MAKE REQUESTS OF GOVERNMENT

PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD MET WITH WILLIAM MANSON, M.P.P.

Hot Heating System Installed at Once—Need a Flag Pole—Primary Class to Be Taught in the Old School for the Next Winter.

A special meeting of the Public School Board was held yesterday afternoon at the city hall for the purpose of taking several matters of importance with William Manson M. P. P. in connection with the new school. The first matter was that of retaining the old school for a time to accommodate the children in the primary department. At a recent meeting the principal reported that there were 27 pupils in the primary department living east of Milton street and it would not be fair to ask them to walk away over to the new school in the winter weather with the present streets. The board desired to keep the old school and open one room for the holidays to accommodate that class. Mr. Manson stated that he believed there would be no difficulty as the building was there and the government had no immediate use for it. School Inspector Dean was opposed to the idea and the principal would prefer to have all the pupils in one school if he could arrange the grading more satisfactorily.

The board decided however to keep the room open during the winter months through an additional teacher will not be engaged for the present. The next matter was that of a 16-foot plank roadway from the street to the school and for walks around the building and to the outbuildings. For a change in the fire escape, making it come right from the building as that style is safer and easier for the youngsters to come down. A flag pole is also asked for to be placed on the grounds and the next matter was that of the heating apparatus. The heating was not included in the contract for the building and separate orders have to be called for. Nothing has yet been done and some tall hustling will have to be done to have the school ready for opening after the holidays. The estimates provide for a hot-air system. The board desires that this be undertaken at once.

In reply to all these matters Mr. Manson told the board to have their secretary write him outlining their requests and he would take them up with the department of education at once. He believed that most of the requests could be granted without any delay or trouble. As for fixing up the play grounds Mr. Manson told the board that he felt they would have to undertake that. The government will do well if they finish the other things.

NEGRO RIOTS ALL OVER THE UNITED STATES

Victory of Colored Champion Sets Thousands of Negroes Crazy in all the Large Cities—Hundreds Are Arrested.

Rioting all Night and Police Unable To Quell Disturbance—Thousands Rioting at Pittsburg—Reserves Called Out in New York.

(Special to the Optimist)

Washington, July 5.—Reports of negro uprising are coming in from all over the country, but none so sensational in their character as the uprising in this city. Seven thousand negroes and as many whites were rioting all night. The news of the victory of the colored champion seemed to have crazed every man of his race in the city. All the police were ordered out last night and are still on duty. It looks now as if the troops would have to be called out at any moment.

Shortly before midnight the whole city was in a state of pandemonium. White citizens going home, often just as they were entering their residences, were attacked. In many instances the blacks followed them into the houses and smashed the furniture. Hundreds of drunken blacks attacked the white men. It grew worse and worse around the midnight hour. Some of the white citizens banded against the negroes and there was fighting all the way up Pennsylvania Avenue clear to the vicinity of the White House. At one time it was believed the mob of colored people would make an attempt to enter the presidential mansion.

Three negroes dragged three white women into the street and stripped them of their clothing. The howling and yelling was something indescribable.

The fighting went in all night and all the police were engaged in it. In the early hours the chief called upon citizens to assist and a number of white men were sworn in as special constables. With this aid two hundred blacks were landed in jail and an attempt was made to break into the building to rescue them.

This large number of arrests did not bring but a brief cessation to the rioting. In half an hour it had started again with renewed force. The mob of colored people in the streets grew larger as the morning hours crept on, and the women were worse than the men. All seemed to be drunk and acted in the most frenzied manner against the whites. The black population of this city numbers one hundred thousands, and the whole of them appeared to be emptied into the streets.

At this writing the police are nearly exhausted and the federal troops may be called out at any moment.

Hanged On a Lamppost

New York, July 5, 11 a.m.—During the rioting this morning the whites succeeded in stringing one negro to a lamp post on the Bowery and there was a fierce fight around the post for a few minutes. Eventually the police broke in and cut the colored man down. He was still alive.

PRINCE RUPERT INTERESTED

Yesterday afternoon half the City were out looking for news of the big fight at Reno. Bulletins were read in the opera house and private ones were received at the Prince Rupert Club and the Exchange Grill. Summaries of the rounds were posted on the Optimist bulletin board where a large crowd gathered. The flash of the negro's victory was received just after the seventh round and was discredited by many who wished it otherwise. A few minutes after the receipt of the final round The Optimist issued a special with the complete story and the whole edition of nearly 1000 copies was sold out before six o'clock. A lot of money changed hands here on the result, some having wagered three to one on Jeffries.

Johnson's victory and a number of race fights has been the result. One black was killed and scores were badly injured. The fighting is still going on.

Only One Negro Killed

Omaha, July 5.—There was a fierce race riot here last night but it was cleverly handled by the police and quelled. One black was killed and many colored were injured.

Negress Kills White Woman

Fort Worth, Tex. July 5.—In the race rioting here last night a negress beat a white woman to death. She was arrested and a white mob is now howling around the prison demanding that she be lynched. A large number were injured during the rioting.

Hundred Hurt in Riot.

Pittsburg, July 5.—A thousand negroes started a riot here soon after the news came in of Johnson's victory and they kept up the tumult all night. When interfered with by the police they resisted and a fierce battle was fought in which over a hundred people were severely hurt. A large number of arrests were made and this morning all seems quiet.

Wholesale Lynching Proposed

Wilmington, July 5.—All the negroes seemed to get drunk on the news from Reno and the white men had to band themselves together to put down the disturbance. No deaths have been reported but many were injured when the two races came together in battle. After matters had somewhat quieted down the whites made a proposition to lynch all the negroes taken into custody and started out to do this but wiser counsels prevailed.

Twenty Negroes Shot.

New Orleans, July 5.—Race riots started here around the fight bulletins and when it began to look serious the white men began to arm themselves. Some of the negroes were also armed and there was a fusillade around the St Charles hotel that lasted over half an hour. In this some twenty negroes were shot and several white men are known to have been seriously wounded.

Six Blacks Were Killed at Roanoke, Va., Twenty at New Orleans, Three at Shreveport, One at Chicago and One at Omaha.

(Special to the Optimist)

Roanoke, Va., July 5.—As the result of the negro victory at Reno the colored race of this city started on a mad rampage, attacking white men and destroying their property. Six blacks were killed while committing depredations and one white man was shot down while defending his home.

Three Colored Men Killed

Shreveport, La., July 5.—Three negroes and one white man were killed in the riots following the announcement of the result of the Reno fight, and scores were injured.

Dragged From Homes and Beaten.

Cincinnati, July 5.—Hundreds of negroes clustered around the bulletin boards giving news of the fight, got too gay when it was announced that Johnson had won and the whites took a hand in the celebration. The negroes were driven to their homes, then were dragged out of their homes and beaten and warned not to appear on the streets for the rest of the day. They obeyed and there was no more trouble. No deaths are reported.

Hot Fight in Negro Quarter

New York, July 5.—Rioting started in the negro section about ten o'clock last night and a body of police was sent down to quell the disturbance. Later the colored people came out in great force against the police and some of the latter were severely handled. The police reserve was called out this morning and rode their horses through the mob, using their clubs freely. No deaths reported.

TWO NEGROES LYNCHED

Infuriated Farmers Have a Stern Chase After Them.

Charleston, S. C. July 4.—Two negroes made what is claimed to be an unwarranted attack upon a planter named William Cox. Yesterday the farmers in his neighborhood took up the matter and it was not long before the meeting was wrought up to a great excitement. It was determined to go gunning for the negroes and this was done. On being surrounded the two men gave themselves up. They were brought into town and strung to a tree, the yelling crowd emptying their revolvers and squirrel rifles into the swaying bodies.

JUDGMENT FOR HAYS

Supreme Court Hands Down Decision in Frewen Case.

(Special to the Optimist)

Vancouver, July 4.—Chief Justice Hunter this morning handed down the decision in the case of Moreton Frewen versus President Hays of the Grand Trunk Pacific. The judgment is in favor of the defendant. Frewen, through his attorneys, has given notice that the decision will be appealed before the higher court.

COAL SUIT FOR FOUR MILLIONS

OPTION ON DUNSMUIR COAL LANDS SUSTAINED

Chief Justice Hunter Gives Judgment for the Plaintiffs, Holding That Their Option is Entitled to Registration—Suit Stands Over.

Victoria, July 2.—That the plaintiffs, Henry Croft et al were entitled to registration of their option on certain coal lands was the ruling of Chief Justice Hunter upon a point of law arising out of the suit of the aforementioned against Hon. James Dunsmuir, Whiting, Percy et al, for \$4,600,000 damages. The suit stands over until after the vacation.

It is alleged that the defendants persuaded the owners of the lands in question to break their contract with the plaintiff, and give a second option to Whiting, which he attempted to register before the plaintiff's option was registered.

The lands in question are included in those ceded to William Mackenzi in the purchase of the Dunsmuir coal interests for \$11,000,000.

RIGHTS IN THE ARCTIC

Statement that U. S. Will Contest Canada's Sovereignty Unconfirmed

Washington, July 2.—The state department refuses to confirm the rumor that the United States in contesting Canada's sovereignty over certain portions of Arctic territory. This is a matter which will possibly be brought up before the court at The Hague, in the meantime the officials here do not desire to discuss it. It is acknowledged, however, that there is some likelihood of matter being discussed in connection with the Newfoundland fisheries question which has been referred to the Hague Tribunal.

Americans Coming to Canada

Ottawa, July 2.—Mr. W. J. White, inspector of immigration agencies in the United States, reports to the department that approximately 150,000 Americans will settle in Western Canada this summer.

THE JOHNSON-JEFFRIES FIGHT.

The great world's championship pugilistic contest is over. The event which has engrossed the attention of the sporting fraternity for months, and been the centre of public interest for weeks, has passed. A lot of people are sorely disappointed and many have a deal of easy money. Some go so far as to predict racial trouble as a result and not a few philosophise on the outcome. As a matter of fact it is a very minor event in the world's happenings and quite unworthy of any serious consideration.

As an item of news interest it is probably without equal in many years. No event in which only two men were contestants has ever before held the public stage over such a great area. But the interest was artificial, not natural.

As far as the championship of the "pugs" is concerned the world has little care but the interest was "touted" so strongly by the sporting pages of the great papers that it soon became an object of general news interest. The newspapers of America really created the contest and then made the public grow enthusiastic over it. By metaphorically fighting the battle every day with contradicting opinions the public were coaxed into taking sides and making an issue. Men who do not know a straight bunch in the eye from a short jab in the ribs wagered hundreds of dollars on their opinion as to the outcome. Others to whom the personality of the combatants would be repulsive read with fervor every detail of the contest. It was a subject for daily conversation in every part of America. The enthusiasm was astonishing, particularly when one considers that the manly art is not generally admired and that the physical perfection of the pugilist is not developed for any good to mankind but merely for applause and financial gain.

One might argue that it is a sign of degeneracy on the part of the public, but it is rather a temporary intoxication—another form of dementia Americana. In a day it will be forgotten.

HUMAN EAR AS A THREAT

NEW METHOD EMPLOYED IN THE STRIKE OF SAILORS

Bottle Containing Ear Sent with Letter to Steamship President Threatening Death Unless Union Demands are Met.

Cleveland, July 2.—Wrapped around a bottle of alcohol in which lay a humane ear, Harry Coulby, president of the Pittsburg Steamship company, received a letter here today in which he was threatened with mutilation and death if he refused to grant the demands of the sailors who have been on strike for two years.

The man to whom the ear belonged has already been identified as Edward Fraser, a non-union sailor, who was assaulted in Buffalo last Monday and had his ear severed from his head by his assailants. He was picked up later by the police, dying from loss of blood. Across his chest was pinned a piece of paper, inscribed: "Don't be a scab."

Mr. Coulby turned the letter and the bottle and its contents over to the federal authorities and a search was immediately commenced through every port on the Great Lakes for the perpetrators of the outrage.

For Services to the Empire.

London, July 2.—To commemorate the ninety-third birthday of Sir Frederick Young, vice president of the Royal Colonial Institute, in recognition of his services toward imperial unity, the members of the British Empire League presented him with a silver cup on Thursday.

At Winnipeg Next Monday

Ottawa, July 2.—The Winnipeg meeting of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's western political tour was arranged for Monday, July 11. The Manitoba elections were subsequently arranged for the same date. There may or may not have been anything in this coincidence, but Sir Wilfrid has changed the date of his meeting to the evening after the elections.

MEN ARE WANTED

Ald. Pattullo Would Like to See Five Hundred Working on Streets.

Ald. Pattullo remarked this morning to the Optimist in reply to the usual query "what's new?" "I wish I could tell you that 500 men had been put to work. That would be the greatest piece of news that was ever given out in this town."

Every citizen will heartily agree with Ald. Pattullo. The town needs improved streets and improved roads in the worst way. Traffic is growing too rapidly to be handled satisfactorily or economically on the existing steep grades and narrow roads. The town also needs the pay roll and the circulation of money as at the present time practically all the money in the city is tied up in real estate and improvements and it requires a big pay roll to keep things moving for a few months.

The new city engineer will arrive here next Monday, but it will take him some time to prepare his plans for street grading and for the water works system. In the meantime the council and the streets committee will have to hustle along the smaller stretches of street grading that are being petitioned for. On those small sections a good sized gang could be employed.

J. E. Merryfield Home

J. E. Merryfield arrived in the city this morning on the Str. Inlander from Kitselas where he has been for the past month looking after his business interests there. He reports everything very prosperous in that town, especially in mining circles. He predicts that the mineral deposits up the river will shortly not only rival but surpass the deposits at Stewart. So far only prospecting has been done up the river and a little development work, but that little warrants the miners displaying the utmost confidence. In the near future a great deal of Prince Rupert money will go up the river to the mines.

HOW THE FIGHT WAS REPORTED

UP-TO-DATE METHODS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION

Every Important Blow Struck Reported Fifteen Seconds Later to Coast Newspapers—Most Instantaneous Action Ever Attempted.

San Francisco, July 4.—How the news of the great fight was sent will be of interest, as greater pains were taken to give the result speedily than ever before, and in fact it was as near being simultaneous as human ingenuity can at present go. Every important blow struck was reported in San Francisco within fifteen seconds, and from there wired to coast cities.

Owing to the limitations of the carrying capacity of telegraph wires three relays or re-sendings were necessary to reach all points. One of these was made at San Francisco, where the stuff was re-sent to coast papers; another at Denver, from where all central and southern points are served, and a third at New York—from which eastern points were taken care of. At each of these points the receiving operator used a visible typewriter and the sending operator, seated beside him relayed the incoming matter word for word as it was received. The task of giving to the country this description of the fight, a story which promised to be one of the most widely read of the decade, was assigned to Max Balthasar, known in the sporting world as "The Ringsider," one of the foremost boxing authorities in the country, and a man whose opinions have for many years been the last word in sporting questions on the Pacific Coast, the home of the fighting game.

Balthasar had been at the ringside during practically every important bout participated in by either Jeffries or Johnson and had a personal and expert knowledge of the science and style of each man. For several weeks he had been touch with both fighters, has studied them at their work and during their relaxations, and the full value of his knowledge of the men and their methods will be brought out in his description and analysis of their battle. Balthasar was assisted in his work by Tip Wright, also a well known boxing authority.

Joseph Martin, M. P. for East St. Pancras, states that the city and the trade organizations have succeeded in collecting \$2,500,000 for the big world's fair to be held there in 1914. Of this amount the G. T. P. have donated \$500,000, the Canadian Pacific \$500,000, and the C. N. P. \$250,000. Sir Wilfrid Laurier will shortly make a tour to the West and while in Winnipeg he will, it is understood, inform the city that the Dominion will give dollar for dollar to advertise the exhibition as the greatest the world has ever seen. This will mean that the government and the city will expend \$500,000,000 between them.

English Welter Champion Beaten.

London, June 28.—Harry Lewis, the American fighter, defeated Young Josephs of England in the eighth round at a twenty-round contest before the National Sporting Club last night. The fight was for the welterweight championship of England and a purse of \$3000. Lewis led all the way, Joseph's second throwing up the sponge after he had taken the count three times.

HURRAH FOR VANCOUVER

Now at the Head of the League by Two Games.

(Special to the Optimist)

Vancouver, July 4.—Vancouver and Spokane played two hard fought games on Saturday, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The local players won both, and in the Sunday game they again won, thus giving Vancouver two games ahead.

The scores for the two days playing are as follows:—

Saturday morning game—Vancouver 3, Spokane 2.

Afternoon games—Vancouver 4, Spokane 1. Tacoma 4, Seattle 3.

Sunday game at Seattle—Vancouver 6 Spokane 2.

Ontario's Mineral Output

Toronto, June 28.—The output of the metalliferous mines and works of Ontario for the three months ending March 31st last, according to returns just issued was \$6,309,171. Of this aggregate silver counted for \$3,041,158, nickle, \$1,131,924, and pig iron \$1,730,396.

Gold Shipped to Mint.

Ottawa, June 28.—The royal mint yesterday received from the Yukon 11,151 ounces of gold shipped by the Bank of British North America and valued at \$35,000. The mint is not yet ready to coin Canadian pieces and the metal will probably be converted into British sovereigns.

Grafter Commits Suicide

Ottawa, June 28.—A report reached here this afternoon to the effect that Frank Gouldthrite, the missing purchasing agent of the printing bureau, who is wanted on a charge of fraud, committed suicide by jumping into Lake Erie from the deck of a steamer plying between Cleveland and Detroit. The report was later confirmed by Hon. Chas. Murphy, Secretary of State.

SHIPMENT OF GOLD

Yellow Metal From Northern British Columbia and Yukon

Vancouver, June 28.—Yesterday a shipment of gold dust arrived at the Dominion Assay Office on Hastings street, and today the employees there were busy refining and testing it. This shipment is valued at between \$75,000 and \$100,000, but it is considered quite small in comparison with the amount that is expected next month.

During July, when mining operations in the North get into full swing, the assay office has its hands full, but at present the season is only commencing. Gold dust comes from every part of British Columbia and the Yukon. It is refined and then valued, the depositor receiving a letter of credit cheque, which is payable in any part of the Dominion.

BIG STEAMERS COLLIDE

White Star Liner in Collision with Big Tank Steamer.

(Special to the Optimist)

New York, July 4.—The White Star steamer Baltic this morning came into collision with the tank steamer Standard. There was a heavy fog down the Bay at the time. The Baltic steamer slowly backed to quarantine with her watertight bulkheads smashed in. The pumps are still going and the passengers have been taken off. One man was drowned.

Charged as a Vag, Gets three months And a Fine.

Walter Patrick was fined \$25 and three months in jail by Magistrate Carss on a charge of vagrancy. He appeared for trial Thursday afternoon and was convicted. The town will be well rid of his presence.

ANOTHER NEW TOWN

Bitter Creek a Valuable Tributary To Prince Rupert.

The town of Bitter Creek, surrounded by mining properties, level as a billiard table—really as ideal a site as could be desired in any country, hemmed in by towering mountains capped with eternal snow—will go on the market early in July, according to H. P. Gibson, one of the locators. A crew of surveyors under H. C. Black, has about finished laying out the 85 acres into lots. A young town has already sprung up with a general store run by Strain & King, Mrs. Anderson's restaurant, Albert Egan's restaurant, two stage lines and a hotel in course of construction.

Prospectors find this new camp a particular convenience. Previously they outfitted in Stewart on their long hike to the glaciers. Now many of them save a 12 mile tramp by taking the stage to Bitter Creek and outfitting there. The site offers business inducements which are apparently recognized already

judging by the many people who are daily going there to inspect the place before it goes on the market. The completion of the wagon road over Ward's Pass has enabled the stage to get through to the new camp.

A city of tents is springing up and the history of Stewart is being repeated in a small way. What now is mostly needed is a postoffice, a petition for which is in circulation.—*Portland Canal Miner.*
