SAM. BARKER OF HAMILTON

FORCED INTO THE LIMELIGHT OF PUBLICITY

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Declares That Sam Barker Has No Terrors For Him.—What a Big Bugaboo Sam Must Be as a Rudder.

Prince Albert, Sask., July 28.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier and party met with another great reception yesterday. F. F. Pardee, M. P., in opening an enthusiastic meeting quoted the statement of Sam Barker, of Hamilton, in an interview at Vancouver to the effect that the government had no right to spend public money on the Hudson Bay railway. The statement was greeted with storm, protesting groans and hisses.

"Yet," added Mr. Pardee, "Barker is one of the rudders of the conservative ship of state." (Renewed groans. "They have one policy for the east and one for the west and no settled policy.")

Sir Wilfrid discussed the navy policy. "I have been asked," he said, "why I talk to the people of the west. I am told it does not interest you, that you are inland. Ah, fellow Canadians, that is the very reason I talk it here. I would fain see our country such that what interests the coast of our continent shall interest the centre of the continent. We are all Canadians, together let us cultivate that spirit. To those who criticize me for taking the navy to the people of the west, I said: 'Oh eye of little faith,' you do not understand the spirit of Canadianism."

"When I go to British Columbian coast and Maritime provinces I shall talk Hudson Bay railway. What interests a part interests the world."

"It has no terrors for me despite Mr. Samuel Barker," he declared.

ARCHDUKE TURNS UP

Was Last Reported To Have Been Drowned Off Chilean Coast

(Special to the Optimist)

New York, August 4.—The versatile John Salvador, Archduke of Austria, who was last reported as having been drowned off the coast of Chili, has turned up here in the person of Baron Otto. He has had several conferences with lawyers since May, when the Emperor of Austria decreed him dead and confiscated to the crown all his estates.

In order to marry a Swiss maiden of lowly wstate the archduke years ago renounced all rights to his title and his family reversion; but since then he has been divorced, married an actress with whom he does not live and has perhaps now arrived at the conclusion that he has eaten husks long enough and that being archduke is better paying business than any of the many he has attempted.

ROAD FOR FRASER STREET

Engineer's Report Was Adopted by The Council

More work on city streets will soon be under way. The people on Fraser street and cross streets want plank roadways now. They cannot wait for the grading, which will be done within the next year. They have petitioned for the work and their request has been granted.

The city engineer reported on certain walks and plank roadways. He also reported on the plank roadway on Fraser

street and connecting streets. This work would cost something over \$5000, and the life of the work would be two or three years. The property owners on that street wished this work to be done in spite of the fact that the streets will be graded within the next year. He therefore recommended that the work be done.

Ald. Lynch, chairman of the Streets Committee reported in favor of the reports and recommended that the work be proceeded with.

Moved by Ald. Pattullo and Ald. Lynch that the engineer be authorized to prepare for proceeding with the work.

As to the assessment the corner lots will pay half the frontage on the side street and the full frontage on the avenue. This system will prevail all over the city.

The work will be done on usual terms viz eight hours a day and \$3.00 per day minimum wage, and no Asiatics employed.

CASE FOR CROWN NEARLY THROUGH

DEFENCE OF WILLIAMS WILL BEGIN THIS AFTERNOON

Defence Will Probably Be a Plea of Insanity—Seventeen Witnesses For the Crown—Complete Chain Of Evidence Produced.

G. T. Williams appeared before His Honor Judge Young this morning for trial on a charge of setting fire to his rooming house on Second avenue on July 19th. W. E. Fisher is conducting the prosecution and L. W. Patmore is defending Williams. The prisoner sits alongside his council crouched down in his chair. He has evidently worried considerably since he was confined to the cells. His face shows signs of failing health. Otherwise Williams conducts himself like a man who is not on trial and who has not a serious charge hanging over his head.

The defence has put in no plea as yet, but will this afternoon after court resumes. Judging from the cross examination of the crown's witnesses by the defence the plea will probably be temporary insanity, or something of similar nature.

The prosecution has seventeen witnesses. All were called this morning except chief of Police McCarvill. He will go on the stand this afternoon and when he finishes the defence will begin.

In the past issues of the Optimist the details of the case have been given and little new information was produced, although the chain of evidence the chief has worked up was made complete. Witnesses told of the prisoner warning his guests to be ready in case of fire, of his having talked much of fire, and insurance, of his buying gasoline and borrowing shears, and of having stuff removed from the hotel. Ald. G. R. Naden, the insurance agent who carried the insurance on the Talbot Rooms stated that at the time of the fire there was \$8000 insurance on the place. At present there is \$5000. To the judge Mr. Naden said the reduction was made because they considered the amount of insurance was away too high. Much more than the insured was entitled to.

The court adjourned at 12:15 until 2 o'clock.

Started Blasting

In accordance with a resolution of the council a station gang was put to work blasting on Seventh street and First avenue this morning removing the rock which will be up against the plate glass front of Peter Black's new hotel.

REMOVING REMAINS OF THEIR ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT

City May Buy the Boilers.—City Accountant to be Appointed.—Application for Fire Protection—Hydrants Not Here Yet.

The usual meeting of the city council was held last night when a number of minor matters were taken up and put through and a couple of by-laws were given the final reading and passed.

All the members were present except Ald. Smith and Ald. Hilditch.

Ald. Naden notified the council that there was a representative of the B. C. Tie and Timber Co in town who was gathering together all the odds and ends of their old electric light plant. There are a couple of boilers on their ground which are supposed to be as good as new. If the council still intends to go into the lighting business this year it might be well to look into this matter and see if those boilers can be purchased reasonably. The boilers might come in very usefully. Ald. Pattullo and Ald. Barrow moved that the Light Committee look into the matter.—Carried.

City Accountant

Ald. Mabley said that an important matter at this time was the appointment of a city accountant. The new books are here and some one is required to look after them. He moved therefore that the mayor he instructed to appoint a city accountant. Ald. Barrow seconded the motion and it carried.

Regulating Sewers

A by-law was introduced regulating city sewers. It was read a first time and carried.

The committee then finally adopted the Temporary Loan by-law.

The by-law on Public Morals was read a third time and passed.

The city seal has arrived and on motion of Ald. Pattullo and Ald. Mabley it was adopted as the city seal and will be used in future.

Inquiries

Under the head of inquiries Ald. McIntyre asked if the Engineer had made any report on the electric light plant.

The mayor said that the engineer was looking over all the data that had been submitted to him, and would report as soon as possible.

The Health Committee is considering the advisability of bringing in a by-law providing for a city pound. They will secure full details and bring on a by-law in due course.

Fire Protection

Mr. Christiansen put in an application for water connection for fire protection. He said that he had got one some time ago but evidently it had not yet been placed in the hands of the city clerk. He had purchased 300 feet of 2 inch hose and it would be a great benefit to all the surrounding buildings as well as their own premises. He therefore asked that they be granted the 2 inch connection with the water main.

The matter was referred to the Fire and Water Committee to deal with.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

All Committees Asked to Meet Friday Night

All the committees of the Agricultural Society are requested to meet tomorrow night and present their re-

ports. All interested in this movement are also requested to be present. The outside towns and villages are all making rapid progress with their portion of the work and they are enthusiastic. It is now up to the merchants and people of Prince Rupert to get busy and make the thing a big success. As a matter of fact the success of the fair this fall depends in a large measure upon the people of this town, as the other towns are doing their share. A big meeting is looked for tomorrow night.

Purchased a Safe

City Purchasing Agent E. A. Woods, has purchased a two-ton fire proof safe for the city and it was placed in the city hall this morning. The safe had been sent up to G. W. Morrow and was sold to the city at cost as the original purchaser had no use for it after going out of the meat business.

GOING AFTER BIGGER GAME

PUBLICITY CLUB WILL MAKE A FRESH START

Meeting Tomorrow Night is to be Made Interesting by Statements of What Other Publicity Clubs are Doing and New Plans.

H. H. Clarke, president of the Publicity Club, told the Optimist man this morning that the announcement made in these columns yesterday of the Publicity Club having called a public meeting for Friday evening, seemed to have stirred up public attention and many inquiries had been made as to what the meeting was about. He would like to say that the meeting would be of a purely business character on the subject of publicity work, but it would be made generally interesting by statements of what the club had done and what was being done by other publicity clubs both in Canada and on the other side of the boundary.

"There are a variety of reasons why the club has not been kept before the public as much as it ought to have been. These will be stated and also the plans for a new start will be laid before the meeting. I believe we shall have a large and representative gathering, and new vim instilled into the publicity movement.

"The Publicity Club started on modest lines and it has been a pronounced success along those lines. But the time has come when we should attempt more and accomplish more. It profits nothing to attempt the hunting of big game with small guns. We have largely interested the general public on the outside in Prince Rupert, but the letters received by our secretary are principally from the modest; men enquiring as to the chance for work or the opportunities for starting a small business. We want to go after bigger game and this we are going to do. To do this we need better guns and more guns, and plenty of ammunition."

BIG SHIP SAILED

Belle of Scotland Left For Portland To-day.—Takes Lumber to China.

The big steamer Belle of Scotland which brought rails here from Sydney, Cape Breton, sailed this morning for Portland, Ore., where she will load lumber for the Orient. The barge Ivy took on all the rails for the Portland canal railway and is now anchored in the harbor waiting to be towed to Stewart. The Belle of Scotland was only delayed here two days by the strike of the long-shoremen.

Another rail boat, the Bannockburn, is expected here from Cape Breton the third week in September.

Dropped in a Ditch

A little excitement was created on Sixth street at the corner of Second avenue last night when one of the hack horses dropped into a deep ditch. The horse had been let loose to eat up some of the timothy that is growing there and did not notice the deep narrow ditch running across the vacant property. "WATER ACT, 1909."

Whereas the Placer Gold Mines Company, a company duly incorporated under the laws relating to private corporations of the State of Washington, one of the United States of America, having its head office at the City of Seattle, in the said State of Washington, and duly licensed to carry on business in the Province of British Columbia, and having its head office for the Province in the City of Vancouver, has petitioned, under the provisions of the "Water Act, 1909," for a certificate in pursuance of the provisions of sections 85, 86, and 89 to enable the Company to proceed with its undertaking of the construction of works on Ruby Creek, in the Atlin Lake Mining Division, for the purposes of hydraulic mining, according to the plan submitted; and

The difference in altitude between the point of diversion and the point where the water is to be returned is approximately 400 feet. ALD. BARROW'S TIDAL POWER

COUNCIL URGED TO ACT ON THE MATTER OR STEP ASIDE

The Alderman Wants to Push His Scheme Ahead and Have it Proven—Many Countries Interested in Tidal Power Development.

The development of tidal power is liable to be proven feasible right here in Prince Rupert and within a short time. In many places in the world experts, scientists and engineers are working on the scheme. They are advancing and perfecting their scheme all the time. In Prince Rupert Ald. Barrow has a proposition which he believes will be feasible and also successful. He is for the time being tied up by the city council and until that august body sees fit to either take the proposition of or turn it down and step aside Ald. Barrow cannot move. On the other hand the alderman is anxious to have his plans proven as he realizes what an advantage and what an invaluable advertisement it would be for Prince Rupert to have the tidal power proposition prove successful here first. This was also the alderman's reason for urging the council to take some action which would further his scheme. The debate on the matter in the council last night was as follows:-

Ald. Barrow asked if the council would consider engaging someone in the engineer's department to look into the tidal power proposition which he has before the council. The engineer himself is too busy but even if he were not there is a whole mass of work which a subordinate could prepare for the engineer and thus give him a lot of valuable information. As it is the proposition is being held up and he (Ald. Barrow) cannot do anything.

Ald. Mobley said that the engineer had to look up a lot of information on the Zanardi Rapids anyway and he could make use of all information that might be secured.

There are not enough men in the engineer's department now to spare anyone, but later on when the street work and permanent water system gets under way the engineer might get a breathing spell.

Ald. Barrow said that a couple of months delay would injure his own chances to develop the scheme.

Ald. Naden favored the city spending something to get this information for the engineer so that he could come to some decision in the near future, or else

get out of the way and let Ald. Barrow proceed.

The engineer was instructed to bring in a report on the Zanardi Rapids power question.

A WRONG IDEA

Reporter Misunderstood Statements Of W. H. Dempster

An article appeared in last night's issue complaining about land grabbers up the river. The story purported to be an interview with W. H. Dempster of the G. T. P. Land Department. The reporter got a wrong impression of Mr. Dempster's views. That gentleman made no complaint about land grabbers and there is no fault to find up the river. What Mr. Dempster did say was that a few years ago a number of Vancouver capitalists sent into the Kitsumkalum Valley and staked a lot of timber leases on land where there was no timber whatever. Those leases are a detriment to the settlement of the country. The Land Purchase Act is one

of the best acts on the Provincial books and is doing a great deal towards opening up the country and allowing settlers to get in and clear the land on easy payments. There is no complaint, and no reason to complain, about land grabbers.

SURVEY PARTY

On Permanent Water Supply Are Making Rapid Progress

Engineer A. W. Agnew, who is in charge of the survey party which is operating between Woodworth Lake and the city arrived in town last night and left again today for the camp. He states that they are making rapid progress with their work and will soon be ready for the Chief Engineer to start his plans for the permanent water supply.
