronts second avenue overlooking the harbor you pass the porter's room on the left and turning to the right enter a delightful reception room. On the right is a telephone cabinet and a cosy smoking room, and a few steps along the spacious entrance hall is the bar room which is not quite completed yet but requires only a day or two for the polish to dry.

Right behind the entrance hall is the billiard room, a fine large and lofty room which will be equipped with two full size English tables now waiting ready for it at Vancouver. The tables will not be out until a dance has been held in the billiard room when the ladies of Prince Rupert are to be given an opportunity of seeing how the mere males can make themselves cosy in a club.

Commodious cloak rooms, and lavatories open off the entrance hall to the left by the stairway, and in the basement below is the efficient steam heating plant that warms the whole building to perfection.

The feature of the club rooms upstairs is probably the observation room. This fine long room with its superb furnishings, cosy arm chairs, and luxurious sofas, and its splendid line of windows commanding the finest views of harbor, islands, and mountains, is without doubt one of the finest club rooms on these coasts.

On the same floor are situated four card rooms, comfortable and excellently arranged and furnished, and a commodious reading and writing room, as well as the secretary's business room and residential rooms.

The general effect of the whole premises is pleasing, welcoming, and thoroughly recreative. The color scheme of the decorations is good. The lighting of the club rooms is being done by A. T. Parkin & Co., and the design and construction of the building was in the hands of G. L. Proctor, and Messrs. Anderson & McKinnon.

Opening Last Night
An informal opening to the members was held last evening when over fifty were present, many of them seeing their new home for the first time. Naturally there were many expressions of admiration and approval. The directors were thoroughly complimented upon their accomplishment.
At nine o'clock a general meeting was held in the observation room when the directors received the approval and thanks of the members for the efficient

manner in which the club has been built and furnished.

A Reception Night

At this meeting it was also decided to hold a formal reception in about a week to which all members and the ladies will be invited. This formal occasion will be under the direction of the officers who have been given carte blanche. It promises to be the social function of the season.

President V. W. Smith drew the attention of the members to a handsome 400-day clock which had been placed on the mantle by Mr. G. W. Morrow. He tendered the club's thanks amid general applause.

The members retired to the billiard room where a toast was drunk to the club with Mumm's Best, donated for the occasion by Messrs. Clarke Bros., wholesale liquor dealers.

FOUR HUNDRED DEAD IN ITALY

RESULT OF VOLCANO AND A GREAT TIDAL WAVE

Minister of Marine Reports Naples Disasters to King of Italy and His Majesty Starts for Scene of Suffering in Torpedo Boat.

Naples, Oct. 26.—The minister of marine has notified King Emanuel that the number of deaths due to the volcano and the tidal wave is over four hundred and that there is great suffering. Every one of the coast towns in the provinces of Naples and Solerno was visited by inundations and pestilence is now feared.

Word has been received that the king is now on his way here in a torpedo boat. The pope has issued a formal order to all the priests to give all possible care to the injured.

Militia Are Called Out

Jersey City, N. J., Oct. 26.—(Special)—Following the riots last night in connection with the strike of the drivers of the United States Express company, a call was made for the militia to protect the non-union drivers. The governor has acceded to the request and a company is ready to start at once.

To Strike For One Day

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 25.—(Special)—Pennsylvania will have a general strike for one day on November 8th. The state Federation of Labor has ordered it to enable workers to vote in elections.

DEAL IN PREMIER STOCK

J. E. Gilmore's Interest in Premier Purchased by G. W. Morrow.

A deal of some importance was transacted yesterday when J. E. Gilmore sold his quarter interest in the Premier hotel to G. W. Morrow, the purchase price being approximately \$8,000. Mr. Morrow now owns one half interest in this popular house.

Mr. Gilmore who has been manager since the hotel opened will probably continue in that position.

DOINGS IN THE FLYING WORLD

CELEBRATED FRENCH AVIATOR HAS FATAL FALL

Missing Balloon Which Started from St. Louis Sighted Over West End of Lake Superior—Flight from France to Aldershot in Five Hours.

Paris, Oct. 26.—Morrison, the wealthy English aviator, started this morning to attempt to duplicate the Moissant successful flight from Paris to London.

Blanchard, the celebrated French aviator, is dead. His machine became disabled and he fell from an altitude of one thousand feet, at Izzy, this morning. Death was instantaneous.

Sighted Over Lake Superior

Toronto, Oct. 26.—It is reported that the missing balloon America, one of those starting on the endurance flight from St. Louis, had been sighted near the western end of Lake Superior. A search party has been sent out from Fort William.

Great Aviation Meet Postponed

Belmont Park, N. Y., Oct. 26.—It was blowing a forty mile gale here this morning and this caused an announcement to be made that there would be no more flights until the wind had subsided.

Town Planning Conference

The celebrated Canadian author, Sir Gilbert Parker, a member of the British House of Commons, is taking a leading part in a conference on town planning which is being held in London. Other prominent men connected with the conference are Lord Kitchener, Rt. Hon. John Burns, and the Lord Mayor of London. The fact that over a thousand delegates are present shows the great interest being taken in the problems of making life as pleasant as possible for the great mass of the people.

London, Oct. 26.—(Special)—In the running for the Cambridgeshire Stakes yesterday Christmas Daisy came in first, Mustapha second and Halcyon third.

Four Days in a Lifeboat

London, Oct. 26.—(Special)—After being tossed about in a lifeboat for four days, the captain and four of the crew of the British schooner Florence Leland were rescued by the steamer Commodore.

Chinks Cleared Out

The two Chinamen who got scrapping the other day, were apprehended and let out on \$25 bail each, have quit the city forfeiting their bail.

Subscriptions to the Hospital Fund amounting to \$780 have been received since the last announcement, and today Mr. G. W. Morrow added the balance of \$300 to his subscription already paid to the fund.

GUNBOAT IS WRECKED

Fifty of Its Officers and Men Are Reported to Have Been Drowned

Port au Prince, Haiti, Oct. 26.—It is believed that fifty officers and men of the Haytian gunboat Liberte were drowned this morning. There was an explosion on board the vessel off Port au Prince, and almost immediately after she sank. Twenty of the crew were picked up.

In Sorry Plight

A pale looking man named James Mayor appeared in this morning's police court charged with being a vagrant having no visible means of support. He seemed rather rattled, and told a story of having been robbed of the fruits of his labors on the King's Highway. Chief McCarvell stated that Major had required medical attention from Dr. Reddie since he had been taken in charge and the doctor thought he should be looked after for a day or two. Magistrate Carss said he would look into the matter, and meanwhile Major is detained.

NAVIGATION IS ABOUT CLOSING

INLANDER MAY MAKE ONE MORE TRIP

Omineca and Distributor Going over to Shipyard for Winter.—Hazelton Goes to Hardscrabble Tomorrow.—Camps Well Provided with Supplies

The steamer bulletin says the weather about Hazelton and the north this morning was calm, cloudy, cold, with a heavy frost last night. This exactly describes the weather at this end also. The city pavements were this morning covered with hoarfrost and all the tops of the hills within view were covered with snow. This portends the early close of navigation on the Skeena river.

The stage of water this morning was two feet three inches below zero, so there can be little more transportation by river this season. The Omineca and the Distributor are now tied up at the Foley, Welch & Stewart wharf and will shortly go over to the shipyard on Digby island to be laid up for the winter. Last year the Distributor left for Hazelton on October 28th, but she got stranded and was laid up along the river all winter, exposed to the breaking up of the ice in the spring. This year the company will take no such risks, and really has no need to do so, as it has the railway to fall back upon.

The Hazelton got in last night and it was rumored that this was her last trip for the season. But she is to leave for Hardscrabble tomorrow morning with a load of groceries and general merchandise. It is hoped that after this she will be able to make one more trip as far as Kitselas. The Port Simpson passed Graveyard Point early this morning on her way to Hazelton, and this will undoubtedly be her last trip even if she manages to make the journey back.

With the Inlander it is different, as she can navigate on a lower stage of water than any of the river boats. She passed Aberdeen at eight o'clock this morning on her way to Hazelton. It is confidently expected that she will be able to make another full trip, Harry Rochester, the agent of the company, declaring this morning: "She will continue to travel as long as there is the least moisture."

There is no longer any food famine, however, to be feared at any of the river points. Vernor W. Smith, manager for Foley, Welch & Stewart, said this morning: "Our camps are now well-supplied with stuff for the winter, as we have been enabled to do much better than we expected a month ago. If we tie up every boat now we can keep things going all winter all right."

"But then we have the railroad. The last bridge under contract will be completed on the 28th of this month, and that will give us a clear one hundred miles out of this city. So that any addition to our camp supplies that may be needed from time to time can be sent in by the regular train."

ORDEMAN THE CHAMPION

WHAT BROUGHT KING MANUEL OF
PORTUGAL TO HIS EXILE IN ENGLAND

Short and sad has been the reign of
the young king of Portugal, who is
now an exile in England. He was
brought to the throne from which he
has now been cast by one of those
double catastrophes, which are said to
be a grim characteristic of the house
of Braganza, and the wave of sym-
pathy for the boy-king thus suddenly
and cruelly raised to the throne in
1908, will be repeated from end to end
of Europe.

The remembrance of that terrible
scene of February 1, 1908, when King
Manuel lost, under the bullets of assas-
sins, both father and brother, has not
yet grown dim. King Carlos, after fif-
teen years' experience of the unprin-
ciple and unrepresentative use of
party government by both parties in
the state, acceded in an evil hour to
Senor Joso Franco's demand that he,
as premier, should be invested with
dictatorial powers, for the purpose of
restoring able and honest government
to unhappy Portugal.

After two years of this dictatorship,
during which no substantial progress
was made in any direction, and the
position of the Anarchists had become
greatly strengthened in the country,
Dom Carlos saw the mistake to which
he had been a party. He was on the
point of terminating the extraordinary
powers that had been granted to Sen-
hor Franco, when he fell a victim to a
plot, the existence of which seems to
have been known to the police for some
days beforehand.

Acting upon the representations and
advice of those responsible for his
safety, King Carlos and his queen left
the Palace of Villa Vicosa, a favorite
royal seat outside Lisbon, for the Neces-
sidades palace within the capital, where,
as Senhor Franco urged, it was more
easy to protect their majesties. With
the king and the queen came the crown
prince and Prince Manuel. The royal
party landed unostentatiously at the
Caes des Columnas, on the Tagus, in
the heart of the city. They entered
the royal carriages without delay, and
moved into the Prada do Commercio.
Suddenly a young man dashed from
among the crowd, and climbing up
upon the back of the royal carriage,
discharged a revolver two or three times
into the bodies of King Carlos and his
eldest son. The queen, who was sitting
beside him, despairingly attempted to
beat down the assassin with a bouquet
that she was carrying. But the man
had done his work.

The king was dead, and the crown
prince sitting opposite was mortally
wounded, though whether the death of
the latter was due to this miscreant
or to the simultaneous carbine shots of
an accomplice by the side of the road
is not certain. The latter certainly
was able to inflict two or three wounds,
happily not of a serious nature, upon
Prince Manuel also. The crown prince
lingered only for a few minutes. In
this way did unhappy King Manuel
ascend the steps of the Portuguese
throne.

Wounded as he was, the eighteen-
year-old sovereign at once issued a pro-
clamation announcing the death of his
father and his brother, and his own ac-
cession, his intention to rule whole-
heartedly for the welfare of Portugal,
and his confirmation in office of the
existing ministry. He forthwith called
together his council and said to them
in words of simple dignity: "I am
without knowledge or experience. I
place myself in your hands, counting
upon your wisdom and patriotism." Sen-
hor Franco immediately resigned his
position and fled the country, the
premiership being accepted by Admiral
Ferreira do Amaral. But the troubles
of Portugal lay deeper than could be
reached by the best efforts on inten-
tions of the patriotic young king. Con-
stitutionalism in Portugal is a mere
farce. The radicals of the country are

allowed to have but a small minority
in the assembly. There is no real lib-
erty, either of speech or of the press,
and the position is made doubly hope-
less by the fact that the close oligarchy
in whose hands all real powers reside
are able to cast the odium for every act
of oppression or injustice, of which
they are themselves guilty upon the
shoulders of the king. Under such cir-
cumstances it is not to be wondered at
that anarchism has gained in strength
from year to year.

King Manuel was a universal favorite
with his brother sovereigns. He was a
special friend of the king of Spain, whom
he repeatedly visited. His only visit
abroad since his accession was paid
to France and England. He was well
received in both countries. During this
short travel the young king's name was
mentioned with more than one of the
younger princesses of the royal houses
of Europe, and it was rumored that it
was not impossible that the immemorial
ties that link Portugal with her oldest
ally, England, might one day have been
strengthened. But the position in Pot-
ugal demanded a stronger hand than
Manuel's. After the despotic rule of
France a political change was obviously
necessary, but it is possible that no
alteration could have satisfied the sedi-
tious crowd that ever more and more
closely thronged round the gates of the
Necessidades palace with hardly-veiled
menaces. King Manuel attempted a
conciliatory policy towards his enemies,
but to no purpose. The underground
forces were unrelentingly at work, and
now revolution has robbed the young
monarch of his throne, as anarchism
deprived his father of life.

TAKE UP CUSTOMS NEXT

Co-operation Between Governments
of Canada and United States

Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—The ad-
ministration has decided that the im-
migration and customs officers stationed
along the Canadian frontier are to
co-operate more closely than ever.
Orders just issued by the treasury de-
partment, direct customs officers at
ports on or near the Canadian boundary
line where immigration officers are
stationed to inform the immigration
officers upon the entry of any household
effects under section 520 of the new
tariff law.

The immigration official will be per-
mitted to examine the entry papers
covering these effects with a view to
locating and accounting for the settlers
on the immigration records. This action
is expected to result in a greater fund
of information concerning the circum-
stances of the settlers who head this
way across the line. The tariff section
referred to permits the free entry of
books, libraries, usual and reasonable
furniture and similar household effects
of persons or families from foreign
countries if actually used abroad by
them for a year or more and not in-
tended for sale if for any other person
or persons.

Outlook for Political Supremacy in United States Sections

The New York Herald, which has long been noted for preparing its election forecast dispassionately, has been gathering information and studying the political situation throughout the United States, and sums up its conclusions in regard to the probabilities in the impending Congressional elections as follows:

Democratic members of the next House, 141; Republican members, 132; doubtful, 118.

In the doubtful list, 82 places are now held by Republicans and 36 are held by Democrats.

There are 217 Republicans and 174 Democrats in the present House, making a Republican majority of thirty-three. If the Democrats can hold the places they now possess, they need gain but seventeen places to win control of the next House.

Says the New York Herald: "The plain inference from these figures would be that at the outset of the campaign the Republican party is showing a disposition to go to pieces and prepare for the worst whipping it has had in many years. It must be admitted, however, that even as this article is being prepared there are signs here and there throughout the country that the Republicans are recovering from their panic. The buoyancy of the Democracy is not quite so apparent. It is going to be a battle royal, anyway."

Bible Text-book In Schools

The Church of England Synod has declared in favor of the use in the public schools of a Bible text-book. If it is possible to act upon this proposal without interfering with the non-sectarian character of our schools, we are sure it would be a good thing. There seems to be no objection to teaching the doctrines of Plato, Confucius, Buddha or any one else, except those of the Founder of the Christian religion.—Victoria Colonist.

FAVORS SINGLE TAX

The adoption of the single tax system promulgated by Henry George, by the city of New Westminster is advocated by Mayor Lee and if he is re-elected to the position of chief magistrate of the city for another term this is probably one of the first matters which he will bring up for consideration by the new City council and the citizens generally. The system in its entirety is not favored by the Mayor but only in so far as it provides for the taxation of land only and exempts improvements. This will tend to place a premium on improvements in the city while discouraging the holding of unimproved city property for speculative purposes.

Mayor Lee is now looking for two men qualified to undertake the reassessment of the city. A short time ago he brought to the attention of the city council the need of a more equitable assessment and at the last meeting he was authorized to suggest the names of men qualified to undertake the work. His idea is that two experienced men should be secured who would proceed with the work forthwith in order that it might be completed early next year.

To a representative of the British Columbian Mayor Lee pointed out that at the present time the assessment of the city is not at all equitable. In some cases property is assessed up to nearly its full selling value while in other cases only a small percentage of the value is assessed. Assessment Commissioner Frank Broad is doing something on the assessment for next year and it is the idea of the council that the experts engaged should revise the work already done and place everything on a proper basis.

The tax rate for this year and, indeed, for some time past, has been 24 mills on the dollar. His Worship is of the opinion that with the readjustment of the assessment of property in the city this rate may be considerably reduced this year. If, however, improvements are exempt from taxation next year the possible reduction in the tax rate is not likely to be so great. Upon the appointment of assessment specialists the city council will decide what proportion of the selling value of the property is to be assessed.

Thus is Prince Rupert's lead being followed up by other cities. The St. Johns, N. B., *Telegraph* also comments on this system of taxation and urges its adoption in that city. The *Telegraph* says:

"The movement to tax land values is gaining ground. It has been taken up in Vancouver, Edmonton and Prince Rupert, and is under consideration in Winnipeg. The Ottawa Journal urges that city to take up the subject, and endeavor to secure provincial legislation which will give the city the legal power to tax only land values. At the last session of the Ontario legislature a measure giving the municipality the option of taxing land values alone was introduced, but was turned down by Sir James Whitney. The Ottawa Journal declares that it ought to come up again and ought to be adopted."

FREIGHT TRAINS MAY RUN

Victoria, Oct. 22.—There has just been deposited with the government of British Columbia \$55,000 as a first payment on account of the purchase of ninety thousand acres for the general colonization project initiated by Mr. Norton Griffiths, member of the British House of Commons, and a millionaire railway contractor.

Mr. S. E. Oliver, the company's special agent, made the payment. The lands are in the most fertile section of the Naas river valley which extends to the west of the Skeena river valley. Mr. Griffiths intends to promote a movement for locating British agriculturists on these lands. The Earl of Dunmore is one of the members of his company.



THIS PROVINCE IS BACKWARD

SAYS REPORT OF DEPARTMENT OF INDIAN AFFAIRS

Aborigines Prosperous Everywhere in Canada Except in Naas and Skeena Districts, Where Unrest Is Fanned by Outside Agitators.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—The report of the department of Indian affairs for the fiscal year ending March 31 last is out. It is the most satisfactory yet issued by the department, showing a mild winter and the development of settlement in the west have made things much better for the aborigines. The only province which shows any moral decline, says the report, is British Columbia, but this is due to the fact that it is the last of the Canadian west to feel the effects of white "civilization" in the districts in which Indians are chiefly located.

The entrance of railways with its accompanying influx of settlers into what the tribes have from time immemorial regarded as their hunting grounds and fishing stations, has created more especially on the northwest coast and in the Naas and Skeena river districts, a feeling of unrest, which has been fanned into strength by outside agitators actuated by motives somewhat difficult of comprehension.

The Indians claim that under the old proclamation and in other ways their rights to the country until surrendered by them are recognized and assured, which reduces the issue to one between them and the provincial government. The whole matter is being gone into by the department of justice and the department is watching the interests of the Indians in the expectation of an early and peaceful solution of the difficulty. The Indians are commencing to appreciate the advantages of attention to the white man's modes of living and of agriculture, and the result is shown in increased prosperity and comfort. The earnings of the Indians in the year under review increased by over \$83,000.

The report of the department of Indian affairs shows that there are now in the Indian reserves of the country 110,597 Indians, as compared with 111,043 during the previous year, a net increase of 446. There were 2,499 Indian births during the year, while there were but 2,102 deaths, leaving a net increase of 397 in the aboriginal population. While the reports from the various reserves still continue to tell of the ravages of alcohol among the Indians, it is evident that the evil effects are less than they were and the prospects of the red man are correspondingly bright.

During a recent call upon Premier McBride, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific railway, brought forward a proposal relative to the construction and future operation of a scenic railway from Banff to Windmere, which should prove of great popularity with tourists and scenic beauty lovers generally, the upper Columbia valley, to be traversed, being a veritable wonderland. The suggestion finds favor naturally with the Provincial Premier and it is understood that construction of the line will be initiated in the very near future.

Amendments to City Charter

Application will be made at the approaching session of the legislature for the amendments to the Prince Rupert incorporation act enabling that city to borrow money by the issue of inscribed stock, to convert debentures already issued into such stock, and to consolidate debts provided for under individual by-laws so that consecutive debentures or inscribed stock may be issued for such debts as consolidated.

HELPING NEW REPUBLIC

Great Britain Will Help Portugal to Retain Colonies

London, Oct. 16.—Great Britain is determined to play the role of best friend to the republic of Portugal just as she did to the kingdom.

It is well understood that the statement of Senhor Jose Reivas, the new Lisbon finance minister, regarding "The supreme interest attaching to the preservation and development of our colonies," reflects a complete understanding with the London government. Whatever money may be needed to carry out this policy it will be an easy matter to obtain in Lombard street.

Sir Edward Grey is maintaining the tradition of the British foreign office in supporting Portugal on the East African coast, where lie her most valuable colonies, and the establishment of the South African commonwealth renders it tenfold more desirable for Portugal's dominion in that part of the world to be maintained.

British statesmen are almost equally desirous that the status-quo as to the colonies on the West African coast be preserved, because in spite of the arrangement under which, in certain eventualities, Germany was to take the west coast possessions of Portugal and England the east, London has never viewed such a contingency with composure.

Manuel and the queen mother received a cordial, though not a demonstrative welcome on their arrival in this country this week. Their presence will emphasize the fact that England is taking the place of France as the home of exiled royalty.

AMERICAN BOAT CHANGES

Cottage City to Be Succeeded by Excursion Steamer Senator

The Cottage City came in yesterday afternoon, with few passengers for the north. She put off fifty tons of perishables here and left at half past six. This is the last trip of the Cottage City this season, as she goes on the drydock for her annual overhauling. She will be replaced by the Senator, which leaves Seattle on November first.

The City of Seattle left Seattle today for the north. It is expected she will make only one more round trip to the north this season.

Regular Supply of Radium

London, Oct. 22.—The Evening Standard states that Cornish pitchblende will give a regular supply of radium. If this should prove correct there will be a rapid decline in the price.
