## AIR RACING DURING BIG STORM

### Hundred Miles in Hour and Fifty-five Minutes

Twelve Competing Aviators For Forty Seven Thousand Dollar Prize—Four Hundred And Eighty-Eight Miles Cross Country Flight.

(Special to the Optimist)  
Mezieres, France, August 11th.—In the four hundred and eighty eight miles cross country flight, for a prize of \$7,000, Leblanc this morning completed the third leg of the perilous journey from Nancy to Mezieres. The distance is one hundred miles and he made it in the remarkable time of one hour and fifty five minutes. None of his six companions equalled this. Leblanc came in during a blinding

electric storm, the lightning playing about his frail aeroplane as he swooped over the town. Hearing the staccato of his motor above the roar of the onrushing storm the entire populace of Mezieres turned out into the streets to greet the flying machine wildly careening in the gale, the stays of the planes taut with strain as the aviator swooped to earth. The storm forced Lindpainter, Aubrun, Cammerman, and Vullierme to descend, the first two at Chalons and the last at St. Michaels. Later all ascended and finished the day's run. The other aviators from Nancy were Lieutenant Fequant, Lieutenant Vullierme, Legagneux, Ranez, and Aubrun, the latter arriving second. Leblanc's official time for the two hundred and eighty-five miles covered so far is five hours and forty-eight minutes.

## GAYNOR STILL IMPROVING

### PASSED GOOD NIGHT AND IS SLEEPING WELL

Dr. Arlitz Reports His Patient's Condition More Favorable For Recovery Than at Any Time Since Shooting.—Gallagher Brought Up.

New York, August 11.—At St. Mary's hospital, Hoboken, where Mayor Gaynor is still under treatment, the following bulletin was issued this morning in regard to the condition of the distinguished patient:  
"Gaynor's temperature is one hundred and five, his pulse seventy-six and his respiration seventeen."  
Dr. Arlitz supplements this information by the statement that the mayor's condition is more favorable for recovery than at any time since the shooting.  
Gallagher was brought up this morning but his indictment was postponed, it is not yet certain that a graver charge may not be entered against him.

## FOR A UNIFORM RAILWAY RATE

### INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE IS NOW BEING HELD.

Chief Of Canadian Railway Commission Conferring With Chairman United States Interstate Commerce Commission

## GOVERNMENT WHARF

### Petition to Have Construction Rushed to a Completion

A petition to premier McBride was being circulated yesterday, calling upon him to use his influence with the Minister of Public Works to have the government wharf at the foot of McBride street completed without delay, as was promised by the government some time ago. The petition recites the fact that the Grand Trunk Pacific wharf is inadequate for the rapid increase of the commerce of the port, and that outside the boats of this company there are twenty regular vessels of other steamship companies regularly plying here. The consequence is that often the wharf facilities are congested and vessels are compelled to wait for a chance to berth, to the great inconvenience of the shipping interests and the public generally. As a case in point it is noted that the railway company announced recently its intention of building an extension of its present wharfage for the handling of its coal and other material. The petition seemed to hit the right spot, for during the afternoon some hundred and fifty signatures were appended to it. It is dated August 12th and by that time the signature of every leading merchant and business man in the city will have been obtained for it. The Board of Trade has called a meeting of its council for three o'clock Saturday afternoon to take up the petition and consider other business.

## ONE VIEW OF LAURIER

### New York Journal Hails Has as Friend to United States

On this side of the line they would call Wilfrid Laurier an insurgent, and a dried-up old man with a cigar cocked in one corner of his mouth would be making funny speeches about him off on the prairies. In Canada he is Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of the Dominion and the biggest man in it. Just now he is swinging round the western circle, dedicating wheat fields and launching bridges, and hammering his ideas of political progress into the ear of crowds that cheer themselves black in the face at the thought of reciprocity with the United States, a lower tariff and friendly relations with all the world. Now and then some one calls Wilfrid Laurier an annexationist but without authority. The most he will say is to declare his friendship.  
"I am a great admirer of the American people," he said the other day. "One of their marked characteristics is an ability to look after Number one. I propose that we do the same."—New York Globe.

## TELEPHONE MATTERS

### Council is Taking Over the System To-day.

The Telephone by-law was finally adopted by the council last night and everything is now ready for the council to sign the agreement and take over the plant. The mayor and clerk were instructed to sign and seal the same today. The Telephone Committee met last night for a few minutes and appointed E. A. Woods, J. C. McLennan, F. S. Clements, W. D. Vance and D. G. Stewart a board of trustees to handle the business until the old company is properly wound up and all the details are completed.

A meeting of the shareholders and representatives of the council will be held tonight in the city hall. It is expected that the telephones will be operated on Saturday for the first time and that free service will be allowed the first two days and that charges will start from Monday.

There was a lengthy discussion as to whether the shareholders of the old company should receive a bonus or not. The general opinion was that most of the shareholders would not accept anything and did not expect it. It was therefore decided to pass a vote of thanks to the president, officers, directors and shareholders for the services they had rendered. Ald. Pattullo, on behalf of the company made a suitable reply.

## PECULIAR ACCIDENT

### Locomotive Suddenly Dumped on Deck of Steamer Conveyor

The Conveyor was loading one of the dinky shunting engines for use up the line this morning, when the crane broke down under the weight and dumped the engine right on top of the capstan of the steamer. No one was injured. The engine weighs over ten tons and a bigger crane was at once obtained to lift it from the capstan. The Developer was sent out this morning in place of the Conveyor.

## POSTAL FREE TRADE

### Mr. Henniker Heaton Urges Abolition Of Frontier Regulations

London, August 5.—Mr. Henniker Heaton is urging the appointment of an "Imperial and foreign postmaster," whose first duty should be to convene a meeting of European postmasters-general with a view to abolishing the political frontiers for postal telegraph and wireless communications between the countries of the world.

## DASHED INTO CROWD

### Famous Aviator Seriously Injured in Flight on Atlantic Coast

Asbury Park, N. J., August 11.—Walter Brookins, the noted aviator, was seriously injured this morning when his machine broke and fell. It dashed down among the crowd of spectators and seven of them were hurt.

## HUNDREDS FACING STARVATION

### Thirteen Railway Engineers Are Buried Alive.

Vast Tracts In Japan Flooded.—Thousand Houses In Shidzuko Submerged.—Trams Are Stalled And Passengers Without Food

(Special to the Optimist)  
Tokio, August 11th.—Reports show a shocking increase in the number of disasters and fatalities on the Island of Hondo owing to the continued heavy rains. The region between Yokohama and Tokio is a sea of mud with several villages under water and hundreds of people facing starvation.

Two trains are stalled near Kanaya and the passengers have been without food for two days. There are three hundred of them and they are beyond the reach of rescuers from Horinouchi. There are six hundreds refugees in a Buddhist temple here. Thirteen engineers were caught in a slide as they were rushing to rescue the passengers from a partly submerged train, and all of them were buried alive. At Shidzuko over a thousand houses are submerged. The city of Takasaki is a veritable lake. Part of this city is under water and there is much suffering. The rains continue although clear weather has been forecasted.

Dear Sir,—In regard to the article on your front page of yesterday's issue, entitled "Levine Case, A Fine Kettle of Fish", I would like to point out one or two errors. Your statement that the assets are not ascertained is incorrect, as the same paper that shows the liabilities shows the assets also.

Also, the company were not partners at will at the start as you state. A partnership agreement was drawn up and signed by the partners, and the declaration registered in Prince Rupert before a dollar's worth of goods was bought by the company, or by any one on its behalf. It follows that there was no organization of the company, nor any arrangement made as to the taking over of the partnership assets.

Further, Mr. Levine was representing himself at the creditors' meeting, and not the Stewart Mercantile Company, which was represented by the assignee, Sheriff John Shirley. Naturally he did not make any proposition.

I am under the impression that the only "heat" in the matter is the hot air that has been given your reporter. The whole article seems to have been written with the intention of influencing certain criminal proceedings now in progress, and you have been long enough in the field of journalism to estimate the propriety of articles of that description.

## CRIPPEN'S TALE IS VERIFIED

### ANOTHER EXAMINATION OF THE REMAINS OF THE WOMAN

Found that Woman Had Undergone Operation Before Death.—Prisoner Intimated in Confession Wife Died From Operation.

London, August 11.—Experts who have been again examining the body found in the basement of the Crippen home, today asserted that it is that of a woman who had undergone an operation before death.

This corroborates a rumor cabled by the Quebec correspondent of the London Chronicle that Crippen intimated to the Canadian officials that his wife had died from the effects of an operation performed by him.

The experts found nothing from which the identity of the remains could be established.

## BANDIT HANEY. IS ARRESTED

### MAN WHO SHOT CONSTABLE DECKER AT ASHCROFT

Recalls the Thrilling Man Hunt of a Year Ago Last June and Details Of the Robbery of Canadian Pacific Express.

(Special to the Optimist)

Dillon, Mont., August 10.—The bandit arrested here yesterday is stated to be William Haney, the man who held up the Canadian Pacific express and afterward shot and killed Police Constable Decker at Ashcroft. Posses were out after them all over the country. The two men were seen several times and in the course of fleeing from the police they stole rifles, horses and boats. They were landing at Ashcroft when Policeman Decker attempted to arrest them. Haney shot the constable and again made his escape.

## TREATY WITH UNITED STATES

### DOMINION PARLIAMENT MEETS IN NOVEMBER

### Cabinet to Come Together Next Month To Make Preparations For The Work of Next Session—Conference to Be Held With States.

Ottawa, August 8.—Hon. W. S. Fielding and Hon. William Paterson are expected to sail for Canada at the end of the month and all of the cabinet ministers will be in the capital again September 8 to take up the work of preparing for the next session of parliament, which will probably begin about the middle of November. The question of the proposed reciprocity treaty with the United States will be one of the first questions to be considered by the cabinet.

In October a conference between Washington and Ottawa cabinet ministers will be held, but it is unlikely that there will be a general tariff revision pending the inquiry to be instituted by the tariff commission whereof Sir Wilfrid made mention in the west.

# BISHOP DU VERNET'S CHARGE

## Delivered to the Anglican Synod at Prince Rupert on Tuesday

Reverend Brethren and Brethren of the Laity:-

While we have met as a Synod in this Church Hall on three former occasions this is the first time that we extend to you a welcome to the City of Prince Rupert. When we met here three years ago Prince Rupert was little more than a railway surveyors' camp with a few huts and tents, now it is an incorporated city with many miles of streets rapidly filling up with houses. It is a port with many lines of steamships calling here, and already railway trains are making their way up the Skeena river bringing nearer and nearer to those in the interior the hope of easy transportation. Assembled here in this city which is destined to become a great metropolis, the centre of a mighty development in the northern half of this province, we of the Diocese of Caledonia, which embraces the same region as members of that historic church which began Christian work in this neighbourhood fifty years ago, must feel the thrilling interest of the present moment as we watch the unfolding of events and endeavor to do our part in laying the foundation for the moral and spiritual welfare of a great nation in the West.

In reviewing the year since last we met as a Synod we must first mention some of the losses which the Church has sustained. Last May the whole empire felt the shock of the unexpected death of him who while occupying the highest position in the realm was ever a loyal member of the Church of England. King Edward VII will long live in history as the great Peace Maker of his age.

In this Province the Church of England has met with the loss of a Bishop who by his fidelity to duty and consistent Christian character endeared himself to all who knew him. As I was an undergraduate of King's College, Windsor, N.S. when Dr. Dart was President of that University, I felt the death of the late Bishop of New Westminster as a personal loss.

This Diocese has been called upon to mourn the loss of a devoted layman who laboured with marked ability as principal of the Indian Industrial School at Metlakatla for nearly twenty years. Many of our native young men will remember with gratitude the debt they owe to Mr. J. R. Scott.

Not only by death but also by removal we have suffered loss as a diocese. Rev. M. H. Jackson who for nearly two years did most efficient work at Atlin was obliged on account of his wife's health to leave us and take work where he could be near expert medical advice.

We have also met with serious loss by fire. The beautiful new church at Essington only opened by me a year ago last month was totally destroyed by fire early in the morning of June 8th. This second loss of a church building in less than eighteen months has been a staggering blow to the Rev. W. F. Rushbrook, but thanks to the S. P. C. K. insisting upon a larger insurance before giving a grant we shall be enabled to build a smaller church with the insurance money and local assistance, in the way of labour given, without appealing for outside help.

From our losses let us now turn to our gains. It was my privilege on St. James' Day to take part in the consecration of Rev. A. U. De Pencier as Bishop of New Westminster. Having laboured in the same diocese with him as a neighbouring clergyman for some years, I feel that the church of this province has been greatly strengthened by the promotion to so high a position of one so familiar with Canadian church life and so vigorous in action. The Southern boundary of this Diocese in the northern boundary of the Diocese of New Westminster. For example one

side of the river at Fort George is in our Diocese, the other in his. As neighbouring bishops I feel sure we shall work well together.

As Prince Rupert is not only a growing city but also a convenient centre from which to work out-lying missions, I am most thankful to be able to announce that I have secured the assistance of two clergymen—Rev. T. C. Des Barres B. A. formerly curate in charge of St. Jude's, Nottingham, and Rev. W. G. James, B. A. formerly rector of Pincher Creek, Alberta. While not neglecting the centre but giving it men of different gifts we shall be able to do more in the way of ministering to the small settlements which are springing up in the neighbourhood.

Ever since I came to this Diocese I have had on my conscience the abandoned Mission to the Stikine Indians. There were two difficulties in the way of reopening this mission—the man and the money. Rev. Frank Palgrave, as a holiday trip, revisited this Mission last summer and brought me such an appealing account of the Indians still loyal to the Church of England, still waiting for us to send them a missionary that I could not refrain from doing my utmost. The way seemed to open wonderfully—the Indian department promised a grant for the Day School at Tahl-tan, kind friends in England made a generous donation and Rev. T. P. W. Thorman accepted my call to return with his son from England and reorganize the work which he laid down on account of his wife's declining health seven years ago. After a dangerous trip up the Stikine in a gasoline launch he and his son arrived at Telegraph Creek on June 9th and a few days after reached the Indian village of Tahl-Tan, where he found things which he had left in the mission house seven years before untouched—a tribute to the honesty and loyalty of the natives. He opened the day school at once and soon had fifteen scholars in attendance. It is a matter of rejoicing that our church and mission house at Tahl-Tan are once more in use and that the Indians who have waited so patiently are again being ministered to by one who can talk their language.

The church has advanced during this year not only in the way of more clergymen being brought into the diocese but also in the way of new missions being opened. The transfer of Rev. Wm. Hogan from Port Simpson to Masset has placed at the entrance to Masset Inlet one eminently adapted to minister to the settlers who are beginning to fringe that remarkable water-way into the heart of Graham Island. New Masset has been given regular Sunday services and the congregation there are ready for a church building.

A few months ago Stewart was only a hamlet of half a dozen log houses. To-day it is a town of about 2,000 inhabitants. We have there a church and a neat parsonage with Rev. W. E. Collison in charge of this new mission.

Forced on account of the railway to tear down our church and mission house at Inverness we have built on a better site a building consisting of church with rooms attached which the Rev. J. H. Keen has found most serviceable during the fishing season.

Another step in advance which we as a Church have taken this year has been the incorporation of the Synod of the Diocese. While the Bishop has for some time past been a "a Corporation Sole" to hold church property in trust, yet with the growth of our church work it will be found more satisfactory to have church property vested in the Synod. This can now be done under the act of Incorporation of March 10th, 1910.

Turning to matters which affect the church in this province I have to report

that a forward step has been taken within the last few weeks in the way of preparing for some kind of provincial organization. While I have expressed myself on former occasions as in favor of as simple an organization as possible it seems that under the constitution of the general synod there is no other way of our organizing than in the form of a provincial synod which while safeguarding our Diocesan Rights will allow us to take united action as a church in British Columbia. The chief work assigned to a provincial Synod by the General Synod is the subdividing of Dioceses and the appointing of bishops. Naturally this vast missionary diocese will be the region most affected by this if we agree to the formation of a provincial Synod, therefore in the draft which has met with the approval of delegates from the three other dioceses in this province who were in Vancouver July 26th, and which I hope to submit for your consideration at this session of Synod, a clause is inserted which will protect the interests of a missionary diocese founded by a missionary society. By resolution of General Synod the question of the formation of an ecclesiastical Province of British Columbia depends upon whether the dioceses involved "desire to form such". As we hope to have another session of our synod before the meeting of the General Synod in September of next year we need not take final action now but we should fully discuss the question.

Another matter of provincial importance which has given me most anxious thought is the question of Theological Colleges. We are building for the future and we should build wisely. We have an open field before us. The Provincial University and the two proposed theological colleges—St. Mark's and Bishop Latimer are still in a state of flux, nothing has yet crystallized. Surely no words can express the importance of starting right.

The solution suggested by these words may under God's blessing yet be accepted. As my words upon this vital question will be read far and wide by those interested on both sides not only in this province and Eastern Canada but also in England, I shall state even at the risk of being somewhat lengthy the position which I have taken. It will be remembered that this Synod at its last session confirmed the stand which I then took by passing the following resolution:—"That this Synod declines to recognize any theological college as being for the whole church of this province without this Synod having due representation on the governing body of the same."

This was at once met by the supporters of St. Mark's College offering to rescind their provisional constitution and give this Diocese proper representation. After consultation with our diocesan delegates Rev. J. H. Keen and myself, this principle was embodied in the new constitution. There yet remained the still more difficult question of a representative on the teaching staff which was mentioned by me as a second matter of vital importance. This led me to suggest to the authorities of St. Mark's College a scheme of an affiliated school in which lectures on controversial subjects would be given by professors in sympathy with the line of teaching imparted. Not being asked to act for those in Vancouver who were promoting Bishop Latimer College my suggestion took the form of an affiliated Diocesan institution taking the students of the final year for lectures on Ecclesiology, or the Doctrine of the Church, the Ministry, and the Sacraments, but I made this suggestion, which was accepted by St. Mark's College, with the earnest hope that it might open the door for the affiliation of Bishop Latimer College on similar lines.

A few days ago it was my privilege to meet in Vancouver the promoters of both colleges with our Diocesan delegate, Mr. G. H. Cowan, M. P. present to support me. Negotiations are still in progress and no formal action has yet been taken but I believe there is good hope for at least a measure of co-operation. Perhaps I could not be doing the cause of truth and harmony greater service than to outline the foundation

upon which we are endeavoring to build.

The Church throughout the Dominion of Canada by resolution of the General Synod has agreed upon a common standard known as "The Preliminary Examination for Holy Orders". All the theological colleges of whatever type of churchmanship accept this, and the ground covered in the different courses of study is practically the same. There is a common Board of Examiners for Divinity Degrees with representatives upon this Board from all the theological colleges.

Further in this common standard set by the church as a whole there is a frank recognition of the different schools of thought in the church. This is done in the way of alternate text-books. Still further if a candidate chooses certain text-books, as allowed, the examiner is a member of the Board in sympathy with the teaching contained therein. Surely it is an easy step which must commend itself to all broad-minded churchmen to allow, in a college professing to be a provincial institution, the teaching upon controversial subjects which is embodied in authorized alternate text-books to be given by professors in sympathy with the views embodied therein. Such teachers on controversial subjects being supported by voluntary contributions of interested donors.

Upon such non-controversial subjects as Old Testament Exegesis, the Canon of Holy Scripture, Apologetics, Christian Ethics, Hemitics, Elocution etc., there can be united action. All students attending lectures by the same professors supported by the whole Church. The only serious objection which I have heard raised against this scheme is the question of residence. The spiritual life of an institution is as potent an influence as lecturing. A boarding house for the students is not a vital part of a Provincial College. The simple expedient of two residences, each with its own Dean meets the objection.

The outcome would be this:—One "Anglican Theological College of British Columbia" affiliated with the Provincial University, with a handsome building on the University grounds, containing lecture rooms, library, reading room, convocation hall etc. All lectures to be delivered in this college, with two adjacent residences "St. Mark's Hostel" with a warden and "Bishop Latimer Hall" with a principal, both men being not only deans in residence but members of the college staff of lecturers. All students would register at the one college but would be free to choose their residence, and alternate set of lecturer on certain subjects. There would be a common board of examiners as outlined and a diploma issued by the one college.

If untrammelled by the associations of the East we in the West can at the very foundation of things agree heartily upon some such broad and united policy as this and escape the scandal of two rival colleges we shall be setting an example to the whole church in Canada which will redound to the glory of God and the advancement of His Kingdom of Truth and Love.

In regard to the Indian Land Question I take the ground that the Indians are wards of the Dominion government and that if they have any grievances it is for the Dominion Government to take up their cause with the Provincial Government and see that they get their rights. I deem it unwise and unnecessary to stir up the minds of the rank and file of the Indian bands throughout the country by circulating petitions and asking them to raise money for lawyers to fight their battles. I am glad to say that no clergyman in this Diocese has done this. As a church we have appealed to the Dominion Government and received assurance that earnest efforts are being made to obtain a decision which will be recognized by all as final.

In facing the future we as a Diocese while doing our most in the way of self-support through contributing to our Diocesan Mission Fund, must of necessity look for assistance in our pioneer work from the church in Eastern Canada and in the Mother Land. We are deeply

grateful to the English Societies known by the letters—C. M. S., S. P. C., C. and C. C. S. as well as the missionary society of the Canadian church and the Woman's Auxiliary.

A month from today our brethren in Nova Scotia will be celebrating on the historic spot the 200th anniversary of the first Anglican service in Canada. While we cannot be present in person we can in spirit stretch forth our hand from the Pacific to the Atlantic across the vast Dominion of Canada and give the Diocese of Nova Scotia in the extreme east the heartfelt greetings of the Diocese of Caledonia in the far west.

"We are not divided,  
All one body we;  
One in hope and doctrine,  
One in charity."

Christian love above everything else is the bond which binds us together. May we as a Synod in all our deliberations feel more than ever that while there are diversity of gifts and differences of opinion we are all working for the one end under the leadership of the one master, Christ our King, to whom we would once more bend the knee and take the oath of allegiance that we may the better serve under the banner of the Cross our day and generation in the uplifting of humanity.



## LONG DISTANCE MOTOR RACE

ONE OF COMPETITORS IN RACE PUTS IN HERE

**The "Limit" Probably the Speediest Cruiser on the Coast.—Many Inspect the Vessel.—Race Starts From Ketchikan Next Monday.**

As a result of the invitation of the Publicity Club to the Pacific Motor Boat association for the boats in the long distance race from Ketchikan to Vancouver to call here, one put in yesterday and some of the other entries for the race may do so today or tomorrow. The start for the race is to take place next Monday, and there are about fifteen entries.

The motor which put in here is called "Limit", and it is supposed to represent the limit of highest speed yet reached in such craft. A large number of people made an inspection of Limit, and there is no doubt it awakened a decided interest among those who know the variety of pleasant excursions that can be made in smooth water all around Prince Rupert. The Limit flies the house flag of the International Power Boat association, and visitors were courteously received by the acting secretary and originator of the association, F. M. Foulser. He was secretary but resigned in favor of E. L. Kinman, former owner of the Limit, who is now operating a quartz mine he has bonded at Ninemile Mountain. The present owners of the boat are A. W. Le Page, Wm. R. Marriott and Wm. Fellows, who were all on board, the other members of the party being Mrs. Ed. Allen, Miss Anna Worthington and Mrs. Viola Nollain.

Although the little boat is but fifty feet long with a beam of ten and a half feet, the whole party is comfortably accommodated, so cunningly is space economized. Forward is the dining saloon, neatly fitted with sideboard and other conveniences. Next the galley, with cooking range on the one side and butler's pantry and carving table on the other. Aft are two state rooms with bunks. Amidships is the secret of the fame of the fast cruiser, the Ralaco engines of fifty horse power.

Some idea of the speed these engines produce may be guessed from the fact that in the long distance race in which it was last a competitor it was handicapped by a minute for each mile. This in a run of sixty miles. In another, the distance of which was 231 miles, the handicap was seven hours.

Secretary Foulser says the association has had this Alaska long distance race in mind for two years, and that it is certain to create a great interest in all

aquatic circles. The idea of it is the 'idea for which the association was formed—to bring to a popular realization the value of the motor boat for the purposes of pleasure and commerce. These races would probably be semi-annual affairs and each to be run between two points. The association had followed the course of Prince Rupert with interest, and one of the early races to come would certainly have this port as its objective point. This was the finest water on the coast for such boats and their trip up here had been much enjoyed by the whole party.

At four o'clock this morning the Limit skimmed away with the speed of a fish hawk. She will not know what her handicap is until the morning of the race.

The visit of the Limit awakened so general an interest here that the Optimist has arranged to receive the results of the race from Ketchikan to the Vancouver yacht club boathouse reported by wire.

## BUSINESS IS ON THE INCREASE

MANY PERMITS ARE BEING ISSUED EVERY WEEK NOW

Inspector McNeill Reports That This Fall Will Be Very Busy.—Many Fine Homes and New Business Places are Going Up.

Building operations in the city are on the increase and there is reason to believe that this fall will witness a big push in this line. A large number of men are now employed on a number of buildings and during the past two weeks building permits have been issued amounting to \$57,775. Alderman Gilley's name was brought into the limelight by the report of last night,

and he indignantly left the council chamber followed by some hooting from the crowd.

Former Mayor Keary is among those directly charged with graft in connection with the sales of land for unpaid taxes.

**MINING NEWS FROM HAZELTON**

**Mining Development Showing Up Well---  
Prices Refused for Land Shows  
Progress in Agriculture.**

A few prospectors have been finding their way up the Skeena this summer and of these John Blume & Fred Roger have made discoveries that have much promise. Several claims have been staked and some good ore samples brought in. The values are chiefly silver contained in galena and gray copper, and compare favorably with assays obtained in any part of the district. The claims staked are on both sides of Babine river, close to the Skeena. At present they are too far from transportation to be deemed of any great value but if a railway line is ever built up the Skeena to reach Groundhog mountain coal, what is thought to be an extensive district would be at once opened up.

**Water Supply for Aldermere**

A 5 H. P. kerosene engine and pump with 800 feet of pipe came on the steamer Inlander, on the last trip, for Broughton and McNeill of Aldermere, and will be used for supplying the town with water.

**Are Generous People**

A subscription list, circulated around town among the business man and others, for the benefit of Wm. White the victim of a powder accident at Buckskin mine, to assist in paying his expenses to the coast, for treatment at the hands of a specialist, netted over \$600.

**Many Coal Claims Located**

Prospecting for coal in Bulkley valley is being carried on more extensively this year than ever before. Many new seams have been found, some of them reaching over ten feet in width in places where for years it has been considered the seams were too narrow to be profitably mined. Work is being carried on vigorously and before fall it will be possible to tell something of the ultimate worth of the new finds.

**Can Afford a Vacation**

James Dyer of Rossland, who has been at Fourmile hill since May, left on Wednesday for his home, immediately following the receipt of the first payment on the bond on the Fourmile claims, given to a Vancouver syndicate.

**Erie Shows Much Ore**

Eight men are at work on the Erie claim on Fourmile, under bond to E. L. Kinman of Vancouver and much good ore has been uncovered in the last week. Three ledges have been opened beside the one on which the shaft is being sunk

and one of them shows eight inches of solid galena.

A contract has been let for sinking fifty feet from the bottom of the prospect shaft and it is Mr. Kinman's intention to sink 100 feet this year. In widening the shaft for timbers another streak of the high grade ore was uncovered on the foot wall side, which with the streak on the hanging wall side, makes nearly three feet of high grade ore now exposed.

**Big Price For Farm Land**

An offer of twenty-five dollars an acre for a tract of 940 acres of land near Hazelton was made and refused one day this week, which goes to show that present holders of land in this country have every confidence in the future.

**Native Silver From Babine Lake**

Ben Severson, a prospector who has been around Babine lake this summer, came to Hazelton Thursday with samples of ore from new finds close to the lake. Some of the pieces were plentifully sprinkled with native silver, occurring as flakes and nuggets in the quartz. Other pieces were largely composed of what passes for gray copper. He is sending samples away for assays and upon the receipt of returns will be able to tell more of the value of his claims.

**Telephone at Sealey**

A telephone line from the telegraph office here to the headquarters construction camp at Sealey is being put in and will be in working order within a few days.

**Nine Steam Shovels at Work**

J. B. L. McDonald, superintendent of construction for Foley, Welch & Stewart, is authority for the statement that there are nine steam shovels on the upper river, some of them being of the 75-ton type. All but one or two are at work and these last are on the ground and being put together. Monday morning Mr. McDonald and T. T. Duhlop left town for Bulkley valley on a tour of inspection, returning on Thursday.—*Omineca Herald.*

**ONLY ESPERANTO WILL BE USED**

SHAKESPERIAN PLAY IN THE NEW LANGUAGE

Sixth International Congress To Be Held At Washington Next Week.—Five Hundred Delegates Representative of Forty Nations.

Washington, August 10.—The Sixth international congress of Esperanto will begin at Washington on Sunday next. Meetings will be held at which the only language spoken will be Esperanto. "As You Like It" will be given in the woods in Esperanto. The 500 delegates from the forty nations to be represented will attend a game of ball at the American League Park. All the rules will be in Esperanto. Some of the decisions will be announced in it.

Friends of Esperanto say it has been making progress in the United States. It has been taken up by scientists, linguists, teachers, public men and commercial houses. At its last session the Maryland Legislature passed a law permitting the study of Esperanto in the public schools.

Owing to the use of the term "universal language" many have been misled into the belief that it was intended to substitute Esperanto for all other languages. That this is erroneous will be emphasized at the congress. Its author, Dr. L. L. Zamenhof of Warsaw Poland, will first in English and then in Esperanto tell what he had in mind when he prepared the first text book and what associations all over the world have been advocating them since. He will point out that Esperanto is meant to be a language to be used at all peace conferences, between business men in different countries and in all cases in which a common language is lacking.

The teaching of the language in the public schools of this country and abroad will be the principal topic during the congress. It is believed by the leaders that through the children in the schools success is to be obtained. It is declared by the advocates of the language that in the study of English and foreign tongues the knowledge of Esperanto will be of more value than Latin or Greek. Missionary work to this end will be planned.

Another thing that will be emphasized at the meeting is the use of the language to bring nations and races closer together. It is pointed out by Ivy Kellerman, Ph. D., author of several works on Esperanto, that Esperanto will help to bind nations

together and dispel the doubt with which races regard each other. She will deliver an address along these lines, pointing out the difficulty of travel abroad under old conditions and the ease with the use of Esperanto by many foreigners.

While the congress will not be convened until Sunday, an informal reception and concert will be given Saturday night, August 13, at the Arlington Hotel. All the vocal exercises will be in Esperanto.

On Sunday morning church services will be held in the Episcopal and Catholic churches. The Rev. James L. Smiley of Annapolis and the Rev. Paul Hoffman of Baltimore will preach. The sermons will be in the new tongue. In the evening there will be a concert, the vocal parts being repeated in Esperanto.

**SWARM OF HINDOOS**

Fifteen Hundred of Them Coming To the United States

(Special to the Optimist)

Calcutta, August 12.—Fifteen hundred Hindoos have sailed from here to the United States. The consul-general of the United States here says they will probably be refused permission to land. It may be they will be barred from entering via Canada.

**ENGINEER MINE IS A WINNER**

HELD BACK FOR YEARS BY A SERIES OF SQUABBLES

Present Owners Satisfied They Have A Big Bonanza.—Will Proceed to Erect Hundred Stamp Mill on The Property.

Atlin, B. C., August 7.—Capt. Alexander arrived yesterday from the Engineer mine with the first gold brick produced on the property. The weight of the brick is twenty pounds eight ounces, the product of eight hundred pounds of rock, four hours' run of the two-stamp mill. This is considered the record run of the world. It is estimated that the brick represents only sixty per cent of the value of the rock.

The mine has been working since January and about two hundred tons of rock have been taken out, which will average \$150 per ton. Three tons of selected rock will go six to ten thousand dollars per ton. These are conservative estimates.

Numerous leads have been opened up, all showing good values. After discovering values on the surface the leads were tapped by tunnels at a depth of four hundred and fifty feet, which demonstrates the continuance of the values through the entire body and proves the mine to be one of the richest, if not the richest in the world.

The owners intend to erect a hundred stamp mill at an early date, for which purpose Capt. Alexander expects to leave shortly for England. Particulars of the mine have not heretofore been made public owing to possible litigation, all likelihood of which is now at an end.

The Engineer group was one of the first discoveries of gold bearing quartz made in what is now the Conrad and Windy Arm mining district. It was made by engineers running the surveys for the White Pass railway in 1898, and some of the rich looking ore was brought to Skagway. There a company was formed, a million dollar company at one dollar per share. The first stock was issued at ten cents and after a time, as the company got into litigation with the owners, it could be bought for any old price. The property was tied up until last fall, and the report above is merely a verification of what the rock promised in its early days.

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
