THE BIG FIGHT

Bulletins of the Mill at Reno, Nev., To-Day

Reno, July 4.—Jim Jeffries was up early this morning and after a light breakfast had a long conference with his trainers. He then went to the arena and inspected the ring. He raised an objection to the thin canvass used as flooring and it is probable that the one in use at his training camp will be substituted.

Jeff spent yesterday playing cards with a select number of friends.

Johnson also rose with the lark, but not before the rest of Reno was fully awake and roaming the streets. Most of the eastern sports had forgotten to put their watches back and in consequence were up at daybreak.

Johnson had a conference with Delaney this morning, and this confirms the impression that he hopes to spring some new plan in his battle with the white man.

"There will be no color line tonight, no matter which wins," remarked the colored boxer to the crowd of correspondents.

As early as ten o'clock this morning the crowd began to pour into the arena, and a short time after there was a large crowd at all of the entrances.

The betting at ten thirty was in favor of Jeffries by ten to six and a half.

At 1 o'clock the arena was nearly filled. The heat was intense as the mid-day sun poured its rays into the crater-like structure. Odds still stand at 10 to 6. Johnson and his attendants started for the arena at 1 o'clock in an automobile. Old fight attendants vowed that never before has a prize-fight in this country had as many women spectators as this. In addition to the 75 or 100 in the long booth on the rim of the crater, every section was dotted with them from the cheapest seats in tiers to those from \$50 to \$75 each.

Ringside betting favors Jeffries at ten to six. Official pool seller Corbett walked about the arena looking for Johnson money.

Johnson arrived at the arena at 1:32 p.m.

Tex Rickard announced that the men were fighting for a purse of \$101,000, sixty per-cent to the winner and forty per-cent to the loser.

Rickard stated that he had given a bonus of \$10,000 to each man. This had already been rumored but not confirmed.

The money according to Rickard, is all in the hands of the stake-holders. Jack Johnson's wife came into the arena and was seated near the ring.

Although the big men were scheduled to enter the ring at 1:30, the preliminary introductions of the pugilists customary at these functions had not begun at 1:45 p.m.

The crowd however was patient and good-natured.

Billy Jordan the veteran announcer entered the ring at 1:45 p.m.

Jeffries and his attendants left for the ring at 1:40, p.m. in an auto.

At 1:40 o'clock it seemed that every seat in the structure was occupied and the six foot platform that extends around the upper edge was black with a human fringe of standers.

At 1:55, p.m. announcer Joran cleared the ring of photographers and hangers-on. Jeffries arrived at the arena at 2 o'clock. Billy Muldoon entered the ring and after making a neat speech extolling the "one free state in the Union", suggested that the entire assembly stand up and "With Heart and Soul" give three cheers for Nevada and the Governor of the state.

The response to these remarks was spontaneous and the vast assemblage rose to the man and aimed its lungs in three rousing salvos for the one free state.

It is reported the new purse division was brought about by Johnson's refusal to enter the ring until it was agreed.

Responding to repeated calls, Fitzsimmons, the ex-world's champion, jumped into the ring. Bob made a neat speech.

Tom Sharkey, also responding to the importunities of the sports, stalked into the ring and was next to be introduced.

At 2:03 Tex Rickard was introduced as "the gamest sport of the world," by Billy Jordan. Jordan reviewed Rickard's connection with the prize-fight game, and concluded: "I call for three cheers for our Tex." They were given with great vim.

John L. Sullivan then clambered through the ropes and sat on the spectators' side.

Jordan referred to him as "the great and only John L. Sullivan."

2.24 p. m.—Jeffries is taking a rub, and is stripped for the ring in his dressing-room.

Tommy Burns, Stanley Ketchel and McCarey had been introduced, but the crowd shows considerable impatience, and that it is thoroughly tired of the introductory game.

Sam Langford and crack middle-weight was presented and announced he would challenge Johnson for \$10,000 win or lose.

Johnson entered the ring at 2:28 p.m. Johnson entered from the north-east corner. He was seconded by Bull Delany Cotton, Coc. Furey, and Dave Hills. Jeffries entered the ring from the south-east at 2:30 p.m.

Johnson gave Jeffries the south-east corner.

"I don't care what corner you put me in; it's all the same to me" said Jeffries as he sat in his chair.

The entry of Jeffries into the arena was the signal for a tremendous outburst of enthusiasm.

Jeff's seconds are Jim Corbett, Abe Attell, Joe Choynski, Bob Armstrong, Eugene Vancourt, Farmer Burns, Roger Cornell and Sam Berger. Jeff's time-keeper is Bill Gallagher.

At 2:35 p.m. Johnson was presented as "the heavy-weight champion of the world."

Time called at 2:44 p.m.

Johnson was clad in blue trunks with the American flag entwined. A weak reception was tendered the champion.

At 2:37 p.m. Jeffries seconds were still winding the surgical bandages.

At 2:38 p.m. Jeffries stripped. He wore purple trunks and the American flag.

Johnson clapped and cheered Jeffries with the rest of the crowd, as the big white was introduced as "The Great and only undefeated champion of the world, J. J. Jeffries."

Jeff folded his arms behind himself and gazed over the vast crowd,

HOW THE FIGHT WAS REPORTED

UP-T-ODATE METHODS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION

Every Important Blow Struck Reported Fifteen Seconds Later to Coast Newspapers—Most Instantaneous Action Ever Attempted.

San Francisco, July 4.—How the news of the great fight was sent will be of interest, as greater pains were taken to give the result speedily than ever before, and in fact it was as near being simultaneous as human ingenuity can at present go. Every important blow struck was reported in San Francisco within fifteen seconds, and from there wired to coast cities.

Owing to the limitations of the carrying capacity of telegraph wires three relays or re-sendings were necessary to reach all points. One of these was made at San Francisco, where the stuff was sent to coast papers; another at Denver, from where all central and southern points are served, and a third at New York—from which eastern points were taken care of. At each of these points the receiving operator used a visible typewriter and the sending operator, seated beside him relayed the incoming matter word for word as it was received. The task of giving to the country this description of the fight, a story which promised to be one of the most widely read of the decade, was assigned to Max Balthasar, known in the sporting world as "The Ringsider," one of the foremost boxing authorities in the country, and a man whose opinions have for many years been the last word in sporting questions on the Pacific Coast, the home of the fighting game.

Balthasar had been at the ringside during practically every important bout participated in by either Jeffries or Johnson and had a personal and expert knowledge of the science and style of each man. For several weeks he had been touch with both fighters, has studied them at their work and during their relaxations, and the full value of his knowledge of the men and their methods will be brought out in his description and analysis of their battle.

Balthasar was assisted in his work by Tip Wright, also a well known boxing authority.

READY FOR TRACKS

Contractor Stewart Says he Never has Enough Laborers

Contractor J. W. Stewart, of Foley Welch and Stewart, in in town for a few days. They have a contract to make railroad bed from Prince Rupert to Aldermere, a distance of two hundred and forty-five miles. The first hundred miles is graded and all ready for the steel, and the balance of the work has been well opened up and is proceeding rapidly.

Mr. Stewart says the work done is up to schedule time but greater headway would have been made could they have had more men. He said they certainly had lots of difficulty in getting labor although they were paying big fat wages \$2.50 and \$3 per day. They were now employing about two thousand five hundred and had work for nearly double that number.

Reid of that city was in town a few days last week making inquiries and investigating for himself. He was taken in tow by Leonard and Reid, real estate men on Third avenue, and they showed him the city. This was Mr. Reid's first visit. In speaking to the Optimist on Saturday just before he left for the north where he will spend a few days, he said he was not only surprised, but amazed, at the growth and development of the place. ALLIANCE WITH GERMANY

Prince of Wales to Marry the Kaiser's Only Daughter

Berlin, June 27.—There are interesting rumors in circulation in military and social quarters at Potsdam to the effect that the Kaiser and the Kaiserine are thinking of a matrimonial alliance between their only daughter, Princess Victoria Louise of Prussia, and the eldest son of the King and Queen of England, who is the Prince of Wales. The Princess, who will be 18 next September, is one year and three-quarters older than the Prince of Wales, but that would not be regarded as a handicap from her parent's point of view. The Kaiser's wife is several months older than the Emperor, and their second son, Prince Frederick of Prussia, is married to a Princess three years his senior.

Extend Telephone to Stewart and Retain That Trade

J. V. Rittenhouse, representing the British Columbia Telephone Company, has let a contract for the erection of telephone poles and states that a service will be inaugurated at an early date. Mr. Rittenhouse left for the outside on Saturday and will return early in July. The projected service embraces a local exchange for Stewart and the running of a trunk line as far as the Forks, with subsidiary lines to connect with the different camps en route—Portland Canal Miner.

Rome, June 28.—The notorious Sicilian brigand, Mulone, who escaped the officers of the law four years ago, and fled from Italy, was tried in contumacy at Perugia Monday. After being found guilty of murder, blackmail and other crimes, he was sentenced to 144 years in prison.

English Welter Champion Beaten.

London, June 28.—Harry Lewis, the American fighter, defeated Young Josephs of England in the eighth round at a twenty-round contest before the National Sporting Club last night. The fight was for the welterweight championship of England and a purse of \$3000. Lewis led all the way, Joseph's second throwing up the sponge after he had taken the count three times.

Ontario's Mineral Output

Toronto, June 28.—The output of the metalliferous mines and works of Ontario for the three months ending March 31st last, according to returns just issued was \$6,809,171. Of this aggregate silver counted for \$3,041,158, nickle, \$1,131,924, and pig iron \$1,730,396.

Gold Shipped to Mint.

Ottawa, June 28.—The royal mint yesterday received from the Yukon 11,151 ounces of gold shipped by the Bank of British North America and valued at \$35,000. The mint is not yet ready to coin Canadian pieces and the metal will probably be converted into British sovereigns.

Grafter Commits Suicide

Ottawa, June 28.—A report reached here this afternoon to the effect that Frank Gouldthrite, the missing purchasing agent of the printing bureau, who is wanted on a charge of fraud, committed suicide by jumping into Lake Erie from the deck of a steamer plying between Cleveland and Detroit. The report was later confirmed by Hon. Chas. Murphy, Secretary of State.

SHIPMENT OF GOLD

Yellow Metal From Northern British Columbia and Yukon

Vancouver, June 28.—Yesterday a shipment of gold dust arrived at the Dominion Assay Office on Hastings street, and today the employees there were busy refining and testing it. This shipment is valued at between \$75,000 and \$100,000, but it is considered quite small in comparison with the amount that is expected next month.

During July, when mining operations in the North get into full swing, the assay office has its hands full, but at present the season is only commencing. Gold dust comes from every part of British Columbia and the Yukon. It is refined and then valued, the depositor receiving a letter of credit cheque, which is payable in any part of the Dominion.

WEATHER REPORTING STATION

Established in Prince Rupert.
F. W. Dowling Agent.

B. C. Webber outlines the workings
Of the Weather Bureau and the
Important Part it Plays in the
Commercial World.

B. C. Webber, assistant erector of
the weather recording stations in Canada
was in the city for a few days last week
and left on Saturday for Port Simpson
where he will look after the removal
of the instruments from that place to
Prince Rupert. For a number of years
the station has been at Port Simpson
but owing to the growing importance
of this town and at the request of the
G. T. P. the Weather Bureau decided
to move here. F. W. Dowling, Dominion
Telegraph Agent, has been secured to
look after the weather station and a
better man would be hard to find as he
has charge of the one in Atlin for four
years.

Some of the smaller instruments have
already been placed at Mr. Dowling's
residence on Musgrave Place and the
others Mr. Webber will bring down
from Simpson in a few days. It is pro-
posed to erect the station on the bluff
in front of the Catholic Church. This
is an ideal location. The instruments
will be about 30 feet above ground and
will be surrounded by a fence.

The instruments on the hill will be a
telegraph connection recording its findings
on an instrument in the house. This
instrument will be read twice a day at
5 o'clock and the reading transmitted by
telegraph to the headquarters in Toronto.
When the station is working the daily
readings will also be published in the
Optimist.

The Optimist met Mr. Webber on
Saturday and had a chat with him on
the system and the workings of the
weather bureau. For the information
of our readers we print below in part
what Mr. Webber told us.

The Bureau has telegraph weather
reporting stations about every 120 miles
throughout Canada and the United
States. The stations in the states all
report to Washington and those in
Canada report to Toronto. Then the
two countries exchange reports. To
the states the reports from our Northern
stations are the most valuable in fore-
casting the weather in their country
and the reports from across the line
are very valuable to us.

As these reports are received at the
head quarters they are reduced to sea
level. The temperature of the air at the
time of the reading is taken; the rain
fall (if any) the kind of weather, the
direction of the wind, the force of the
wind and the highest and lowest tem-
perature during the preceding 24 hours.
These reports are taken twice a day at
the same time by all stations. In Prince

Fake Mining Reports

The Toronto Globe of ten days ago
has a special front page story of a great
strike of free milling ore at Stewart—
enough it is said to keep thousands of
stamp mills going for hundreds of years.
The Globe heralds it as a greater
Eldorado. That kind of exaggeration is
criminal in the man who wrote it and in
the paper which flaunts it to the unwary
investor. It is the kind of exaggeration
that injures the district it purports to
benefit. The truth about Stewart is
unknown but it is true that Stewart
has been over-boasted. It is ahead of
its time. The fact seems to explain the
steady decline of mining stocks there and
the flatness of the real estate. Reports
from the camp from reliable parties
show that there has been nothing
happening at Stewart to account for
the slump. This explanation seems to
be that the stocks were boosted far too
high for properties that are not shippin
ore. Stewart is not yet a mining town—

Rupert the reading is at 5 o'clock a.m.
and p.m.

All messages are, of course, sent to
Toronto in code. There they are de-
ciphered and put on the skeleton map
of North America. When these are
completed they have a complete report
of the existing climate conditions of
the whole continent.

By means of isobaric lines, which
are drawn on the map for every tenth
of an inch of pressure, the authorities
can locate and trace the progress of the
stormy or fine weather.

All weather changes move from West
to East, being carried along by the drift
of the eddies of the atmosphere. It
would be physically impossible for the
storms to move from the east to the
west as that is against the rotation of
the earth. By these atmospheric con-
ditions passing over the continent the
authorities are able to forecast the
weather in advance. For instance,
when they see a storm passing over
Prince Rupert from the Pacific it can
be followed right across the continent
and it generally passes through the
straits of Belle Isle. The usual course
of storms from the Pacific is across the
prairie provinces, the great lakes, down
the St. Lawrence to Newfoundland.
Another set of storms start from Mexico
and move north east across the Great
Lakes and over to Newfoundland. A
third set comes up from the Bermuda
Islands and sweeps across the Maritime
Provinces to Newfoundland. The latter
place usually receives the butt of every
storm and it is one of the stormiest
countries in the world.

Canadian Stations.

The Canadian weather stations ext-
end from Dawson City in the north,
south east to the Bermuda Island and
east to Prince Edward Island and Cape
Breton. Also to Newfoundland. The
stations on the Pacific Coast are at
Dawson City, Atlin, Prince Rupert,
Triangle Island, Victoria and Vancouver.

Import of Meteorology

Meteorology in all countries is ad-
vancing very rapidly and the per centage
of verification of weather forecasts for
forty-eight hours in advance, and also
for notification of approaching severe
storms, has now reached almost 90 per
cent. Weather bureaus are so important
to the general public in these enlightened
days that it would be a great hardship
to dispense with them.

Fishermen are warned of the approach

NEW PROVINCIAL PRISON NEEDED

NORTHERN BRITISH COLUMBIA IS DEVELOPING RAPIDLY.

Ald. Pattullo Moved Motion Authorizing the Mayor to Take the Matter up at Once with the Idea of Having it Built Here.

There is no reason who the Provincial Government should not establish a provincial jail in Prince Rupert. Ald. Pattullo, at the council meeting on Saturday night introduced a resolution authorizing the mayor to take up the matter with the provincial authorities at as early a date as possible. Ald. Hilditch seconded the motion and it carried.

Ald. Pattullo in his remarks on the subject stated that Prince Rupert is growing rapidly and there will be an increasing number of prisoners from here for the provincial penitentiary. Only last week the city had to pay 60 odd dollars for transportation for prisoners going to New Westminster. That is a needless expense. This whole district is filling very rapidly and a better place for the provincial prison could not be found than right here.

Mayor Stork agreed with the chairman of the Finance Committee. He said he would take the matter up with the government at once. He explained that he interviewed Attorney General Bowser when in Victoria on the question of a site for a city hall and that gentleman promised to give him an early reply. The city will then get the city hall and city police station under way. That will help out a little. In the meantime the city has taken over the Provincial police station here and boarding the provincial prisoners at 50c a day. That arrangement will only last until October.

He would get busy on the provincial prison proposition at once.

WILL MISS MR. DAVIS.

Berlin Paper Regrets Departure of The Engineer for the West.

One of the Berlin papers refers to Col Davis, Prince Rupert's new city engineer in its issue of June 7th as follows: Col. W. M. Davis, who has been the town engineer for the past ten years, is likely to go to Prince Rupert. He has received an offer to accept the position there of town engineer, at a salary of \$5,000. He will accept it and will leave as soon as he can arrange his work here to allow him to get away. It is understood that his family will not leave here until later on, after Mr. Davis has secured a suitable house in the new and rapidly growing western town.

Col. Davis left early today for Niagara, with the Grey's Horse, of which he is the commanding officer, but will leave for the west as soon as possible after his return.

Mr. Davis is one of the best known engineers in Ontario. He has been in great demand and did a lot of work for other municipalities, and he superintended the installation of the sewage disposal system here.

In his removal, the Canadian Club loses one of its most enthusiastic members. Since its organization he has been a hard worker and at present occupies the president's chair. Mrs. Davis also has been one of the most energetic members of the Daughters of the Empire. Their removal from Berlin will be generally regretted.
