FURTHER PLANS FOR THE FAIR

COMMITTEE WILL REPORT TO BOARD OF TRADE

Mr. Hays Suggests Baby Show as a Never Failing Attraction—Foley, Welch and Stewart Warehouse May Be Used for the Exhibition.

The exhibition committee of the Board of Trade met last night in the rooms of the board, and a very interesting session was held planning out further details of the fair. T. G. Dawson presided and among those present were: Messrs. Tite, Nelson, Newton, Hoyer, Peck, Brown, Thompson, Manson, Law, Morrison, Sawle, and G. W. Nickerson, who acted as secretary.

The first question was as to the raising of the necessary funds, and Mr. Dawson, chairman of the committee, was commissioned to interview the city government and William Manson, M. P., who reported that the mayor favored the project and thought he could promise liberal subscription from the city, but that he wanted more particulars. Mr. Manson had promised to write to the provincial government asking for a grant.

Secretary Nickerson reported that letters had been written to the city council, the provincial government and the Grand Trunk Pacific in regard to subscriptions.

A number of letters had been sent out to the gentlemen named from out of town points to serve on the general committee and from some of these the replies were read. All of them were more or less enthusiastic and promises of exhibits were made. James Martin, of Bulkley, in his letter suggested that October 12 might be a good date for the fair, and it would give time for various crops to ripen also for the people from the interior to return to their homes while the river was still open.

Edward Hicks-Beach wrote from Hazelton that he should be glad to do in his power to get the people in that district to send a good exhibit, and he felt sure that there was no better way of advertising the resources of that portion of the district than by showing what could be grown. He decided the best time would be somewhat later in September, as transportation facilities were then fairly certain on the Skeena river.

Rev. Thomas J. Marsh of Masset, wrote that after spending fifteen years at the Great Slave Lake he was not sure that his services on the committee would be of much value, but he was partly in sympathy with the movement and had no doubt it would be well supported in his district.

Mr. Martin wrote they would certainly send a good exhibit from his district, and in the event of them being able to send a line of valuables such as gold dust, it would be necessary for the committee to guarantee the safe return of the exhibits.

It was reported that Mr. Frizzel was enthusiastic and that he had an exhibit all ready. He would be able to get from the canneries on the Skeena every variety of fish, frozen in solid blocks for the exhibition.

Certain kinds of exhibits were next discussed, and this led to a large number of names being added to the general committee of men who could be depended upon to secure such exhibits. Mr. George Raleigh was one of these,

his success in gathering Indian exhibits being particularly mentioned.

Mr. Hays said one product of British Columbia must not be overlooked which always drew large crowds at such exhibitions, and that was the baby show. That was really one of the greatest drawing cards of all the local exhibitions and would be here if they had a good show and selected a good judge.

Mr. Manson: He would have to take to the woods after giving his decision. The Chairman: He might give it over the phone, as we will have it running long before then. I understand it will be in operation in about a month.

The safety of the judge of babies thus being assured the committee passed on to a reconsideration of the name of the proposed exhibition association. This was upon the suggestion of Mr. Manson, who said that in order to obtain a provincial grant, the addition of "agricultural" in their title might assist. After some discussion the title stood—Skeena District Industrial and Agricultural Exhibition." Mr. Peck seconding the motion to that effect.

In regard to a provincial grant Mr. Manson said he could write to the government, which would meet in executive on Wednesday, and get a reply back on Thursday as to how much the province would assist. He reminded the committee that all the grants for such purposes had already been made, they generally being brought before the legislature in February. That course could not have been followed by Prince Rupert, but he believed they would be able to obtain a regular grant.

In further talk over the expected finances, it was mentioned that \$1000 might be obtained from the provincial government, \$1000 from the council and \$1000 from the railway. It would be easy to collect another \$3000 from the hotel keepers and real estate men in the city and this sum would be sufficient for all purposes.

The chairman said several manufacturers would undoubtedly have been glad to pay for space in the exhibition had the committee space they could rely upon having to sell.

This brought up the question of site, and it was decided that the Foley, Welch and Stewart warehouse on the dock would then be practically empty and available for the purpose. The chairman said it would make an ideal exhibition hall. Mr. Peck suggested that a tent might be erected on the wharf near by for an exhibition of live stock. In this connection he thought a parade of draught horses would be an attractive feature. Mr. Hays added poultry to this and both suggestions were accepted. Mr. Manson said it would be well to get into communication with some of the government experts, and have them act as judges.

The question of a permanent site for the annual exhibition, it was agreed, could be better discussed later. Mr. Morrison called attention to the importance of having a strong transportation committee, and Mr. Manson suggested the three editors present as the strongest he could think of. Mr. Sawle thought the large shippers would carry the greatest weight with the companies, but the chairman held the committee was well selected. He said it would have an easy task anyway, as the transportation companies would be glad from a business point of view to assist and would willingly carry all exhibits free as they would have the people coming and going.

A game exhibit, exhibits of ore and many other matters were discussed and the committee then adjourned to report to the Board of Trade on Monday evening.

Plans for the new court house at Grand Forks are being prepared.

PRIESTS FIGHT WITH ROBBERS

ATTEMPT TO DESPOIL FAMOUS ST. LEONARD CHURCH.

Two of the Clergy are Seriously Stabbed After a Fierce Fight with Two Masked Robbers—Thieves Driven Off and Escape.

New York, July 9.—A most determined attempt was made last night to rob the famous church of St. Leonard. The edifice is rich in altar adornments and no doubt the cracksmen expected to make a valuable bag. They waited until the evening service was over and the lights turned out and then entered the sacristy and turned on a dark lantern. Two priests who had remained to pray, immediately sprung on the robbers and taking them unexpectedly managed to throw them. Both of them used their knives and the valiant priests were fearfully cut before exhaustion forced them to give up their grip. The robbers escaped but carried no booty with them.

NO LICENSES TO BE GRANTED

COMMISSIONERS ACTED UPON SOLICITORS' ADVICE

City Solicitors Favored Granting Licenses—W. E. Fisher and L. W. Patmore Said Such Action Would Be Illegal.

The License Commissioners decided this afternoon on motion of Commissioners Smith and Merryfield that as they were not legally appointed to office until June 9th, they were not now able to grant any licenses for the sale of liquor, and that the meeting adjourn until the second week in September. This motion was carried and the Board adjourned. The opinions of Messrs. Williams & Manson, W. E. Fisher and L. W. Patmore were read. The former rather favored granting licenses and the two latter were opposed to it from a legal standpoint.

WITH SAME OLD BALLOON

Wellman Announces That He Will Attempt to Cross the Atlantic.

New York, July 9.—Walter Wellman, the newspaper correspondent who has made two or three attempts to reach the pole by balloon but has never got outside of the sight of Spitzbergen, is now out with another proposition. He declares that next month he will cross the Atlantic, using the balloon that last September was strewn over the ice of the northern seas.

APPOINTMENTS MADE

By Lieut-Governor on June 9th, Says the Attorney-General

License commissioner V. W. Smith received a wire yesterday from the Attorney-general informing him that he and Mr. J. E. Merryfield has been appointed license commissioners for Prince Rupert on June 7th and that the Lieut-Governor did not consent to them until the 9th. The appointments are thus dated from the 9th of June therefore the telegram did not say anything about

the granting of licenses and as the majority of the commissioners are not willing to take any chance on going too far written opinions are being prepared by two legal firms and these opinions will be presented to the meeting this afternoon at three o'clock. It largely depends on these opinions what the commissioners do. The lawyers may disagree, and then the board will be in as bad a position as ever.

CAPT. GILMOUR SLEPT

Prince Rupert Came in and Left and the Captain Slept On.

Capt. Gilmour, of the Premier Hotel, a rived home from Swanson Bay last night after a most enjoyable trip. The captain had been to Stewart and returned on the Str. Prince Rupert. He returned to his stateroom during the afternoon to rest and fell asleep and did not awaken until after the steamer had called at Prince Rupert and had pulled out again. His friends here were a little anxious about him as it was known that he was coming down from the north on that boat and no trace was found of him when the boat landed here. As soon as he woke up the captain sent a wireless to Digby Island and from there it was sent here notifying his friends that he would get off at Swanson Bay and return on the Camosun. A warm welcome awaited him on his return last night.

New Indian Agency

Owing to the opening of the country and the great extent of Babine agency, for which R. E. Loring is agent, with headquarters at Hazelton, the territory has been divided and a new agency created with headquarters at Fraser Lake. The change will relieve Mr. Loring of about half of his district and leave him the watershed of the Skeena from Kitselas up, with the exception of the southern end of Babine lake, the divisional point coming at Old Fort about midway on the lake.

LABORER DROWNED

K. Fredrickson Met Death at McHugh's Camp, Lorne Creek

Word was received last night by Mr. V. W. Smith from A. L. McHugh's camp at mile 145, just above Lorne creek, stating that K. Fredrickson, a laborer, had been accidentally drowned that evening.

REFORMER IS KILLED BY MOB

STRUNG TO LAMP AND RIDDLED WITH BULLETS

Had Forced His Way Into Saloon and Shot Its Proprietor.—City Became Quiet After Wreaking Vengeance On Reformer

(Special to the Optimist)

Newark, Ohio, July 9.—All is quiet around town today, after the lynching last night of Carl Etherington, the moral reform detective, and the town is really at peace again for the first time since the rioting begun on the news of the victory of Johnson in the prize ring. The negroes went on a wild jamboree and there was some rioting but it was soon put down. Other troubles arose, however, from entirely different causes, and worked the already inflamed public mind.

One of these incidents had a fatal ending. While feeling was running high Etherington was conducting a street crusade against the saloons, at the same time laying informations upon all sorts of pretences against the liquor dealers. He forced his way into the saloon of a man named Howard and raised a disturbance there. Howard endeavored to pacify the reformer and failing in this started to eject him from the premises. Etherington drew a revolver and shot the saloon-keeper dead.

The police were quickly on the scene and the reformer was rushed through the excited crowd to jail. Since then there have been a number of riotous meetings on the subject of the shooting, and last night a large mob, headed by personal friends of the late saloon keeper made an attack upon the jail. They overpowered the police and dragged out the prisoner. Over a convenient lamp post at the entrance to the jail a rope was strung at one end of which was the reformer and at the other a yelling mob. The bumping of the reformer's head against the crossbar was the signal for a volley from the revolvers of the crowd, and the body was riddled with bullets.

HAD LOST ON FIGHT.

Went to Jack Johnson's Home Armed With a Rifle.

Chicago, July 9.—Richard Quick, a machinist who claims Brantford as his home, tried to force his way into Jack Johnson's home last night, armed with a rifle and in the hallway was met by some of the black champion's friends, who held him until he was turned over to a policeman. Asiatic Labor Again



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GEOLOGY OF SKEENA RIVER

WHERE ERUPTIVE ROCKS REST AFTER TRIASSIC PERIOD

How to Prospect the District for Mineral and for Coal.—Excellent Article Written by a Clever Mining Engineer and Mineralogist.

There are many people now being attracted up the Skeena river, the Bulkley valley, by the building of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway. Information about this new country is therefore interesting. Mr. R. C. Campbell-Johnson, mining and metallurgical engineer, of this city, who has recently returned from an extended professional trip through those parts, writes as follows:

"During the Triassic period in geology, a superlative flow of eruptive rock had commenced to come to rest, this flow covering an immense area of the world's crust on the Pacific coast, including the Queen Charlotte islands, and a large tract of country called now the northern interior of British Columbia. The line or points of eruption was along the present coast range, before the time of the Batkolith granites, of the Jurassic age.

On this Triassic basal flow, rock acting as a foundation, was later cemented by lime and iron oxides, the resultant of the usual disintegration of earlier rocks of palaeozoic (ancient life) and other eras. The atmosphere then was dank and stagnant with carbonic gas arising from the gigantic volcanic eruptions, the basal rock was still very hot, the air was stifling, waiting for plant life to absorb the carbon into its body, and the vomiting stream from the water on the heated ground, and the crevices exuding more hid the sun and skies.

Under these more than tropical conditions grew giant sagillaria and other ferntrees and reeds of prehistoric dimensions, which cleansed the air so that men could exist, and stored up carbon so as to form our present beds of coal.

Among this rank growth swarmed saurian and reptiles, with only embryonic lung capacity. They were amphibious and not inconvenienced by the coal-damp gas, so fatal to our coal miners. Coal-fields were formed in one continuous stretch on a horizontal plane, spreading out hundreds, and even thousands of miles in those interior lagoons, and under the present Pacific ocean, forming parts of the lost continent of Lemuria, connecting this shore with Australia and Madagascar. The watersheds were different then from now, the Naas river probably being the trunk drain, fed by other rivers, a sluggish body of water draining the country badly, like the Mississippi or Amazon.

This interior lagoon grew by lacustrine deposits, and the vast accumulation of dead decaying plant life, and by degrees raised its head above the level of the present ocean, and went on up-raising itself stratum after stratum, conglomerates, coal, sandstone, more coal, alternating the one with the other for seventeen and more swings of the pendulum of time, in sequences occupying aeons in the making.

The coal building process just described consumed periods in the Jurassic, lower and upper cretaceous era in geology, and perhaps even later, strata now denuded and eroded away by glacial and meteorological action in the Eocene age, represented by the massive beds of gravel and rounded stones, forming the banks and flats along the rivers.

In the Tertiary period, identified in date by microscopic slices made and examined of the ingredients and prior rocks found in their matrix or mass, came as intrusive rocks, more natural convulsions with origin and genesis below the Triassic, named in mineral nomenclature by Mr. W. W. Leach, of the

NEW BODY OF ORE
Discovered Two Miles Back of Placer Claims.

Messrs. Giggey and Wood located a large mineralized body last week carrying gold and silver values, about two miles back of the Palawan group of placer claims. The body is cut to a depth of about one hundred to one hundred and fifty feet by three canyons, two of the canyons cross cutting the body and one cutting it along its strike. It is heavily mineralized for a width of three thousand feet, and on the surface where it is subject to atmospheric action, is considerably decomposed. Every twenty or thirty feet there are seams of solid galena running through it, these seams varying in thickness from one half to five inches.

The body is cut by a mineralized porphyry dike two hundred feet wide, one specimen from the dike having been powdered and panned by Mr. Wood showed several small colors of gold. Four claims have been located on this body, and takes in from the first canyon which cuts it, back to some hundred feet beyond the porphyry dike.

This body or mineralized formation has been sampled for some distance by Messrs. Jones, Giggey, and Wood, and if returns from assays of these justify it, the Inland Mines Limited will take over the claims and have them thoroughly prospected.

The seams of silver mentioned above are numerous, but too far apart to be profitably worked of themselves, unless the mineralized body in which they lay proves to be a workable low grade proposition—in something better than iron.—*Big Canyon Weekly*

ORE SENT TO SMELTER
Lead King Group on Ninemile Has Been Incorporated.

Ed. Charleson, of Telkwa, has gone to Vancouver on business connected with the Lead King group of claims on Ninemile mountain beyond Hazelton. Mr. Charleson states that five tons of ore were shipped to the smelter two weeks ago, and if the returns from that run are all that the owners believe they will be, extensive development will be underway within another month.

The Lead King group adjoins the Sunrise group of claims, now under bond by the Prince Rupert syndicate who are developing the Silver Cup mine. The Lead King group is already incorporated, but the incorporators will await the returns from the five ton mill-run before offering their stock to the public. The vein taken in by the Lead King group is four feet wide, is a true fissure, and so far as shown by all the work done to date, which consists of open-cuts and prospect holes, runs well in galena from wall to wall.

GOLD CREEK TRAIL

Fred Forrest Has Good Showing on Lucky Jim Claim

Fred is always reluctant to speak of his own property, but the specimens that have been brought in by the prospectors who have visited it, and their accounts of the width of the lead together with the extensive work Fred is doing, certainly go to show that Fred's faith in it is genuine.

GEOLOGY OF SKEENA RIVER

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 2

Canadian government's geological survey, porphyry granites. These transformed the landscape, altered the watersheds, generated new conditions, and created different environments. It is the segregation and concentration out from these inclusions into their contacts with the older rocks of the economic metals that comprise the origin and genesis of our ore bodies today, by the solfataric heated waters, sweating out through the pores of the matrix by capillary and lateral attraction reprecipitating our copper and other pores in chutes. This is the structural history of this part, built up by the geologist with his clear, concise and close observation.

On the correctness of these facts the miner will work intelligently, seeking coal where the later disturbances have been sufficiently far apart and separated not to destroy the original clean coal by a crushing, grinding, uplifting motion, interlaminating shale and foreign rock not of vegetable growth, and so destroying the market value of his product.

For the gold and silver, copper and lead, the miner will follow contacts and fissures, crosscutting only from the vein, watch carefully for his quartz leader or indicator to clearly show him the channel to be followed from ore chute to ore chute."

AGAIN VISITED BY BIG FLOODS

GOOD EXCUSE FOR RAISING THE PRICE OF FIZZY WATER.

Famous Champagne District Undated and the Loss Estimated at Three Million Dollars—Avalanches in Switzerland.

(Special to th Optimist)

Paris July 9.—Heavy rains have caused a recurrence of the floods of a week ago, and all the lower quarters of the city are now in a state of flood. The damage will not nearly be as severe as on the last occasion, for the reason of the number of improvements the municipality and the government have made in the embankment of the Seine. But this work was not completed and much costly work was washed away yesterday. Consequently the damage in his city will still be great.

The heavy downpour of rain during the last two days seems to have spread over a large area and the valleys of all the important rivers in the Midi are flooded. In many cases great damage will ensue, especially in the Burgundy, Burgoigne and Champagne districts, where most of the vineyards have been destroyed together with the crops. In the Champagne district alone the damage is placed at three million.

Grindelwald, Switzerland, July 9.—Owing to the heavy rains an avalanche came down yesterday afternoon which overwhelmed three different parties of tourists. Seven men were rescued by search parties, being dug out of the deep snow in which they were suffocating. A party of five tourists is still missing and grave apprehensions are felt for their safety.



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MEDAL FOR THE KING.

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London, July 2.—King George gave an audience today to General Stewart L. Woodford, of New York, president of the Hudson-Fulton celebration commission, who presented his majesty with an official gold medal. Accompanying the medal was an address originally prepared for presentation to the late King Edward. The address expressed the thanks of the commission for the presence at the celebration at New York of the representatives of his majesty's government, paid a tribute to the English seamen, and expressed an appreciation of the Anglo-Saxon influence on American life.

In replying, King George referred feelingly to receiving an address originally intended for his father, "who had so cordially associated himself with the Hudson-Fulton celebration." He thanked General Woodford, and added: "I know that this medal will be prized by the government of this country as a memento of the festival and evidence of that hospitality so warmly extended to those who represented my government on that occasion. I most heartily join in the hope expressed that our two countries may ever work together in the promotion of everything conducive to the peace and happiness of the whole world."

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**Miles and a Quarter Laid in
and a Half Hours—Road Will
Probably Handle Traffic Before the
Close of This Year.**

Two and a quarter miles in six hours
is a half the record Dan Dempsey
with his track-laying gang on
today, and railroad men say that is
some for this mountain section.

Dempsey is the head foreman at
end of steel on the Grand Trunk
Co. He is in charge of "the Pioneer,"
the first machine to be used in
the province. In fact Dan is one of
the inventors of the machine. It is a
wonderful piece of mechanism—not much
like a steam engine, but a whale to work. It will
employ 50 or 60 men busy in front and as
many more behind spiking down the
line. The machine is a hustler and it
is the man hustle, too. That is a
point about it, but that same hustle
has been the cause of some delay because
of the gang of men at work on the machine
it first started out were clumsy
and fell over themselves. An experienced
hand had to be brought in and now the
work goes along merrily.

The track-laying train is made up of
an engine with two flat cars of rails
and the track-laying machine
behind them. Behind the engine are
flat cars of ties, and work and general supply.

On each side of the train are box
cars always hung just below the edge of
the floor of the flat cars. The tramway
on the left side runs from the front of
the Pioneer to the end of the flat cars
carrying rails. The trams are operated
by a team from the engine. They are
operated by rollers which carry the rails up
to the front of the pioneer. As the end
of the rail shoots out two men clamp on
the rollers. The rail is suspended from
the two cranes—one for each
roller—and lowered into place. Tem-
peratures steel rods hold the rails in posi-
tion until the train has passed, when
the spiking gang arrives. On the right
side of the train the trough-like tram
carries the ties back to the cars with the ties.

The ties are fed in and are pushed
down by rollers having teeth. They
are pushed out of the tram some distance
behind the pioneer. A man grabs
the tie as it comes out and drops it in
the trench. When one considers that fre-
quently half a mile of track is laid an
hour and that there are 3200 ties to the
mile it means stepping lively.

At the present time the track is out
for as far as the trestle over Bone-yard
creek, about 22 miles from Prince Rupert.
The work is considerably delayed by
the lack of material. Until the completion
of the Zanardi Rapids bridge all the
material has to be taken from the Rupert
harbor on a scow ferry to a slip this side
of the river. On account of the tides
only one load of material can be put on
the scow unloaded each day.

The Zanardi bridge has given a great deal
of trouble but the concrete piers will be
finished this week ready for the steel
work. The span between the shore
piers is 100 feet. There are three
piers built to withstand the torrent of
water which pours through with the
spring and fall of the tides. Mr. Young,
of the Canada Bridge Co., has charge of
the superstructure and he has his
office on the ground ready to start
work as soon as the concrete is finished. His
work is now about completed and by the
middle of August the big bridge should be
ready for trains.

In the meantime the track-laying
train proceed as far as material can be
put on the front. No ballasting will
be done until the track reaches the
level pit 90 miles up the line. This will
be some weeks yet, but an effort will be
made to have the first hundred miles
completed before the frost of next winter.
The bed of a new road the bed is in excellent

shape and with 80 lb rails heavy trains
can be taken over it at a good speed
without danger. There are very few
soft spots and these are mostly near
the mouth of the Skeena.

The scenery along the route is magni-
ficent. After leaving the harbor view
the road slips around the end of
Kaieen Island, where for half a mile it
loses sight of the water, to come out on
picturesque Porpoise harbor with its
pretty islands winding channels, and
swift running waters. This type of
scenery continues as far as Inverness
where the grade turns on to the north
branch of the Skeena. Then for many
miles it winds under the towering
cliffs of granite and along the broad
and beautiful river. At this season of
the year the Skeena is alive with hundreds
of small craft belonging to the canneries
but the scene from the train is more like
a bit of the St Lawrence or the Hudson
on a midsummer holiday.

A trip out to the end of steel is a
holiday and education combined. One
has to see the massive cuts, the deep fills
and the numerous difficulties overcome
to realize what a gigantic undertaking
it is to hew out a grade for a trans-
continental railroad. Future travellers
will glory in the scenery and the luxury
of the drawing room cars but few
will think of the tireless energy, the
thousands of days' labor and the millions
of money it has cost to rush passengers
along at the rate of 60 miles an hour.

W. C. C. Mehan, the general superin-
tendent, who organized the construction
work and who is personally in touch
with every part of the G. T. P. work
here is making an effort to get the first
section of the road ready to handle
traffic this year. If things can be ac-
complished it will materially help the
Prince Rupert business man.

**Premier Says That Application of
City for Three Hundred Inches
From Woodworth Lake Takes
Precedence Over Woodworth's.**

Prince Rupert gets 300 inches of
water reserved on Woodworth Lake.
William Manson, M. P. P. received a
telegram from the Premier to that
effect today. Thus the city's reserve,
over which so much comment has taken
place holds good, and the record of the
Prince Rupert Power and Light Company
is practically worthless.

This reserve of 300 inches was made
some years ago for the future city.
Wm. Manson was a member of the
cabinet at the time. Mr. Manson has
always insisted that the reserve held
priority over all other rights.

BITTER CREEK STRIKE GOOD

**J. S. BAGG REPORTS IT TO BE A
VALUABLE DISTRICT**

**Time and Money Will Develop it—
The Greatest Mining Camp in the
World—Very Profitable Ore all
Over.—Puts Time at Three Years.**

J. S. Bagg arrived in town yesterday
from Stewart where he has been for the
last month in the interests of Portland
Pacific Mining Co. This mine is one
of the first locations having been found
some five years ago. The company is
now starting in to do development work
and Mr. Bagg is figuring on putting in
the winter at the camp.

He is one of the most enthusiastic
advocates in the north country and
claims that Stewart will be the greatest
camp in the world. The general public
has no idea of the immense wealth there.
It will take a lot of money to develop
the place and it will be about three years
before any large quantities of ore will
be shipped out. But no successful mining
camp was ever made in a day. There are
now under development some of the
largest bodies of low grade ore on the
continent right at Stewart and these
are large and valuable claims of high
grade ore.

Speaking of the new Bitter creek
strike Mr. Bagg stated that from what
he could learn from old prospectors it
is a valuable acquisition to the camp.
He has seen rich samples of gold and has
seen assays that are extremely encourag-
ing. The ore is there and it is there in
quantities and there is an extensive
area of country. It will take time to
bring the new district to a paying pro-
ducer but work and money will do it.

Mr. Bagg is not a wild cat promoter
or anything of the kind. He is well known
in this city and held in the highest
esteem, and his opinions have much

is interested in mining. He frankly

KINMAN SHOWS SILVER ASSAYS

**AVERAGE ONE HUNDRED AND
FIFTY TO THE TON**

**Has Bonded the Property and Paid
Ten Per Cent of Purchase Price—
Hopes to Make it a Mine Without
a Company.**

E. L. Kinman, accompanied by Mrs.
Kinman, came up on the Prince Rupert.
They are registered at the Grand Trunk
Inn but will leave as soon as possible
for Hazelton, where Mr. Kinman is
operating a silver deposit on Fourmile
Mountain.

In a chat at the Inn this morning
Mr. Kinman spoke of the assays he
had made in Vancouver from the ore
taken out of his prospect. The assay
made by J. O'Sullivan gives 280 oz of
silver and 8 per cent lead. That of G. G.
West, another well known Vancouver
assayer, run 10 ounces gold, and 350.8
silver. Mr. Leitch, the government
geologist, has assays made from ore he
had himself selected at the mine, and
this gave 335 ounces.

Mr. Kinman says he has a gang of
men working on the property and will
increase their number as development
proceeds. He has not the intention
of forming a company but intends to
work the property himself. He will
return to Prince Rupert in about a
month.

PRINCE RUPERT IS A WONDER

**BEGINS TO SHOW HIGH SPEED
SHE IS CAPABLE OF**

**Arrives Here Two Hours and a Half
Before Schedule Time, Although
Delayed Thirty Minutes Starting
From Vancouver.**

To everyone's great surprise the
approaching whistle of the Prince Rupert
awoke the echoes this morning two hours
and a half in advance of schedule time.
This notwithstanding the fact that she
was delayed half an hour in starting
from Vancouver, which would make her
three hours the gainer on the run up.
She carried about two hundred passengers
most of them for Prince Rupert and an
ordinary cargo of freight. The freight
for Prince Rupert is to be landed here
this time, the strong representations as
to the previous conduct of the steamer
in this regard having apparently had
the desired effect. She will leave here at
eight o'clock this evening. Mr. Dickie,
president of the Portland Canal com-
pany, is among the passengers for Stewart
and Captain John Irving is going from
here to look after the development of
his properties on the canal.

The Sunken Scow

The divers are still working at the
sunken scow of contractors supplies
and by degrees they are getting the
cargo raised. The scow it will be re-
membered went down just in front
of Foley, Welch & Stewart's offices.
A crowd of men is always sitting around
the wharf watching the operations.

SITE FOR THE NEW POSTOFFICE

ENGINEER GEAUVREAU TAKING MEASUREMENTS TODAY.

Site on G. T. P. Park Reserve on Second Avenue—Selected by the Citizens Meeting Last Winter—Building will be 125 ft by 120 ft.

Engineer Geauvreau with a staff was out early this morning planting stakes and taking measurements on the G. T. P. reserve on Second Avenue opposite the Provincial government buildings.

When questioned by the Optimist Mr. Geauvreau stated that he had been sent out by the Department of Public Works at Ottawa to secure certain information about those lots. The intention being to erect a public building on them. The nature of the building he could not say as he had not been told.

The property referred to is the site selected by the citizens last year for the new post office and the general belief

is that is the object of the engineer's visit here at this time.

Mr. Geauvreau stated that the building would be 125 ft by 120 ft and that the government had secured the site from the Grand Trunk Pacific. The site is an ideal one, both for public convenience and for a general outlook.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Minister of Public Works intimated to the Optimist last winter that, from data he had in hand he believed that the site at the corner of Second Avenue and Sixth Street would be the better site. This was also the location recommended by the Board of Trade. A citizen's meeting was held later when it was decided to request the minister to put the post office on the grounds opposite the Provincial buildings on Second Avenue.

The site now being surveyed is on the Grand Trunk Pacific Park Reserve and in time the surroundings will be one of the most attractive spots in the city.

The citizens will openly rejoice when they see the first sod for the new post office turned, and they will patiently await that eventful day.

NATIVE SILVER AT HAZELTON

BOUND TO BE A BIG CAMP AT HEAD OF SKEENA

Galena That Will Pay Hundred Dollars to Ton—Stampede to the Rich Ground—Mr. Kinman Takes Samples of Ore to Vancouver.

A mining camp, the richness of whose ore bodies promise it a future second to none so far discovered and developed in British Columbia, is in the making in the vicinity of Hazelton, at the head of navigation on the Skeena River, says the Vancouver Province. For a year or so ago the presence of the ore bodies in this district has been known, but not till within the past few weeks has there been any understanding of the richness of the mineral contents of the vein matter.

Showings of native silver, which in extent and value rival the richness of the famous Silver Islet ores of bygone days, when the Lake Superior property was being worked, have been discovered. For months it was thought that the whitish mineral which spread through the vein matter in every direction was nothing but deposits of sulphate of antimony, but assays made in Vancouver have determined it to be native silver, giving to the ore values running all the way from \$145 to \$185 per ton. The ore shows but traces of gold and traces of copper.

The properties carrying these veins of native silver are situated on Four-mile Mountain, the name designating the distance of the mountain from Hazelton. An examination of some of the claims on Four-mile Mountain was made within the past month by Mr. E. L. Kinman of Vancouver. His experience in the rich silver lead districts of the Kootenay led him to believe that what the prospectors pointed out to him as mere sulphate of antimony, was nothing less than native silver spread thinly in sheet form throughout the vein. Following negotiations for two of the claims on which development work had been done, Mr. Kinman secured a price on the properties subject to ten days' time in which to have assays made. Depositing the first payment in Hazelton with instructions that it was to be released following a telegram from Vancouver that everything was satisfactory, Mr. Kinman went south with his ore samples. His opinion of the character of the ore was confirmed by the assays, which gave the values stated, and the payments were released.

Mr. Kinman has one shift of men

now at work on development, and leave Vancouver next Monday for Hazelton to start a second shift. The ore is a refractory one, and before the season of navigation on the Skeena River closes sufficient of it will have been shipped out to secure satisfactory smelter tests. The properties on Four-mile Mountain are accessible from Hazelton by a good wagon road and a fairly good transportation rate has been named from Hazelton to Prince Rupert on the river steamers. Mr. Kinman expects that after making liberal allowance for the cost of mining, teaming to Hazelton, water transportation to a smelter, and reduction rates, the average return from the ore will not be less than \$120 per ton.

This estimate is based on ore that will carry average value of \$150 per ton, and in his opinion this is a conservative figure at which to place the worth of the contents of the general run of the vein.

The formation of the country at Four-mile Mountain is sandstone with intrusive dykes of granite. Classification of the vein matter which carries the high silver values is a puzzle which geologists and expert miners have been unable to solve offhand. Apparently the vein fissures received their mineralization when the upheaval which introduced the granite occurred.

Recently there was a stampede to Four-mile Mountain with the result that numerous claims have been staked on what is supposed to be an extension of the rich vein, but sufficient development has not been done on any of these later stakings to determine their value as anything more than good prospects.

At Nine-mile Mountain considerable development has been carried on at the Silver Cup, a property carrying a richly mineralized silver-lead vein. Nine-mile Mountain is attracting a great deal of attention, in fact the entire country within a radius of a score of miles of Hazelton is now being combed by prospectors, and there is every probability that before the end of the present summer the Hazelton district will be the scene of a mining rush similar to that which has brought Portland Canal so prominently before the world in the last six months.

MAKE REQUESTS OF GOVERNMENT

PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD MET WILLIAM MANSON, M.P.P.

Want Heating System Installed at Once—Need a Flag Pole—Primary Class to Be Taught in the Old School for the Next Winter.

(From Tuesday's daily)

A special meeting of the Public School Board was held yesterday afternoon in the city hall for the purpose of taking up several matters of importance with William Manson M. P. P. in connection with the new school. The first matter was that of retaining the old school for a time to accommodate the small children in the primary department. At a recent meeting the principal reported that there were 27 pupils in the primary department living east of Fulton Street and it would not be fair to ask them to walk away over to the new school in the winter weather with the present streets. The board desired to keep the old school and open one room after the holidays to accommodate that class. Mr. Manson stated that he believed there would be no difficulty as the building was there and the government had no immediate use for it.

School Inspector Dean was opposed to the idea and the principal would prefer to have all the pupils in one school as he could arrange the grading more satisfactorily.

The board decided however to keep one room open during the winter months although an additional teacher will not be engaged for the present.

The next matter was that of a 16-foot plank roadway from the street to the school and for walks around the building and to the outbuildings. For a change in the fire escape, making it come right out from the building as that style is safer and easier for the youngsters to come down. A flag pole is also asked for to be placed on the grounds and the next matter was that of the heating apparatus.

The heating was not included in the contract for the building and separate tenders have to be called for. Nothing has yet been done and some tall hustling will have to be done to have the school ready for opening after the holidays. The estimates provide for a hot-air system. The board desires that this be undertaken at once.

In reply to all these matters Mr. Manson told the board to have their secretary write him outlining their requests and he would take them up with the department of education at once. He believed that most of the requests would be granted without any delay or trouble.

As for fixing up the playgrounds Mr. Manson told the board that he felt the city would have to undertake that. The government will do well if they furnish the other things.

ANOTHER NEW TOWN

Bitter Creek a Valuable Tributary To Prince Rupert.

The town of Bitter Creek, surrounded by mining properties, level as a billiard table—really as ideal a site as could be desired in any country, hemmed in by towering mountains capped with eternal snow—will go on the market early in July, according to H. P. Gibson, one of the locators. A crew of surveyors under H. C. Black, has about finished laying out the 85 acres into lots. A young town has already sprung up with a general store run by Strain & King, Mrs. Anderson's restaurant, Albert Egan's restaurant, two stage lines and a hotel in course of construction.

Prospectors find this new camp a particular convenience. Previously they outfitted in Stewart on their long hike to the glaciers. Now many of them save a 12 mile tramp by taking the stage to Bitter Creek and outfitting there.

The site offers business inducements which are apparently recognized already judging by the many people who are daily going there to inspect the place before it goes on the market. The completion of the wagon road over Ward's Pass has enabled the stage to get through to the new camp.

A city of tents is springing up and the history of Stewart is being repeated in a small way. What now is mostly needed is a postoffice, a petition for which is in circulation.—Portland Canal Miner.

CITIZENS GET MONEY BACK

COOTE REFUNDS DEPOSIT ON THE WATER QUESTION

Puts Up a Bluff That the City Will Not Get the Three Hundred Inches of Water the Council Has Applied For From the Government

The citizens who organized themselves into a water company and put up \$1000 for a \$30,000 option on the Woodward Lake water, have been presented with their thousand bucks. Jos. Coote, who is associated with and represents Mr. Woodward, arrived in town on the Prince Rupert and one of the first things he did was to hunt up Ald. Pattullo and present him with the cheque. Needless to say the action was something of a surprise and took the breeze out of the alderman's sails.

During the conversation Mr. Coote offered to bet Ald. Pattullo a silk hat that the city would not get the 300 inches of water asked for from the government and he stated that the company would not think of selling out now for \$30,000.

The members of the council, however, were not particularly alarmed and the mayor said "Well, we'll get it eventually and it will not cost anything like as much as that."

WHO CAN THIS BE?

Portland Canal Miner Says Stewart Has Been Slightly Bitten.

GRANTED SUBSIDY TO DRYDOCK

CONSTRUCTION WILL START ALMOST IMMEDIATELY.

Dock to Cost Twelve Hundred Thousand Dollars and Be Large Enough to Accommodate Vessels of Twenty Thousand Tons Burden.

(Special to the Optimist)

Ottawa, July 7.—The government has approved the application of the Grand Trunk Pacific for a subsidy to a dry dock, of the second class, to be constructed at Prince Rupert.

The company will at once build a dry dock to cost \$1,200,000 which will be large enough to accommodate vessels of 20,000 tons burden. The subsidy is three and a half per cent of the total cost and maintenance for twenty-five years.

The marine department is also to establish a depot at Prince Rupert at an expenditure of \$100,000, including light house and buoy service.

LEFT IN THE DARK

Local Officials First Heard of Subsidy Through the Optimist

When some of the G. T. P. officials were shown the dispatch received by the Optimist from Ottawa in reference to the new dry dock they were greatly pleased although they all admitted that it was news to them. They had not received any word of the movement and could give no information as to when the work would be started or where the dock would be located.

Last summer government officials visited Prince Rupert in connection with a site for the dry dock and at that time it was generally understood that Hays Creek would be selected and so far nothing is known of any other location.

The belief, or at least the earnest hope, is that the work will be got under way at early date. The G. T. P. have no place on the Pacific coast in which to run their boats for repairs and they need one badly. The nearest dry dock to Prince Rupert is at Esquimalt and another is at Seattle. Both of those are too far away for the northern navigation.

The G.T.P. has been planning to get this work under way at an early date and when they do get into shape it will mean employment for a hundred men and a big pay roll and that is what the city wants. An expenditure of \$1,200,000 here this summer, fall and winter would help things along a whole lot.

W. C. C. Mehan, general superintendent of the Grand Trunk Pacific said he did not know the first thing about the proposed dry dock, as it had no bearing upon the railway construction. No doubt the dock would be on one of the spaces reserved by the government on the water front, but which one was probably only known to the government and the company.

Ald. Barrow remarked that a dock capable of accommodating vessels of twenty thousand tons burden would take in all big ships, as the Dreadnaught class came under that. Its construction would give a lot of employment of course, but the dock itself would be a floating affair the same as the one the government was to put in at Vancouver, and would in all probability be constructed in the old country.

Petition for Local Option

A petition for a local option vote under the Scott Act is being circulated quietly about the city. Quite a number of signatures have been secured.
