

## LABOR DISPUTES ON THIRD AVE.

### THIRTY MEN OF S. P. McMORDIE'S GANG STANDING IDLE

#### Difference of Opinion Between Contractor and Laborers Over Length of the Working Day Whether Ten or Eight Hours.

Matters in connection with the grading of Third avenue are not going as smoothly as could be desired just at present. The work was going forward this morning certainly as could be seen, but the appearance of a number of husky laborers standing round with their hands thrust deep into their pockets, watching the other fellows work, did not look so healthy as the same gang looked when on the job yesterday.

Some thirty men are having a dispute with the contractor S. P. McMordie over the length of the working day. Should the day be one of ten or one of eight? is the question immediately at issue. Nothing so far has been said on the subject of the wage for the days work by either party.

The trouble began at five o'clock last night when S. P. McMordie who had been supervising the work on Third avenue went down to attend to the same duty in connection with his sewer contract.

Shortly after he arrived there his foreman on the Third avenue contract came hurrying down to him with the news that the gang had quit work at five p.m. declaring that they intended to work only an eight hour day.

The terms of S. P. McMordie's contract are that a day of not less than eight hours shall be worked at a minimum wage of \$3 but no stipulation exists to limit the day to eight hours. The eight hour day is from 8 a.m. to noon, and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. The ten hour day from 7 a.m. to noon, and from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. The wage for the eight hour day is \$3, for ten hour day \$3.75.

As soon as Mr. McMordie understood how matters were, he prepared to have work started as usual at seven o'clock this morning with a new gang of men. The disaffected gang was there, however, and the men made a hostile demonstration. Matters for a moment looked ugly the old gang insisting on going to work and Mr. McMordie thought it advisable to send for a police officer who came round promptly but found matters quieter than and Mr. McMordie directing the work of the new gang unmolested.

Interviewed by the Optimist this morning S. P. McMordie remarked that it was simply a question of his conducting the contract in his own way for the best interests of the city and his own business as contractor. There is a time limit on the contract of course, and it is desirable to get the work forward as rapidly as possible while the good weather and longer light lasts.

"Very soon" said Mr. McMordie "we shall not be able to put in more than an eight hour day as the winter sets in. Just now the ten hour day is an advantage especially owing to the spell of good working weather, therefore I have put on a gang of men who are willing to work the ten hour day."

At 9:30 this morning the thirty laborers in dispute with S. P. McMordie left Second avenue where they had been watching the new gang at work and went down to the City Hall to interview the Mayor and ascertain the exact terms of

## INQUEST OPENED ON MAN SHOT

### REMAINS OF JOSEPH BEAUDOIN VIEWED BY CORONER'S JURY

#### Inquest Adjourned Until Monday—Deceased Came of Well To Do Family—Had Wealthy Uncle in Vancouver.

At two o'clock yesterday afternoon an inquest was held on the remains of Joseph Beaudoin who died from the shot wound he received on Thursday night in the shack where he resided with his mate, Alphonse Reicher.

The jury consisted of T. H. Thompson, Alec McRae, John Vaughan, J. R. Beatty, J. D. Allen and J. H. Johnson. The jurors having been duly sworn, and the charge regarding their duties read over to them by Coroner McMullin, an adjournment was called to view the remains of the deceased in F. W. Hart's premises on the Rupert Road.

Here the body lay temporarily coffined and swathed in a blood stained garment. The bullet had entered the left side under the arm and remained lodged in the body. The jury paid particular attention to the position of the wound.

After evidence of identification had been given by George St. Clair who said he had known deceased Beaudoin for about thirty-five years, the inquest was adjourned until Monday evening at eight o'clock.

It appears that Beaudoin comes of well to do family. He was a native of Quebec and has a brother in Michael, in Wisconsin, and an uncle, N. Motin, who is well known in the lumber business in Vancouver. Joseph Beaudoin who was of a disposition less inclined to settle and save than the others of his family was in Prince Rupert when the townsite was cleared and did some contract work then as a lumberman. He also did contract work on the G. T. P. railway, and it is understood at Stewart. Little is as yet known of Alphonse Reicher who is at present in custody over this fatality.

## REICHER UP ON MURDER CHARGE

### ACCUSED APPEARS BEFORE MAGISTRATE TODAY

#### In Answer to Charge Reicher Prefers To Say Nothing.—He is Remanded Until Friday—Inquest is Adjourned to Monday.

Alphonse Reicher the man who gave himself up at the police station on Thursday evening over the shooting of Joseph Beaudoin who died next morning in hospital, and on whose body an inquest was opened yesterday, appeared this morning before Magistrate Cares in the police court.

A charge of murder was preferred against him.

Accused when asked if he had anything to say remained silent. He was remanded until next Friday, and returned to the cell.

The evidence will be taken at the inquest on Joseph Beaudoin adjourned till Monday at 8 p.m.

### PRINCESS MAY REPAIRS

#### Tenders Called For Work on Plates and on Interior

Victoria, Sept. 23.—Tenders have been called for the repairs to the C. P. R. steamer Princess May, now on the B. C. Marine Railway Company's ways at Esquimalt, and bids are to be in by noon tomorrow. About eighty plates are to be handled, about two-thirds of them renewed, while the remainder will be taken out and faired or faired in place. A number of floors, frames and beams have also to come out, and there is considerable work to be done to the saloon and some of the after cabins on the main deck. The work will occupy at least ten weeks, if not longer.

### Colliers Return to Work

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 21.—Thirty thousand coal miners of Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas and Oklahoma who have been on strike for five months returned to work today, all the mines in the southwest having resumed operations. The contract with the miners who returned to work will not expire for two years.

### Bars Close at Eleven

New Westminster, B. C., Sept. 23.—Commencing on Thursday of next week all bars in the city will close at 11 o'clock, in accordance with the provisions of a recently passed by-law. The hotel men are greatly annoyed at the by-law being enforced before the provincial fair is over.

### INQUEST ON CHARLES DALY

#### Who Died After Falling in Darkness off Plankway

Coroner McMullin opened an inquest this afternoon upon the body of Charles Daly who died from the effects of injuries to the head caused by his falling in the darkness off a plankway crossing the creek between the Dominion and Grand hotels.

The following are the jurymen: G. Armitage, F. E. Morgan, G. Woodhouse, Joseph Howe, James Ferguson, and Geo. Leek who was elected foreman. After the jury had been sworn, they adjourned to the Hart's morgue on Rupert Road to view the body, and thence to examine the scene of the man's fall—a precarious plankway which even in daylight the jurymen found difficult to negotiate.

The inquest was afterwards adjourned until 8 p. m., on Wednesday.

## INQUEST HELD ON MURDERER

### MYSTERY OF REID'S DISAPPEARANCE CLEARED UP

#### Concluded That Murderer Took His Own Life Shortly After Killing His Wife—Body Identified by Fellow Boarder.

Victoria, Sept. 22.—At 11 o'clock this morning an inquest on the body of George Reid, who is alleged to have murdered his wife at Clayburn several weeks ago, and whose body was found floating in the Fraser River at Mission yesterday, was begun at Mission.

Positive identification of the body was made last night by a young man named Porter, who had boarded in Reid's house, and this morning the provincial police headquarters here received further notification that the body found was indeed that of the missing man.

The gruesome discovery at Mission confirms a belief that had grown in the minds of the authorities for some time, that Reid had taken his own life shortly after the murder. The strange disappearance of the man was difficult to explain on any other hypothesis, as he was known to be unfamiliar with the country, and thus handicapped in any effort he might make to evade justice.

Another fact in connection with the murder of Mrs. Reid is explained by the finding of the body. Before entering the water Reid had cut his throat, and this explains why the razor with which he is alleged to have killed his wife was not found on the scene of the tragedy. Reid had evidently taken it away with him to use against himself.

The murder was committed on Sept. 6 and since that time the provincial police have carried on a baffling search for the criminal. The entire absence of clues is now explained.

The trip will extend to a matter of four or five days and is planned as a preliminary expedition to investigate the ground with a view to a longer expedition later in the season.

## CONFESSES TO AWFUL CRIME

MISLED POLICE WITH FAKED ACCOUNT OF TRAGEDY

Breaks Down When Cross-Questioned And Admits She Killed Both Her Father and Brother.—She is Only Thirteen Years of Age.

Newkirk, Okla., Sept. 21.—Possessing the man who attacked Ebby Alice Shepherd, 13, and beat her father, Taylor Shepherd, and her brother, J. W. Shepherd, to death, were called today, when the little girl, tearful and hysterical, confessed that she had killed her relatives.

According to the confession, the little girl sobbed out today the fantastic story she told Saturday of assault and murder was fabricated to cover her own terrible deed, when, angered because they had beaten her she stole up behind her father and beat him to death with an axe, and then fearing that her brother would discover the deed and tell of it, she killed him also.


The screams of the little girl brought people to the scene of the attack Saturday. They found her unconscious, her father bleeding and semi-conscious was lying near her and her brother was found not far away. The father regained consciousness and the few words he managed to speak confirmed the belief that a man had attacked his daughter and then had beaten him.

Those who heard the few words that Shepherd uttered believe today that he did not know who struck him and they think that the first blow probably rendered him unconscious and that the blows that were rained on his head afterward he knew nothing of.

For hours the girl lay unconscious, then when she regained her senses she told of an attack that had been made upon her. When she repeated her story there were a number of discrepancies and she was closely questioned. Under the cross-examination she broke down and told the story of her attack on her father and brother. She said that they had beaten her severely. She is hysterical today and under the care of a physician.

Both father and brother lived for several hours after they had been struck by the little girl. J. W. Shepherd never regained consciousness. Both suffered fractures of the skull.

## LONG DISTANCE CRITICS

Eleswhere in this issue is an article taken from the Edmonton Journal as a criticism of G. T. P. construction methods and hinting at deep designs. One might be led to suppose that the road referred to throughout the whole article was the G. T. P. whereas the complaint about excessive cost refers to the Government built portion of the line. The threadbare complaint of camp conditions does not at least refer to construction on this side of the mountain section which is proving the most expensive and slowest. In the camps at this end the men are undoubtedly as well or better fed than that class of men usually are. They receive a minimum wage of \$3 per day and this is the highest paid unskilled labor on any big contract in the country. The high wages while attracting a certain number of laborers from cheaper fields is on the other hand often a detriment to the labor market. Men soon get a little money ahead and then comes the desire to spend it. They go a long way in search of a carousal and usually do not return. The contractors lose thousands of dollars monthly during the summer season in advancing fares and meals to men who do not go to work, for white man is mighty uncertain in some things.

Other railroads may not be howling about the shortage of labor as the Journal says but none of them have like conditions to encounter as have the G. T. P. on the West Coast.

As for the suggestion that the G. T. P. may abandon the agreement with the Government, the suggestion is absurd and not worthy of consideration.

Out at Edmonton there may be plenty of labor. In fact, the contractors can get all the help they want at \$2 per day but that does not justify the Edmonton Journal claiming the cry of shortage is all tommyrot. Long distance critics are very likely to miss a few essential points.

## LABOR DISPUTES ON THIRD AVE.

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

the Second avenue contract regarding labor and the working day.

The men are acting as a body and without any proclaimed leader, but the foremost advocate of their cause amongst themselves are John Johnson, James Ross and James Brighton. These men state that the whole gang are anxious only to conform to the terms of the contract, and maintain that though one day of ten hours has been put in by the gang since the job started, they had all along the idea that they were engaged to work an eight hour day. There was some mention of a time and a half clause in the contract regarding wages for hours worked over the eight, but this the men do not immediately emphasize, repeating that they will abide by what is in the contract anyway.

The gang further maintains that there was no strike on their part; that they came on the job this morning prepared to work an eight hour day; that they were not given a chance to work nor to state their case; and that the policeman was summoned to turn them off the job. They further argue that if they are, as they consider themselves, dismissed, they were entitled to receive their time on the spot and at once, not at 3p.m. as promised by Mr. McMordie

There is no time and a half clause in the city contracts for Second avenue grading. The men were informed on this point by the city engineer this morning and agreed to wait until three o'clock in the afternoon when the city engineer thinks that possibly the matter will be amicably settled so that they can start again on Monday. The city engineer consulted with S. P. McMordie on the position this afternoon.

The opinion prevails among the citizens that the men are ill-advised to enter upon any sort of dispute regarding hours at this season since their working day will inevitably be curtailed soon enough by the approach of winter. Some business men, however, think that if a man wants to work eight hours instead of ten, or ten hours in preference to eight, and is paid by the hour he might as well be allowed to work for the time that suits him when his labor is needed for the city's improvement.

## MINING STRIKE NEAR BOUNDARY

### STEAMBOAT DISTRICT OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Ore Running Over Thousand Dollars Gold and Twenty-Six Ounces Silver.—Another Strike of Free Milling Ore is Made.

Vancouver, Sept. 21.—"A new strike has been made by Webb & Co of Seattle on their property in the Steamboat district of B. C., that runs \$1108 in gold and 26 ounces in silver," said Mr. B. A. Jennings late of Nevada, in an interview yesterday. Mr. Jennings has now made Vancouver his headquarters and intends to play a part in the mining life of the province. He has recently returned from Steamboat Mountain, which is situated at the headwaters of the Skagit. "This property," he continued, "lies close to the boundary line on the British Columbia side, and shows how extensive is the mineralized zone of the province. And in addition to the importance of a strike so close to Vancouver city, specimens of the new strike show free gold, the ore being porphyry, similar to that of the original strike made by Dan Greenwaldt on Steamboat Mountain."

Mr. Jennings referred to another body of ore in the same neighborhood, which pans freely, but which has not yet been assayed. Jetter and Hewitt have also uncovered a ledge of good free-milling ore of gold and some silver.

This instrument consists of outside—visible 13 brass trumpets, 13 brass piccolos, 13 wooden flagelets. Inside 5 open basses 13 open pipes 6 stopped pipes 11 pipes in accompanied. Bottom 5 stopped basses, 7 stopped pipes, 10 pieces in accompanied, 1 stop for trumpets also base and snare drum. It has a surprising volume of tone, is very handsome in appearance and is especially fine for dancing and skating.

It will also prove exceedingly attractive to the rinking business Mr. Warren had certainly an ear for music when he selected an instrument of this kind. You can easily hear the sweet strains of music in any part of the rink as it penetrates through the moving panorama of skaters who at one time made a roar like Niagara. The floor has recently been put into such shape that the skaters now make only a buzzing like a bee on a hot summer day.

The new band organ is now in operation and will prove a great attraction to skaters and to beginners.

### SILVER CUP REVEALS MORE WEALTH

Winter Cabins Constructed and a Full Crew to be Employed Throughout Year

Hazelton, Sept. 23.—On the Silver Cup the number two tunnel is being driven ahead on four feet of high grade ore and sacked ready for shipment. C. Bierns has secured the contract for packing 100 tons of ore and proposes to keep his pack train busy on these shipments until the close of navigation. Work on the Duchess claim of the company has disclosed a fine body of ore and proves the Cup vein for a length of over 300 feet with practically the whole of the Silver Dollar claim unexplored. Winter cabins have been constructed and all necessary plans made for the continuance of vigorous development throughout the winter. It is calculated to have the mine in shape for a phenomenal production next spring and summer. Judging by the estimates placed on the property by engineers and experienced mining men who have recently visited the mine it is evident the Silver Cup mine is destined to make Ninemile mountain and the Hazelton mining district famous.

American Railroad Commission Orders Suspension of New Tariffs

Washington, Sept. 22.—Suspension of increased tariff schedules filed recently by forty railroads operating in the Western and Southwestern territory was ordered today by the Interstate Commerce Commission, the date of operation being extended until January 5, 1911. The commission ordered a full hearing on complaints against the proposed tariffs becoming effective, reserving announcement of the time and place for the hearing.

## GOLD THIEVES ARE WATCHED

### TRANSPORTATION MAN UNDER SURVEILLANCE

Theories of the Police—Men Who Fled to the Hills After Doing the Job Were Undoubtedly Well Paid For Their Work.

Seattle, Sept. 21.—Watched night and day by detectives, a certain transportation employe now in Seattle, is under surveillance, suspected of having in his possession the \$57,000 in gold bullion which was stolen from the treasure room of the steamboat Tanana, on the Tanana river.

According to advices received here yesterday morning the two ex-convicts, "Badger" Oleson and "Hump" Penderon, are now believed to have been only the tools of this man, who paid them well for their trouble.

They then made for the hill country, where they are now being pursued by special agents and detectives in the Kayih mountains.

These men, if captured, it is believed, will turn state's evidence.

The transportation man suspected was seen about six months ago talking with a counterfeiter who is known by the government secret service men to have a "plant" somewhere in the Cascade mountains.

In view of the fact that the stolen gold is of such a color that it would be impossible to dispose of it in any assay office in the country it is believed that this man will turn it over to the counterfeiters who will make it into five, ten and twenty-dollar gold pieces and dispose of the money here in Seattle.

## DEATH OVER WORRY

### Farmer Who Ran Over Man Seized With Remorse

Colfax, Wash., Sept. 19.—Albert Schultze, a wealthy farmer living five miles west of Colfax, died suddenly at his home yesterday. Schultze was lodged in jail here Monday night and fined \$25 and costs for attempting to drive over F. J. Zesiger, another farmer, while both were on their way home. Schultze overtook Zesiger, who was driving a hack, while Schultze had a grain wagon with four abreast. Zesiger was trampled in the dust and his hack broken up. Schultze is said to have worried over the affair and the humiliation of being lodged in jail, until either he took poison or his worry caused heart failure.

The coroner's jury of Colfax will investigate the cause of his death. Schultze admitted that he had been drinking and had a bottle of whisky with him when he ran over Zesiger. He did not remember the facts about the accident.

## ON DEFENCE OF PACIFIC

### "FIGHTING BOB" EVANS WANTS A LARGE FLEET

Should Uncle Sam Adopt Veteran's Suggestion Canada Would Have to Follow, Fortifying Prince Rupert Harbor and Building Shipyards

Seattle, Sept. 19.—"Fighting" Bob Evans is in Seattle today and declares that he is a warm supporter of the plan for a big fleet of battleships for the Pacific.

As to the expense of a large fleet, the admiral declared that as insurance alone it would pay the government.

"It has been figured," said he, "that the cost of a fleet of 100 battleships would not exceed one-tenth of one per cent of the property within reach of 12-inch guns on the Atlantic coast.

As proof of the insurance value of battleships he pointed out that at the beginning of the Spanish-American war property along the Atlantic sea coast depreciated in value and houses exposed to the sea could not be rented at any price.

Taking up the protection afforded along the Pacific coast defences and forts, the admiral characterized a fort as a sign for a hostile fleet to steer clear of. He said that a fort was only useful to the country within reach of its guns.

Even after the Panama Canal is completed, the admiral contends, the United States should still keep a permanent fleet on the Pacific coast. He insists that the hazard of ships passing through the canal during a war would be too great to risk the entire fleet on the Atlantic coast.

## ALASKA'S NEW RAILWAY

### Trains Now Running Out of Cordova Into the Interior

Cordova, Alaska, Sept. 21.—Copper River & Northwestern railroad today celebrated the opening of the train service to the new town of Chitina, at mile 135, and also the connecting of the Fairbanks trail with the railway at Chitina.

The remaining sixty miles of the road are graded and rails and bridge steels are being sent to the front to insure completion of the road to the Bonanza copper field on January 1.

The town of Chitina declared a holiday and welcomed a long train loaded with building material and supplies.

With the opening of the new route to Fairbanks, the time of winter travel will be greatly lessened as well as its discomfort and danger.

## OLD PROBLEM NOW SOLVED

### OF INTEREST TO SKEENA DISTRICT MINING OPERATORS

**New Process In Reduction of Silver-Lead Ores Claimed to be Successful—Merchantable Products Made from Refractory Ores.**

Nelson, Sept. 19.—The great problem that has confronted mining industries of the interior is now declared to have been solved. That a smelter for demonstrating the success of a new method for the reduction of low-grade zinc ores will be established in or near Nelson, and be in full working order before Christmas, was the statement made today by A. Gordon French, an eminent consulting metallurgical chemist of Victoria.

Mr. French has been visiting various silver-lead zinc properties in the Kootenays during the past few weeks with the result that he has been confirmed in his belief that he has worked out a method for the reduction of the refractory ores in the Kootenay, containing a comparatively small percentage of zinc, on a commercial scale. Mr. French is representing French's Complex Ore Reduction Co., which has been organized by large capitalists at Victoria. He left for the coast today and upon his return will make arrangements for the erection of a smelter at Nelson with a capacity of four or five tons of ore per day. This new method having proved successful, one or more large smelters will be built in the Kootenays at least one of which will be located in Nelson.

"The main object of the new smelter," said Mr. French, "is the recovery of zinc in the form of the merchantable products of that metal, the metallic zinc and the well known zinc white. The residue containing lead and silver, will be forwarded to the Trail smelter and there reduced. That my method is a success, I proved by experiments with Kootenay ore. Since I have come to the Kootenay and visited the Slocan and other mills, of which the chief values lie in silver lead ore made refractory by the presence of zinc, I have been more than convinced that the demonstrative smelter we shall erect before the snow comes will prove to the mine owners in the district that a method has been discovered for the reduction at a reasonable cost, of the complex ores of the Slocan and other parts of the Kootenays."

Mr. French has been engaged in the study of refractory ores all his life. At an early age he learned the rudiments of metallurgical chemistry at Glasgow, later on going to Swansea, the centre of the greatest lead and zinc refineries in Great Britain. For the great smelting company of Vivian & Son, he there devised a method for the successful smelting of the Constantine ores of the Island of Sardinia, which were recognized by smelter men as presenting the greatest difficulties that had, up to that time, been encountered in modern smelting. He reorganized the famous Brokenhill mines of Australia and put them on a paying basis, built the first copper smelter in Canada at Notre Dame, Newfoundland, and was responsible for the working of a big smelter for the reduction of the ores from the Bethanga mines in Victoria, Australia. In this instance, he adopted the same method of procedure as in the case of the silver lead zinc ores of the Kootenay. At the request of Byron

N. White, of the Slocan Star mine, near Sandon, and of M. S. Davies, of the Hewitt mine at Silverton, Mr. French will visit both these properties on his way to the coast.

## BRAVES WAVES TO SAVE PUPILS

### TEACHER CARRIED LITTLE TOTS FROM BLAZING FOREST

Rushes With Her Charges Into Wind Tossed Bay From Seething Wall of Fire—Movement to Present Her With Medal.

Bellingham, Sept. 19.—The parents of the children in the Bennett school district, three miles from the Bellingham city limits, are collecting a fund to buy a gold medal for Miss Georgia O'Neil, teacher of the Bennett school who, last Monday, when the house was hemmed in on three sides by forest fires, led her charges to safety through the surf and spray of Puget Sound. Fanned by heavy winds, the fires swept up to the school house before Miss O'Neil was aware of the danger. Where the roadway had been clear a moment before was a seething wall of fire and the woods in every direction were a furnace. A narrow clearing leading to the water front alone remained open.

Sending the larger children on ahead, Miss O'Neil hurried to the beach with the smaller ones. The underbrush and even the drift wood was on fire to the very water's edge. Wading boldly into the surf, Miss O'Neil carried the little tots pick-a-back to some rocks several rods from shore. Returning again and again she moved her little band through the water along the beach to where a cleared space on land enabled the children to come ashore, not a child having been injured.

## READ TO DEAD FATHER

### Eulogies of Prince Ito's Work In Korea Read at Grave

Victoria, Sept. 19.—Japanese advices state that since the annexation of Korea was accomplished, there have been remarkable scenes at Prince Ito's grave.

Following a cablegram from Viscount Terauchi, resident-general of Korea announcing the annexation, the message was read to the spirit of his father by the young Prince Ito. A delegation of prominent members of the Seiyukai party afterwards visited the tomb "to make a report of the successful annexation of Korea."

Eulogies of Prince Ito and his work in Korea were read to the spirits.

A. degree from Acadia College, the Baptist school of Maritime Provinces. He spent three years at the Newton Theological Institution, Boston, Mass., and was graduated from that school in 1901. Mr. McLeod also took a Post Graduate course at the University of Chicago. He was appointed to a fellowship in this university which is a recognition of excellent scholarship. He received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity from the University of Chicago and was presented with the same degree as that given by McMaster University, Toronto, last June.

## CHANNEL AIR ROUTE

### Novel Scheme to Establish Aerial Passenger Service

Paris, Sept. 21.—The first line of cross-Channel aeroplanes is, it seems, to be established between Boulogne and Folkestone. Such, at least, is the ambitious scheme of the Ligue Nationale Aerienne, which it is said, has begun negotiations with the authorities of the two channel ports to induce them to offer a big prize for the first regular aerial service. It suggests that a sum of \$10,000 be promised to the aviator who on four successive days, or four times within the same week shall have made the voyage to and from one port or the other with one or more passengers.

The aeroplane is to be constructed so that it shall be capable of alighting on the water without sinking, and of starting again without assistance. The aviator is to start in the presence of an official of each town, so that there shall be no doubt as to the reality of the performance. This is supposed to be the most practical means of inaugurating the new service and making it popular.



ORIGIN OF TETE JAUNE

Probably Yellowhead Pass Got Its Name From Same Source

Many of the historic posts of the Hudson's Bay Company in the west will be disturbed this year through the building of the G. T. P., which is conquering the passage of the Rocky Mountains and the coast range. One of the most notable of these old posts, which was used as a base for the supply of the posts in the interior of British Columbia, is Jasper House, situated on the Athabasca River and about 200 miles west of Edmonton.

Jasper House was built about 1800, and the records of the Hudson's Bay Company show that it was established in the forest on the shore of a small lake surrounded by high rocks except on the lake side. In 1817 the factor in charge was Jasper Hawes. It is his Christian name which gives the name of the post, which, however, in the early years of its establishment was popularly called "Rocky Mountain House," although the post of that name was afterwards officially established at the junction of the north Saskatchewan River and the Clearwater River in Alberta.

Jasper Hawes was celebrated for the great shock of yellow hair that he wore, and the Indian and half-breed hunters referred to him as "Tete Jaune."

### NEW WATER SYSTEM

#### Fort George Has a Bountiful Supply In Nechaco River

A bountiful supply of pure water is one of the greatest assets a new town can boast. While Fort George has never suffered from a scarcity of aqua pura, the fast-growing population demands a modern and easy method of procuring this greatest necessity, says the Fort George Tribune. No wells have yet been sunk in the town, the population as a whole preferring to quaff the sparkling and health-giving waters of the Nechaco River, which flows past the town. To facilitate this a large supply tank, having a capacity of 2,500 gallons, is being placed at the intersection of Central Avenue and Hammond street, near the bank of the Nechaco. A 6 h.p. gasoline engine will operate a pumping plant. Underground water pipes will be laid to central parts of the town and auxiliary reservoirs located where deemed necessary.

This, by the way, is but a temporary arrangement. The magnificent power site acquired near the Willow River is intended soon to furnish facilities for a complete and modern system of water-works and sewerage and an electric lighting system.





**WHAT IS BEHIND**

(Edmonton Journal)

That there is something more than mere shortage of labor behind the G. T. P. howl is a matter which requires but little perspicuity to appreciate.

If all that stood between the Grand Trunk Pacific and the accomplishment of its designs was the lack of a few hundred or thousand railroaders to construct the mountain section it is not at all likely that men of the calibre that Hays and Smithers are presumed to be would waste much time going about the country howling about the necessity or Oriental labor. They would simply take a leaf from the Canadian Northern and C. P. R. and improve the conditions under which the railroaders work. If that was not sufficient inducement, a raise of a few cents a day in the pay offered would bring them.

The cry that there are not men enough to do the work is all tommy-rot. When the United States commenced to build the Panama Canal it took possession of a pestilential, fever-laden swamp, the graveyard of the hopes, ambitions and reputations of the alleged great men of France, and by the application of proper sanitary science made the camps along the ditch healthy and pleasant places in which to live, with the ultimate result that there is now sufficient labor to build the canal and more offering for the past year than has been required. The rules which applied to Panama should apply to the Coast section of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and the new transcontinental has the advantage over any other road that ever crossed the mountains in the respect that three quarters of the cost, whatever that may be, is guaranteed by the government, making it a work on which, for all practical purposes, the usual usages of public works could be applied.

Furthermore, the other railway enterprises in this country are not raising any howl about shortage of labor or the necessity of importing Orientals and why should the Grand Trunk?

It is noticeable in this connection that the agent of the Norwegian government in Montreal, only the other day, came out with the statement that he was advising his fellow countrymen not to come to Canada to work on the railways, as he had ample evidence that they were not well treated when they got here. Considering in connection with this fact that some six months ago the announcement was made that the G. T. P. had put itself in a position to get all the labor required by opening employment offices in Norway, it is easily seen that any labor shortage which prevails is due to circumstances over which Hays and Smithers have absolute control and which they could amend by merely issuing the orders.

It must be that there is something more than the labor shortage back of this G. T. P. howl.

It is a well known fact that President Hays has had engineers on the ground from the commencement of construction of the Transcontinental and that he has been protesting to Ottawa about the excessive cost, filing his protests in detail to show where the cost is out of all proportion to the difficulties, pointing out the places where the specifications have been altered to give rock prices for loose earth excavation and all the other grafts which have become notorious on the part of the road.

Can it be that the stupendous cost which has been piled up against the Transcontinental and on which according to the agreement the G. T. P. must pay three per cent., has frightened Hays to such an extent that he is about to throw the whole proposition back on the government's hands?

If that is the case, the west will say without hesitation "done."
