## PRINCE RUPERT HAS ARRIVED

STEAMED INTO PORT AT HALF-PAST THREE TO-DAY

## WAS HUNTING AN ASSASSIN

CONSTABLE LACEY MAY NOW BE LYING DEAD IN BUSH

Mad Man Enters Hotel and Kills Son of Proprietress.—Returns Later to Kill Another Man and is Wounded By Police Chasing Him.

Fernie, B. C., August 24.—Search is being made for Constable Lacey, of Elko, who has been missing since the pursuit of Martin Harrell, and it is believed he may have been killed.

Harrell entered an hotel here and killed William Halmer, son of the proprietress and escaped. Later he returned with the declared intention of killing another man and the police went after him. During the chase the police fired upon the fugitive and wounded him. He is now a prisoner in the hospital. It is feared Lacey was wounded during the chase and is lying somewhere in the bush unattended.

Large Number of Railway Officials and Several Distinguished British and French Capitalists With Party to Spend Week in Prince Rupert

## DR. CRIPPEN MAY GET OFF

WILL NEED MORE THAN CIRCUMSTANTIAL EVIDENCE

Public Feeling Incensed By Recent Conviction on Such Evidence Will Prove a Stumbling Block to the Prosecution.

London, August 24.—Predictions are freely made by lawyers that the prosecution will have great difficulty in convicting Dr. Crippen upon the evidence already put in. They say the difficulties are rendered much greater by the recent conviction of John Dickman who upon circumstantial evidence was found guilty of murdering John Nesbit, a wealthy colliery owner, on the train near Newcastle.

There was great question of guilt in the case and after the conviction a petition was got up and sent to the home secretary and other ministers were appealed to. After enquiring into the technical side only royal clemency in the case was withheld.

This has aroused a storm of public indignation and during the present state of public feeling it would be extremely difficult to obtain a verdict on mere circumstantial evidence, no matter how convincing it might be.

When President Chas. M. Hays arrives here there may be something coming to the public in the way of publicity in connection with the G. T. P. assessment. It is understood that the G. T. P. has protested vigorously against the assessment made by the city and that unless the city discounts the item the company will not proceed with the contemplated station and million dollar hotel.

Communications from the G. T. P. along this line have been received by the council and dealt with at star chambers sessions. The ratepayers have not been taken in the confidence of the council but Mr. Hays may give the public some information.



CHARLES MELVILLE HAYS

President of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company

Charles Melville Hays, our visitor today, has had a marvellous career as that of our recent distinguished visitor the premier of Canada; certainly one that is as great a stimulus and example for the young manhood of our nation as that of Sir Wilfrid himself. There is a certain correlativeness between the two careers in that both started from the ground up and both have attained the highest pinnacle of their professions if statesmanship and railroads can be embraced in that term.

Yet there is as wide a difference in the two careers as there is in their different walks of life and in the men themselves. Before the Sir was appended the premier was always known from his first start in life as Wilfrid Laurier. Mr. Hays was known then, and he is today, to thousands of people, as "Charlie", or Charley Hays. There is not so much in the name itself; but the way it obtains a common acceptance there is a depth of significance which all know and feel yet the nuance of which it is difficult to put into words.

Charley Hays began his education in a grammar school in St Joseph, Mo., went to the high school of that city and next had a short academic course

in a business school of Philadelphia. He was studious and possessed that prominent trait of the Missourian which has become proverbial, although he chanced to be born in Illinois. This trait led him to be thorough in his studies; what he knew he knew well. He probably inherited a taste for railroading, as his father was at one time president of what is now the Missouri Pacific railway.

Therefore it naturally followed that Charlie's first job was in a railroad office. He went straight from school into the accounting department of the Atlantic-Pacific & Leased Lines company at St Louis, under C. L. White, who at the time was a noted auditor. From there he was transferred into the operating department under A.A. Talmage, who had a national reputation as a railway executive, and Charlie has been known to say that much of what he has been able to make of himself is due to the discipline and hard work the distinguished president put upon him, and he feels as proud of Talmage as his sponsor as Talmage was later on proud of his pupil's rapid progress.

He became secretary to the general manager of the Missouri Pacific in 1878,

and held down that job for six years. In a similar capacity he served the Wabash St Louis & Pacific for two short years and his steadiness and reliability becoming known in railway circles, he became assistant-general manager of the Wabash Western Railway company.

Mr. Hays was then in his thirtieth year, and it was really a high position for a man of that age. But when it was taken into account that he spent six of the years in one subordinate position it cannot be said that his rise was phenomenal. It became so, however, from this one as a short time later he was appointed vice-president and general manager of the re-organized Wabash railway. That was the beginning of his truly great career as a promoter and manager of railways.

This position he resigned to accept the position of general manager of the Grand Trunk and he left St Louis to make his home in Montreal. He had accepted a four years contract and having completed this he again crossed the line and succeeded Collis P. Huntington as president of the Southern Pacific. He had a ten year contract in this case,

## THE VERSATILE POLITICIAN

A staff correspondent of the Toronto Star, with the Laurier party in the West, touches upon an idiosyncrasy that is frequently noticeable in political speakers "Even Laurier repeats himself. On the tour of the West which he is now making, he and the three other gentlemen who are usually on the programme with him inevitably use certain devices, or certain words, either unconsciously or consciously, to secure the favorable attention of the audience. They have their little jokes, their little mannerisms, their little ways of flattering the town. They have their eyes open, from the moment they enter the awaiting carriages at the town depot, for something whereon to base 'local touches,' some feature of the town to praise, some local vanity to play upon. It may be the band, or the number of churches in the place, or the fine pavements—in short, anything that the people of that particular community are proud of." The greatest showman of the world said that the public love to be humbugged and indulgent and good natured audiences accept the "jolly" from the platform entertainers in the spirit in which it is given. It serves the purpose of putting both parties on good terms with themselves, and a discreet distribution of salve limbers up the air guns without seriously endangering those within the zone of fire.—Exchange.

A particularly noticeable feature of the smooth talk given to Prince Rupert was the assurance that through the railway commission we have a firm grasp on the G. T. P. and could strangle any effort of the railway to override public rights. No sooner had the Hon. Graham finished than he was approached by two prominent residents who asked him to make good his boast—showing him that they had been crowded out of Cow Bay, where they had waterfront leases, by the G. T. P. grading contractor. Their case was promised a hearing.

## SHORT SESSION CITY COUNCIL

### NO GARBAGE REDUCTION PLANT REQUIRED YET AWHILE

Electric Lighting Scheme, Water Supply and Disposal of Refuse Reported Upon By City Engineer—The Telephone Purchase.

The City Council got through their work briskly yesterday evening. The members assembled at 8 p.m. sharp and Mayor Stork presiding at once got to business. The town clerk read the minutes of last council meeting which were approved.

#### Fire Hose Order in Hand

The clerk then read a letter from the Canadian Rubber Company, Montreal, stating that the city's order for fire hose had been received, put in hand and that delivery might shortly be expected.

#### City Charter Accounts

The town clerk read a list of various accounts incurred in connection with the City Charter including one of \$400 for legal expenses. It was moved by Alderman Hilditch and seconded by Alderman Barrow that these accounts be remitted to the Finance committee.

#### City Electric Plant

The City Engineer's report giving the inventory of apparatus required in connection with the installation of Electric Plant at the Sash and Door Factory was read and approved.

#### Augmenting Water Supply

The City Engineer further reported regarding the augmentation of the water supply by the construction of a pipe line to Hays Creek above the old G. T. P. source, and stated that this line orders for which had been sanctioned by the Mayor during the recent shortage of water supply, was already making rapid progress towards completion.

#### Disposal of Refuse

Reporting upon the disposal of city garbage the City engineer recommended that as the population of Prince Rupert was not yet sufficient to justify the erection of a garbage reduction plant arrangements should be made for the thorough collection and removal

of animal and vegetable refuse by means of covered waggons to barges at the waterfront the barges to be towed out and emptied in the sea as often as required. Dry ashes and other harmless waste might be used to fill up hollows requiring levelling or might be dumped at sea if considered a more suitable method. These recommendations and reports by the City Engineer were approved.

#### Citizens' Private Sewer

Alderman Barrow rose to inform the Mayor that his attention had been called to a leak in the sewer constructed by the private enterprise of citizens on 2nd avenue. He asked whether this sewer ought not now to be taken over and maintained by the city. Mayor Stork explained that the leak in question was due to a minor stoppage in a branch pipe and had been already remedied. The mayor explained further that as a new permanent sewer was in course of construction parallel to this private one there would be no need for the city to take the temporary sewer over. He understood that the public spirited citizens who had constructed this sewer at their own expense proposed selling the pipes as soon as the permanent sewer was completed and so reducing their outlay which had amounted to a matter of \$60 each.

#### The Telephone Purchase

A resolution regarding the issue by the city of Debentures to the amount of \$40,000 with the Canadian Bank of Commerce for telephone purposes was passed. The amount is repayable by the city in the year 1930.

#### Council Nights

It was moved by Alderman Barrow and seconded by Alderman Lynch that the nights for council meetings be Monday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week. This motion was declared carried, and at 8:45 p.m. the council adjourned to meet again tomorrow night at 8 p.m.

#### Lillooet Coaling Here

The government steamer Lillooet was here this morning taking on coal. She will go to Masset tomorrow.

#### The Big Cement Ship

The Imverkip, the steamer bringing some four thousand tons of cement for Foley, Welch & Stewart, is due today but so far nothing has been heard from her.

## POLICE COURT

### Fined \$5 and Warned

The man Storck appeared yesterday morning before Magistrate Carss for sentence in connection with the charge against him. The Magistrate while holding that there was evidence enough to uphold the assertion that Storck might be called a frequenter—imposed a light fine, \$5 and costs. He warned Storck strongly to abandon the habits he was falling into and to adhere strictly to business in future.

### Got off With Warning

"I want to warn you, Sir, that you have got to get out of that business. See that you don't come up before me on a similar charge."

In dismissing the case at yesterday's Police Court against Chris Christiansen, of the Fulton Hotel, charged with selling spirituous liquors illegally on the night of Thursday 9th inst., Magistrate Carss used the words quoted.

The evidence conflicted considerably. G. Brewster, detective for the Crown, stated that he had actually purchased whiskey from Christiansen. Christiansen himself denied having sold the stuff, but admitted that he had whiskey glasses on his premises and that he sometimes kept whiskey for his own use. Asked where he kept the stuff, he replied, "In my pocket." (Laughter.)

He further admitted that premises of his in the city had been twice convicted of a similar offence to the present one charged but declared positively that since he was last tried he had not sold whiskey.

Charles Peck, prospector, who said that he had tried to purchase whiskey at the Fulton Hotel and been refused, caused some merriment over his definition of a drunk. He declared he had never seen any drunks in the neighborhood of the Fulton Hotel and was not disposed to admit that a man Tracy had been drunk though two witnesses and the man himself had previously admitted this fact. W. B. Larkin supported the evidence of Charles Peck. Both these witnesses were removed from court during the examination of Christiansen.

### Citizens Warned

Before Magistrate Carss in the Police Court yesterday morning, George Sutherland, restaurant keeper, of the Douglas Cafe, was charged with contravening Section 36 and 37 of the new by law regarding the city's health by allowing water used for dish washing to accumulate in the neighborhood of his premises, and neglecting to provide proper means for carrying the flow from the sinks to the sewer.

The Sanitary Inspector explained the nature of the liquid, and questioned by Mr. Sutherland, admitted that he had at first given Mr. Sutherland to understand that the landlord was responsible for the construction of a proper sewer pipe. Dr. Reddie gave similar evidence regarding the nature of the liquid and told Mr. Sutherland that he had not visited the scene since Thursday last.

Mr. Sutherland in evidence explained that he had understood that the landlord was responsible for the work required and that he had notified him several times. Since having been warned by Mr. Macfarlane he had done all in his power to prevent the nuisance, but as he was not alone responsible for the accumulation of liquid he could not entirely prevent it.

The case was dismissed, the Magistrate voicing a caution to citizens generally to pay careful attention to the proper disposal of liquid refuse and all sewage, in order to preserve the health of the city and to assist the inspector as much as possible in the performance of his duty.

### Says Policeman Hurt

The case of Flossie Russell who having been arrested on a charge of being drunk and disorderly, complained that the policeman arresting her used unnecessary force, was yesterday again remanded for a few days, or until 30th inst, if the county court interferes.

## BOURASSA ON ANNEXATION

RECTLY OPPOSITE DOCTRINE TO SIR WILFRID'S

ional Leader of Quebec Advocates The Annexation of Canada to the United States and Believes it Her Destiny

Antigonish, N. S., August 20.—Annexation of Canada to the United States was advocated today in an address by Mr. Henri Bourassa, M. P., Nationalist leader of Quebec, before a summer school of science of St. Francis Xavier college.

The speaker dwelt at length on the probable destiny of Canada, namely, remaining in the position which she is at present, which he regarded as very probable; imperial federation, which would be an unweildy and unworkable condition; annexation to the United States, and independence.

Imperial federation meant an Imperial council with a preponderant British influence, said Mr. Bourassa. "Conditions in Canada are for annexation rather than for imperial federation," he said. "The penetrative influence of the United States by rail and vessel lines; the men's propensity of two peoples living under the same or similar conditions, industrial and social; the constant inter-communication of Canadians and Americans all are powerful factors for annexation."

### OLD CALUMET GOES

ll Known Early Rupert Landmark Being Demolished

One of Prince Rupert's most familiar landmarks is fast vanishing as the workmen get on with the gutting of the Calumet Hotel.

The Calumet was one of the first hotels erected in Rupert and gave excellent accommodation for workmen and other arrivals in the city in its initial stages.

Built by two prominent citizens the hotel was a substantial wooden structure well suited to its purpose, and as the process of demolishing the house proceeds the lumber used in its erection will be sold.

All the old furnishings of the house, however, being destroyed. They have served their day and generation, and the very newest in furnishings is what Prince Rupert purchasers are apt to want.

When the old Calumet comes down it is quite probable that the place may be taken by the new city hall for the site for the City Hall which will be donated to Prince Rupert by the Grand Trunk Pacific, is practically certain to be located somewhere around the neighborhood of the Calumet.

### TO TAKE UP BOXING

Paris, Aug. 19.—The substitution of the boxing glove for the foils and pistol as the French dueling weapon of the future, is said to-day to be the intention of War Minister Brun. ## REOPEN SCHOOL IN NEW BUILDING

HEATING SYSTEM HAS NOT YET ARRIVED FOR NEW SCHOOL

School Opens Next Monday Morning Board Asks For a Report on Grading the School Grounds—Position Of Janitor Not Open Yet.

The rising generation of Prince Rupert have just four more days of freedom. On Monday next at 9 o'clock in the morning they will gather in the old school house to once more come under control of teachers and be subjected to discipline. The old school will be opened and occupied by all classes for a month or two at least. The new structure is practically completed and the seats and desks were taken over yesterday afternoon and are being placed. The only thing preventing the use of the school is the heating system. The steam plant has not arrived yet and until it has been installed the school cannot be occupied and there is no other way of heating, and on a wet day the school would be too cold.

### Play Grounds

At a meeting held in the Board room in the city hall yesterday afternoon the school board decided to ask Mr. Gillingham to prepare a report on grading and improving the school grounds. The board has one thousand dollars for that purpose but that will not be sufficient for all the work as there is a large amount of filling required. A start, however, can be made. One of the members suggested that coarse rock be used for foundation work and finer stone for the top with gravel for finishing. Mr. Gillingham will be asked to express his ideas and to give an estimate of the probably cost.

### BRITISH VIEW OF IT

Some Deductions Made By Liberal Organ as to Protection

London, August 15.—The British Weekly, the organ of the Nonconformist Radicals, says: "For once we almost envy any liberal member going down to the country. The Canadian revolt against protection is a great fact, so great that it cannot be silenced or suppressed by any conspiracy of Unionist papers. It is a momentous fact that Canadian farmers desire no preference in the British market. Canadian manufacturers will fight hard, but the future of Canada is in the west."

The present standing in the legislature is, Liberals 16, Conservatives 14, and there has been times in the past history of the island when the majority margin has been even less.

Nelson, August 20.—Charles Dundee, locator of the famous Dundee mine near Ymir, one of the earliest residents of Rossland, died suddenly in the Rossland train. The cause of death is believed to be heart failure. He staked the Dundee mine at Ymir, which was recently bonded by a Vancouver syndicate, and was one of the best known mining men in the province.

## RAPIDLY RISING CITY OF SEALEY

DETAILS OF PROGRESS ON PROMISING TOWNSITE

Mineral Wealth Close at Hand Railroad and Water Access Perfect, Townsite Flat and Level, Already The City is Getting Busy.

Prince Rupert citizens are watching with interest the development of Sealey the townsite of which is situated most advantageously for both river and railway communication. Sealey is going to be a city to reckon with in the rise of the west.

## THE PRESIDENT HAYS PARTY

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

but there were repeated calls for him to return to Canada, and the newspapers at the time were full of the shortcomings under the management of his successor. This continued for some time and meantime the financial sponsors of the Southern Pacific had changed the control of the road passing into the hands of Harriman. Mr. Hays did not find his relations with the new directors as pleasant as he could wish, so he asked to be released from his contract, which was grudgingly accorded to him.

Immediately the Canadian and American newspapers were hinting that he had resigned to go back to the Grand Trunk, although no arrangements to that end were entered into for some time afterward. But he did go back. He was appointed second vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk again on January 1, 1902. Mr. Reeves, the gentleman he succeeded, met him in Montreal and after a hearty handshake showed his approbation of Mr. Hays' appointment in the words: "Charlie, your coming back has added twenty-five years to my life."

This was in 1902, eight years ago, and is where the dates stop in his career as it is set forth in "The Canadian Who's Who" recently published by the London Times. Yet these last eight years have probably been the most active of his life and its achievements the greatest of all. During them he has grown to be president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, president of the Central Vermont, president of the Grand Trunk Western and numerous other subsidiary lines, also director of the Royal Trust company the Merchants' Bank of Canada and many other larger enterprises.

Above all there rests upon him to carry to success the great scheme which is the life ambition of our recent guest, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the transcontinental line from Prince Rupert to Moncton. It is the reliance upon his great executive ability as a railroad builder that the premier bases his predictions of an early completion of the road from sea to sea.

It is just possible that the mere plugging away at a task someone else had set for him would never have produced for Mr. Hays such a pronounced measure of advancement were it not for the fact that he had other gifts beside one of industry. Some of it may be attributed to the fact that "Charlie" is a good mixer; that his bump of humor is well developed and he can enjoy the social amenities of life as much as a keen business deal. In the latter he handles

millions with the same smiling audacity as he goes into a game of penny ante. He is probably more at home and in sympathy with such pioneers of the far west as we are than he is in the private office of the great capitalist. He plays golf and occasionally has an outing after big game. He is also fond of the theatre and has a passion for good music.

But he started as a pioneer of the west and has retained that free, hearty jovial manner characteristic of the pioneer; is still Charlie Hays to all his old friends. Some of those who knew him best believe the informal smoker the Publicity Club has arranged in his honor is just the thing he is likely to enjoy. He is certainly entitled to the best Prince Rupert has to offer in any case.

### GREAT SOCKEYE PACK

Estimate of Various Sections Shows Good Season

An estimate of the season's pack of sockeye salmon was given the Province by Mr. W. A. Anderson this morning. ### Government of Alaska

New York, Aug. 19.—The establishment of a federal commission on the order of the inter-state commerce commission for the control of Alaska was advocated today by Jacob H. Schiff, the New York banker, who has just returned from a tour of the territory. Under such a form of government he believes Alaska's resources would be developed rapidly. Population is not increasing as fast as it should, he said, because immigrants do not know what they will have to contend with. In his opinion the conservation regulations, while good, are too stringent.

### MUCH COVETED CAT

Figures with Bottle in Case of Belgian and Indian Woman
