

## GET STREET WORK UNDER WAY

### Ald. Lynch Outlines the Work to Be Taken Up.

### Beech Avenue and Eighth Avenue to be Started Shortly—Section One to be Taken Up as a Whole District—Waiting for Engineer Davis.

Big bodies move slowly. So do municipal councils—not because the members are not anxious to move more quickly, but because there are certain forms to go through and they all take time. A good example is at hand in connection with the street grading. The people are clamoring for the work to start. The business men want to see the work get under way. The city needs the improvements and the merchants need more people here to buy goods. The aldermen are aware of all these facts and they are among the most anxious to get the work started.

Ald. W. P. Lynch, chairman of the Streets, Works and Property committee, has done his best to advance the street grading movement. He has had the particular charge of the matter and is in a position to know as much or more about the progress made and the future moves

of the aldermen as any one. The Optimist called on Ald. Lynch last evening and asked him what information could be given to the anxious public as to the immediate intentions of the council. The chairman of the streets committee replied that he would that night introduce a resolution instructing the engineer to prepare his report on Beech avenue and Eighth avenue at once. There were petitions before the council from taxpayers on those streets asking for the grading to be proceeded with. Then residents on Fraser street will have a petition in shortly. After the engineer prepares his report the work will be advertised for one week. Then the property owners have 15 days to file any objection. If the object is not backed by a sufficient number of the property-holders (one-half) then the work will start. In short it will be twenty or twenty-one days yet before any men can be employed. But towards the end of July the pay roll will be started and it will continue and increase from that time on.

## OLD KANGAROO PICKS JEFFRIES

### Australia Putting Money on the Colored Champion.

### Fitzsimmons Picks Jeffries to Win—John L. Sullivan Visits Camps of Fighters at Reno—Youngsters Corner a Monopoly in Tents.

Victoria, June 29.—Fitzsimmons has just arrived here on the Marama from Sydney. He is on his way to Reno to see the big fight for the championship. When asked to make a guess at the winner he said he did not know how the two men had stood the hard training, but he would pick Jeffries to win for several reasons. These reasons he did not state. He says the betting in Australia favors Johnson, and if odds of five to one can be had on Jeffries in Chicago some body could pick up good money "hedging" as the word was lots of money in Australia ready to be put on the colored man.

Tommy Burns left Australia on the same steamer but transferred at Honolulu for a steamer direct to San Francisco. Lang accompanied Burns, and both are said to be backing Jeffries.

Reno, June 29.—John L. Sullivan with his big auto is here. He first paid a visit to Johnson's camp and witnessed the colored man boxing with Kaufman and Cotton. He concludes: "I saw nothing of a startling nature that is an improvement over our old methods, and in that respect I was a little disappointed but at the same time I should feel complimented, because these latter day young fellows have thought sufficiently well of our old methods to adopt so many of them." Johnson's stealthy work surprised him, reminding him of Fitzsimmons. Old John says that he is not picking the winner for anybody. Both men appear to him to be in fine shape and it will undoubtedly be a grand fight.

Rooms in Reno are at a premium today and the whole town is overcrowded. What it will be Saturday and Sunday is beyond imagination. A group of enterprising lads cornered all the tents in town and have rushed orders for more. They have increased the price to \$1 and are putting up hundreds of them.

Vancouver, June 29.—Great interest is being felt here in the big match between Jeffries and Johnson. Preparations are being made to publish the fight by rounds the same afternoon. Plenty of betting. Odds favor Jeffries.

## CELEBRATION IS COMMENTED ON

### CANNERY MEN CLAIM IT WILL DISRUPT THE FISHING

Means a Loss of Several Days Just at Beginning of Sockeye Season, and When Canneries Are All Shorthanded.

The cannery men of the Skeena River are indignant over the celebration of Dominion Day by a gala day of sports and an advertised demonstration in Prince Rupert. They claim that it disrupts the work at the canneries just at a time when every day counts and when every hand is needed.

"At the present time the mass of the visitors brought to the city by the demonstration are Indians and most of the working natives are now engaged at the canneries. To attract the native from this work is not a difficult thing to do, but to get them back is a problem. It means the loss of several days at least. The sockeye season at the canneries is practically only six weeks and every day has a very material effect upon the season's pack. This year the canneries are all short handed and they cannot spare a single employee. As Canadians we like to see the day fittingly celebrated but not in a way to harass the greatest industry in the country."

Such was the comment of one prominent canneryman and another one who was present agreed with him.

It was reported later that the cannerymen are talking of subscribing to a celebration in Port Essington after the close of the sock-eye season as a bait to keep the Indians at work now. At the close of the season they would have lots of spending money.

## TREATMENT OF INDIGENT SICK

### "FOR THE POOR YE HAVE ALWAYS WITH YOU."

### Case of Indigent Man With Acute Appendicitis Before Council—The Health Committee Instructed to Arrange with Hospital.

At the meeting of the City Council last night the question came up for the first time as to what was to be done for and with the indigent sick of the city. It was brought forward by a statement made by Mayor Stork. A case had been called to his attention of a man at the Knox Hotel suffering from acute appendicitis. He was told that the man had been working, but at the present was an indigent. He had had the man sent to the hospital and had written to Dr. Ewing that probably an operation would be necessary and the man would be expected to pay for his treatment, but if he could not the city would take up the matter.

Ald. Pattullo doubted the wisdom of such a clause, as surgeons usually charged pretty heavy fees for such operations. He thought the health committee should be instructed to endeavor to effect some arrangement with the hospital authorities for the care and treatment of city indigents.

The Mayor said the case was presented to him unexpectedly, and he took the only possible course in the matter. Certainly the health committee should at once see about some arrangement with the hospital authorities as to the treatment of indigents, and especially cases of emergency such as this.

Ald. Naden was of the Mayor's opinion. In cases of sickness it was absolutely necessary for the city to take charge of those without funds, as was done in other cities.

The health committee was instructed accordingly.

## AN UNCLE FOR PRINCE RUPERT

### NEW CITY HAS HAD NO USE FOR A PAWNBROKER

City Clerk Woods will figure it out so that the city will get "Shent Per Shent" for granting Applicant a License.

The aldermen sat upon their new chair cushions last night and some of them were as jubilant as boys about it; while others, Alf. Barrow and Pattullo, for instance, seemed to scorn such effeminate luxury and stoically adhered to the hard wood. The Mayor presided and those present were Ald. Naden, Pattullo, Hilditch, McIntyre, Lynch and Barrow.

There was very little miscellaneous business before the council, and in a few minutes it resolved itself into committee of the whole on by-laws.

There were only two communications, one from A. I. Bind, who wrote that he had visited Prince Rupert, and he found all lines of business represented except that of pawnbroker. He desired to know what the license would cost and the other particulars. The city clerk was instructed to reply to the writer.

The other communication was from the General Electric Company of Vancouver. It stated that as the company's contract with the city was only \$13,000 a cheque was enclosed for \$650 being five per cent, and asking that the cheque sent previously for \$2000 be returned.

Ald. Hilditch moved that the letter be received and the request complied with, and Ald. Pattullo seconded the motion, which was carried.

## WAR STILL ON IN MOROCCO

### THIRTEEN HUNDRED DEAD LEFT ON BATTLEFIELD

Fanatical Tribesmen Ride up to Mouths of Machine Guns and are Moved Down by French Army of Occupation.

(Special to the Optimist)

Casa Blanca, Morocco, June 29.—The fanatical tribesmen have again risen in force against the French army of occupation, led by a holy man from the interior with a command from Allah to drive all the unbelievers into the sea. Although the French are strongly entrenched in the fortifications they have raised around this seaport, the tribesmen managed to make an entrance into the city on the south west end. The street fighting was of short duration, the natives not being well supported, but in this attack thirteen French troops were killed.

Outside the fortifications it was a regular massacre. The natives came in with superb courage right up to the machine guns, shooting and cutting down the gunners in several cases. But the slaughter was fearful. The machine guns mowed down the incoming Arabs and Moors in great wide swaths, and after the engagement, which lasted barely two hours, there were thirteen hundred dead natives on the field.

## SPRING WHEAT TAKES A JUMP

### EXCESSIVE HEAT DEPRECIATES THE GROWING CROPS

Strong Drying Winds Have No Doubt Done Serious Damage to Crops—Jump of Five Cents a Sufficient Evidence.

Winnipeg, June 29.—A temperature of over one hundred degrees was recorded at a number of Manitoba points yesterday and it is quite as hot today. This excessive heat is generally accompanied with strong drying winds. Around the grain exchange today, where wheat jumped five cents yesterday, the bulls had it all their own way. Alarming reports of damage to spring wheat, no doubt many of them greatly exaggerated were received from all over the country. There is no doubt that the crop has suffered considerably.



## PAY-ROLLS WE REQUIRE.

For some years, or until such time as the transcontinental railway makes a trans-shipping port of this city, Prince Rupert merchants must depend largely upon the pay-roll of the railway contractors and on the income from the products of the country—fishing and lumbering. The railway pay-roll is now moving eastward and it will be a diminishing factor in local trade, but the wages paid for lumbering and fishing are regular sources of income. They are worth catering to and it is a wise merchant who keeps them in view. For instance there are twelve canneries on the Skeena with an annual summer expenditure of about a million dollars. At least \$200,000 of this is spent in wages to Indians, Japs and Chinamen. The natives get about \$75,000 which will be all spent in the district within a few weeks. The balance goes mostly to Vancouver and Victoria. Is Prince Rupert making an effort to secure this trade? It is about the only large pay-roll available at the present time and Prince Rupert needs money in her business. The city cannot live off real estate alone.

The Optimist believes that practically all the money spent on supplies and in wages at the Skeena canneries and lumber camps can be brought to Prince Rupert if the merchants, business men and Board of Trade get out after it. It is the nucleus of a nice trade for the wholesaler, a very desirable source of revenue for the retailer. This trade has for years been going to Vancouver and other places, and for that reason it is more difficult to secure than newly developed trade; but it has this advantage, that none of the money put in circulation by the canneries comes out of the city. Every dollar of it we can get here is what the sport calls "velvet."

The editor of the Empire has announced that he is a power in the land. That is not what the members of the city council called him the other morning.

### GREAT NORTHERN WINS

#### Railway will Enter Vancouver by The False Creek Route

Vancouver, June 29.—With the heaviest poll yet given for any bylaw, the Great Northern-False Creek agreement with the city passed last night by a majority of six hundred and ninety-two over the necessary two-fifths vote.

### ROOF TANK COLLAPSES

#### Similar Accident to the Fatal One In Montreal Herald.

Geo. Emmett, a young able bodied healthy fellow, appeared for a second hearing before Magistrate Carss this morning on a charge of vagrancy. The first time he was dismissed with a warning. This time he did not think he had been guilty of any offence although he admitted that he was at a disorderly house when the police saw him. He said he was not working last night and went down the line.

The police were not prepared to go on with the case this morning and asked for an adjournment until Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

At the last meeting of the Public School Board the resignation of Mrs. Harrison was received. She has been teaching the second reader classes, and at the close of the term will give up teaching. The board will advertise at once for a new teacher to fill her place.

### DRYDOCK FOR VANCOUVER.

#### Government Grants a Subsidy of Three and a Half Per Cent.

### ACT TO BE ENFORCED

#### Deputation Waits Upon Attorney General to Protest

Vancouver, June 25.—In support of their application to suspend for a time the enforcement of Act 14, revising and consolidating the Companies act of 1897 and amending acts, the following gentleman, representing the board of trade, the manufacturers and the manufacturing agents doing business in this province by appointment waited upon the attorney general at his office in this city at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon: Messrs. E. Buchan, president of the board of trade; F. T. Walker, R. Stewart, George A. Campbell, Robert Robertson, E. H. Heaps, Sol. Oppenheimer, William Skene, A. Ronald, W. C. Geary and E. W. Dean.

Messrs. Buchan, Robertson, Heaps, Walker, Campbell, Oppenheimer, Ronald and Stewart having submitted their case, Hon. Mr. Bowser informed the delegation that this act must go into full force and effect upon the 1st day of July next as it was utterly impossible for either the government or himself to prevent the intention of the legislature becoming operative. In addition he told them that precisely similar legislation was in force in the eastern provinces, such as Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

### TO PROMOTE PEACE

United States Senate Appoints a Special Commission.

Washington, June 24.—Confining the expenditure to \$10,000 the senate today adopted the joint resolution originating in the House authorizing the appointment of a commission for the propagation of universal peace.

The commission is to consist of five members, and is to be appointed by the president.

The purpose is to consider "the expediency of utilizing existing international agencies for the purpose of limiting the armaments of the nations of the world by international agreement, and of constituting the combined navies of the world into an international force for the preservation of universal peace and to consider and report upon any other means to diminish the expenditures of governments for military purposes and to lessen the probabilities of war."

The bill now goes to the president.

could not speak officially as the council wished Engineer Davis to prepare the plans for that before deciding what to do. He stated, however, that it was the general opinion and intention of the aldermen to make section one a local improvement section. That will include First, Second and Third avenues from Vickersville to Eleventh street, Fraser street and all the cross streets. The whole job will be undertaken at once.

The council intends to take the initiative in this and not wait for petitions. When the time comes the work will be advertised as required by law and then those who object to it will have to file a petition. This puts it up to those who do not desire their property improved by street grading, and the petition must also be signed by one half of the property owners. The aldermen believe that the majority of the owners in section one are anxious for the improvement and this is much the fastest mode of procedure. To wait for a petition that is signed by half the property owners asking for the work to be done might necessitate a delay of months if it was possible to secure it at all, while the way that has been decided upon should not take more than three weeks after the engineers report has been received.

Cost \$300,000

To grade the three avenues Fraser street and all the cross streets in section one, Ald. Lynch estimates will cost \$300,000 and it may run to \$325,000 or \$350,000. Even at that he does not hesitate to state that it will be done within the next year for at least \$100,000 less than if the council was to wait for a couple of years. Every building that is erected in section one adds that much more cost to the grading and a couple of years will see this section pretty well built up. The saving will be greater the earlier the work is done as it can be done faster by heavier blasting.

The aldermen are also alive to the fact that there is little use in grading the avenues unless the cross streets are graded at the same time. They also realize that it would be bad business to grade patches of the section. Hence their intention to grade the whole district as one work.

The above, said Ald. Lynch, is not official although it is the general idea of the aldermen. Nothing definite can be decided until engineer Davies arrives from Berlin about July 1st and he has had time to make his report and prepare his plans. In the meantime, however, work will be proceeded with on smaller stretches already named.

**TITLES OF OWNERSHIP**

**Canadian Government to Investigate All Arctic Lands.**

Ottawa, June 24.—The Canadian government is evidently preparing to make good the claim to sovereignty in the Arctic territory over which the British flag has been hoisted by the several expeditions which have been in northern waters in the past six years. The appointment is announced of Hon. J. C. Patterson to be commissioner to investigate into titles of ownership by the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland of all lands in the Arctic sea, whether acquired by discovery, occupation or otherwise.

Mr. Patterson will report the result of his investigations from time to time to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The instructions to Capt. Bernier, who will sail north in a few days for another cruise in the Arctic, are to plant the flag upon other of the additional islands in the Arctic regions.
